THE MONTEVIDEAN BANKS. The following is a textual translation of the Bill on the Banks passed by the Montevidean Senate and Chamber of Representatives, and which awaits the sanction of the Executive to become law. Art. 1. Experience having shown the necessity of complying with the provisions of the decree of 16th December 1867, the Government shall appoint a commission composed of five competent and characterized persons who after a careful study of the subject, and of the economic requirements and conditions of the country, may propose such measures as will lead to settle upon a solid foundation the institutions of credit and give security for their stability.

Art. 2. Whilst the legislation on Institutions of credit be under revision, the Banks, from the first of June next, shall begin the conversion with 10 per cent. bi-monthly of all their respective emissions, up to the 31st March 1869—publishing in their monthly balance sheets the amount of the conversion.

Art. 3. The excess of the emission over the capital fixed by law, shall be withdrawn from circulation within the ten months conceded for the partial conversion.

Art. 4. From the 1st April 1869, when the partial conversion will be completed, the Banks shall always hold and keep in their chests a sum in gold not less than the amount of their realized capital—whatever be the total of their notes in circulation.

Art. 5. The partial conversion is not obligatory for those who do not wish to avail themselves of it during the whole or part of the period fixed; but while this should last they can make use of the faculty of not converting every two months, more than 10 per cent. of their circulating paper.

Art. 6. The banks of emission shall establish a central fund, independent of their banking operations, which shall be intended to represent a guarantee of the conversion of their notes into specie; said fund to be established within thirty days, beginning on the 1st of June.

Art. 7. The directory of the central fund to be composed of representatives of each bank, who are to elect a chairman among themselves. The Government is to appoint annually a commission, composed of native and foreign merchants, equal less one in number to the members of the directory. The Government commission to have a deliberative vote in the sessions of the directory, and lend its services gratuitously.

Art. 8. The provisions of the two preceding articles are not obligatory for the banks that do not wish to form part of the central fund.

Art. 9. Whether this combination be accepted or not all Banks are to guarantee in the form the Government may determine, the total of their notes actually in circulation by the specie they represent in hand, and the balance by securities which are to be appraised by a commission of merchants and Bankers appointed in conformity with the provisions of Art. 7.

Art. 10. At the expiration of the period for the partial conversion, the banks shall exchange their notes with each other, at farthest every week, and shall not be allowed to make the notes of other banks appear in their balance sheets as specie.

Art. 11. The central fund, as well as the banks that do not form part of it, shall stamp with a special seal all the notes presented for conversion, except those for small change.

Art. 12. The failure of compliance with any of the above conditions will be sufficient to enforce the immediate liquidation of banks that should violate or elude them, let the motive or pretext invoked be what it may. We published in our columns a few days ago the proposal of Señor Esteres relative to the same question, and in connection with it we had the following in the "Siglo" and "Tribuna" of Montevideo:— "Montevideo, May 26, 1868.
