Montevideo, July 9, 5.30 P.M.

The Representative Chambers have approved of the project presented by the Governor, authorising a loan of \$500,000, and to arrange the Bank question by giving account to the general Congress.]

Not such a rush on 'Change to-day.

Great many buyers of Montevideo on paper, but no sellers. Buyers of Maua in large quantities to 24 and 25 dis. At the time of the Bolsa closing the following sales of Bank paper was effected:—2,500 Maua, at 20 1/2 dis.; 4,000 at 25; 2,000 at 24; 3,000 Montevideo at 26; 2,600 Italiano at 24; 2,000 at 22.

She arrived at Lisbon on the 9th June, 3 days and 20 hours under steam; at Bahia on the 25th, 15 days and 1 hour; Rio on the 30th, 3 days and 4 hours; and at Montevideo on the 7th July, 4 days and 5 hours—total, 26 days 6 hours under steam, and experiencing fine weather with light westerly winds throughout.

Left Rio on 3rd July, at three p.m., at which time the English mail had not arrived, but at five p.m. same day passed the Arno north bay. She has 300 tons of cargo for this port, the following is her list of passengers:—

Thanks to the attention of Messrs. Lamport & Holt, of Liverpool, and of Capt. Peel, we received full piles of the London and Liverpool papers up to the 5th June.

Money could with difficulty find employment at 3 per cent per annum. Brazil securities had slightly improved, London and River Plate Bank stock £5 to £6; premium Buenos Ayres Great Southern Railway, 16 to 17; Central Railway 12 1/2. Argentine bonds 76; Buenos Ayres, 86 to 88; Northern Railway 3 to 5.

The great Australian Wool sales had commenced and were going on well, price firm and numerous continental buyers, hides neglected and following; tanneries, refuse to pay such prices, tallow down. Cotton in Liverpool slightly down.

The Cabinet held a council on the 2nd (afternoon), but it does not seem to have come to a final decision on the scheme for advancing the general election, as Mr. Disraeli stated in the House of Commons in the course of the evening that he was not prepared to give information on the subject.

The House of Commons resumed its labours on the 4th, and was chiefly engaged in voting the civil service estimates. Previously, however, a short discussion took place on the subject of the Irish policy of the Government. Sir T. Bateson originated it by drawing attention to a letter recently written by Mr. Gladstone, in which the right honourable gentleman stated that the Government had proposed to endow a Roman Catholic university in Ireland. Mr. Disraeli attacked to believe that the letter was spurious; but Mr. Gladstone at once admitted that it was genuine, and stated that his assertion was justified by the declarations of the Government. Mr. Disraeli and Lord Mayo said that the intention of the Government had been misunderstood, as it had never intended to endow the Roman Catholic Church.

Mr. Bright was the guest of the Liverpool Liberal Association at a public breakfast in the Philharmonic Hall on Thursday morning the 4th. The spacious building was well filled, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. Bright reviewed the political events of late years, and dwelt at considerable length on the Irish Church question. Mr. V. Harcourt also spoke, and in terms always forcible, sometimes humorous, and frequently eloquent, exposed the gross inconsistencies of the existing Cabinet.

Mr. W. Beumont, ex-mayor of Warrington, recently stated at a meeting held in that town that Mr. Gladstone was the owner of a church in Liverpool from which he received £700 a year, out of which he paid a clergyman £120 a year, and in respect of which he had attempted to evade the payment of taxes. The statement was denied by Gladstone, and Mr. Beumont has written to a Warrington paper apologising for what he said, and pleading that he was misinformed.

The Emperor of the French has quite recovered from the effects of his recent indisposition.

Prince Napoleon's visit to Munich appears to have been of a private nature, for he made no official or state calls, nor did the King, who is now staying at Schlessberg, go to Munich to meet the prince.

Murphy, the anti-pobery lecturer, has moved on to Hanley, and on Wednesday was attacked in the street by an Irishman named McCarthy who knocked him down twice. The superintendent of police was fortunately at hand, and an extension of hostilities between the rival camps was averted. McCarthy was locked up, and Murphy was escorted to his lodgings. Yesterday morning McCarthy was committed by the mayor for two months, without the option of paying a fine, and was ordered to find substantial securities.

The Monitor Yacht publishes a letter dated Ay (Marne), May 28, in which the writer says—"I have just witnessed a most distressing spectacle. Imagine to yourself two entire communes completely ruined. One, the commune of Diez, contains 730 inhabitants; the other, Champillon, 350. On the 20th instant the inhabitants of these communes, who are nearly all vine dressers, at two o'clock in the afternoon were industriously pursuing their labour among the vines, showing leaves and bunches of grape in more than usual abundance. Suddenly a storm arose which drove all to seek shelter, and in the course of a quarter of an hour not a single bunch of fruit remained on these two vineyards, comprising respectively 50 and 110 hectares. The hailstones were so numerous and so large that on the following day, notwithstanding 30 degrees (Réaumur) of heat, they could still be gathered in heaps."

IMPORTANT FROM MONTEVIDEO. Wednesday, July 8, 1868.

The mind is almost overwhelmed at the contemplation of the impending woes of this unfortunate country. The general condition of Oriental humanity is to-day so wretched, that many believe any change must be for the better; but, I foresee, that we are on the eve of an unlimited supply of irredeemable paper, which, under the elevating and ameliorating influences of what is known here as a "vote of confidence," will be diffused with a liberality, rivalled only by the desire to get complete control of the whole circulating medium of the country.

I cannot depict to you the grave apprehensions of the thinking portion of this community. It may be all very well to write in a jocular strain now and then, to make your readers laugh; but if the botchery that is talked of be carried out, depend upon it that the verdict of the public will be, that all who voted for such a patched-up compromise, all who aided in the enactments, have permanently ruined credit, repressed industry, promoted national, social, and individual misery, and rendered abortive the choice blessings which a benevolent Providence accorded the once happy Banda Oriental.

'Nil desperandum' is the motto now. 'In for a penny, in for a pound,' and the speculators rub their hands with glee at the near probability of an issue of new paper money, which I, for one, regard as the very worst measure that any people or Government could resort to.

The pungent anticipations of an improved money market, which the speculators entertain, are based upon the hopes that when paper money again becomes abundant, the gold will emerge from its hiding-places. Of all the thousands paid out by the banks, not ten thousand ounces can be found to-day in this distressed city. To-day, there was a rumor of another bank closing up. Happily, the affair was arranged, but Saturday will try the concern.

There is but one bright drop of the elixir of happiness in our bitter cup of financial woe, and that is the hope that the President will refuse his assent to any measure that will tend to the creation of irredeemable paper dollars. The extreme sensibility and increasing horror of an event which we all now have to accuse ourselves of having provoked is heightened by the current rumours of the day. There are at this moment many parties preparing to wind up and permanently leave the country, I repeat, there is but one safe course left to the rulers of this land, and that is to keep clear of the banks that have gone down, and stand by and help the ones which have survived. Any departure from this line of conduct will give a durability to a crisis which, under other circumstances, must be transient.

The "Siglo" defends Mr. Guimaraes against the attacks made upon him, and indeed to look at his conduct in an impartial light, I think he deserves more praise than censure, he stemmed the current to the last: but in a few days there will be published a paper about the affairs of the Italian Bank which all the city is anxiously looking forward to.

Government has again extended the time for paying the patente tax to the 20th inst.

Yesterday it was currently rumored that the splendid Club Progreso building has been sold on reserved terms.

The Phillips' concert proved a splendid success, the house was well filled notwithstanding the numerous attractions elsewhere on the same evening, the opera, French theatre, three grand private parties, the fashionable Progreso ball, and the fireworks in the plaza. The great success of this concert firmly establishes Mr. Phillips' reputation as a negro minstrel he is the Christy of the Plate, his drollery is irresistible, and his extemporaneous parodies betray the precise talent essential to put the house in a roar; his hits at the Standard as a matter of course took—we cannot escape being ever the target of satire, and appearing as he did in so many characters, we recognise the full calibre of his versatility. Miss Sanchez almost eclipsed Catherine Hayes in "The Last Rose of Summer," and was on every occasion vociferously cheered. Bonetti was fully up to his high reputation, and is now the great English favorite. Messrs. Tolkien and Beck charmed the audience by their beautiful rendering of favorite English ballads, and Mr. — on the violin brought back to us the days of the memorable Ole Bull. Upon the whole, we congratulate Mr. Phillips and Mr. Reinken, on the great success of the night; and we promise them ever a full house, when they undertake a similar entertainment. We believe that there is some probability of another concert next month.

Perhaps it is not generally known that the now famous and quick steamer, the Conde de Bismarck, brought from Rosario the large amount of specie for Sr. Cabal, which we reported the other day as having arrived for his account. We recommend this beautiful and safe steamer to the notice of the public, as being the best cargo boat running on these rivers.

On Thursday we received our English exchanges per Tycho Brahe. People looked anxiously for the arrival of this steamer to learn the result of the Derby; as even here there were heavy bets on the Lady Elizabeth, but this favorite lost, and the Marquis of Hastings, her owner, has left for France; the name of the winner is Blue Gown, belonging to Sir Joseph Hawley. It is said the ring are heavy losers, one commission agent alone having laid £80,000 against him.

The news from headquarters amounts to very little. It appears that there has been a slight brush in the Chaco, close to Timbo. The Paraguayans attempted to surprise the Brazilian outposts, but they in their turn were surprised and driven back with great slaughter. The affair, however, cost the Brazilians something. We notice that now all our colleagues admit the existence of women troops on the banks of the Tebicuari, and even give the name of the female officer in command. When we first gave this news all the papers contradicted us, but now they see their mistake. Some months ago the total number of women soldiers only numbered about 3000, but there are subsequent letters at hand which state that the female recruiting is going on all over the country, and Lopez has stated that he will bring 20,000 women into the field to fight the Allies. Respecting Humaita there is nothing new; the troops spend the day fishing; the river still continues high; and now there is little talk of the surrender of the Place.

On Thursday during the Te Deum in the Cathedral, some pick-pockets walked off with D. Saptiano Olden's gold watch, which did not cut the chain but seem to have unscrewed the watch from the chain, whilst the owner was inspecting the grand altar. Mr. Billingham on a previous occasion lost his gold watch precisely in the same way.

We have received a detailed account of the Fourth of July celebration in Rosario, which we publish to-morrow. It was a very grand affair, and passed off most brilliantly. It seems that even out at Frayle Muerto the 4th of July was kept up, but we, as yet, have received no accounts from that quarter.

again. The only proper place for the capital is this city, and the sooner the question is finally settled the better for all parties concerned.

We heard yesterday that the engineer, of the Shamokin, in coming up to this city from Montevideo on Wednesday night, was robbed of £35 on board the steamer. It is well that the public should be put on their guard since the swell mob seem to have not only invaded the churches, but have got on board the steamboats.

The two projects sent to the Legislature by Minister Sorilla have been at last passed, after some modifications. Thus the Oriental Government is now armed with power to make arrangements with the banks, but we fully concur with our Montevidean correspondent in his remarks. The Government should hold aloof from the banks already in liquidation, and never, under any circumstances, lend itself to the creation of irredeemable paper money.

We are glad to note that our friend Mr. Bagley has come off with flying colours in the suit he was obliged to enter upon on account of the falsification of his Hesperidina labels. The demand for this ambrosial beverage is now so great that we hear it cannot be manufactured fast enough to supply the wants of the public.

Last Thursday night the celebrated North American Circus Company gave their first performance to a full house. Lovers of good horsemanship will have an opportunity of seeing Mr. Aymer, the bare-back rider, on Sunday, at 268 Calle Libertad.

The ball at the Progreso is universally admitted to have been, both for attendance, show of beauty, and display of costly toilettes, unsurpassed by any that have preceded it. The arrangements for the supper were, as usual, on a scale of profusion and excellence, for which the Club has acquired a well-deserved fame. All the wines were far above the common run of what are generally met with, and among the many delicacies with which the table abounded were some fat snipe, that would have done credit to a Soyer. H. E. President Mitre, with his family, was present, and the rest of the company included the cream of our fashionable society.

THE BRITISH CEMETERY.

To the Editors of the "Standard."

Gentlemen, Although my remarks relative to your editorial articles on the decree of the Municipality, ordering the English Cemetery to be closed, appeared in the "Standard" of June 28th, nevertheless there was no comment made upon my letter until the 4th of July. Trabuco then, thought that there was an opportunity for a display—and truly a nice display he has made, but of what?—of insolence and vulgarity, had taste and ill-breeding. Poor man! I know not whether to be indignant with, or to pity and despise him. In a very few words however, I'll teach Trabuco what he has not learned as yet, viz. the way to be cutting and gentlemanly at the same time—the way to criticise without descending to vulgarities.

Did "Trabuco" occupy himself from the 28th of June until the 4th of July in the composition of a straggling, disordered letter, which is only indicative of the total absence of good taste, literary education, and gentlemanly breeding? Well may I say, in the words of Horace:—"Patruent mentis: inane torridus imus."

If "Trabuco" cannot translate this line, perhaps some kind friend would do so for him, and, after that, explain to him also the way to apply it in the present case, as poor "Trabuco" himself appears, indeed, very void of anything like intellect. There are many little-minded, superficially-educated, and consequently ignorant persons, who are always anxious to appear before the public, especially in the columns of a respectable newspaper. These little people, but would-be-giants, are delighted when an Editor receives their productions, although it be only to fill up a column for which no matter could be found. Many a scribbler owes his fame to a discussion with some superior intellect, whose ideas he was unable even to comprehend. Perhaps this too is the ambition of the individual who has had the impoliteness to insult one who never insulted, at least knowingly, any human being. Evidently he

mistook the person with whom he had to deal, when he penned his vulgar and insulting criticism of my letter. My letter, gentlemen, was addressed to you, and was a criticism of some of your editorial articles. Consequently, did I say anything wrong? I would prefer that you yourselves would have answered me, and set me right; and then I would have to deal with gentlemen who are educated and capable of understanding what they read, and of deducting conclusions; and secondly, because I am sorry to see a column of your newspaper filled with the ravings of an ignorant would-be-logical and would-be-literary dabbler. But logical or literary he never was, and I doubt if he ever will be!

In my letter of the 28th of June there is not a single word calculated to wound the feelings of anyone, and yet this Trabuco gratuitously insults me for the conscientious expression of my thoughts. I repeat again, although this individual denies it, that the Municipality did not vote against their conscience, and I feel sure the Editors of the STANDARD believe as I do.

Trabuco accuses me of ignorance of logic! This is certainly rich! He says that I argue we are to do away the lesser evil (the English Cemetery) and retain the greater (the Recoleta). I sustain no such doctrine. I argue that if the Recoleta is a nuisance, it ought to be closed; but if the Municipality refuse to close it, is that a reason to allow another nuisance—viz., the English Cemetery, to remain? If my sheep and dogs are taxed, and I cannot free myself from the sheep-tax, is that a reason why I should also be taxed by the dog-tax because the dog-tax is lighter and consequently incommodious less? If Trabuco has no brains, and is unable to follow even this simple argument, how can I help that? It certainly causes me laughter that I must be taught logic by one who in all probability never opened a work on Logic in his life. I venture to say that if I were to ask him what is Logic he could not tell me.

He calls me his "young amigo." Does he know that this mixture of English and foreign words, except on very rare occasions—and this is not one of them, is considered by the best English writers a gross vulgarity? If not, let him consult Prof. Barry's "Grammar of Eloquence."

A specimen of his insulting impertinence may be gathered from this, he says—"The Municipality is unjust, 'Justiciero' is a disciple of that unjust 'clan'; therefore, 'Justiciero' must be unjust." I beg to say, I am a disciple of no "clan." I am above such lowliness, and leave such pursuits for "Trabuco" and his like. I repeat what I said before, that if it is in the nature of Englishmen and Americans to protest against injustice, they should do so, firmly, and more respectfully than is their custom.

What a nice friendly advice he gives me at the end of his windy epistle. But the words in which it is expressed are so hackneyed, so common-place, that he ought to have coughed it in other terms. He tells me too to choose another "hobby," for my talents and abilities. Now, one good turn deserves another, therefore, dear "Trabuco," take my advice, never by any means get into print, not even after thinking well over your subject, for of what use is a candle to a blind man; and, secondly, never choose any hobby for your talent and ability, for talent and ability you have none.

In conclusion, I beg to say, that any letter you may write hereafter will be totally disregarded, by me, therefore you may look upon the question as closed between us.

And now, Messrs. Editors, as a sincere and ardent friend, and well-wisher, let me hope that the "Standard" may always continue to hold the first place amongst the papers of B. Ayres, and remember it must be so, so long as you exclude from it such stuff as that of "Trabuco." But enough of him, in the words of a world-renowned orator I say—"He is, indeed, an object of compassion, and, from my inmost soul, I bestow on him my forgiveness, and my courteous pity."

National Bonds looked very firm to-day; two of the principal English brokers bought heavily on time. The cash sales amount to 12,000, at 43.

For Saturday 82,000, at 43. For July 31st, 210,000, at 43. For September 30th, 25,000, at 45. For August 31st, 20,000, at 44. The total sales of the day amount to 349,000. The speculation is evidently for the rise, but as yet no heavy purchases have been made.

There was some inquiry on the Bolsa to-day for Montevideo bank notes. Many brokers appear to have received superior information from Montevideo, respecting the new arrangement about to be made, and were anxious to buy Mau and Italian Bank notes at advanced rates. The telegram from the Bolsa announced that Mau notes had gone up to 74, but private advice represents the state of things down there as worse; and a protest against the mooted forced currency project was going the rounds at receiving the signatures of all the foreign houses. This document has been drawn up with legal precision, and notifies the Government that foreign merchants will hold the Government responsible for all losses consequent on the adoption of the proposed measure.

Exchange rules the same. About 2500,000 sterling passed. The rate to-day was from 49 1/2 to 50 1/2, but no large amount of Exchange could be passed under 50d.

The great news of the day however was the final arrangement of the Cabal business by the Argentine Bank. This bank, under the able management of Sr. Dn. Anarcharis Lanuz, has at once taken a new position in this market, and promises ere long to be the great city bank for the almaceneros and dealers. The immense connection of Sr. Lanuz is now bringing to the bank the very best customers, and the increased number of new accounts opened within the last few weeks, shows the popularity of the concern.

Respecting the Cabal business, we understand that the contract or arrangement formerly existing between Cabal and the River Plate Bank is now concluded with the Argentine Bank, and the bills on the Brazilian Treasury that have come down to Cabal on his former contract, payable to one of the principal mercantile firms in Corrientes, and duly endorsed, have been taken by the Argentine Bank, and the necessary advances made. The total amount of these drafts is half a million of pesos, the principal part of which will be applied towards the payment of Sr. Cabal's overdue notes. This being the first large transaction effected by the Argentine Bank in relation to the terms of the business and the affairs of the Bank. We learn on reliable authority that a half-yearly dividend of 9 to 10 per cent. will be declared on the 1st of August. A new subscription list for shares has been opened. The old shares command a premium. Should this Bank conclude the mooted business with the National Government, which will give circulation to its notes at the Custom-house, the bank will then rank on a par with the Provincial Bank of Buenos Ayres, and even surpass it, inasmuch as shortly it will be in a position to supply its dealers with bills on England and France. The judicious nomination of Sr. Lanuz as General-Director is now apparent, and the very lucrative contract concluded with Sr. Cabal is solely due to his influence and position.

The Tycho Brahe came up this afternoon. We suppose she was detained by the fog.

The news respecting wheat, per Tycho Brahe, is unfavorable, down 12 per cent.

In discounts money still rules tight. It was said on "Change" that some large amounts were being taken up at 1 1/2 per cent. per month for 90 days, to send to Montevideo.

MASSON AND MONGFELD. (Spurious Imitation of "Hesperidina" Labels, purporting to be of the same quality as that Manufactured by Bagley.)

Buenos Ayres, May 18th, 1868. Sr. Juan de Comercio—Melville S. Bagley, Manufacturer, without revoking Power of Attorney, Nicholas Masson, Manufacturer, and Henry Mongfeld, Lithographer, in the suit entered by the former against the two latter, inasmuch as Bagley, being in use of certain Labels for marking Hesperidina manufactured by himself, the Lithographer printed and sold others which, although somewhat different from the former, and which he may be mistaken for them, and the manufacturer used them for marking and selling the same article as Bagley, before your Worship we affirm, that having had knowledge of our duty in the case, since we, the defendants, Masson and Mongfeld, never intended to cause injury to the plaintiff, and Bagley, on the other hand, being desirous to put an end to the present suit, since his rights are recognised, and cannot suffer any injury, we have agreed to settle all our differences, which have been submitted to decision in said suit, and we give as concluded under the following heads:—Firstly—The defendants, Masson and Mongfeld, acknowledge that they have trespassed upon plaintiff's right, and done him harm; the former by using their own Labels, and the latter by having used them for marking and selling the same article, for which Bagley was already using them. 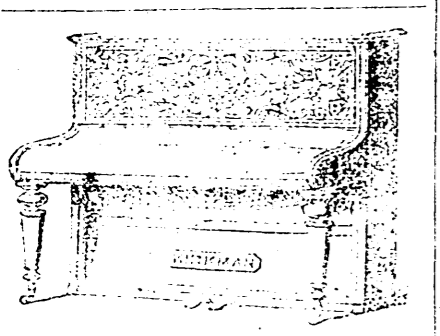
