A NEBULA RESOLVED.

It is time the curtain was raised. The audience is growing impatient. It is sick of the orchestral prelude; and well it may be—for the instruments are woefully out of tune, and there seems to be no clearness of design in the composition; and, horrible to relate, some of the very first fiddles, instead of attending to their parts, have been breaking each others heads.

has there indeed led to civil war; and the effects of it are ordinarily kept in check only by the solidity of character and the political training of the people. In countries where the Spanish race is predominant, the nuisances proper to party Government are aggravated tenfold. Even in Spain itself, which, we cannot say boasts, but is possessed of a Monarchical form of Government, the rise and fall of Administrations is simply the sweeping in and sweeping out of a herd of subordinates; the outsiders, called 'cesantes,' remaining a standing nucleus of revolution and discontent.

is a most valuable and venerable relic. It was built in 1152, twenty years before the English invasion, and combines the Norman and Gothic styles. The main song of the monks was frequently interrupted by the blast of war, and the place was three times plundered or wrecked, but there is enough remaining of the choir, nave, transepts, and cloister, to show the vastness of the structure. The nave is 131 feet long, the arches are light and elegant, the windows and capitals well moulded: the final desecration under Cromwell's soldiers was attended with the destruction of the tombs of kings and abbots, whose insignia are still seen on fragments rudely thrown about: two stones are entire, one apparently belonging to a bishop, the other to some belted knight of remote antiquity.

EDITOR'S TABLE. In a correspondence from Lisbon, with latest telegraphic news up to the moment of the sailing of the French packet, published by our valued colleague the Tribuna, we read that the news brought by the telegraphic wires with regard to the Ministerial changes in England stated that the whole Ministry had resigned, and that Mr. Disraeli had been charged by the Queen to form a new Cabinet. Although the wording of the telegram might lead to the conclusion that a Ministerial crisis had taken place, we anticipate that it will turn out that the only change has been that Lord Derby has, on account of ill health, resigned the Premiership to Mr. Disraeli, who will probably be succeeded in the Chancellorship of the Exchequer by either Sir Stafford Northcote or Mr. Garthorne Hardy.

The locomotive General Flores has for some days past been put into use and is rendering important services in carrying material—that the bridges are expected by the David Napier which has sailed from Liverpool—that four more vessels with materials are daily expected—that there are in port four ships unloading—and lastly, that competent persons who have visited the deposits have expressed surprise at the quantity of material for the undertaking there collected. He adds that all the embankments as far as Piedras including bridges and alcantarras are ready with the exception of a very small bit about to be finished at Paso Molino. He concludes with these words—"I have the most complete conviction that once the line is open to public traffic the shares will be at a premium in the market, and that when a statement of operations is given to the shareholders, others will lament not having been wise enough to invest their money in the Uruguay Central Railway."

The free and easy manner with which she steps the boards, and a certain non so ché about her, seem to betray, in spite of an Italianised name, a Gallic origin, or at least that she has inhaled the exotic atmosphere where live those beings so aptly typified by the French historians of the declassees. As we understand that she now for the first time makes her appearance on the boards, we cannot but congratulate Amelia Tesio on the great success she has obtained.

This is a sad state of things for sheepfarmers to contemplate, and the worst of it is, they seem resigned to the thought that they are incapable of doing aught to improve it. Yet there is a little foundation for the hope of anything "turning up," as there was for the expectations of Wilkins Macawber. Nothing is likely to happen at the Antipodes or in Europe, beneficially to effect the sheepbreeding interests here.



the "prospects of sheepfarming;" such discussion would be fruitless. The present state of the business must be accepted as the normal state; the past was the abnormal. The present state is susceptible of being somewhat improved by their own exertions, but to expect the golden period to return is a wild delusion.

At Assuncion, the capital of Paraguay, we stopped two days, and the most remarkable thing I saw was all the Paraguayan ladies barefooted. I do not speak of the common country people, or poor inhabitants of the town, but of the first-class ladies, dressed in the latest fashions, with costly shawls and large crino lines, but—barefooted. This is the national custom.

There were at that time but a few strangers at Assuncion; some English were employed by the single existing railway here (but a few leagues long), eight or nine Frenchmen, and a few Germans, who kept shops or hotels, or were mechanics. Further up the river the country appeared more and more unpeopled, and the alligators began to appear in greater numbers.

The number of tigers in these almost unpeopled localities is astonishing. We saw one, stepping slowly along the bank of the river, not at all disturbed by the noise and movement of the steamer, and seeming hardly to notice us. More strange yet was the spectacle of another large tiger who crossed the river swimming nearly under our bow, the river being very wide at this point, and making at the same time, an effort to board us by the novel mode of climbing up one of our wheels, as we passed.

When we reached Cuyaba, the capital of Matto Grosso, a nice town with about 10,000 inhabitants, there was a rumour in circulation that an expedition was ready to set out for a new gold country, about 100 or 150 miles distant.

It is generally known that about 60 or 70 years ago there was found more gold in the vicinity of Cuyaba, especially in the very spot where Cuyaba now stands than perhaps in our times in California. All the surrounding country of that town from 20 to 30 miles distant was literally turned up; large heaps of stones were still to be seen in every direction, also ditches and water conduits. I saw a water conduit still in tolerable repair, of 20 miles in length. There are yet many places left where gold is in abundance, but the country has little water, and the people of Matto Grosso are not enterprising enough to construct new and costly water conduits, perhaps 20 or 30 miles long, without which it would be impossible to wash the gold.

I learned also, that there was an American who worked with five or six people upon the highlands of the sierra, about 35 miles distant from Cuyaba. I couldn't find out how much he gained by his labour, but I suppose it must be something worth the trouble, because he had already been thus employed for three or four years. The highlands of these sierras, about 5,000 feet above the level of the sea, are very healthy and also very suitable for farming; the coffee of these grounds is said to be the best of Brazil.

In regard to cotton, I must yet add that Matto Grosso is the true cotton country. I numbered about 20 different species of cotton trees and plants, which grow wild in greatest abundance in every part of the vicinity of Cuyaba.

In respect to the above mentioned expedition, which was to set out for the gold country, I learned the following curious facts: there lived 50 or 60 years ago in Cuyaba a Portuguese, who, because the gold in the vicinity of the town was almost exhausted, resolved to make an exploring expedition a little further in the country, where, till then, people had not dared to go. He set out with two mules, laden with provisions and the necessary tools for gold digging. After about a month he returned with much gold, but also very sick. He lived but a few weeks. Before he died he communicated to his son the secret that he had found the richest gold country of the world, and gave him a description of the necessary directions to find his way again, and recommended him to be silent about the whole matter.

Some time after his death his son also set out in search of the appointed country, and succeeded in finding it, but had some encounters with the Indians which prevented him from returning with as much gold as he would otherwise have brought. He returned sick, and died, as his father did some few weeks afterwards, and with him died the secret, but there exists in Cuyaba an old manuscript which relates this strange story, and there are also old people who remember to have heard it mentioned in their youth.

grazed near the banks of the river was captured by a lasso and brought living on board, struggling with rage, but powerless, their legs and horns tied with strong cords.

After an absence of two or three weeks the expedition came back—two or three had died, and of the rest a great number were sick. I learned afterwards that the leaders of the expedition soon became involved in disorders, and after going some 60 or 80 miles, with fruitless searches after gold and diamonds, they turned back; rather, perhaps from a lack of proper management and a scarcity of provisions than any other cause; for I am satisfied, indeed, I know, that the land of gold and diamonds is still there. I have no doubt that an expedition of from 80 to 100 men, with a sufficient number of mules, good tents to protect them not only from the night air, but from the intense heat of mid-day, with plenty of provisions, and well armed for defence against the hostile tribes, would prove a success. To bring back a hundred mules laden with gold and precious stones, would well repay for the expedition.

Dear Sir, Information having been received from the Welsh Colony in Patagonia that the settlers there are very scant of clothing, an appeal is thus made to the English residents of this city for any cast off wearing apparel, to be forwarded to the colonists.

The colonists, it appears, have been bravely contending for two years against adverse vicissitudes, but have now been firmly located, and in all probability will be able to maintain themselves and prosper after the present year. The winter, however, coming on, and the climate being somewhat cold, to be moderately clothed would considerably aid and encourage the colonists to work.

There are some 130 persons in the settlement—men, women and children; and when it is considered that the little stock brought out by them has not been replenished since their departure from home, now going on three years, it will be seen that apparel of every description will be appreciated.

The goods thus gathered will be placed under the care of Mr. L. Jones, who represents the Colony. The vessel is advertised to sail next Saturday, the 4th April. Parcels marked "Welsh Colony," will be received at the Standard office, 74 Belgrano, up to Saturday morning at 12 o'clock.
