Montevideo, July 2, 6.40 P.M. The Ministerial question was settled to-day. The following are the names of the new Ministers: Don Antonio Rodriguez Caballero Gobernador.

THE FRIAS PROJECT.

A project of some importance for the general public has just been laid before Congress by Senator Frias, the object of which is to empower the National Government to name a Committee to inspect the books of all the private banks of emission in the riverine towns, and also in Cordova and to present their reports thereon to Congress, on or before the 31st of August.

We must admit, however, that after what has occurred in Montevideo, where bank inspectors also exist, we see very sound reason for Sr. Frias's project. If the truth be told, the public now places very little reliance on the monthly statements so punctually published by the banks, since experience has taught us that although the balance-sheet can be signed, sealed, and delivered, on the last day of the month, with the precision of a last will and testament, the mere figures amount to nothing, and the whole concern may be rotten at the core.

Aside, however, from the melancholy state of affairs in Montevideo, there are not wanting rumors respecting the solvency of some of the banks in the riverine towns, which fully justify the proposed bill of Senator Frias. Only the last steamer from Santa Fé brought the news that at the colonies up there much of the Rosario paper money has ceased to pass current, and parties who had gone up to those colonies amply supplied with Rosario notes, for the purpose of buying produce, had to return without effecting any purchase, as potatoes and maize could only be bought for gold.

Again, in the city of Corrientes, we have advices almost by every mail respecting the abundance of paper money and the scarcity of specie. Gold exists there, but not in the hands of banks or shopkeepers, whose business transactions are almost solely carried on by paper money. Correntino dollar bills are floating about in the allied camp with a greater profusion than grape or slugs. At no period since the commencement of this celebrated war has the money market at headquarters ruled so easy as at present. It flies about with the velocity of gunpowder, and possibly Senator Frias thinks it possesses the same explosive qualities. We see nothing of all this paper money here, but what did we see of the five hundred millions worth of

paper money withdrawn from the Montevideo market? and yet we suffer from the disaster almost as acutely as if we participated in the spoils. Senator Frias is right, and his bill merits the support of the whole mercantile community of Buenos Ayres, as it may avert another grand financial burst up, similar to that of Montevideo. Paper money has never in this Republic assumed its proper position; not even in the palmist days of the Provincial Bank of this city did its notes circulate beyond the province which gave it birth.

If the natural state of man is war, we confess that the normal state of the Plata is a crisis, and the Frias project may be regarded through a financial telescope, as the first appearance of a meteor that may illumine or destroy the free banks in the Interior. The celerity with which Sr. Frias asks for this report betrays his ulterior views of Bank reform; he stands before the public as the guardian of private interests since his memorable attempt to protect the horses of the republic, and we trust that his project now before the house will lead to effective Bank reform.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CELEBRATION.

Seldom is it that the Buenos Ayrean public is afforded such a thoroughly enjoyable musical treat as the one allowed them last Tuesday evening, in the American Church, a treat which appeared to be fully appreciated, if we may judge from the well filled house, and the attentive, and to all appearance well pleased audience, assembled to hear the report of progress, and especially to listen to the musical attainments of the scholars of the Sunday School, in connection with that Church. We think we are justified in adding, that the audience had no reason to be dissatisfied as regards the result of any of the objects for which they had met.

A glance around the building showed that considerable pains had been taken, and much taste exercised in the decoration of the edifice, which, being most gracefully set off with festoons of evergreens, and with flowers, grass-decorations, mottoes, &c. effected a change, converting the usually plain homely interior into a most attractive one. We particularly noticed the skill with which gas had been made useful as well as ornamental, as also the words "Peace on earth, and good will towards men" on a scroll at the upper end of the Church.

Among the many attractions most particularly to be noticed the juvenile songsters, who, to the number of about one hundred, were well accommodated on a temporary platform erected at the east end of the building. The picture they afforded was one, unfortunately, but very seldom seen in this city—being one of genuine joy and happiness, and of childish beauty, glee, and innocence, showing that the children desired to repay the trouble of their teachers.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL.

This, the proceeds of the evening, it was confidently hoped, would completely cover. The entertainment was agreeably diversified by the distribution of prizes, premiums, &c.; but its chief feature was music, in the selection of which excellent taste had been shown. Our space will but allow us to briefly remark on so varied a program, but justice demands particular praise should be bestowed on the choir for the manner in which they acquitted themselves in the anthems—"Great is the Lord" and "But in the last days;" "Happy days of childhood" was well performed, as also "The Christians' dear home;" "The Rainbow," a recitation, was pleasingly rendered by a class of seven girls; "The Anchor" should also have an honorable mention; a dialogue, representing an "Inquest on the body of Timothy Toper," who died from drink, was given by several boys; and a declamation by Mr. Martin, of the Bible Class, was favorably received.

Time forbids us to give a more extended report of the proceedings, but a few remarks will, perhaps, not prove unavailing. The opportunities afforded Buenos Ayreans of hearing artists are certainly not few, but the chance to enjoy a musical feast such as this is not often offered; thus, perhaps, it is we can so fully appreciate one when afforded, be this as it may, we may truly state that the young songsters performed their parts most admirably. In fact, nothing could have been more charming, nor could different pieces have been very much better executed; the hissing voices of the young ones mingled well with those of the older singers, giving to the whole performance a most pleasing, and peculiarly attractive effect.

There may be enjoyment in operatic concerts; but in our opinion, to hear the young raising their sweet voices in sacred song is far more ennobling and enjoyable than the former—and certainly is in Buenos Ayres far more rare. Music such as this, pleasure such as this, is innocent, wholesome, and good in every way, since it does not cause the reaction, more or less, always consequent on an opera or theatrical representation. In now concluding this imperfect description of an entertainment, which to be appreciated must be seen and heard, we can but add the greatest praise is due to all the performers, and more especially to Edward Hollister, Esq., who was, we understand, as leader of the Church Choir, most indefatigable in his duties in directing the musical part of the festival. But his success, and the success of all, will, we are assured, prove a sufficient reward for trouble so willingly given.

MONTEVIDEO ATHLETIC SPORTS.

The sports took place on Monday, 29th inst., and were better than a great success, being the forerunner of a greater. Heavy rains during the preceding week rendered training impracticable, and made the ground marshy and treacherous. Heavy packet work—the Arno having left on Monday morning—prevented that over-worked animal, "the British clerk," from showing the full strength of his muscle, and yet this trial meeting came off well, a result mainly attributable to the inspiring presence of the Montevidean fair ones, and also to the good management of the judge, Mr. Littlejohn, of the managing committee, especially Mr. Getting, who also acted as starter, and the stewards, Messrs. Barnett, Tomkinson, Lafone, Morrison, &c.

The Montevidean Athletes, as a body, are not ambitious, but in the latter part of the day's proceedings, one or two opined that they could make "small beer" of the Buenos Ayreans. Palermo men, be generous, and remember the "tightening" influences of the Montevidean "cocktails" on the unruly member. With the permission, however, of your Bolsa Committee, we would fain reserve one holiday a year to see the meeting of "a Greek and Greek." The program being finished, boxing foil-playing, and quits, became the rule of the day. In one or two contests with the gloves, although before dinner, the claret was drawn with spirit; but nothing could resist the argument of a well known camp man; unsuccessful in hitting an opponent he turned round and let drive at an unoffending bystander. On being remonstrated with, he made the most satisfying remark that he could not hit his own man, and must punish somebody.

THE ROAST BEEF OF OLD ENGLAND. 100 Yard Race—Eleven Entries. The distance was done in 11 seconds notwithstanding the slippery condition of the ground. Fuller who was in good form, won easily, Banquier coming in second closely followed by Macarthur.

Long Jump Standing. Six Entries. This was won in splendid style by Fuller, the distances were as under: 1 Fuller, 9ft. 1in. 2 Banquier, 8ft. 9 1/2in.

High Jump Standing. Seven Entries. The pluck of our American cousin was here displayed, Lieut. Setely winning in a masterly style. 1 Setely, 3ft. 8 1/2in. 2 Davis, 3ft. 4 1/2in.

200 Yards Hurdle Race. Four Started. This race was well run, Setely coming in an easy winner, having cleared the hurdle successfully, Banquier a bad second. The event was most laughable and exciting. From the state of the ground, and the position of the hurdles, falls were plentiful. At the third hurdle Banquier experienced a sufficiently satisfactory cropper. Davis came to grief at the fourth, and Betts had to indemnify the club for the smashing of the second bar.

Long Jump Running. Owing to the ground being bad, the distance accomplished scarcely came up to the mark. Betts won easily, and promises shortly to out-shine himself. 1 Betts, 15ft. 4in. 2 Fuller, 14ft. 3in.

High Jump Running. This was well contested, the result remaining long uncertain, from the plucky way the jumps were taken by Setely, Davis and others. At the last jump Setely unfortunately sprained his ankle, and had to be carried off, the result being a tie between Davis and himself at 4ft. 3in. The ground was particularly unfavourable.

Throwing Cricket Ball. Setely won easily, notwithstanding his maimed condition, throwing 98 feet against a slight wind, Ellis coming second.

Race for Boys. Fourteen Started. The little fellows ran well. The winners were loudly applauded. Woodgater ran well, and came in first. Young Carroll, the second, is smaller, but ran most pluckily.

440 Yards Race. This was one of the most interesting events of the day. The start was, under Mr. Getting's able management, everything that could be wished for. On nearing the first corner Banquier let out, and continued, three quarters of the way, when Fuller, who had been waiting, shot past. Time, 1m. 7sec, with Betts second, and Davis third.

Throwing the Hammer. There was little competition— 1. Banquier, 63ft. 3in. 2. Tomkinson, 53ft. 3in.

Putting the Stone. The winner of the previous competition maintained his position, Macarthur second, Dunn third.

Hop-skip-and-Jump. This was won by Fuller. The ground was bad— 1. Fuller, 33 ft. 2 1/2in. 2. Banquier, 33ft. 2 1/2in.

Three-legged Race. As there was but one entry, the two three leggers did not see the joke of walking over the course for the amusement of the public.

100 Yards Consolation Stakes. This was a well-contested race, Macarthur coming in a good first, followed by G. Hart, rather out of wind.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Edward Everett and the Rio Negro came up yesterday from Montevideo, bringing between the two considerably over one hundred passengers. It is no wonder that people should be anxious to flee from the crisis-stricken city. A friend of ours who came up yesterday informed us that with \$10,000 of paper in his hand he could not obtain \$200 in gold. Matters must have come to a pretty pass when such occurrences as this take place.

The Estrella arrived early yesterday at the Tigre, with 47 passengers and very heavy mails from the Interior and from the Pacific. In Rosario great tranquillity prevails, and a good deal of dullness in commercial operations. Our exchanges from the interior are San Juan, 6th; Mendoza, 9th; and Cordova, 26th ult., but we can find nothing authentic with reference to the results of the Presidential Elections. From the West Coast we have dates from Panama to the 10th, and Valparaiso, 30th April. Nothing of any importance is reported from Chile. From Peru we learn that the electoral colleges met on the 5th inst. for the purpose of electing the President, and Vice-Presidents of the Republic. The result of the votations was as follows, was in favor of Balta. The event had as usual, given rise to political squabbling, and questionable electioneering finesse on both sides. The yellow fever had not abated in the least, and we are assured that in Lima the fatal cases amount to 400 per diem; the official statements published are unreliable.

A correspondence from Navarro, published by the 'Tribuna,' gives a detailed, and apparently authentic account of the casualties which occurred during the electioneering row that took place there a few days ago. The murderous fire opened by the Juez de Paz and his myrmidons on the populace, caused the death of one Wenceslao Benitez, and, besides a number of others slightly wounded at the beginning of the 'melé,' and who ran away, the names of ten are given who were seriously wounded, some of them mortally.

It is stated that President Mitre has received a letter from his son, who is Secretary of the Argentine Legation in the United States, announcing that Sr. Sarmiento intended to sail from New York on the 22d inst. He is, therefore, expected to arrive here in the first week in September.

The vestiges of a mysterious and horrible crime were discovered on Wednesday morning. A washerwoman on going that day to her usual avocations found near the river at the foot of Calle Moreno a sack tied up and from which a human leg was protruding. On giving notice to the police the latter proceeded to open the sack, and were horrified to find in it the corpse of an elderly man, decently dressed, whose head had been battered in with some blunt instrument. The unfortunate victim has not yet been identified, nor any clue found to the perpetrators of this act.

We are requested by D. Emiliano del Campo to state that the Government having decreed the payment of what is due to the prisoners on board the Argentine man-of-war, 25 de Mayo, for the months of January, February, and March last, the relatives of said prisoners, who hold powers of attorney, or are authorized to draw for their assignments, are notified to apply at 288 Calle Potosi. The absurd statement, that Sarmiento was born in Chile, and therefore not eligible for the Presidency, is perfectly unfounded. He first saw the light of day in San Juan, in 1811. A very interesting work, written by him, entitled "Recuerdos de Provincia," contains some very curious geographical details, and among others the following, which is highly characteristic: In the year 1833 he was a clerk in a commercial house in Valparaiso, at one gold ounce per month, of which he set aside half to pay a professor, of English, one Richard, and two rials weekly, to the sereno of the street where he lived, in order that he might be called at two in the morning to study English. We extract the following from our transandine colleague the 'Valparaiso and West Coast Mail'—It has been determined that a new colonial bishopric shall at once be formed for the Falkland Islands, the jurisdiction to extend to all British congregations in South America, with the exception of Guiana, which has already the advantage of episcopal supervision. It is pretty certain that the Rev. White Hoeken Stirling, M. A., of Exeter College, Oxford, at present superintendent at Keppel Isle, in connection with the South American or Patagonian Missionary Society, will be the new bishop. I am certain that last year had our scabs been cured both in the rains and away after the shearing of 1866, by dipping, two or three times, say the first dipping a week after shearing, and three weeks or a month the second, and so on, that instead of our sheep going 8 1/2 and 9 to the arroba, we should only have gone from 5 1/2 to 6. Are there any sheepfarmers in this country who do cure their scab? I neither know them, nor have I ever heard of any; but whether there are or not it is the duty of the Government (if there be such a thing here) to make them do it. Our estancieros, who are supposed to be rich men, do not take sufficient care of, or interest in their sheep, which they ought to do, as they not only keep themselves poor, but look at the lots of young Englishmen who have sheared on halves, thirds, and even fourths, who live hard, and work hard, and yet their wool money is so wretchedly small it hardly pays their expenses, and who is to blame but the estancieros? They alone are to blame, and I do not hesitate for one moment in saying they ought to be ashamed of themselves. Look, also, at the few rams they put into the flocks—one ram to 100 sheep, which is perfectly absurd. I wonder what our large sheepbreeders in England think of it? I know two of about the largest sheepfarmers and breeders in England, and they never put more than from 25 to 30 ewes to one ram. "Oh! ye estancieros; when will you learn wisdom." I can only say as your other correspondent, that until scab is cured sheepfarming will not, can not, prosper.—I am, yours truly, PUERTO.

The deficiencies in the instrumentation, as well as the execution of the orchestra, were more than usually apparent. To-night, "Rigoletto," with Mme. Labache.

A VOICE FROM THE WESTERN CAMPS. It is with great pleasure I read your "Occasional Correspondent's" letter, in your paper of the 27th of May, on the everlasting subject of "Sheep-farming." Certainly, he is quite right as to what he says about scab; but I do not agree at all with him about medianeros, &c., being run off the road, like our glorious old coaches were. It is but too true that the reason we get so little wool from our sheep, and so bad a price for our wool, is simply because our estancieros will not cure the scab. And why will they not? Simply, because there is no law to compel them, like there is in Australia, where they have our glorious English shears, and where, if a man does not cure scab in his flock in a certain time, after having had notice given him to do so, his sheep are killed. But here we labor under one great disadvantage, viz., not being under Old England's laws.

Another reason our flocks are bad on account of keeping so many old sheep running in the flocks: every sheep that has reached the age of six or seven, ought not to be allowed to run with the flocks; but then our sapient estancieros say, "Oh, she will have another lamb." Yes, so she may, which has already the advantage of episcopal supervision. It is pretty certain that the Rev. White Hoeken Stirling, M. The same paper says—The Chilean Minister of Marine has ordered that the national steamer Abato, in her next voyage of instruction shall visit the Isla de Pascua, or Davis Island, as it is called by the English, with the object of examining it, perhaps with a view to its colonisation. We believe it was first visited by the Dutch in 1722, by the Spaniards under the command of Don Felipe Gonzalez in 1770, and by Captain Cook four years afterwards; it possesses an area nearly double that of the island of Masafuera, is situated about 900 geographical miles from the coast of Chile, in lat. 27° 12' S. and long. 109° 25' W. of Greenwich. The official journals, and our native contemporaries generally appear to regard this Island as "geographically" belonging to this country, though by what process of reason they have arrived at this conclusion we are at a loss to understand, except perhaps, that it is in about the same latitude as Caldera; it seems to us that "geographically" belongs to Chile about as much as India "geographically" belongs to England.

Respecting the subscription for a monument to the late Dr. Leslie, we understand that the amount collected is slightly over \$13,000, which is deposited in the Maua Savings Bank. Mr. Saldices, the trustee of the fund, purposes handing over the whole to Mrs. Leslie to be disposed of by her as she may think proper. Yesterday intimation was received at the Policia of the murderer of the Irish sheepfarmer near Arco. The assassin's name is said to be Harry Handy, and he has been traced on foot to an estancia in Matanzas, where he slept on Wednesday night, and escaped next morning. The Chief of Police has issued the necessary order for the arrest of the party in question. The storming of the patente office has in a measure ceased. Yesterday the place was not much crowded, and several parties who came to see the sport went away disappointed. The time has been extended to the 10th inst.

We learn with satisfaction of a remarkable sale of wool made yesterday by our friend Mr. Duggan, who disposed in the morning of upwards of 20,000 arrobes of wool, at the high rate of \$63. This gentleman is the broker of many of our Irish sheep-farming friends, and the above sale must enhance his reputation. Private letters have been received from Corrientes giving the most terrible account of the state of things up there. The estancieros and residents of the country towns are flying the country; soldiers are crossing and recrossing at every point. Caseres refuses to surrender, and the whole country is in arms. Experienced parties believe that this Corrientino affair will be a long and bloody chapter in Argentine history.
