IMPORTANT FROM MONTEVIDEO. Montevideo, June 17, 6.20 P.M. Government bank decree causes great commotion, and but little satisfaction.

Foreign houses sell for gold only. Bank paper quoted at same rates as yesterday.

FURTHER NEWS FROM THE WAR.

ANOTHER EXPEDITIONARY FORCE. There is no longer any doubt as to the next movement of the allies.

All the pine in Corrientes, all the vigas at Itapiru, and even the planks of the dealers of Cnripaiti have been purchased by the commissaries of the allied army.

The last attack of the Paraguayans on the two ironclads, in front of Tayi, has disturbed the forbidding calm which reigned at the Allied camp.

The Paraguayans keep up a very steady fire upon the Brazilian position at Establecimiento, and some strangers who visited that part of the Allied camp, narrowly escaped with their lives.

The river Paraguay is still on the rise; and we gather, from the most authentic source, that a view of the great inundations, General Rivashad crossed over to the mainland to have an interview with the Commander-in-Chief.

The President of the Republic, in virtue of the authority conferred upon him by the legislative resolution of the 13th inst., and in council of his Ministers.

A fiscal Commission of Banks is hereby appointed, composed of the Accountant-General of the State, and the following gentlemen:—Dn. Juan Peñalva, Dn. Exequiel Perez, Dn. Luciano Stewart, and Dn. Mauricio Dumau.

All emission banks established in the Republic shall deposit into the hands of the Fiscal Commission, as guarantee for the total amount of emission that each may have in circulation.

The securities established as guarantee may be withdrawn by the banks to whom they belong, if required for their operations, if substituted by others, that in the opinion of the Fiscal Commission offer equal guarantee.

THE BANKING CRISIS.

GOVERNMENT DECREE RE-ESTABLISHING A FORCED CURRENCY. DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE. Montevideo, July 10, 1868.

1. That the monetary state of the country at the present moment offers insuperable obstacles to the faithful discharge of pecuniary obligations.

2. That this situation obliges solvent banks to convert their notes in accordance with the law of December 13, 1867, which is tantamount to obliging them to enter into a forced and violent liquidation.

3. That a liquidation of this nature is altogether prejudicial to private interests, which it affects in a direct manner, and to public interests, upon which its pernicious influence rebounds both for the indefiniteness of its duration, for the stagnation and paralysation of the capitals thereby compromised, for the consequent depreciation of banking securities on account of the large number of them thrown upon the market, whose realisation is imperiously demanded by said liquidation.

4. That in view of the mere possibility of such a situation the Government is bound to adopt all possible measures to avert it, under penalty of compromising its most serious responsibilities.

5. That it is of vital interest both to public and private wealth that, in default of a national coin, the notes of solvent banks should become legal tender, in order to facilitate exchanges, foster labor, and encourage the development of industrial and useful undertakings, thus securing the well-being of families and the peace and tranquility of which the State stands in so much need.

6. That under the pressure of the requirements of the economic and commercial situation which at this moment weighs down upon the country, it is impossible to hope to satisfy them by any other means than those that, while less onerous, may satisfy the objects in view in the most prompt and efficient manner.

7. From the 1st of August next the banks shall peremptorily withdraw from circulation at the end of each month, 3 per cent. of the total of their emission, until it shall be reduced to 40 per cent. of the double of their realised capital.

8. Besides the monthly 3 per cent. alluded to in the previous article, the banks shall withdraw from circulation all the proceeds from sale of funded property given as guarantee.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

Owing to the kindness of Mr. Bannfield, the able manager of the Southern Railway, we are able to-day to achieve another splendid Editorial victory by publishing in another column a telegraphic message with latest intelligence, from our special correspondent at Chascomus.

Yesterday was an eventful morning in the city. The telegraph people were up all night. The Tribuna got possession of the wires from 8 o'clock on Thursday night until past midnight, and the great "Curso Forzoso" decree came flashing along the wires at the trifling cost of about one hundred pounds sterling.

12. In all contracts made before or after the present resolution, the conditions therein expressly laid down shall be strictly adhered to.

13. Besides the guarantees mentioned in Art. 2, the Nation guarantees the convertibility in specie of the emission of all the banks, that shall subject themselves to the provisions of this decree.

14. The guarantee of the Nation shall cease 90 days after all the banks have begun the conversion of their notes, which shall irrevocably take place at the expiration of the 20 months of forced currency authorized by Art. 11.

15. As the notes of Banks of emission, according to paragraph 7 of the 1st article of the loan of 23rd March 1865, enjoy absolute preference over other credits, all the securities which said banks as determined by Art. 2 give in guarantee shall be expressly affected to the conversion into gold of its notes, and are consequently exempt from all interdiction or judicial action, whatever may be the reason adduced.

16. The banks that do not choose to avail themselves of the present decree can continue their operations in strict observance of the Banking Law of March 23, 1865, as long as these are not in opposition to articles 1 and 6 of this decree.

17. On the same conditions the banks whose notes, after being declared legal tender, shall have been amortised in the form prescribed by art. 7 and 8 will equally be able to continue their operations after the lapse of the twenty months fixed by art. 11.

18. In case one or more banks should fail to comply with any of the provisions of this decree, the Fiscal Commission shall at once inform the Finance Minister, stating the causes that have led to such non-compliance, in virtue of which it will proceed to liquidate said bank or banks in the form and manner that may correspond.

19. The provisions of the present decree are applicable to the Commercial Bank of Salto.

20. The Fiscal Commission, in addition to the duties laid down in the foregoing articles, shall have the following attributions:— I. To verify the monthly balance-sheets of the banks, and sign them, authorising their publication.

21. To inspect the operations of said banks that may have reference to the emission.

22. To arrange the books in the manner it may deem most convenient for its own labors, establishing regulations for the administrative part of this decree.

23. To remit monthly to the Finance Minister a statement of the operations performed, which is to be subsequently published, as well as all other proceedings that may be of interest to the public.

perhaps the bank will be able to go on. Mr. Gomez Oliviero, the manager, is deservedly popular, and was just beginning to push his bank here into an excellent business and first-rate connection.

The foreign protest against the forced currency bill in Montevideo was presented by the managers of the following houses:— Bates Stokes & Co. Prondfoot Hall & Co. Mallman & Co. Drabble Brothers.

As the Government however has published the Curso Forzoso decree, it is evident that the Minister paid no attention to the protest of the foreign commercial public.

During the week almost every steamer that left this port for Montevideo took down specie to that port; it is calculated that in this way some £25,000 sterling in gold has been shipped to private parties solely for the purpose it is presumed of speculation; how all the gold at present in Montevideo will be got back save on payment of a high premium is a mystery which has yet to be solved.

On Sunday the elections in this city will take place. Almost every Sunday we have elections now, the booths are now almost as regularly opened on Sundays as the churches, but it is all according to law.

Several parties having applied to us for Alberdi's last pamphlet on the Civil Code, we beg to say that having lent our copy to Dr. Velez Sarsfield we do not expect it back for a few days.

On next Thursday another grand wine auction will take place at Mr. Billinghurst's famed mart. The wines are from Rouher and Chausson vaults. Bin No. 26 we strongly recommend—it is a renowned Burgundy—a goblet of it is the elixir of life. All who want good dinner wines cheap and frugal should attend the auction. As for the vintage its history is far too long, however Mr. Billinghurst is read up in the matter.

The crowds at the Patente Office have at last scattered. We visited the office yesterday; only three applicants present, and from the general appearance of the place, very little money taken in during the day. We hope, next week, to find out the exact amount paid in during the last few months.

Yesterday the Provincial Bank received another huge iron safe. Had it been the landing of an elephant there could hardly have been a greater crowd round the door. Crowds round bank doors, no matter for what purpose, are, at the moment, objectionable.

There was nothing particularly fresh yesterday during the daytime from "Montevivus." No new eruption had taken place, but the lava of paper money was hourly expected. Perhaps, on Monday, the "crater" may be at work again.

The fourth dividend is now being paid to the creditors of Don Patricio Peratta. Creditors should call at once at the office of Don Bernardo Iturraspe, where same is payable.

Yesterday it was currently rumoured that the fine American steamer Edward Everett had been sold at a reserved price.

We may be excused for mentioning the fact, that on Thursday we held in our hands for a few minutes the stupendous sum of five hundred thousand patacons, in Provincial Bank certificates, over one hundred thousand pounds sterling; this beats the Times hollow, we doubt if any of the editors of that world renowned paper ever saw such an amount in one sum but the vicissitudes of editorial life in Buenos Ayres would positively fill five large volumes.

The Tribuna yesterday published a very able article respecting our much esteemed friend, Mr. Riestra, which we purpose publishing in English to-morrow: it does simple justice to this much abused gentleman, and doubtless will carry its merited weight.

LATEST FROM PATAGONIA.

PROBABLE LOSS OF THE WELSH COLONY'S SCOOER.

Under date of Patagonias, 4th July, our friend Mr. Jones, the agent of the Welsh Colony, writes to us thus:—

"It is my melancholy task to report to you that our Colony's little craft is missing since February last, having left Patagonias for the Chuput, and never since been heard of, nor traces seen of her, she had on board some 60 bags of flour, a large fishing-net, parcels of clothes, and other goods, together with a few animals. But the sad aspect of the misfortune is, there were on board at the time six men from the Colony, whose names it is my mournful duty to give you, to save anxiety to other relatives. They were: Robert F. Nagle, captain, from Liverpool; George Jones, from Liverpool; James Jones, from Carmarthenshire, having a wife and family in the Colony; Thomas D. Evans, Manchester, also having a wife and family in the Colony; David Davies, from Aberdare, having his parents in the Colony; and Thomas Cadivor Wood, Secretary of the Welsh Colonising Company at home, who had recently arrived in the Colony to report upon it, and had taken a trip to see Patagonias before returning home. I have but my sincere sympathy and condolence to offer to the families of these unfortunate fellow-countrymen and, of course, intimate acquaintances of mine, since I am afraid, neither hope nor surmises will avail anything.

"Apart from this catastrophe our Colony is marching steadily onward. The provisions, clothes, and wheat, barley, and cattle, were all safely landed, and caused universal joy and activity. Active Indian trade has been done, and doing when I left."

PATENT OFFICE REPORT.

The Commissioner of Patents, Mr. Daniel Maxwell, has added another blue-book to the Argentine red-tape library.

The National Patent Office was created by Congress in September 1864; two years later the Government issued a decree organizing the office and appointing Mr. Maxwell chief Commissioner; this gentleman formally opened the office on the 3rd of November 1866. It is necessary to read the report to be able to form a faint idea of the up-hill work and immense labour the Commissioner had to undergo, so as to enable him to put this office into working order; any man not endowed with systematic habits, patient endurance and fixed determination to surmount every obstacle, would have quailed under the thousand difficulties experienced by the Commissioner, he, however, has weathered the storm with credit to himself and honour to the nation.

One of the Commissioner's first acts was writing to his agent in London asking for the laws of European States and certain books that treat of this subject—these works were sent for at his own private cost. The Commissioner's next care was to put himself in communication with similar offices in Europe and America through his own friends and through the diplomatic agents of the Republic: The Argentine Ministers in France and England were not backward in lending all the assistance in their power to the Commissioner. The Commissioners of Patents of Great Britain have offered Mr. Maxwell a complete collection of all the works published by the British office since the year 1623, and all that may in future be published; these works comprise over two thousand and two hundred and fifty volumes, and it will be the only complete collection in all South America; the number of volumes added to this collection yearly, from the present will, it is supposed, exceed one hundred.

It is worthy of remark that England recently refused to supply one of her own Colonies with a collection of the very works she now offers Buenos Ayres gratis.

It is disheartening to see that the very moment the Commissioner has waded through all his difficulties and placed the office on a footing with the best in Europe or America, that a member of the liberal parliament of 1868 should step forward and lay a bill on the table of the House ordering the Patent Office to be shut up. You will ask what motives the honorable member may have for framing such a bill. He himself takes care to tell us that, in his opinion, the office is useless because the inventive genius of the country only demanded seven Patents in fourteen months, and in order to prevent the patentees from increasing in number he proposes, in the same bill, to withdraw all the Argentine diplomatic and immigrant agents; it is true he holds this wholesale withdrawal of very useful employes with the plea of economy. If the worthy member for Cordoba is so very fond of hoarding up the nation's money he should show his love of economy and patriotism by introducing a bill to cancel his own salary and that of his colleagues; Congress costs the nation about eight million current dollars annually, a very respectable sum for very little work, and quite sufficient to support employes just as necessary to the nation as its members of parliament.

You must admit, Mr. Commissioner, that your country is a most ungrateful country to its toiling patriotic sons; those who labor incessantly for the real interests of their country are scoffed at, while those who heap ruin upon ruin and deluge the country with the blood of her own sons, are extolled. To return to the Commissioner's report: it states that a patent office was established by law in England in 1623; in thirteen of the British Colonies between the years 1849 and 1861; in the United States in 1790; in France in 1781—168 years later than in England; in the Italian States between 1805 and 1864; in Russia in 1812; in Poland 5 years later; in Prussia in the memorable year of 1815; in other States forming the German Confederation, between 1825 and 1833; in Spain in 1826; in Cuba seven years later; in Mexico in 1832; in Sweden in 1834; in Norway five years later; in Portugal in 1837; in Belgium in 1855; and in the Argentine Republic in 1864.

During the twenty years between 1842 and 1861 there were 24,318 patents issued in England; and 31,566 in the United States; during the same time there were 69,455 patents and certificates of additional improvements issued in France; all the other European States registered many patents, some of them thousands, during the same number of years.

During the fourteen months that the B. Ayrean office has been open— from November, 1866, to the end of 1868, the date at which the report closes—there were seven patents issued, two of them for five years each, four for ten years each, and one for fifteen years; in the same interval there were nine precautional patents registered.

The cost of a patent for five years is eighty silver dollars, for ten years two hundred dollars, and for fifteen years three hundred and fifty dollars. The intending patentee must pay half fee on application, and the remaining half in equal annual proportions up to the date of expiration.

A person wishing to take out a patent for a new invention must apply in Buenos Ayres, to the Commissioner; in any of the provinces application may be made to the principal Post-masters.

The Commissioner states that the only key capable of unlocking the country's riches consists in increasing the population by affording every facility to the introduction of foreign immigrants; he gives a clue to the rapid prosperity of our northern cousins in the following table:—The increase of population in France during the first sixty years of this century was 37 per cent.; England and Wales 121 per cent., while the increase in the United States during the same time was 593 per cent., nearly five times more than that of England, and more than sixteen times that of France. In his address to the Minister on this subject, he says:— "Everything that tends to attract elements to the country likely to enrich it with new industries, or perfect those already in it, to cheapen labor or economize time; anything, in fact, that may induce foreign immigration is of vital importance, and it may be said, that every law tending to facilitate this object is good, and every opposite law decidedly injurious to the interests of the nation.

The Commissioner submits to the consideration of Government the propriety of adding an agricultural department to the Patent Office in imitation of the United States; he offers to superintend said additional department without any additional cost to the nation. Such liberal offers are rare in a country wherein the all-mighty dollar is so much adored. The Commissioner very aptly remarks that the members of Parliament of the United States distributed in their respective States and counties over five hundred thousand packets of seeds with the view of improving agriculture; an equal number of packages was distributed by societies and private individuals, and all this in the short space of one year.

What says the honorable member for Cordoba to this? If he considers the public money is squandered by paying Commissioner of Patents one hundred silver dollars a month, he would undoubtedly consider the introduction of foreign seeds into the country nothing short of high treason.

SWELL MOB AFOAT.

In to-day's copy of your valuable journal we notice that robberies had been committed on board the steamer Lujan on her last trip up to Rosario. Immediately on reading this, which interested us a great deal, the Lujan came in, and we learned from her captain that nothing of the kind had happened on board.

Now, we presume, Mr. Editor, that because we are directly interested in it, but for the satisfaction of the numerous people that give preference to the Lujan when they wish to travel both safely and comfortably. It might

have occurred, perhaps, that some of her passengers had misused something at the time of landing, as is often the case in all steamers, but there is a wide difference between this and what your correspondent says about thieves being on board.

The Lujan, like all well regulated steamers, has watchmen on duty day and night, so that it is almost impossible for the light-fingered to practice. Trusting you will find space for this statement, we remain, yours, &c.

[We can only state that the information to which the above has reference was not only given to us by our Rosario correspondent but by other parties, who, we think, could have no motive in misleading us, and who even mentioned the names of well-known individuals who had been victimized. We thought it, therefore, our duty to warn the public, without in the least detracting from the Lujan's merits as a passenger boat.—Ed. Standard.]

LATEST FROM MEXICO.

There was a rumor at the capital just previous to the departure of the mail to the effect that two days previously an attempt had been made to kidnap President Juarez and his family while they were sojourning at Chapultepec. The guards at the castle had been heavily increased.

The press of the capital sympathizes with Dr. Larrazabal in his imprisonment. He defies the authorities to produce the proofs of any implication on his part in any conspiracy.

Señor Machado who was arrested for having originated the late conspiracy against President Juarez's life, had been discharged. He was arrested on suspicion, because he had failed to comply with certain formalities required of all newly-arrived foreigners. He has amply apologized for this omission on his part.

The recent report of President Juarez having gone to Texas with \$7,000,000 in specie had its origin in the fact that some specie was removed from the capital for safety during the excitement caused by the discovering of the conspiracies against the President, his Cabinet and family. An outbreak in favor of General Ortega was feared at the same time.

The bandit J. Juarez, the hero of the late raid on Carmen Island, was executed at the place.

General Andrade was shot at Puebla by Señor Aspiroz, a merchant of that city.

Major Aguirre, formerly of the imperialist forces, was recently executed at San Felipe for violation of the law of nations during Maximilian's reign.

A subvention of \$10,000 has been granted to the peaceful Indians of Coahuila.

The remains of General Zaragoza had been transferred to the Pantheon of San Fernando, in the capital, with great solemnity, on the 4th inst. The ceremonies at the mausoleum consisted of the identification of the hero's remains and a panegyric by Minister Iglesias. On the following day the victory over the French at Puebla was duly celebrated by a grand procession, the firing of canon, speeches and poetical effusions, fireworks and banquets.

Mr. Plumb, American Chargé d'Affaires was absent from the banquet given by the government.

Mr. Masson, the Editor of the *Trait d'Union* (French Journal) has advised all foreigners to behave cautiously whereupon the *Siglo* denounced such a hint as that violence was to be feared from Mexicans while celebrating their victory over the best soldiers and most warlike nation in the world.

The other Mexican papers likewise took this latter view of the question. No outrages, however took place; for nearly all the foreigners remained at home on the holiday.

The property of General Miramon had been denounced to government for confiscation, but government decided that the sentence against that imperial officer did not work confiscation of his property, which consists mainly of plantations.

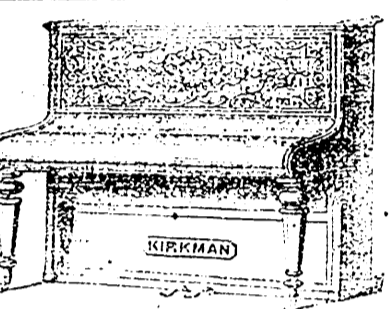

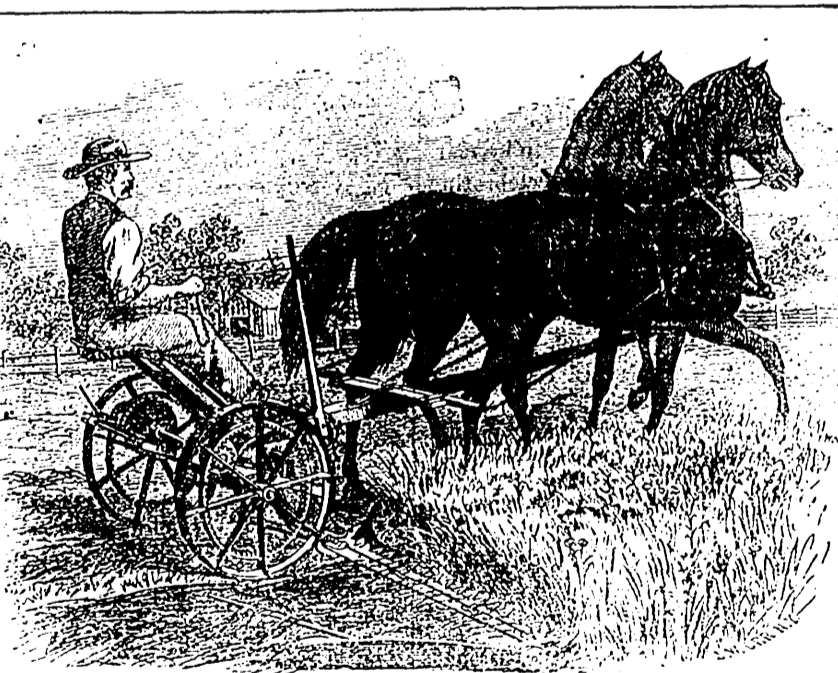
