CONCLUSION OF THE WAR IN ABYSSINIA

Foreign Office, April 26. The following telegram, dated Alexandria, April 25, has been received from her Majesty's Agent and Consul-General in Egypt:

THE FOLLOWING TELEGRAM

The following telegram just reached me from Suez: "Theodore defeated near Magdala. Surrendered all captives and artificers. Retired into Magdala. Magdala taken by storm on the 13th. Theodore killed. Troops suffered very little loss. Fourteen thousand men laid down arms."

CASUALTIES ON OUR SIDE

"Casualties on our side—Captain Roberts, 4th Foot, wounded in the arm, and 15 rank and file wounded. "No one killed."

THEODORE'S ARMY

"Theodore's army much disheartened by the severe losses of the 10th inst. "A portion of the chiefs surrendered the most formidable position of Shilasse (1), and many thousands fighting men laid down their arms."

MAGDALA TAKEN BY ASSAULT

"Magdala taken by assault on the 13th under cover of Armstrong steel guns, eight-inch mortars, and rocket battery. "Ascent to gates most formidable. "Theodore killed, defending to the last. "Our loss small. "Army will return immediately."

MAGDALA STORMED

"Magdala was stormed yesterday. "Theodore was deserted by nearly all his army, but made a desperate resistance with a few devoted followers. "Theodore killed himself with his pistol as the British troops approached him. "The British loss was about ten men wounded."

THE TRUCE ENDED

"The truce ended this morning. King Theodore had not surrendered. Fallas Solasso Islango (?) had surrendered at once without fighting. Theodore had retreated to Magdala. He planted five guns at the base of the ascent. When General Napier came in sight the King opened fire. The English replied with 10-pounder Armstrong guns and 7-pounder rockets. The King left his guns, barricaded the sally-ports, and opened with musketry. He gave no signs of surrendering. The bombardment lasted three hours. An assault was then ordered. The fortress was carried after vigorous

resistance. The Abyssinian loss is 68 killed and 200 wounded. The English loss is 15 wounded, rank and file. King Theodore was found dead, shot in the head. His body was recognised by the Europeans who had been released. Some say he was killed in battle, and others that he committed suicide. His two sons have been taken prisoners. The fortress presents many evidences of barbaric splendour.

THE CLERKENWELL EXPLOSION

At the close of the trial of Barrett for the Clerkenwell explosion the prisoner spoke as follows:— "I have, indeed, a great deal to say. Nevertheless, I do not intend to occupy much of your Lordship's time, being fully conscious that any words of mine would in no way alter your Lordship's mind in this matter. Still, I cannot allow this opportunity to pass, as it is likely to be the only one I shall have on this side the grave, of endeavoring to place myself as I should like to stand before my fellow men. In doing so I may be compelled to expose the means that have been resorted to for the purpose of securing my conviction. I am not, however, going to adopt a whining tone or to ask for mercy; but yet I address your Lordship as a humble individual whose career has been mercifully assailed, and I wish to defend it, conscious as I am that I have never wilfully, maliciously, or intentionally injured human being that I am aware of—no, not even in character. True, I stand charged with one of the most repulsive of crimes—that of murder, yet when I come to examine the terribly conflicting character of the evidence I find there are not two of the witnesses who do not directly contradict each other (he then comments in an able manner on the conflicting evidence given). I am far from denying, nor will the force of circumstances compel me to deny, my love for my native land, I love my country, and, if it be murderous to love Ireland dearer than I love my life then it is true I am a murderer. If my life were ten times dearer than it is, and if I could by every means redress the wrongs of that persecuted land by the sacrifice of my life, I would willingly and gladly do so. As your Lordship has said, I will now turn my attention to that other land where the injustice of selfish mortals cannot follow me—where man has no longer the power to persecute his fellow man, and where might no longer triumphs over right. I will not speak of the evidence against me—my feelings will not permit me to dwell upon it. If there were one thing more than another required to complete the degradation of Irishmen it is what has happened in this court. An Irishman's oath will no longer be admitted in a court of justice where the life of a fellow-creature is at stake. This is, indeed, a crowning indignity and a crushing humiliation. But I will not dwell on this part of the proceedings. A few words more and I will have done. As I have already said, I will now seek that other land, where I trust to obtain pardon and forgiveness from the next Judge before whom I shall have to appear, and before whom we must all sooner or later one day appear—judges and juries as well as criminals—to render an account of every action we have done, as I hope to obtain mercy and salvation from the Eternal Father, and a place in that mansion where joy is interminable and suffering is unknown, even there I will remember the miseries of poor unfortunate Ireland. Before that Throne where the prayer of the peasant is received equally with that of the Prince, I will pray for the redemption of that unfortunate country, and I here express it as my most fervent wish that her children will never cease to attempt to shake off that yoke which has so long deprived and degraded them, until the freedom of that country or the extinction of their race shall be complete. I want no petitions and no demonstration to have my life spared. No! never again will I go forth with the brand of Cain upon me. Let no man insult me with the belief that I desire existence with that infamy. Let me go to the scaffold and the grave, and there I shall find that justice which here I have been denied. I have already trespassed on the time of the court further than I intended. I now thank your lordship for the kind and indulgent manner in which you have listened to me. I have also to thank my talented counsel for the manner in which he has defended me, and I must give my sincere thanks to Mr. Lewis for the part he has taken in my defence. It may appear hard when thus called upon so soon to part with life (the prisoner is only 27), but since it is the will of God so to call me, I will meet death without a murmur, and as He in his all-wise way directs all things for the best, I venture to hope that it will please God to turn even the sacrifice of my poor worthless life to the account of my poor

suffering country. I shall now ascend the scaffold with firmness, strengthened by the consolatory reflection that the stain of murder does not rest upon me, and mingling with my prayers for my soul those for the regeneration of my native land. I have done! The prisoner, whose speech had made a profound impression upon the auditory, listened unmoved and with an air of modest and quiet resignation to the sentence passed upon him, and then firmly retired from the dock. The Court adjourned at a quarter past seven o'clock. Official notification was given that the jury in Burke's case will be wanted to-morrow (this day.)

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Yesterday was a great day for news, steamers, mails, and letters; intense excitement in political circles, respecting the Presidential question; some extraordinary 'bola' current of the sudden death of Sarmiento, got up by an opposition paper. No truth whatever in it. Highly important telegrams of the most private nature from Montevideo, and our office crowded from an early hour to know the news about the banks; but the advices from Paraguay are, after all, the most refreshing. Lopez has shut up the city of Asuncion; not a soul left in a city formerly boasting from 40,000 to 50,000 inhabitants. The Government archives, ministers, and clerks, all moved off to the town of Luque, not many miles distant from Asuncion; intense distress throughout the land, but the people apparently determined to fight to the last. The Allies are in the same position as before, but their encampment in the Chaco has become more secure. Humaita there has been a great explosion caused by the bursting of a shell, fired from the Brazilian iron-clads, and which struck a powder magazine. The explosion caused great damage and much loss of life.

From Corrientes we have news of the revolutionary Government becoming more stable. Things assuming a more peaceable aspect. Caceres no one knows where he is; but it is generally supposed that he has crossed over to Entre Rios.

From Entre Rios there is nothing very particular. Mr. Victoria arrived in town, yesterday morning. The only item of interest is the subscriptions going on in some of the partidos to buy cannons, mentioned in the Entre Riano papers. Rather a novel way to buy artillery.

We received yesterday ex-Minister Avellaneda's report for the year, which as yet we have not had time to examine, it is nicely printed, well got up and sufficiently voluminous; at an early date we purpose reviewing it. The scene at the Colon on Saturday night baffles description, luckily no lives were lost, but the rush from the pit and boxes for the door when the first scream was heard in the cazuela was terrific. We give elsewhere the fullest details by an eye witness.

We have to thank the agents here of Messrs Lamport and Holt of Liverpool, for the important telegram which we received from Lisbon per Hipparchus, and we are pleased to learn that through the arrangements made by the same Liverpool firm henceforward all the steamers of the Antromonical line, will bring special despatches up to the latest moment from Lisbon. This is a move in the right direction and will not fail to be appreciated by the commercial public of the Plate.

The French mail will leave on Friday, and our edition for Europe will be published on Thursday morning. We understand that the Annis will take this trip a full list of passengers Mr. Demarechi and family leave for Europe, and Captain Connel, of the Lanuz steam line, starts for the United States.

On Saturday in the neighbourhood of the Once a terrible murder was committed; the victims, two poor native women residing in a rancho, the assassin escaped to the camp.

Yesterday the Boca river was high, and dozens of lighters with hides, wool and sheepskins were able to get out. It appears that for the last week the Riachuelo has been so low that several lighters with dry hides have been locked in. The little river is the busiest centre in Buenos Ayres, and if the Government would only keep the mouth clear of the mud it might become the great emporium of river trade, but at present only when the river is very high can the lighters pass up and down.

Two great furniture auctions in Rosario have just come off, and may be regarded as a sign of the times—Mr. Oroño's furniture, as he does not purpose soon returning, and Mr. Penaloza's; this gentleman, one of the most influential in Rosario, leaves with his family for a trip to Ireland.

In Rosario nothing particularly new. Election for Deputies in place of Alvarado and Bengolea, who it appears have been cashiered. Municipality calls for bids for construction of a new market place, as the city is now felt too large for only one market. The drought on the estancias is terribly felt, and the cattle and sheep running wild for water. The whole country cries out for rain, and rain for at least a month.

Great as is the excitement that preoccupies the mind of the public on the Presidential question, it fades into insignificance compared to that occasioned by the brilliant liminary unexpectedly risen over our theatrical horizon, Mlle. Gandon. Notwithstanding the oppressiveness of the night, the Franco-Argentine presented an unusual appearance on Sunday last; every seat had been sold early in the day and every box was crammed to excess. Even ladies belonging to our highest circles of society were not proof against the general frenzy, and graced the performance with the presence. The very popular and amusing piece of "Les Chevaliers du Pince Nez" was performed in a manner that reflects the greatest credit on the whole company. Dubois, in the historical character of Chabanaix, kept the house in roars; and D'Hote fully sustained his great artistic reputation. Philippe made a charming young man, and was unexceptional both in hermise and her admirable acting and singing. As for Mlle. Gandon, she was inimitable, and yet the reserve she put on, no doubt out of regard to the presence of ladies, although disappointed those who heard her the first night in the Pompiers, gives her further titles to the favor of a discriminating public. The great favor she made on Sunday night is therefore a just and genuine tribute to her wonderful talent irrespective of adventitious attractions. The encore of the Can-can in the second act showed that she was evidently so affected by the warm reception she had received that she was unable to go through with it in her usual spirit. We have to thank the agents here of Messrs Lamport and Holt of Liverpool, for the important telegram which we received from Lisbon per Hipparchus, and we are pleased to learn that through the arrangements made by the same Liverpool firm henceforward all the steamers of the A.S. Cronometrical line, will bring special despatches up to the latest moment from Lisbon.

The French mail will leave on Friday, and our edition for Europe will be published on Thursday morning. We understand that the Annis will take this trip a full list of passengers Mr. Demarchi and family leave for Europe, and Captain Connel, of the Lanuz steam line, starts for the United States.

On Saturday in the neighbourhood of the Once a terrible murder was committed; the victims, two poor native women residing in a rancho, the assassin escaped to the camp.

The drought on the estancias is terribly felt, and the cattle and sheep running wild for water. The whole country cries out for rain, and rain for at least a month.

Great as is the excitement that preoccupies the mind of the public on the Presidential question, it fades into insignificance compared to that occasioned by the brilliant luminary unexpectedly risen over our theatrical horizon, Mlle. Gaudon. Notwithstanding the oppressiveness of the night, the Franco-Argentine presented an unusual appearance on Sunday last; every seat had been sold early in the day and every box was crammed to excess.

The latest intelligence from the seat of war is to the 4th inst. The news is devoid of any great importance. On the 5th, a column of 2000 Brazilians and 500 Argentines was to march to the Interior, under the orders of Gen. Mena Barreto, towards the Tebetiari, or further, for the purpose of reconnoitring Lopez's position.

The introduction into general consumption of a new article of food, like the extract, is necessarily a matter of some difficulty, requiring much labor and expense, and the company's success in this respect must be mainly attributed to the excellence and uniformity of manufacture, and to the careful control of analysis and consequent certificate of genuineness delivered by the director of the scientific department, Baron Liebig, and by his delegate, Professor Von Pettenkofer, whose high reputation naturally inspires absolute confidence to the public. Mr. Giebert having been compelled to devote the whole of his time to the works at Fray Bentos, the second establishment to be constructed at Gualeguayebí can only be completed at a later period.
