the balance-sheet, No. 3. The entire
capital expenditure, amounting to
£1,051,601 14s. 8d., has been debited
there in accordance with the terms of
their contract. The principal item
was £857,500 for permanent way,
bridges, stations, and rolling stock.
A sum of £13,219. 9s. 9d. has been
received for interest on investments,
thereby reducing the capital expendi-
ture.

"The Land Account, No. 2, shows
that the total outlay at the same date
was £1,452,13s. 6d. This amount is
due to capital, the board not having
as yet exercised the power given to
them by the resolution of the General
Meeting of the Proprietors, held on the
5th February, 1866, to create bonds
for a sum not exceeding £10,000, to
defray the cost of 'developing the re-
sources of the Company's land estate.

The directors had hoped, with this
Report, to have been able to lay before
the Proprietors' statements of the Re-
venue Account during the period em-
braced since the first three sections of
the Central Argentine Railway have
been in working operation. In this
they have been disappointed, the ac-
counts not being agreed with the Ar-
gentine Government, and until they
shall have been finally adjusted they
cannot be passed on the books of the
Company.

The subjoined returns, however,
indicate the development in the traffic
receipts since the opening of the first
and second sections under the Govern-
ment decree dated 1st December, 1866,
a copy of which was appended to the
preceding annual report:—

"In the month of September last the
third section from Frayle Muerto to
Villa Nueva (36 miles) was opened
under the decree of 27th August, 1867,
to this Report annexed. Since then
the receipts show an increase.

"This return represents that the
gross earnings in these three months
amounted on the 158 miles to £13,287.
10s. 5d., averaging per mile per week
£6. 9s. 4d.; and it will be noticed that
the average for the month of Novem-
ber alone was £8. 2s. 6d. per mile per
week, or double the average of the
return up to the end August on the
122 miles then opened.

"Little progress" however, was made
during the month of December, owing
to the almost entire stagnation of
trade and industry throughout the
Republic, caused by the terrible visita-
tion of cholera, which has interrupted
the traffic of the several railways in the
country.

"The gross earnings may be consi-
dered satisfactory, when it is remem-
bered that the native carriers have
resisted for many months the delivery
of goods at the Company's stations,
and have insisted on continuing to
take them the whole distance. That
combination was gradually coming to
an end, and the returns tend to
strengthen the belief that the pas-
sengers and goods traffic of the Cen-
tral Argentine Railway, when opened
from the port of Rosario to the city of
Cordova, 247 miles, will be developed
to an extent that will render two Com-
pany, at no distant date, altogether
independent of the Government Guar-
antee.

"At the Extraordinary General
Meeting held on the 25th of Novem-
ber, 1867, the Directors were authori-
sated by the following resolutions to raise
the remainder of the capital requisite
to complete the line:—

1. "That the Argentine-Gov-
ernment having offered to sub-
scribe for 15,000 (fifteen thousand)
of the company's shares, at par,
such offer be accepted.

2. "That the Directors are
hereby empowered to issue at
par, when and as they shall think fit,
the remainder not hitherto
issued of the capital of the Com-
pany either in shares or in debentures
having five years to run, and
bearing interest at seven per cent.,
or partly in shares and partly in
such debentures, without any
previous offer to the members of the
Company."

The board has not been made in the works. At the same time they are fully sensible of the difficulties with which the contractors have had to contend.

The Directors who retire by rotation are Henry Brockett, Esq., William B. Buddicom, Esq., Lawrence Heyworth, Esq., and William Wagstaff, Esq., all of whom, being eligible for re-election likewise.

The Directors, in conclusion, unhesitatingly repeat the opinion so often expressed, namely, that the Central Argentine Railway, when opened through from the Port of Rosario to the City of Cordova.

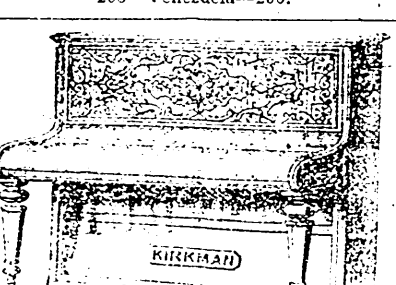
