SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. From the Marseilles papers of the 16th May we extract the following— ENGLAND. London, May 14.

The bill relative to the limits of electoral districts has been re-committed. A meeting of 3000 workmen was held to-day in Trafalgar Square.

The Irish Bishops presented yesterday an address to the Queen, against the abolition of the Irish Church, and the Queen answered—'A commission is instituted to examine the condition of the Irish Church; Parliament on the report of that Commission, will undoubtedly adopt the measures that may lead to the maintenance of the true religion among my people.'

Mr. Gladstone's bill respecting clerical appointments in Ireland has been read a first time, and the second reading is fixed for the 22nd.

The riots in Ashton prove to have been of a very serious character. The Irish and the Murphys made extensive preparations for the battle, arming themselves with bludgeons, and even revolvers.

THE WAR IN THE NORTH. ARRIVAL OF THE CISNE. PARAGUAYAN FISHERIES. On Sunday, the regular Paraguayan mail steamer Cisne arrived, crowded with passengers and heavy mails.

The Paraguayan at Timbo and Humaita are now becoming expert fishermen, from sunrise to sunset hundreds of lines are out in the river, which abounds with the most delicious Paraguayan salmon, something like the 'Pack' of Buenos Ayres.

FRANCE. Paris, May 14. To-day, in the diplomatic reception of Baron Moustier, the language exchanged between the Minister of Foreign Affairs and the representatives of the other powers has a most favorable character for the preservation of general peace.

The new law of the press has been promulgated in Paris, and stuck up at the corners of the streets. It was reported that on the occasion of this promulgation the Emperor will give a general amnesty for all personal condemnations and fines relative to journalism.

A telegram from Berlin says—'The French ambassador, M. Benedetti, was one of the first among the members of the diplomatic corps at Berlin who congratulated Lord Loftus on the capture of Magdala. News to the contrary are false.'

PRUSSIA. It appears certain that the Prussian Government has been invited by the Cabinet of St. James to take part in the deliberations of the future Franco-Italian-English financial commission relative to the affairs of Tunis.

AUSTRIA. It is currently rumored that Galicia, or Austrian Poland, will soon be the object of a measure similar to the one adopted for Bohemia, by which it would recover its autonomy under the same conditions offered to the other great provinces of Austria, and accepted by them unreservedly.

THE TROOPS ON BOARD THE IRONCLADS have been reinforced, owing to positive information received that Lopez is preparing to attack them in the night time. The new plan of attack is to asphaltize the Brazilian sailors down below, by pumping poisonous air through the ventilators.

He states that he saw a man there who had been four days in the building, and that behind the counters he beheld large boxes with big seals and large piles of gold, ready for the public. There can be no doubt that the public itself is greatly to blame for the rush on this bank.

For the last few days the most alarming rumors respecting the solvency of the place have been current: they say—'Give a dog a bad name and you may as well hang him at once;' but I say, 'Give a bank a bad name and you may as well shut its doors at once.' The crowd around the bank to-day can only be compared to a gang of Choctaws around a captive, a pack of hounds around a deer, or a troop of terriers around a badger; and yet, withal, I take upon myself to say that of the unwashed thousands who thronged the portico, not \$5,000 could be found in the whole crowd.

As a general rule, respectable people prefer to sell the bills at a slight shave rather than attempt to enter the bank; yet, nevertheless, there has been a heavy drain going on during the week, and the violent efforts to raise a loan of half a million proves too clearly the impetuosity of the current. It may be that I am prone to look at the darker aspect of things and to attach the greatest importance to the most trivial occurrence, but the repeated meetings of the Almaceneros has thrown a comestible spell over my thoughts, and I believe the 'gremio' is in danger, the present is a moment when people are prone to be suspicious. We are, as it were, in the seat and yellow leaf of a long financial life, we have basked too long in the sunshine of cheap money and an easy currency, and now after passing so many years as millionaires, we find ourselves paupers.

The mooted loan of the River Plate Bank to the Government, has proved a bubble. Mr. Jones holds half the gold of Montevideo, but neither the Minister wants to borrow, nor the manager lend; the best bills in the market can be had at 24 percent. per annum and with collateral. Money was tighter here to-day than ever; up to yesterday evening we all thought that we had past the worst, but our condition reminds me strongly of that famous French horse that disappointed his master by dying precisely on the last day of his dietetic experiment. The moment has arrived when illusions terminate and disenchantment begins. We are all on the eve of a tremendous smash, if I survive it you may possibly hear of me out at the Cañapir mines.

There have been large sales of bank notes of every denomination to-day: I give you the quotations. 12,000 Mauá notes at 30 percent discount. 12,000 do. at 28; 5,000 Montevideans at 40, 12,000 at 37, 15,000 at 36. Italian bank notes at 6, 8, 9 and 10 percent discount. Tramway shares seem to be running down as fast as the cars are running up. There is a cross-fire kept up in the newspapers about the value of the road, and the price of the stock. Both parties, I suppose, are in the right; but it seems to me that a cold, ominous despair has seized some of the shareholders, who seem to anticipate future evils, and are anxious to realize.

The Oriental Consul at Cadiz who, by a strange coincidence is called Cadiz, and, I believe, was once connected with the 'Tribuna,' has been removed, and Sr. Dn. J. S. Roman named to succeed him. This Consular appointment is regarded by many as very significant, and points to the decadence of a certain influence.

There has been a terrible row before the Junta, caused by the landlord of one of the Juzgado's refusing to receive his rent in anything save gold or silver. As the Justice of the Peace and the policemen are his tenants, if he distrains for the rent it will be an awkward business.

Some ship captains, who have recently entered the harbor, have complained to the Captain of the Port of the extraordinary anchorage of some of the gunboats. They say that it is difficult to enter by daylight, and impossible at night time. If the town was blockaded the gunboats could not take up a better position. A polite request to the Admirals to change the anchorage is about to be made.

If the name of McAdam has gained a European celebrity that of Calzadilla is securing equal fame in the Plate, the Calzadilla pavement is now going down as a sort of a sample, it is the same as that facing the Cathedral in Buenos Ayres. Calzadilla is a partner of the Baron Campy, and hopes to obtain a contract for paving the whole of the city. I believe it would be a great improvement, but the age of street pavement is past; paper money has done its duty in that respect here, as the splendid roads can testify. To-day, according to the statement of one of the newspapers, there are five thousands workmen out of employment, to give a Calzadilla pavement to the city, we must however have recurrence to the splendid free banking system in which we so long implicitly trusted, but which now with unerring instinct we regard with the same aversion as cattle poisonous weeds.

CAKES. LATEST FROM ROSARIO. (FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT). June 17, 1868. The day before yesterday was the turning point of the season. Up to the 16th the weather remained warm, with the mercury at times up to 85, summer heat in fact. On Monday the change was ushered in by a furious south-easter, with little or no rain, and continued for nearly forty-eight hours. Last night the wind shifted more to the south, and the result was a pretty regular rain throughout the night. The severe cold, however, that has accompanied this change will prevent the rain from starting the grass, and cattle and sheep must still suffer severely. This is the first rain we have had in the Province for more than two months, a rare circumstance, particularly at this season of the year. The cattle that are brought to market are very poor; it is scarcely possible to get fat beef. Vegetables of every kind are very scarce, and it is to be noted that onions, usually so plentiful here all the year round, are not to be had in the market. However, the weather is not altogether to blame for this. The coasting craft pick up everything that can be bought, and at heavy prices, to take up to Paraguay. Butter is scarcely seen, and when to be had is paid for at the rate of six reals, or 2s. 4d. per pound. Potatoes are worth \$4½ the quintal, equivalent to

15s. sterling. Bread is comparatively dear; so that, what with expensive marketing and dear house rent, it is 'hard times' with families of fixed incomes. The temporal' has done no injury to the vessels in port, although the waves ran pretty high, and the river rose about four feet. Of course it stopped all operations of loading and discharging, except at the wharves. The gale blew up to port five barques and a brig yesterday, some with material for the railroad, and a handsome barque under the Argentine flag, direct from New York, with cargo for the new importing house of Wheelwright & Co. The rest are all under the British flag.

You will have heard by this time of the result of the elections for President and Vice-President in this province. Unanimous for Urquiza for the first, and the votes for the second thrown away on Gen. Paunero, which is the reprehensible indulgence of a pique against Alsina because he snatched the last Administration. They say that General Urquiza is very savage, and blames Mr. Cabal. The latter gentleman is in hot water—on bad terms with the potentate of Entre Rios on account of the result of the elections; with the circle composing the National Government because no support was given to Mr. Elizalde, and with the Liberal party of Buenos Ayres for having been the means of placing the power into the hands of the Federal party of Santa Fé; add to this that he is by no means good terms with the party that placed him in power, and you will readily understand the rumors, that are considered perfectly well founded; of his speedily resigning his dearly-bought honors. In this case, his successor will be D. Pascual Rosas, a gentleman who has already occupied the Governatorial chair of the Province.

It is melancholy to witness the revival of the animosity between the two great parties of the day. It really appears as if six years of constitutional government has done nothing to allay that virulent party hatred that in these countries is a precursor, not of legal changes and reforms, but of broils and bloodshed. Is it possible we have no fund of common sense—no class of men in the Republic that might act as arbitrators between the fiery extremes of our noisy factions? Were there such a class I would beg to present the award made somewhere in 1841 in the case of two distinguished politicians who had quarrelled.

According to the *Progreso* of Cordoba there have been no elections in Rioja; but as the said *Progreso* is the very extreme of federalism, we probably ought not to put much faith in its sayings. I have heard it stated that we are to have a general assembly of the Guardia Nacional de Santa Fé on the 9th of July—something in imitation of the popular 'reuniones' of Entre-Rios. A committee of our public men is about to go to San José, for what purpose it is better not to surmise at present. I very much fear however that the triumph of Sarmiento will be the signal of some outbreaks, which it is to be hoped will as speedily be put down, for I for one do not believe that Urquiza, if defeated, will countenance any resistance to the will of the majority of the electors.

The Municipality of Rosario has been increased from twelve to eighteen members. There will, consequently, be an election on Sunday for sixteen members, as, what with the members whose term is expired, and others who have resigned, there are only two left. The Government has made two sales of public lands, with the condition of colonising them, in the Chaco; one to Mr. Laprade and the other to Mr. Paz. The commission for the expropriation of the lands of the concession to the railroad company, is hard at work, although its operations are necessarily slow on account of the obstinacy of the proprietors. I think every thing will be concluded by the middle of next month. The lands expropriated in this Province will cost the Government some 300,000 Bolivian dollars—probably something over this amount. The bridge over the Segundo is finished so far as the piles are concerned; the upper structure is all that remains to be put on. The work is

said to be more perfect. The Government bridge at Frayle Muerto is almost finished.

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BANDA ORIENTAL.

Carneles, 20 June, 1868. The best news I have to send you from this quarter is that it has rained plentifully, and suddenly put an end to the sultry and unhealthy weather so unusual for the middle of June and which was very trying both to man and beast.

The cañadas and arroyos have again received a fresh supply of water and the camp which was beginning to look withered and bare now presents a verdant aspect quite refreshing.

Rumour having got aloft of Carralho's disaffection the natives were again called up but only for a short time. We are now enjoying perfect tranquility but for how long it is impossible to say, as it is a lamentable fact in this country that one mounted gaucho with a lance and a fluttering flag can set the whole province in motion and commotion.

The paper money question disturbs us very little here, perhaps from the scarcity of dollars. The gentlemen whom it affects most are, I should think, the pulperos and there is little fear of them. Take it all in all this is a delightfully exciting country I mean to those, who have got any thing to lose.

If they are estancieros there is the sudden fall in the price of wool to waken them up and should that not stir them sufficiently, then there comes a civil war and a host of ragged soldiers to try their nerves, and should they be foolhardy enough to survive all this they are met with the Bank bubble to finish up with.

Of course I do not speak of the Paraguayan war as an affliction, for from its venerable antiquity I regard it as a South American Institution. I very much suspect that those are the happiest who labour only to supply their daily wants which consist of carne, mate and paper cigars.

The Siecle says:—"People doubt that the British government, so easily victorious over Theodoros, will, as is said, withdraw its troops from Abyssinia, and abstain from all attempt to annex it to the colonial empire of England. We shall soon be enlightened on this subject. Should Sir Robert Napier really return to India satisfied with having delivered his unfortunate countrymen, the captives of Theodoros, this expedition would undoubtedly be unique in the English annals.

The traditions of the Eastern policy of the British empire have not yet accustomed us to the sight of such a costly undertaking, carried out for an object of pure humanity, free from all ambitious calculations."

The Liberté thinks the news premature announcing immediate evacuation of Abyssinia, and is of opinion that the "English taxpayer has spent too much money on the matter not to look for compensation."

The Courrier Francais says:—"The French have pierced the Isthmus of Suez, believing thus to make themselves the masters of the route to India, but the English, at the cost of one hundred and fifty millions, and by an easy expedition have seized the key of the passage, and gathered thus all the fruit of M. de Lesseps' labors."

There are two or three brokers who have sold heavily for the end of the month, and are now compelled to buy. To-day, as money is scarce, and loans on Bonds less difficult, the market showed a better tone, and many look for the closing rate for the month at 46.

Political affairs look unfavorable. The departure of Hornos for Corrientes has created much attention, and many seem to think that in the direction of Entre Rios troubles are brewing. Exchange fell off to-day, closing at 49, drawers, and 49, takers; but, it was said on 'Change' that bills were put at 49. The London Bank is not as yet drawing. We hear Mr. Green refuses to draw 49d.

The news from Montevideo to-day was of the same stamp as usual. Crowds at the Italian Bank. Exchange falling. In the South Plaza one sale of capones to-day from the estancia of Martinez de Hoz at 304 mg. The following are the latest telegrams from the Picardie:— Lisbon, May 19. Cotton lower, and prices weak.
