The ordinary regulations for the supplies of the troops from Itapiru have, in the meantime, been countermanded, which confirms the opinion that some change of position is meditated.

DEATH OF CAPTAIN SMYLEY.

It is with profound regret we have to announce to our readers the death of Captain W. H. Smyley, a worthy American citizen who served with distinction under our lamented countryman Admiral Broune, and in subsequent years played a very conspicuous role in the waters of the South Pacific and Atlantic.

The loss of Captain Smyley will be long felt, not only by the immediate circle of his friends at home and abroad, but by the Mercantile Marine navigating the Straits of Magellan, where he was a sort of "Neptune"—intimately acquainted with every spot on the Patagonian coast, and the best pilot extant for the difficult navigation of the Straits.

ON CHANGE.

We have been daily with the following by a merchant (Glasgow, Jan. 11)—When we last had to report the Liverpool market dull, and this continued to be the predominant feature for the two following days, but on the 11th inst. the news of a decided falling-off in the receipts of cotton at the American ports produced a better demand, and on the 13th the confirmation of this news combined with better accounts from the American receipts kept moderate prices well considerably higher two or three months ago.

February 20, 1868. Nothing done in Bonds to-day, and business brought to a standstill owing to the interrupted communication with Montevideo. All kinds of rumors were current as to the cause. It was pretty generally held that the last five messages, with the most important news, had arrived; that Pedro Varela was holding out in the fort, and that the Blanco party held the rest of the town.
