ANOTHER LAWSUIT.

SHAFTE versus ALZAGA.

The publicity which of late we have given to lawsuits pending before the courts where foreigners' rights and important principles are involved has attracted such attention in the immediate circle of litigants that we find our table as crowded with briefs as if we were practising at the bar. So well pleased are we to know that the STANDARD is beginning to be regarded as one of the most effective appellate jurisdictions in this city that, without any fee or recompense, we wade through the voluminous documents connected with each case, and coming directly to the point at issue, lay the matter before our readers in as few words as possible. To our mind no department of a newspaper is more important than that of the legal questions of the day, which are decided by the courts. A correct knowledge of the decisions serves to guide the judgment in the affairs of life, whilst on the other hand the ventilation of a case serves to rescue the litigants from the endless delays which surround every lawsuit. The present case is one of apparently trifling importance, inasmuch as the amount claimed by Mr. Shaffe the plaintiff does not exceed 5000 paper dollars, but we drag the case from the dusty archives of the Escribano's office, and place it before the public, not for the purpose of entering into the merits of Mr. Shaffe's demand or Mr. Alzaga's defence; but, with the higher object of showing up the abuses which have crept into the procedure of our courts, and the improper system of sending a poor man from pillar to post, which demands the most energetic reform. In the year 1862, on the 10th of February, Don Carlos Shaffe summoned Don Martin Alzaga before the Juez de Paz of Tuyu, the subject matter in dispute being the winding-up of a flock of sheep on thirds, which he, the said Shaffe, received from Alzaga, viz.—On the 4th of May, 1860, Alzaga gave to Shaffe, on thirds, a flock of 1,104 mestiza sheep and 27 rams.

On the 1st of February, 1862, the business was wound up, and the flock then counted, 1,561 sheep, and 9 rams, being an increase of 447 sheep, and a loss of 18 rams. The share of the increase that fell to Shaffe, 149 sheep, which Alzaga took at a valuation of 40 dollars each, amounting to 5,960 dollars, but deducted therefrom the 18 dead rams, for which he charged \$300 each, amounting to \$5,400. Shaffe refused to pay this loss, alleging that according to the custom of the country, and the tenor of such contracts, (except when expressed to the contrary) the value of the dead rams should be deducted from the business prior to a subdivision of the profits; that is to say, the owner of the flock should bear two thirds of the loss, and the shepherd one third. The Justice of the Peace on hearing the evidence adduced on both sides, decided in favour of the plaintiff, whereupon Alzaga, the defendant, denied the jurisdiction of the Court, inasmuch as the amount at issue exceeded the sum of 4,000 dollars, the tenor of the jurisdiction of a country judge. In June, 1863, the plaintiff brought a suit before the Juez de Primera Instancia, who decided that the case did not belong to his court, and should go before the Commercial Tribunal. Application was then made to the judge of the latter court, who declined to hear the question, alleging that the sheepbreeding business was not within the meaning of the law a mercantile question. The plaintiff was turned out of court and told to apply where he thought fit. Mr. Louis Wild, the attorney of the unfortunate Frenchman, the plaintiff in the suit, finding all the lower courts shut against him, issued a writ of Seire Facias in the Superior Tribunal de Justicia, and demanded of the court to know before what tribunal the case should be tried. The return on this writ was that the case belonged to the jurisdiction of the Civil Court below. Mr. Wild then brought the case up again before the Juez de Primera Instancia, who refused to entertain the suit on the ground that the declaration of complaint was not signed by a lawyer. This last judgment was given in October, 1863, and until June, 1865, we find no further move made in the matter; then it was that the plaintiff again appeared in the same court with his lawyer, Mr. Salvañach, and with the same demand. Judge Cazon ordered a 'juicio verbal,' and summoned Mr. Alzaga to attend, who declined the notification on the ground that he had named Mr. Peter Joseph Romero as his general attorney. The case again went back to the court, and Romero was summoned to appear. Romero put in his defence, and Judge Cazon rescinded his decree ordering the court to have the case sent back to the Juez de Paz of Tuyu. Mr. Wild, on behalf of Shaffe, opposed this, but Judge Cazon decreed that the case should be sent back to the Juez de Paz of Tuyu. Mr. Wild petitioned the same court to have the case sent before the Juez de Paz of the Cathedral del Sud, alleging that his client was then living in town, and too poor to bear the expense of going to Tuyu. Judge Cazon refused this petition, and decided in favour of Alzaga, against which decision Mr. Wild appealed, and brought the case up before the Supreme Court. On 22nd of November, 1866, the whole Bench of the Supreme Court reversed the decision of Judge Cazon, and decided in favor of the plaintiff, thereupon the case was brought before the Justice of the Peace of the parish of the Concepcion, Sr. Zapiola, who on hearing both sides gave judgment in favor of Mr. Shaffe, the plaintiff. Alzaga appealed against this decision, and 'juicio verbal' was ordered on the 20th of April 1868, all parties attended before Judge Agrelo, who at once confirmed the decree of the Justice of the Peace Zapiola, ordering the defendant to refund to Mr. Shaffe the two thirds value of the 18 dead rams, and to pay the costs of the suit. On the 16th of June 1868 being six years and four months since the commencement of the lawsuit, the defendant paid the debt and costs. We, for our part, consider that our duty is discharged in laying the facts of the case before our readers without offering any comment. Some of the judges who figured in the lawsuit are off the bench, others, we believe, have gone to their long home. Such cases as these plainly establish the urgent necessity of judicial reform. The plaintiff, in the case in question, a poor struggling shepherd, is turned out of all the lower courts, and forced into the highest tribunal of the land, not to try the merits of his case but simply to discover before what court he can obtain justice. Had we room or space we could track the illegalities of the procedure from the humble court-house in Tuyu to the questionable decision of the Commercial Court. Suitors, judges, and lawyers all seem to be groping their way in the dark; and let it be known to the foreign public of Buenos Ayres that it took over five years for a poor French shepherd of Tuyu to discover before what tribunal he could bring his patron to task for the two-thirds value of eighteen dead rams. This beats Barnabé and even the memory of the illustrious 'Maver,' and even the best Barnard

IMPORTANT FROM CORRIENTES.

ARRIVAL OF THE VENEZIA.

The fine steamer Venezia, Captain Thomas Mason, arrived yesterday at 12 o'clock from Corrientes with dates to Saturday, bringing 60 passengers, and having been obliged to leave over 30 families at Parana running away from the Entre Rios, the family of the late Mr. Hayes (Sinbad) being amongst them. The Venezia is the only steamer that can enter the lake facing Esquina. She ran in and saw the Entre Rios in full possession of the town. The Justice of the Peace named by Caseres came on board and defied the old Justice who was on board, to come on shore. Owing to the Venezia having Italian colors he could not arrest him. The Paraguayan river is still on the rise: two days more and the allies will be obliged to evacuate the Chaco. No one knows where Lopez is at present. Corrientes is in for a heavy war before a month is over; the beginning of the second act takes place and some 20,000 Entrerios will probably be in the field. All the families in Corrientes are fleeing the country. The lower towns are deserted. We extract the following news from the letter of one of our correspondents:— "Goya, June 29, 1868. "I am awaiting the arrival of the steamer from Corrientes; meanwhile, I pen you these lines to let you know the news from these quarters. "General Caseres, having detached a part of his forces to take the small town of the Paso de los Libres (a Restauracion), said forces were met by those of Colonel Reguera, who defeated them with slaughter. Many of Caseres adherents have already arrived here, and placed in security by our friend Pampin. I know nothing further. "P.S.—The steamer has arrived: my letters to hand. General Emilio Mitre landed at Corrientes on the 25th, accompanied by the 2nd and 4th of the Line of the Argentine army. He (Mitre) immediately sent Comandante Quiroga off to the Paraiso (Curuzu-Cuatia), intimating Caseres to lay down his arms, and to present himself at Corrientes. The Regimiento San Martin and some of the Brazilian cavalry (Rio Grandenses) have passed at the Paso de la Patria. So, if the great Joseph means to fight, he will be accommodated upon reasonable terms.

IMPORTANT FROM MONTEVIDEO.

Monday Evening, June 29. THE EARLY CLOSING MOVEMENT is now the rage here; it has had its day in England and the States, now it is time to try it in the Plate. Saturday night, when that awful day closed in, a most influential meeting of bank managers and clerks was held to discuss the question. The result of that meeting is not yet generally known, but I hear everyone in the hotel saying that early bank closing begins tomorrow. Nothing I can write or say can depict to you the harrowing state of things here at present. Money of every name, nature, and kind has vanished. The banks which still go on have redeemed all their currency, and are now only in trouble about their deposits. The gold and silver coin has completely fled, and is hid away in old wells, cellars, &c. I saw a man to-day returning from the market; he says that everything there is now done by barter— A leg of mutton for four cotton handkerchiefs; a piece of beef for one lb. potatoes for a silk neck-tie; a fat turkey for a bottle of Hesperdina. And so on. Lycurgus himself could not have brought to greater perfection the barter and exchange system. Print it, 'Standard,' in large letters, that there is now one country in the world that does without money. We are ahead of all creation. Why, even the Yankees are fast asleep. First we do up the banks; then we do up the gold and silver coin. But the greatest of all victories is, that we have done up the Minister. 'Pause reader and contemplate our position—Without money of any description, and above all without a Finance Minister. The whole civilized globe will grow dizzy at the spectacle; in fact at times my feelings obtain such a mastery over me that I feel a choking sensation, like as if a fish-bone stuck in my throat. Write, you say, by each steamer—but what man on the face of the earth can write with the billows of a financial tempest beating so madly round his one-oared canoe? Put me on the top of the Pyramids, place me in the aft cabin of the Everet, or Brady, in the greatest storm that has occurred since the Deluge, and I feel I could write a letter for the foreign public of Buenos Ayres. But ask me not to pen another line whilst this crisis continues. I feel so completely done up that positively I don't know whether to spell crying with a 'k' or a 'c.' But if, jehsiding to the inmost sorrow of the human heart, the fettered brain shuts out the memory of the illustrious 'Maver,' and even the best Barnard

THE LATE COLLISION BETWEEN THE STEAMERS PAYSANDU AND CASTOR.

I have just obtained a copy of your widely-circulated paper of the 10th of this month, and have seen, for the first time, a letter therein published, by Captain Robert G. Saw, of the Paysandu, giving an account of a collision between his steamer and the English steamer Castor, on the evening of the 5th inst.

My watch was set as usual, and the pilot at his post. It was a beautifully clear night, and the Paysandu was observed at some distance coming down the middle of the stream, availing herself of the current which is customary with vessels bound down.

On the other hand, I was hugging the right shore, being not a half ship's length off, in order to avoid the current, where there was not sufficient water close in on the other.

If the Paysandu had kept on her course the two vessels would have passed well clear of each other. I was unable to port my helm, because we were going so much slower than the Paysandu that there was no time to cross, and a more serious collision would have been unavoidable.

The captain of the Paysandu states that he ordered his engines to be stopped and backed, and his whistle blown. I can only say that on board my vessel the whistle was not heard, which, considering the close proximity of the vessels, is remarkable.

After the collision, my vessel was run on shore to ascertain if the extent of the damage was such as to endanger the safety of the vessel, crew or cargo. The Paysandu was also run ashore, and I suppose with the same view. The two vessels were not twenty yards apart.

Having satisfied myself that there was no injury below the water-line, and seeing that the Paysandu with lanterns over her side and a boat under the bow, was repairing her damages, I backed off and pursued my course, not considering myself called upon to offer her assistance, as it was apparent that she was perfectly safe, more particularly as no one on board of her made any enquiries as to our condition, which, considering the disparity in the size and power of the two vessels, might naturally have been supposed to be worse than hers.

The Senate Court refused, by thirty-five ays against nineteen nays, to convict President Johnson upon the eleventh article of impeachment. This article charged him with having denied in a public speech that the Thirtieth Congress was authorized to exercise legislative power; also with denying that the legislation of the said Congress was valid or obligatory upon him, or that it had power to propose certain amendment to the constitution; with seeking to prevent the execution of Tenure of Office Act, by illegally attempting to prevent Mr. Stanton from resuming the functions of Secretary of War; and further, with having contrived to hinder the execution of the Reconstruction Act, as well as of the Act which provides that all military orders should be issued through the General of the Army.
