LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Montevideo, June 3, 10.30 A.M. The banks opened at 10. Excitement every moment increasing, the crowds being driven back at the point of the bayonet. Extra number of forces protecting the Banks.

11.30 A.M. National Guards in great force.

IMPORTANT DECISION.

TOMKINSON versus GATH.

The Supreme Court has just decided this important case, and, as the judgment in question involves matters of public interest, we have taken the trouble to go through the papers in order to place the case fully before our readers.

It is much to be regretted that neither the tribunals of the country, nor the parties interested in lawsuits where questions of any importance are decided, take steps to have the decisions published in English. Scarcely a week passes that there are not maritime or commercial questions adjudicated respecting which the general public knows nothing. All important cases in Europe and in the States are invariably published in the news papers; and thus prove a guidance to the public. In this country, however, a mysterious secrecy is observed regarding what transpires in the courts of law, and we call the attention of our commercial readers to the fact that up to the present the ventilation of all questions involving important principles has proved highly beneficial for the foreigners interested.

We take to ourselves the credit of having put the National Government completely out of court in the great verba case of the Fiscal v. Stewart, and in several other minor cases, but calling in dispute important questions of common, commercial, and maritime law, we are proud to say our views have almost invariably met with the unanimous approval of the Argentine Bench.

In the case in question, the judgment of the Supreme Court, on appeal, admits of no discussion. We are free to say, that for us, it establishes new principles, but as the decision of the court is the highest in the land, it is every way desirable that the commercial public should be made fully acquainted with it.

For the general public it is immaterial what the merits of the case in question may be, since the court does not enter into them, the judgment only deciding a pure question of law; but in order that our readers may better understand the nature of the issue, we give the following succinct statement of facts:—

The appellant in this case, Mr. Wm. Gath, is a British subject, and, it appears, up to the 3d of January, 1866, was a merchant in England, trading under the name, style, and firm of William Gath and Co., the partners of Mr. Gath being Messrs. Keighly, whom Mr. Tomkinson of this city represents, and who are the plaintiffs in this suit. On the 3d of January, 1866, Mr. Gath left England for South America, and immediately after, proceedings were taken in the English Bankruptcy Court against him, and on the 23d of January he was declared a bankrupt.

The declaration of bankruptcy and judgment of the English court was sent out here, with letter of attorney to Mr. Tomkinson, empowering him to sue Mr. Gath for a large sum of money, some £7,000 sterling, alleged by the creditors to have been fraudulently taken from the business, to South America, by Mr. Gath.

On the receipt of these documents Mr. Tomkinson, finding that Mr. Gath had arrived in this country and deposited moneys in one of the banks, applied to the Courts for the embargo of the person, goods, and effects of Mr. Gath, basing his claim upon the adjudication in the Bankruptcy Court in England. The Court here at once granted the embargo, but when put into execution it was found that the money alleged to be in the bank had been previously withdrawn. Mr. Gath, surprised at such summary proceedings, at once engaged Dr. José F. Lopez to defend his case, and the question came up on appeal before the Supreme Court.

The great legal ability of Dr. Lopez is traceable in every line of the splendid argument which he made for Mr. Gath, and which, though lengthy, we should have published had it been sent to us in English. Although we take liberty to differ with Dr. Lopez in several of his tenets respecting international law, we cannot refuse to him our highest respect for the great erudition and legal acumen which he has displayed in the case. He appeals from the decision of the lower Court on the following grounds:—1st. That the case in question does not come within the meaning or the limits of the law of this place, authorising embargo? 2nd. That the decision of the Court of Bankruptcy in England has no effect whatever in this country, not even being prima facie evidence of indebtedness; and, 3rd. That the judgment of the English Court of Bankruptcy was an ex parte decision, and fraudulently obtained, inasmuch as Mr. Gath was summoned to appear and seven days given to him to answer before the Bankruptcy Court in England, as if actually present in that country, and able to respond to the summons, when it was notorious that Mr. Gath at the time was crossing the Atlantic on his way to the River Plate.

The attempt of Dr. Lopez to disturb the decision of an English court of justice has certainly surprised us, not that for a moment we would advance the proposition that the judgment of a foreign court could be put into execu-

tion here; but there is a wide difference between impeaching the decision of an English court, and refusing to put a judgement into execution. The English Court declares Mr. Gath a bankrupt; Dr. Lopez goes behind that decision, declares it erroneous, and even proves it to have been obtained by fraud, on this ground—that in the proceedings the English court was not acquainted with the fact that Gath had left the country, but sued as if he were present; the case, regarded in this light, therefore, is more an appeal to the Supreme Court here from an English decision than anything else, since the whole question hangs upon the legality or illegality of the proceedings against Gath in England. Whether Gath was in prosperous circumstances or not, whether his firm was insolvent, or whether, in fact, he owes one farthing of the amount claimed, does not appear by any of the documents in the case. The judge here who granted the embargo took the judgment of the English court as prima facie evidence of the indebtedness; the Supreme Court has annulled that decision, simply on the grounds that the judgment of the English Court was improperly obtained, and is no evidence whatsoever of the indebtedness of Gath. The validity, therefore, of English decisions in this country is ascertained, and the facility with which they can be disturbed established; the fact that they amount to nothing in Buenos Ayres.

We note, in the judgment of the Supreme Court, another point worthy of attention, and that is, that the embargo in the case in question is null and void, inasmuch as the funds for which the embargo was applied, were not in the banks when the writ was issued.

With no other documents, save Dr. Lopez's brief, and the decision of the Supreme Court, to guide our judgment, we find some hesitation in offering an opinion in the case in question, but from the information derived from these papers, it does seem to us that the plaintiffs in this suit, in suing Mr. Gath in England, simply as a bankrupt trader, after he had left that country, and in suing him here as a runaway debtor, taking large sums of money with him, has afforded the supreme tribunal of this country room for establishing a precedent hostile to the general principles of international law. The judgment of the court here clears Mr. Gath from any imputation of bankruptcy, and the plaintiffs must send over evidence to prove the original indebtedness, if they wish to take any further proceedings in the matter.

THE LA PLATA MAILS.

TWO DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE.

THE PRINCE AND PRINCESS OF WALES.

Dublin 23 April.

Their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales proceeded to Bray by special train this afternoon, and then to luncheon at Lord Powerscourt's. They afterwards visited the Dargle Waterfall. There was very fine weather during the time their Royal Highnesses were away.

They were accompanied by the Lord-Lieutenant and the Marchioness of Abercorn.

Holyhead, 23.

Prince Leiningen has crossed from here in charge of the Royal yacht, which will leave Kingstown, with the Prince and Princess on board, at dawn on the 25th. The Royal party will arrive at Holyhead at about nine o'clock.

Admiral Schomberg, the harbour-master here, has made all the arrangements needed for the fit reception of the voyagers at the Admiralty jetty. Great crowds of people are expected to be present from various parts of Anglesey to witness the landing. The railway company has decided not to run excursion trains from Carnarvon.

Dublin, 24th April. To-day the Prince, &c., visited the Royal College of Physicians, the National Education Schools; the Horticultural Show, and the Mater Misericordie Hospital, which is under the care of nuns.

At six o'clock the royal visitors will leave for Kingstown, when the Lord-Lieutenant will be entertained at dinner by the Prince on board the royal yacht.

The fleet will be illuminated to-night, and the royal yacht and fleet will put to sea at five in the morning.

THE IRISH CHURCH.

Earl Russell's second letter to Mr. Chichester Fortescue has been published. After alluding with pleasure to the recent events in Parliament as to the Irish Church, his lordship proposes the following points as deserving calm consideration:—

Is this a proper time for remedying the great Irish grievance of an Established Church endowed for the spiritual welfare of one eighth of the people of Ireland? Supposing the prayer of the lay Roman Catholics to be complied with, shall equality be established by an endowment of three prevailing churches, according to their numbers, or by the disestablishment and disendowment of all churches?

Whether one plan or the other be adopted, how is the object in view to be attained in conformity with our

usual parliamentary maxims of justice and equity, with due respect for the prerogative of the Crown, and due regard to the claims of individuals whose interests may be affected by the measures proposed?

As to the first point, his lordship says that the Fenian conspiracy has been easily put down, but that in the process there has been revealed in Ireland wide-spread hostility to British rule. He considers, therefore, that now is the time to endeavour to remove this feeling by wise legislation. To wait another year might be dangerous. The House of Commons ought not to pause in its work, but go on until it has laid the foundation of a permanent peace and solid union between England and Ireland. The course of legislation with reference to religious liberty in Ireland is reviewed at some length. As to the second point, his lordship declines to press any longer upon the country his proposal for giving part of the Irish Church property to the Roman Catholics and part to the Presbyterians. He still thinks the proposal a good one; but if the Roman Catholics refuse the gift, that is their affair, and he will be no party to thrusting the money upon them. The third point is discussed at some length, the conclusion arrived at being that the proposals of Mr. Gladstone will be fully carried out, and the funds obtained by the disendowment of the Church applied to educational and charitable purposes.

The London papers describe the meeting at Mr. Spurgeon's tabernacle on Wednesday night in favour of Mr. Gladstone's resolutions as a demonstration of no ordinary significance.

The 'Advertiser' says, it was so mighty in its moral as well as in its numerical character that we might almost assume it would of itself be sufficient to seal the doom of the Irish Church.

The 'Times' says, about an hour before the speaking began the spacious building, which will hold upwards of 7,000 persons, was crowded on the floor and in both galleries. When the question was put in parliamentary form by the chairman the meeting shouted aye as one man, and was startled at the sound of its own voice. The disappointed throng outside, roughly estimated at 2,000, was almost as unanimous in favour of the object of the meeting as the audience inside, and its cheers were responses to those of the meeting.

It is currently stated that Sir R. Palmer and his chief are at variance upon the Irish Church question, and that when a new Government comes into power Sir Roundell intends to forego the woollack rather than be a party to the destruction of the Irish Church. You must take this cum grano salis, however, for though Sir Roundell Palmer is well known to be a consistent and conscientious churchman, I do not think he is so deeply in love with the Irish Establishment as to immolate himself in her honour.

THE CLERKENWELL EXPLOSION.

The case against O'Keefe, one of the Fenian prisoners being tried for the Clerkenwell murders, at the Central Criminal Court has been abandoned, evidence of identity not being sufficient. But both he and Ann Justice remain in custody.

Ann Justice, one of the prisoners now on trial in the Central Criminal Court, has been practically acquitted on the capital charge; and all who have paid attention to the evidence will be gratified with that result. The truth is, that, although the woman Justice has lived on very intimate terms with the persons who organised the attack on the gaol, the Crown could not produce any facts showing that she was in any way connected with the conspiracy. The evidence adduced to implicate her failed utterly, and at the most only went to show that she was faithful to her friends, and did not desert them in their trouble. But, known to have close relations with them, when arrested on the spot she was detained, and her name was naturally included in the indictment. It was the Lord Chief Justice himself, who, at the close of the case for the Crown, interposed the remark that Ann Justice had not been shown to be in any way connected with the plot. Still firm in her friendship, the poor woman, on quitting the dock, kissed Barrett, and whispered in the ear of Timothy Desmond. Her hope of immediate freedom, however, was dashed; for, although discharged from the dock, she is still detained, because there are other indictments against her. But the detention is only a matter of form, and whatever may be the fate of her friends, she is virtually free. Her cause was perfectly safe in the hands of Mr. Montagu Williams, who had been retained to defend her; but her acquittal is a testimony to the rigid fairness of our courts and the unbiassed temper of the bench.

THE BUDGET.

The income tax is to be raised from 4d to 6d to provide the deficiency in the Budget through the decrease of commerce and the expenses of the Abyssinian war. As the whole amount required cannot be collected in the year, power has been taken to issue £1,000,000 Exchequer Bonds to meet current demands on the Treasury.

The address of Mr. Ward Hunt was favourably received: Mr. Gladstone himself, although a little demonstrative, approving of the means of supplying the necessary resources.

The Times says, it is stated that duties on a considerable amount of produce were paid to provide for the contingency of any increase of duty being announced in the budget.

The Herald of the 24th April says, a full inquiry for money prevailed in the discount market, and the rates were 2 to 2½ per cent. for first-class bills. Early in the morning the quotations were supported 2 and 2½ per cent., being the common figure. Later, when it was found that the Bank directors had not raised the terms of discount, more money came out and greater ease was apparent.

AMERICA.

New York, April 14, 1868.

General Meade disapproved of the arrest of Judge Pope, of Alabama, for empanelling exclusively a white jury, and censured the officer making the arrest.

It is reported that the Russian Indians of Sitka meditate an attack on the American garrison.

Mr. D'Arcy McGee was buried yesterday at Montreal; 20,000 joined in the funeral procession. The evidence is accumulating that Whelan was the assassin, and that he had accomplices.

A battle is imminent at Mazatlan between General Martinez and Alroez. Thirteen American war vessels were at Mazatlan.

The impeachment trial yesterday was postponed on account of the illness of Mr. Stanberry, for the defence. The prosecution are endeavouring to secure the privilege of unlimited closing argument.

A complimentary dinner has been tendered to Mr. Charles Dickens, at New York, on the 18th April, by the press.

Haiti, April 4.

The Cacos rebels continue successful. They had ambuscaded and routed a body of Salnave's troops.

THE CAPE MAIL.

The steamer Briton, with the Cape mail, has arrived. She brings £2,700 in specie. The Briton left Cape Town on the 20th of March.

The Governor had issued a proclamation declaring the Basutos British subjects, and the country inhabited by them British territory. It was said that Burglers had captured one of Moshesho's strongholds, inflicting great suffering on the Basutos.

LATEST FROM THE PROVINCES.

IMPORTANT FROM RIOJA.

BATTLE OF ARAUCO.

ARREDONDO DEFEATS THE REBEL GOVERNOR.

A chasque arrived yesterday from the National Commissioner Lafuente for the National Government, bringing the following important news:—

Gen. Arredondo, at the head of the forces of the legal Government met the rebel forces under the orders of Governor Davila on the 19th ult., at a place called Arauco, and, after completely defeating them and taking 55 prisoners—among which were Governor Davila, his Minister, San Roman, two Bravos, a Cabral, an Aguallio, and a Posse, he proceeded to occupy the capital together with the Commissioner Lafuente.

The chasque that brought this news was also the bearer of the following letter addressed by Lafuente to the Governor of Cordova:—

Rioja, 24th May, 1868.

To H.E. Governor D. Felix de la Peña.

My esteemed Sir and friend.

With your favor of the 16th inst. I received the President's communications which you were pleased to enclose, and for which I have to thank you.

You will be informed by this time of the happy termination of the revolution in Rioja. All the leaders have fallen prisoners in the engagement of the 19th, as well as all the soldiers, who are exclusively Catamarqueños.

Order and peace having thus been re-established in the province, I beg to inform you that the forces of your province, which the National Government had ordered should be called out, are no longer required.

I have to express to you my renewed thanks for your good wishes with regard to my mission, and reciprocating them with respect to your own enlightened government.

I remain as ever,

Your friend and obdt. servt. JOSE M. LA FUENTE.

CORRIENTES.

From this Province the intelligence is favorable to the revolution. Gen. Gelly y Obes has answered the new Government "That he had given the necessary orders to ensure its being respected and obeyed." Col. Correa was holding out, at the head of 150 to 200 men, and was quartered near San Luis; but 200 men of the National Guard, under Col. Montenegro, had sallied forth to bring the former to submission. All the populations on the coast had declared in favor of the revolution; and a small force, under the orders of Commander Godoy, in the vicinity of the capital, disbanded on the mere appearance of the National Guards.

MENDOZA.

The electors of Mendoza have signed a manifesto declaring their determination to vote for Sarmiento-Alsina.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The mails from Montevideo yesterday brought up important news from that unfortunate city. The manifesto of the Baron Maua is a masterly document, and has been answered by the Minister. Trade is at a complete stand still; no business doing, streets crowded with parties rushing to and from the banks, soldiers on horseback and National Guards on foot, trying to keep back the gold seeking mob. At the Italian Bank a band of music playing all day national airs and melodies—"Believe me if all those endearing young charms." At the Bolsa and Telegraph-rooms knots of merchants and brokers discussing the crisis. Such a state of things was never before known in that forlorn city. The Telegraph-office busy night and day transmitting messages; during banking hours the whole population under a state of financial frenzy, which abates somewhat about dinner time. Quinteros and chacteros come into town before daybreak to get early admission. Only one paying clerk at each of the banks paying out in gold; therefore rather a slow business at some of the banks. Books have to be written up, interest computed, &c., before account closed. This, of course, takes time. Other customers bring huge piles of notes, which take much time to count, and then it frequently happens there is an error in the count, so that delays are inevitable; then again there are coins paid out of every value, and no man can make up the sum in his head; it has to be reduced to figures, and not unfrequently some applicants know nothing of arithmetic. Thus it is that the payment in gold is a terribly slow business. The crowds become greater and more impatient each day, and yesterday had to be held back at the point of the bayonet.

Yesterday was another exciting day in Buenos Ayres. We struck off two bulletins before 12 o'clock, and were the first to give the news. Our office was crowded from an early hour with most of the leading men in the city, and soon after even the Government people sent to us for the news.

The weather seems to have settled and the rain, which we so much required, has fallen in the Banda Oriental. Half the albiges of the city are dry, and even the quinteros complain that the springs of their wells are falling. Soon however we shall have no longer any necessity for albiges, as the water-works are going a-head apace; five hundred laborers hard at work, and shortly the pipes will be laid down; then we shall have water in abundance at every street corner, and be even a-head of Montevideo.

Yesterday we received mails from Corrientes and Paraguay. Nothing of much importance has transpired at headquarters; great preparations are said to be going on for the attack on Humaita, but as yet no day fixed. It appears from statements of deserters that the garrison is very badly off, all the maize finished, and a few head of horned cattle in the swamps. The force in Humaita is stated to be about 3,000 men, but Alen, their chief officer, refuses point blank to listen to any terms for surrender. He states that if the allies want to get into Humaita they have the road before them, and they must fight their way in; there is no other chance of their taking the place; the Commander-in-Chief is therefore making immense preparations for a general attack. The allies still hold the Chaco.

Whether owing to the scarcity of money or the foreclosing of mortgages by the banks we cannot say; but certain it is that the sales and transfers of real estate, house property, &c. are on a much larger scale at present than in any former year. The building lot at the north-west corner of Bolivar and Venezuela, 15 yards on Bolivar by 45 on Venezuela has been sold to Don Anacharsis Lanuz in half a million of paper dollars; there is an old tiled roof house on the lot. The opposite corner, with a far larger building site with old buildings thereon, has been also sold to the same gentleman for close on a million of dollars. A little up the same street, and the house now going up is contracted for in the round sum of 400,000.

The Nacion published yesterday the astounding news that there was a Ministerial crisis in the Provincial Government House. The Nacional in the evening confirmed the statement.

Yesterday there was a great rush for the Congress Hall. At an early hour the crowd waiting at the door for admission was imposing. We sent a special reporter to the house, as it was generally believed that there would be a sharp discussion between two of the most talented men in Buenos Ayres, Dr. Quintana and Dr. Elizalde, on the Minister of Foreign Affairs, on the

head of the Triple-Alliance Treaty, which is now getting out of fashion.

We publish to-day a note from Canon Fahy respecting the proximate opening of a boarding-school for the children of farmers. This will meet a want long felt, and will be agreeable news for our camp subscribers.

The La Plata mails are at last at hand. We received full files of the English papers to the 25th of April. The Prince and Princess had left Ireland, and passed into Wales. The papers are full of the descriptions of the splendid receptions which they met with in Ireland. We publish full extracts in another column.

The Senate has at last abolished the state of siege declared by President Mitre on the commencement of the Paraguayan war. It held law here for over three years, but, owing to the mild exercise of authority by the National Government, the obnoxious decree in question was never felt much by the public.

We find in a late Liverpool paper a note of the arrival of the steamer Albion at Falmouth, landing mails and passengers, and proceeding at once to Antwerp. People are anxious to know the name of the next steamer of Tait's line due here. We suppose the City of Buenos Ayres.

Mrs. Avellaneda and Mrs. Zimmerman have completely annihilated the Club Progreso people, for, after the trouble of summoning a special meeting and calling a poll, the ladies carried their point. They now send the committee about their business by declining in toto the use of the saloons for the bazaar.

The people in Gualeguay are about to erect a monument to the memory of the late Gefé Politico, Don Juan Moreno. He was much respected by all the townspeople.

Sr. Huergo's project to settle the lands of the Government down near Bahia Blanca is at last before the Chambers. We purpose publishing it in English to-morrow if it passes. We can get estancias free gratis for our countrymen who think proper to settle there.

The balloon is expected up from Montevideo as soon as the pampero ceases. M. Baraille will save the passage in the steamer by sailing up in his aerial car, wafted by the gentle zephyrs which blow about the mouth of the river.

The Argentine Bank has commenced a lawsuit against the Oriental newspaper called the Progreso, for a telegram published. The Judge here has ordered the Company to produce the telegram. This is a very serious mistake of the judge: the Telegraph Company is no party to the suit, and cannot be brought into Court, unless sued in the proper manner. The Progreso newspaper is the defendant, and the bank must call on that paper to disclose the message, name, &c. The manager of the Telegraph Company has nothing to do with the matter, and is bound to resist the effort to encroach on the rights of the Company.

The news from the Provinces we publish elsewhere, most of which appeared in a bulletin, published by the 'Tribuna,' by announcing that the reactionary revolution in Rioja had been completely stifled, will reassure public opinion in the Provinces of Cuyo, alarmed by rumors of Federal movements, and incursions by way of Chili. Our correspondence from San Juan is to the 17th inst., and we are glad to hear that our friend, Rickard, has by his praiseworthy perseverance, given quite a new aspect to the prospects of the Hilario works, and is confident now of reaping ere long brilliant results. The new Company, whose representative, Mr. Barnard, passed through this city about two months ago, has succeeded in coming to satisfactory arrangements with the Mendoza creditors of the former business carried on at Hilario, who have accepted to be paid in full by paid up preference shares in the new company. Negotiations on the same bases have been initiated with the San Juan creditors with every prospect of success. Mr. Rickard has accepted the appointment of manager of the new Company at a salary of £1,000 per annum, which is scarcely an adequate recompense for being condemned to live beyond the pale of civilization, and subject to the greatest insecurity both of person and property.

In a late number of the Ferro-Carril of Santiago we see that Mr. Rickard has obtained from the Chilean Government an exclusive privilege for eight years of a new system he has invented for the amalgamation and extraction of gold and silver from their ores. We understand that the invention is one of the greatest importance and value to the mining interest in general.

We have to apologise to our young and talented friend, Don Luis Varela, for an involuntary omission in not having yet acknowledged the receipt of the copy he kindly sent us of his late work on the constitution of B. Ayres, which had already appeared in the columns of the Tribuna. Reserving ourselves to speak more fully of the merits of this important work, we seize this opportunity of congratulating Mr. Varela on his promising efforts, in which we are anxious to see an earnest of his future success as a good and useful lawyer.

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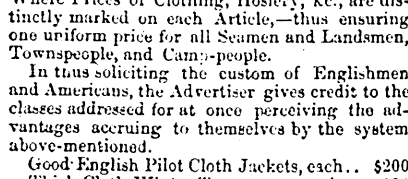
