THE FALL OF ESQUINA.

We have to thank some of the passengers arrived down by the last steamer for the afflicting details of the fall of this historic little town.

Esquina boasts of an antiquity coeval with the settlement of the Missions by the Jesuit Fathers; for better or worse it has given birth to many whose names figure in the history of their country. It is seated on the left bank of the river Parana, and, previous to the commencement of the Paraguayan war, was one of our most thriving riverine towns.

It is melancholy to think that the woes of this little place, deep and terrible as they are, would be unknown to the general public of Buenos Ayres but for its casual connection with a foreign journal through the medium

of our lamented correspondent. The Cossacks of Entre Rios, or the Mamelukes of Corrientes, might level the town, turn adrift the inhabitants, and drive a ploughshare over its site for aught of the people of Buenos Ayres care. Of the two hundred and twenty thousand inhabitants of this city, probably not fifty are aware of the sad fate of this Correntino village, whilst we have Congress sitting in our midst, and the National Government of the country under our very noses.

The only spot in the nation which seems to be ignorant of what is passing in some of the provinces is the city of Buenos Ayres; the passengers by the steamer Goya were astounded on arriving in Buenos Ayres and finding that nothing was known of the terrible state of things in Corrientes, and the sad fate of Esquina; still more astonished however were they when several days afterwards they discovered that the sad narratives which they had related provoked neither comment from the press nor action by the Government.

The history of the sorrows of Corrientes is but a short chapter, and we regret to say, is in some measure, connected with the fate of this country: electioneering rascality. Some half-dozen of electioneering agents, by an uncouth 'coup d'etat' overturned the Government at hardly five minutes' notice. The Governor was then and there popped into prison, where he lies still; and whilst in duration the hollow farce of a formal resignation was performed, based on this resignation (which in no civilised country could be regarded as a legal document), a new Government was formed, and which at present exists.

The patching up of the banks is the great business going on now; yesterday an influential meeting was held in a wholesale grocery store to consider what best to be done under the circumstances. The intense depression that reigns throughout the land is relieved by the unabated fury of note holders each day at the Italian Bank.

Esquina is to-day a deserted village. Sometime previous to the inroad by the Entre Rianos the people of the town had notice of their danger, but few up to the last hour fled the place. The places of business were open, the streets thronged, and the houses all tenanted, when the blast of the Entre Riano trumpet re-echoed through the village.

The history of the Montevideo Bank is simple, it being a quasi-Government institution; its bills were received at the Custom House and in all cases of legal deposit. Thus, although no one in the city regarded the Bank as safe, all were willing to buy the bills at a decent shave, and make 15 or 20 per cent. by despatching goods or paying off an old indebtedness.

What the next steamer may bring us, respecting Esquina and its inhabitants, we cannot even surmise. According to last advices the Entre Riano officer held complete sway there, and thereabouts; but since the place boasts of the ashes of a man who has written for so many years this plain and unvarnished history of the war, we implore of the National Government for so hallowed a spot—something more than its customary metaphorical protection.

TERRIFIC ALARM IN THE CABILDO.

NARROW ESCAPE OF CABRAL & CLERKS.

BRITISH CONSUL AND ENGLISH BROKER ALMOST POISONED. Yesterday at about noon the most intense alarm reigned in the Plaza Escribanos to a sudden rush of all the street without their hats, and with countenances that indicated embryo asphyxia. Consul Parish in company with an English broker was at the moment ascending the stair case about noses.

The rush from above was terrific. In an instant judges, lawyers, suitors, and escribanos came tumbling down from the Court-rooms. Shrieks were heard on all sides—some thought the Cabildo was on fire; others, that the building was giving way—all fled, but none could explain why. Out in the street the crowd assembled; and the hatless escribanos asked the people to stand back for Heaven's sake and allow them a breath of fresh air.

PATCHING UP OF BANKS. GREAT STORM, &c.

The patching up of the banks is the great business going on now; yesterday an influential meeting was held in a wholesale grocery store to consider what best to be done under the circumstances. The intense depression that reigns throughout the land is relieved by the unabated fury of note holders each day at the Italian Bank.

The aluaceneros are furious at the whole business, and blame the John Bulls for the crisis. Tears, the bitter, shed ever wept in this place, are now shed over the smouldering ruins of the banks; the wild oats sown by the agitation of free banks have been reaped, and with a vengeance.

The sudden death of Mr. Wedemann has shocked us all. He came down from Buenos Ayres to arrange some business; and on the very day he died he had taken out his ticket to return. He leaves his business without a soul to look after it.
