LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Montevideo, June 4, 11 a.m.

Great crowds opposite the Italian and Montevidean Banks. Very few people at the Oriental and Navia Banks.

At the present rate of conversion, it is calculated this excitement will continue for three months longer. Great disgust expressed.

The National Guards and police in great force.

Nothing known further of Maua's Bank.

Foreign troops still occupying the Custom-house and market-place.

The Hipparchus has just arrived.

The City of Buenos Ayres left Rio two hours before the Hipparchus, but has not yet arrived. Amongst the passengers by the latter is Mr. Banfield, Manager of the Southern Railway.

LATEST FROM EUROPE.

The Hipparchus brings papers to May 7.

The Liverpool Daily Post says—

"MINISTERIAL CRISIS.

"We have very good authority for stating that a vote of want of confidence in the Ministers will be immediately proposed by Mr. Gladstone."

After it is carried, as it is certain to be, Parliament will be dissolved.

This will accomplish Mr. Disraeli's wish; for the responsibility of a dissolution at the present time will thus rest upon the House and not upon him.

The suspension of the Bank of Boscwell, Arrowsmith, and Kendall, Preston, Lancashire, is announced, with liabilities of £30,000.

London, May 6.

Liverpool.—The Cotton Market continues dull and irregular, and prices during last few days declined one farthing per lb. The demand has been exceedingly limited.

Cash in Treasury on 1st May was 139,000,000 dollars against 122,500,000 dollars on the 1st of April, being an increase of 16,500,000 dollars.

THE MONTEVIDEAN CRISIS.

No poet has succeeded in describing chaos, nor could we expect the most able of economists to define the present financial situation in Montevideo, or foretell its results. It is evident we have not yet seen the worst. It is, on the other hand, possible that the gloomy predictions of the most panicky of our newspapers may not be realized. The main features of the question are entirely local and special; and we, for our part, acknowledge the justice of the imputations contained in the manifesto of the Baron Maua, when he taunts the Government with hypocritical referring to principles of morality and finance, in pretending to devise a temporary relief for an abnormal derangement of affairs. Here was no abstract question of the advantages or disadvantages of a convertible or an inconvertible currency. That matter might have received consideration some years ago in Montevideo, or even a few months since, when the Government committed the error of violently interfering between the private banks and their customers; and the discussion of such questions may hereafter be resumed with the great aid it will derive from the recent and doleful experience. But at present the question is limited to retying a knot which an incompetent and to disentangle, and which, without warning to the public, it rudely dictated Government was unable severed. The existing Government in Montevideo is desirous of distinguishing itself from its predecessors, and counts among its supporters many illustrious men well versed in the principles of political economy, and, above all, in those of Bentham. Borrowing a lesson from Nature, who considers only the species and discards the individual, and acting upon this wholesome principle in Government, it consulted only the interest of the community. Fiat justitia was its maxim, and let the Banco Maua go. And it went. Sooner, perhaps, than the Government anticipated. We applaud the principle; but the question arises, is the knot retied? Will it not give way, and leave us in a worse position than before? At the present moment, there is a great deal of ugly evidence to lead us to suppose that the operation was a bungle, and that, after all, a compromise will have to be resorted to, which might just as well have been arranged at first, when the inconvenience of a panic would have been avoided, and the Government would have been spared the forfeiture of its own prestige, if not of its existence. It is of course very easy to argue after the fact, and to verify our predictions by pointing to the chasm which is now yawning in Montevideo, and to the terror-stricken mob that includes a large proportion of the most noisy and fussy among those who pretended to have solved the whole question by advocating the immediate resumption of specie payments. Some of the smaller of these Frankensteinisms are already horrified at their own handiwork. But in justice to some of our own countrymen who were in favor of the resumption, and who deeply studied the question, we concede to them, that we are all of us too prone to magnify present evils, and to overlook the remotest evils which might have been entailed by the prerogative. But if it be correct, as the Baron Maua states in his manifesto, that he offered sufficient guarantees at the last moment through the intervention of the Brazilian Minister, and that the Montevidean Government would not listen to his proposals, we must conclude that the Government had come to foregone conclusions not based on financial reasons but modified by political and personal considerations. Should this be true, the error of the Government is incommensurable. The evidence in favor of its truth is the unmistakable revulsion of feeling which has taken place in Montevideo. In the three days elapsed since 1st June, Baron Maua has risen to the rank of a martyr. We do not constitute ourselves the defenders of the Baron Maua, nor of any of the bankers of Montevideo. A community generally benefits by the gains of these people. The benefits are due to the intellect they bring and the energy they infuse.

The community may be its own defender. It need not be a slanderer, much less a persecutor. We do not expect gratitude to the Baron Maua either from the Government or the public of Montevideo. We confess in such a case, gratitude would be misplaced, and that it was an error of judgment and taste on the part of the Baron to allude in his manifesto to sympathies and sentiments in matters of finance. But we do expect that people in their haste to sacrifice Maua or any other individual, will not be such idiots as to sacrifice their own interest. That the Government and public of Montevideo have done so in the present instance may still be a debatable question; but the experience of the last few days, and the uninviting prospect financially, politically and socially, which we can vouch for, now appears to the minds of many in that city, present some evidence of repentance and of the self-conviction on the part of the advocates of immediate resumption of specie payments, of an over hasty decision in a very intricate matter.

Many of the future difficulties arising from the existing crisis, will depend on the manner in which Messrs. Maua and Co. liquidate. Should the liquidation be extrajudicial we may anticipate less sacrifices to the public. But without venturing on prognostications, we incline to the opinion we have already expressed, that by some arrangement to which the government will yet be forced to make, the doors of the Banco Maua will be again opened. Commercial matters will then resume their normal condition as far as this is possible after experiencing a concussion so serious. The political questions born of the situation are too complicated to define, but it will not be long before they become disagreeably prominent.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

COLOSSAL MONEY CRISIS.

June 3, 1868.

Another terrible day is past; the rush for gold seems only now to be commencing, and the fitful delusion of some of our wisacres as to the crisis lasting for a few hours is now dispelled. Vain dream of deluded bank managers and importuning merchants.

On Saturday afternoon one heard on every side at the Bolsa that any bank that could stand the shock up to three o'clock on Monday, might be regarded as safe, but these specie paying prophets indulged in a terrible error, since the business of the banks on Monday was insignificant when compared with that of Tuesday, and is zero to that of to-day. Scrimmages at the bank door is a telling proof of the slight credit which the banks enjoy, and the most amusing stories are current as to the towering process of some British clerks who push their way through a mob of Italian note-holders, who present at the counter of the bank immense piles of paper emission, demanding gold for it; but the system of payment here is extremely slow, the various gold coins have different values, and even people who have large amounts with the banks find a difficulty without the aid of pen and ink to count up any large sums in such heterogeneous specie.

It may be estimated that the banks pay on an average from three to four hundred National dollars in specie, so it is but a simple sum in arithmetic how many days longer the financial troubles can last.

The Italian Bank, about which there was so much talk, has paid up promptly, and Sr. Guimaraens, the Manager, deserves high praise for his spirited conduct in anticipating the crisis, by commencing to pay specie the day previous to that specified by law. There has been a great push, by certain parties, against the Italian Bank, owing to its circulation being so extended, and so much of its capital locked up in banking establishments. To-day Sr. Guimaraens astonished the natives, by posting a band of music at the door, and paying away gold over the counter to the air of "Partant pour la Syrie."

The real gainer, the bona fide winner, by the present financial crisis, is the English Bank. There is at present a run on this institution, but a run of the right sort. People are making every effort to get into the bank to deposit their gold, and Mr. Jones, the Manager, now finds a difficulty how to employ this specie, for which he pays 5 per cent.

The Commercial Bank has stunned the public by raising its rate of interest to 21 per cent. per annum, which is a very severe measure for those who have balances against them on account current. This bank pays 12 per cent. for money, and is regarded by all as one of the soundest in Montevideo. Notwithstanding all that is said and published about the Maua Bank, with the malicious object to injure and ruin this institution, notes are taken in all the shops in town, and many parties are engaged in trying to buy the bills at a shave of 25 per cent. In nearly all the papers will be found notices from property-holders and others who offer to sell and receive payments in Maua notes. This shows that the public in general does not mistrust the responsibility of the Baron—and possibly if there had been less

said and written about the Maua Bank, it would have been better for the public at large, for these constant publications have compelled the bank to increase their emission by some two millions and a half. For the last week or ten days there has been a steady withdrawal of deposits from that bank, to meet which the managers have been obliged to increase their emission to the enormous extent of six millions and a half. Upon the Government being acquainted of this fact, the Minister sent a note to the manager, cautioning him against emitting another dollar, since he had already passed by half a million the amount allowed by his charter.

The Union tramway is now in full working order, and doing a good business. The works of the Central Uruguay Railway proceed very slowly.

News has arrived here that the requisition got up in Buenos Ayres to support Urquiza and Alsina on the coming elections, has now more than four thousand signatures, most of the influential men in Buenos Ayres having signed the paper, and the general impression in Montevideo is that the Urquiza and Alsina ticket will win. Sarmiento, however, has a large party here, and within the last few days wagers of some magnitude have been made as to the result.

House property and real estate of every description is beginning to tumble, and some large estancia properties on the River Uruguay are being offered at prices which if known in Buenos Ayres would very soon fetch a buyer. Cattle and sheep are also declining in price, offering a splendid opportunity to new investors.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Thanks to the activity of our Montevideo correspondent we were again able to publish yesterday at an early hour bulletins with the most recent news on the all-absorbing question of the banks in the sister capital, and also latest intelligence from Europe to the 7th ult., brought by the Hipparchus, which has anticipated her arrival by one day. This splendid steamer, which anchored yesterday morning in Montevideo, is deservedly becoming one of the most popular packets plying between the River Plate and Europe, due as much to her excellent accommodation and sailing qualifications as to the affability of her worthy commander, Captain Carroll.

The great topic of conversation in political circles yesterday was the Ministerial crisis in the Provincial Government. The Tribuna published besides the resignation of Ministers Varela and Avellaneda and their acceptances by Governor Alsina, some notes passed previously between the Ministers and the Governor. It appears that although disapproving Dr. Alsina's views expressed in his correspondence with General Urquiza, as the Ministers only looked upon the step taken by the Governor as a private act they were willing to continue in their posts on his making a formal declaration exempting them from all responsibility. But subsequently Dr. Alsina having irrevocably determined to remove from office a government employé, D. Eduardo Wilde, on account of his being connected with a newspaper which had attached an opprobrious epithet to the Governor, Sres. Varela and Avellaneda were strongly opposed to this extreme measure, and had no alternative but to forward their resignations which were at once admitted.

Yesterday there was much anxiety about the state of things in Montevideo. The telegrams announced at an early hour that at some of the banks the crowd before the doors opened was greater than ever. Even here in this market this Montevidean crisis is beginning to be felt, and money was as tight yesterday as in the worst days ever known in this market. The London and R. Plate Bank, we hear, is largely increasing its business; new accounts by the dozen open every day. Money is so extremely tight that the discount brokers are doing in Montevideo, there are great complaints at the Commercial Bank having raised its rate to 20 per cent. Yet money is worth here from 24 to 30 per cent.

The Hipparchus, Captain Carroll, has made a splendid run out in 27 days, calling at Rio and other ports one of the fastest ever made. The equally fast agents, Messrs. John P. Boyd and Co., will have her discharged, loaded, and cleared in a few days after her entry. She has already several first-class passengers engaged, amongst others Mr. Anderson (of the firm of Russell and Anderson) and family.

Captain Harrison announces the pleasing news that next week the magnificent American steamer, James T. Brady, will be placed on the Montevideo route. Her accommodations are equal to the Mississippi, and she will make three trips a week. She will take passengers from shore to shore including but hire and conveyance of luggage in the fair; and leave this every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, returning returning from Montevideo on the alternate days.

Capones are steadily improving in price; yesterday a large English caponeo near Ochaomus sold about 2000 or more, all fat capones to be taken out of the flocks, at \$30.

The saved steamer, Jacar, which was elevated by Messrs. Curlew and Harrison, is now being cleared up by the underwriters, the Argentine Insurance Company, and will be soon handed over to her former owners.

Reliable news was received yesterday of the resuscitation of the Sarsaparilla revolution. Maximo Perez and Caraballo are joined; they insist on a change of Ministry. Whilst, on the other hand, the Government insists on trying by court-martial these two recalcitrant officers. The quarrel is, therefore, a pretty one as it stands.

We publish to-day only part of Baron Maua's manifesto, it being too long for our column's. To-morrow we will publish the conclusion.

The City of Buenos Ayres brings out the mails, passengers and cargoes of the City of Limerick.

Yesterday there was much conjecture as to the names of the new provincial ministers. It was generally supposed that Sr. Ugarte would be Minister of Government, and Sr. Moreno Minister of Hacienda. Dr. Irigoyen's name was also mentioned for the latter post.

Another Chilean war steamer from London, the O'Higgins, has arrived at Montevideo en route for Valparaiso. The name of this fine war vessel is not French; the vessel has been named after one of the bravest officers who fought for the Chilean flag.

The following changes in the Brazilian Legations here and in Montevideo have been announced.—D. Benjamin F. Torre de Barros, attaché of the first class in the United States Legation, has been promoted to Secretary of Legation in Montevideo, and D. Luis A. de Alvarosa Silva Peixoto is appointed attaché of first class to the Legation in this city.

We call attention to an advertisement in another column offering on sale the splendid flour mill belonging to Luis Langevin, situated on the banks of the Conchas river, at a place called Paso Morales, and moved by water power. The increased attention given to agriculture, in consequence of which much larger crops of wheat are expected to be gathered this year in various points of our 'campaña,' holds out very pleasing prospects to all mill-owners. Mr. Langevin is also disposed to enter into arrangements for renting his mill for one, two or more years, being desirous of visiting the United States on business.

At Colon Theatre 'Lucrezia Borgia' was given on Wednesday night before one of the thinnest houses we have seen this season. Mlle. Pasi impersonated the dark character of the heroine of so many guilty episodes with great ability, and in some parts her singing was even better than we have heard before. As usual, Mlle. Uberti was the great attraction of the evening; she continues to enlist the sympathies of an admiring public, who show the appreciation due for her artistic merits by warmly applauding her. Sr. Segri Segarra took the part of the Duke, and confirmed the good opinion we have formed of him as a good and painstaking artist.

President Mitre has published an excellent decree prohibiting Argentine officers meddling in the Corrientes revolution.

The great ram auction at Nazari's on the 28th has finally decided the long dispute going on here between Negrettes and Rambouillet. The Rambouillet sold at from \$6,000 to \$7,000 mpc. and the Negrettes although as good as ever imported into this market from Germany only sold from \$500 to \$900 each; in fact, the parties present all seemed willing to admit that the Rambouillet breed is the only one adapted for this country.

All the blacksmiths in town are now as busy as possible making tachas—vats for sheep saladeros—and on the largest scale; some tachas are made to hold 500 sheep. Sr. Vandervelt, of Calle Buenos Orden, has made tachas of this dimension.

The only news of importance from Paraguay is a small surprise fight, in which Colonel Romero received dangerous wounds. He heard the enemy were busy in the advanced trenches; started off with four men to see what they were at; and from the adjoining woods they fired on him, and he narrowly escaped with his life.

There are rumors in town of another run in Cordova, headed by one of the Pizarros. Our correspondent writes nothing about it, but the dealers in town speak of the affair as extremely probable.

The English schooner Mary, from the Falkland Islands, has brought the captain and crew of the Italian barque Pere, lost in the Straits, bound from Buenos Ayres, for Chile.

The bazaar dispute, between the Club Progreso Committee and the ladies, has, by no means, ended. Another meeting has been held, the reply of Mrs. Avellaneda and Mrs. Zimmerman read, and decided that although the ladies decline to use the saloons, the Club members will exert their best efforts to make them accept the sales of the Progreso.

Yesterday the 'Nacion' published a severe article against our German colleague. We must wait the arrival of our brother editor from Bonn before we can understand what our German colleague is writing about. Dr. Quintana has applied to Congress

to reprimand the Nacional and Nacion Argentina for some remarks on his speeches in the house. We doubt, however, if Congress has any jurisdiction in the matter; although in England the speeches of members in the house are privileged. We agree with Dr. Quintana, that the fairest way to treat such matters is to publish official reports of the speeches. The best Congressional reports are decidedly those of the Tribuna, and they have become both interesting and important, although terribly long.

We regret to announce the demise of Don José Antonio Capdevila, one of the first founders of the town of Azul, and who, on various occasions, filled the post of Juez de Paz of the partido that bears the same name. He had travelled in Europe and in England, and enjoyed a well-earned reputation among all who knew him, and particularly in commercial circles. He also founded the Sala Comercial of the South Plaza. He has died full of years and of respect, but poor and his friends in business intend to honour his memory by defraying his funeral expenses by subscription.

The Hipparchus is expected here this morning, and will leave again on the 12th. A great number of Mr. Banfield's friends will be at the end of the mole to welcome him and his family on their landing. To-night 'Linda de Chamouxix' is to be given in Colon for the debut of the Basso Bufo, Sr. Rocca, who has not yet had an opportunity of making himself heard. He could not have chosen a prettier opera than this, which is one of the most able productions of Donizetti's prolific and inspired pen. We expect, on this account, to see the house better attended than on the last performance.

BARON MAUA'S MANIFESTO.

I owe to the public of this country, to the civilised world, where my name is known, and to all my friends, some explanation with reference to a great event, which has now plunged the people into consternation, and which in a few days will carry despair to the hearths of thousands of families throughout the length and breadth of the land.

The history of the institution of which I am the head, and which carried on banking operations in this city under the firm of "The Bank of Maua and Co.," is well known—but not so all the previous circumstances which led to its establishment in 1855.

In the year 1850, when the Oriental Republic was seriously compromised and fast sinking, owing to its being forsaken by England and France, in consequence of the losses entailed by their profitless intervention to preserve this country from the all-absorbing aggression of the Buenos Ayres Dictator, who, for seven years, had been besieging Montevideo with an Argentine army—when all the cartridges of those who defended the place were exhausted—all their financial resources used up, and ready to succumb on account of the withdrawal, which began by the diminution of the French Subsidy—I had the unfortunate honor of being chosen by my own Government to support and protect for some time the whole of the Oriental Nation, and to supply its defenders' most necessary wants. The Brazilian Cabinet (let extreme parties who convulse the country say what they like) had felt confident during the whole period of the Anglo-French intervention that the two most powerful Nations of the world would not forego the enterprise they had undertaken in the River Plate without succeeding in their purpose.

In consequence, thereof, Brazil found itself disarmed and unprepared, when owing to the unexpected cessation it was obliged to fulfil alone the obligations imposed by the treaty that created the Oriental Republic.

The Empire governed by statesmen of the highest order, had then as its Minister of Foreign Affairs Mr. Paulino José Soares de Souza, and subsequently the Viscount of Uruguay, one of the greatest characters Brazil can boast. A man of such standing, who aimed at the overthrow by one stroke, of the iron tyranny which ruled in the Argentine Republic could not engage his country unarmed and unprepared for such a struggle, without first creating the elements necessary to secure the success, which was subsequently gloriously achieved.

This policy of my country met with my most strenuous adhesion, and I perhaps owe to this fact the preference of which I am to-day the victim. Chosen by the Government of my country to supply the means necessary for the defence of Montevideo whilst Brazil was making its preparations, and convinced that the result could not be doubtful, in addition to the funds which the agents of Montevideo received through my hands, and which were delivered by me without any deduction whatever, not even the most trifling profit for myself, I engaged a large portion of my own private fortune to the better to attain the ends proposed by increasing the means of defence, without committing myself to any participation in the struggle between the local parties, but convinced, nevertheless, that the fall of the place would be tantamount to the absorption of the state by the neighbouring Re-

public, which was contrary to the interests and to the policy of my country.

I thus found myself, at the end of the war, a creditor of the Republic for large sums, which I lent on extremely reasonable terms during the most critical moments of the life of the Oriental Nation, and which, owing to the state of the country's finances, could not be refunded to me except by small monthly instalments.

The necessity of employing here an agent to receive what was due to me gave rise later on to the change of the agency into a banking institution.

From this time forward the facts that constitute the financial life of Maua & Co.'s Bank are public and notorious, and it is due to them that the Bank—until the last days of April ult.—held a deservedly high standing.

The coarse and implacable war waged against it, which at times found vent in loud manifestations, is easily explained.

At a time when miserable and bastard interests, through their immoral tendency, swallowed up all without any consideration for the Republic oppressed and discredited by an enormous debt, and by the most complete insolvency and administrative entanglement, I conceived the bold idea of lending a helping hand to the natural elements of the country, which, although offering an admirable prospect for the creation of wealth, were completely prostrated at that epoch, and could not even be made to contribute to the alleviation of the public ruin and desolation.

The services rendered by the institution of credit which I founded are undeniable; and the most patent of them are those connected with the increase and development of wealth, the extension of commerce and of the navigation of the River Plate and its affluents, and all the material improvements of this country.

The services which all the Governments have received from it cannot be denied. It has served Governments, and never political parties, from whose fate and learnings it always kept aloof. My rule here, as in Brazil, has always been to help the Government, as a Government, for the good of the country, whatever might have been the color or party of the faction to which the citizens that formed it belonged.

These services cannot be cancelled, or ignored, except by ingratitude of the deepest die—and since there are men who in order to shirk their duty of gratitude prefer to assassinate morally their best servants, and the most useful contributors to the prosperity of their country, truth shall prevail sooner or later over all the intrigues of envy, calumny, and ingratitude.

The Bank of Maua and Co. has weathered until to-day all the crises that had been prepared for it, and has paid off all the damages it has suffered through the many and serious economical and administrative errors that have been committed, with part of the profits, legitimately and honestly obtained by exploring a virgin soil which yields to capital, intelligence, and energy an abundant harvest. The effects of the 'economical and administrative errors' alluded to, as well as the political, financial, and economic perturbations which the country has undergone, were dealt with by the predecessors of the present government with prudence and with a sincere desire to avoid the misfortunes they might give rise to. I deplore that I cannot pay a similar compliment to the Public Power which to-day sways the destinies of the Republic.

The country, after a revolution prolonged beyond expectation, after a war, and after being afflicted with the cholera morbus, found itself ready to enter into a Constitutional rule, at the end of more than two years of Dictatorship, under conditions sufficiently favorable, since its revenue had reached an unprecedented figure; the employes of the administration were paid regularly; the obligations of its debt religiously attended to, and although it took part in the Alliance and in the Paraguayan war, the expenses of its small military contingent if not paid were covered by Brazil. It soon appeared however that uneasiness reigned over the country although the Government had taken charge of it under such favorable circumstances, and that new complications would ensue. Political ferment came to aggravate a commercial crisis that existed, and a monetary one that was latent.

POST OFFICE ANNUAL REPORT.

The Post-master General has just issued his tenth annual report—a volume of over one hundred and thirty pages, elaborately drawn up and well worthy of perusal. The figures in this volume prove that letter writing mania is steadily increasing; in 1866, the number of letters passed through the post-office amounted to 1,895,594, in 1867 the number increased to 2,009,092, which gives an increase of 114,498 letters in one year; whereas in the year 1858 only 142,477 letter went through the post-office, four years later the number more than doubled itself and has

gone on increasing from a few thousand millions.

The report is very concise in figures yet I cannot find out the page that should state the number of days' rest' the Post-master General allows to each letter...

There are 54 post-offices in the province of Buenos Ayres, 5 in Catamarca, 15 in Corrientes, 12 in Entre Rios...

The income for the year amounted to 72,952 silver dollars—nearly two million of our paper currency...

The province that figures next to Buenos Ayres is Entre Rios, which has produced towards the tax about one-seventh the sum paid by Buenos Ayres...

The outlay for the year has been 57,373 dollars, which shows a surplus of 15,579 silver dollars.

The Post-office report and I must part for the present.
