judge, the enemy was fairly starved out; and herein Marques Caxias has proved the success of his last year's movement on Tuyu-Cue, and final occupation of Yavi. Whatever may be said of these tactics of the Brazilian commander, and the great exposure of his base, at least they have one merit in their signal success.

That, henceforward, it will be a smooth sailing for the allies, we confess we very much question. Doubtless, the fall of Humaita is an immense victory. Aside from the advantages which it secures the allies, by giving them the river as their base, it must be regarded as a great moral triumph, and calculated to break the spirit of the Paraguayan people; but the sequel of the campaign rests more with the enemy than with the allies. Caxias fights, not only against an army, but against a race. Powder and ball may vanquish the former, but they are slow agents against the latter. The moral triumph of Humaita should be followed up by moral elements within the control of the allies; and, if Caxias will now fly a white flag from the steeple of Humaita church, and offer peace to the Paraguayan people in this hour of victory, he may possibly achieve more than by a continuance of a campaign which, whilst it gives victory to the allies, adds lustre to the Paraguayan arms.

The decorations reflect the highest credit on the management, and far exceeded anything yet seen in Buenos Ayres of the kind. The scene painter and the stage manager were vociferously called to make their bow before the curtain. At the repetition on Thursday night the crush was also very great, and the display of dress and beauty in the boxes and stalls such as is not common within the spacious walls of Colon; H.E. Pres. Mitre and family were present. Mmc. Lablache was of course the queen of the evening, and gained rapturous applause for her passionate rendering of the part of the "Princess," and particularly for the great art she displayed in the celebrated scene "Roberto tu che adoro." The church choir, where the charming "Alice" successfully puts forth all her fascinations to overcome the influence of the evil spirit on the stage, was also a great lyric triumph.

It was currently reported in well informed circles, yesterday, that the Entre Rios difficulty has been satisfactorily arranged, although the precise terms of the arrangement did not transpire. The meeting convened last Sunday by Sr. Carrulla, for the definite formation of the Woolen Cloth Manufactory Co. La Plata, took place in the rooms of the Sociedad Rural, and was numerously attended—Don Francisco Pico acted as chairman, and Don Eulogio Perez as secretary. The following is the list of the Board of Directors appointed:—Don Ambrosio P. Lezica, Dr. Don Miguel Esteves Sagu, Don Miguel Azenaguea, Dr. Don José Roque Perez, and Don Eduardo Olivera. We are happy to see in these names a guarantee for the success of this important enterprise.

Major Ortiz, who was the bearer of the despatches announcing the evacuation of Humaita by the Paraguayans, and his occupation by the Allied forces, has been promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel. The Municipality has hit upon a very ingenious, if not very creditable, means for raising the fund; it is that of ordering, without giving any previous notice, that the traffic of vehicles in certain streets should be restricted to their proceeding in one direction. For the want of due notice the public is not made aware of these changes, and those who incur the fine of \$100 laid down for infraction of this arbitrary regulation are so numerous that it is estimated the worthy Corporation nets by this clever device about \$30,000 per day. The last example of this is in our very street, Calle Belgrano, where vehicles are now only allowed to go from east to west, or from west to east, we really do not know which, as we have seen no official notice, and only know it from parties who have had to pay the fine, and come to complain in our office.

A member of Congress received yesterday a letter from Cordova with a postscript announcing that a revolution had taken place in that town, resulting in the overthrow of Sr. Peña's government. As no other letter received from that city by the mail allude in any way to this matter, we trust this sad news will not be confirmed. Since the news of the fall of Humaita the greatest activity has been prevailing among the shipping at the Boca. We understand that upwards of fifteen vessels are loading there for Paraguay, with the intention of bringing back a return cargo of timber. The scarcity and, indeed, total want of Paraguayan timber, so highly prized for building purposes, is a serious inconvenience, and the supply of this

valuable article will doubtless be a splendid business. The Provincial House of Representatives has passed a bill for the establishing of a Board of Health consisting of Doctors of Medicine, one apothecary, and one veterinary surgeon, with a salary of \$2,000 per month each for the term of 2 years, to be renewed yearly by halves. It is a good bill, and we heartily approve it, and hope for much good in a sanitary point of view from its efforts. We would recommend the attention of this board, if within their jurisdiction to the establishing of a list of prices for the medical faculty, as at present no tariff is established, and we are sorry to say, in many instances the privilege of charging has been abused in a most shameful manner. We have long wished to speak of this subject. We hope it may be opportune, and that the abuse will be stopped by the adoption of a fair tariff.

WE notice in yesterday's edition of the *Patria* an article under the heading "Attack against the liberty of industry." It is well and ably written, and to the point. We are glad to see the position taken by our esteemed colleague in all important matters, and it goes to prove that no unjust bill can pass in this Province or Republic without calling forth the just condemnation of the really liberty-loving *Patria*. We also raise our humble voice against such an absurd bill as that passed by the House of Representatives, and are positive that it passed without their attention being drawn to it. The article in question reads thus:—"No specific remedy of any kind shall be sold in any drug-house or apothecary without the special permission of the Consul of Health." The National Government permits the entry of these articles, collects his duties, and obtains thereby a very large revenue. Then the importer, by a provincial law, passed at the request of the Consul of Health, denies the right of sale, which is the higher authority, the National or Provincial Government? How can a person be denied rights granted by the Constitution? It is a blow directed against the very foundation of the Republic. We have always been ardent admirers and firm supporters of this Republic, and all laws that were just, but we must protest, in the name of the commercial community, against such an outrage on their right. We do not suppose for an instant that it will pass the Senate; no, and we are positive that it passed the House of Representatives from oversight. We call on the Senate to send back the bill thus offered, with many corrections, but principally the one referred to by our esteemed contemporary, Art. 23. Such a bill, if passed, would be a death-blow to many a business. What security would the merchant have? None; he would be at the mercy of a few who, without reason, pass a bill denying rights granted by the highest of all power—the Constitution.

From Shelton Abbey we drove into Arklow, a thriving town of fishermen, and returned by the Aughrim road to our hotel at Wooden-bridge. The carman was very intelligent, and well-versed in the scenery of the country, and we engaged him for an excursion for the next two days through all the most famous parts of Wicklow.

On Friday morning we started for Glendalough, our route first lying through the copper-mining districts, then through Mr. Kemmis's charming estate of Lagnaquilla, after which we entered the wild pass of Glennamare; the traveller can have a capital dinner at Mr. Fogarty's inn. The road lay over a steep and desert mountain till we came in sight of Glendalough, and long before reaching the classic city of St. Kevin we were assailed by hests of mendicant children.

The round tower and a few scattered ruins are all that remain of Glendalough, so famous in the 7th century. The guide, James Brough, tells very amusing legends as he shows you the various "churches": they are 7 in number, but only one, "St. Kevin's kitchen," is at all preserved. We took a boat on the lake, rowed up to St. Kevin's bed, a hold in the rock, from which he is said to have hurled Cathleen; the "bed" is very dangerous of access, at an alarming height, and yet ladies not infrequently venture in (especially married ones) as it is said to have a special charm. The guide awakened the echoes, bidding Fint MacCul welcome us to Glendalough: he stated it was true in the poet's word:—"By the lake whose gleamy shores Skjibik never warbles o'er."

We halted for the night at Roundwood, and started next morning for Luggelaw; this lake is surrounded by lofty hills, on one side thickly wooded, and the waters from it flow into Lough Dan, which is a mile lower down the glen. Not far hence we visit the Vartry Water-works, which cost of £100,000; the water is conveyed a distance of over 30 miles. The Devil's Glen is a romantic dingle extending about two miles, with nothing of beauty, but much of sombre austerity. We came through it about the ear meeting as it were, and we halted for dinner at Newrath bridge; it was a glorious summer evening as we drove home through Avondale.

Yesterday we went to Gorry, visited the convent built for the Loretto nuns by Sir Thomas Esmond, and then drove out to Ramsfort, the magnificent country-seat of the Ram family, commonly called "the ram of Gorry." The house is like a museum, full of historic relics, fine oil tapestry, &c.; the gardens and terraces are most tasteful. Thus ended our excursion in this part of Ireland, and now we return to Dublin, to set out tomorrow for Killybeg.

AN AVERAGE VERDICT. To the Editor of the "Pall Mall Gazette." Sir,—Yours assumption that the jury in the case of Risk Allah v. the "Daily Telegraph" arrived at the extraordinary sum at which they valued the character of the gentleman from the Lebanon—£200—by striking an average of their estimates of the value of that article is doubtless correct. I was myself, a short time since, acting as a jurymen to try an action brought by a servant against his master for malice in having given the man a bad character. When we retired to deliberate several of the jury proposed that the plaintiff should get a verdict for £1,000. Others thought that £500 would suffice. I stated my opinion that he should get no verdict at all, it appearing to me that the character given to him by his master had been fully justified by his misconduct, and by his subsequent demeanour in the witness-box. It was near dinner time. Most of the jury were impatient to get away, so the foreman proposed that we should each write down the amount of damages that we thought the plaintiff ought to get, that the twelve sums should be added up together and then divided by twelve, and that the plaintiff should obtain a verdict for the result. To this proposal I refused to agree unless the jurors would all undertake that in no one instance the sum suggested should be more than £10. After a short wrangle they fell into my view of the case, for they were very hungry, and wished to catch the six o'clock train from London. The average of our opinions was struck, and the plaintiff got a verdict, not for £1,000, but for £3 17s. 6d., which was gravely handed to the judge (who entirely approved of it) by the person who had in the first instance been loud and decided in urging that the plaintiff should obtain £1,000 damages. Upon tasting it, we declared it admirable, but it was a sherry so valuable that no price has been set upon what it is really worth. In 1730 the house possessed twenty five casks of what was then known to be at least twenty-five years' old sherry. From that time to this they have zealously kept this wine, until from evaporation the quantity has been reduced so that it now fills but five casks, and to-day they exhibit this wine whose value might be reckoned at so much per drop, to show what sherry will eventually become from age and concentration. Let no one hope ever to taste the best of sherry, unless he make a pilgrimage to Xerez, and drink at the monster cask "Napoleon."

The house of Peter Domecq is one of the oldest of the Xerez firms. They have no wine less than two hundred and fifty dollars per pipe, and none which they recommend under three hundred. From this their prices range up to nine hundred per pipe. All these prices are of course in gold. They send but little wine to America, because either owing to the heavy custom-house dues, or an almost total want of appreciation of good wine on the part of Americans, the orders come mostly for cheaper wines than this house deals in. As will be seen from the prices, if you will drink good wine, you must pay high for it. A pipe of wine contains 105 gallons, and each gallon fills 55 bottles. At \$100 per pipe it is worth almost 92 cents per gallon, or 18 cents per bottle. At \$100 per pipe, about \$3, 75 per gallon, or 75 cents per bottle. At \$900 per pipe, it is about \$8, 33 per gallon, and \$1, 67 per bottle. When, therefore, one buys at home good sherry wine at \$2 per bottle, in currency, it is hardly to be supposed that after deducting the custom dues, the freight expenses, and the heavy percentage realized by the American wine merchant, it would prove to be a very high-priced wine in Xerez, if indeed it were so fortunate as to come from there at all. AUSTRIAN SHEEP FARMING RULES. As an old Australian, I am bound to corroborate all said in the letter of "Puestero" relative to the compulsory curing of sheep of scab in that country. When I was in Victoria, scab inspectors were appointed to different districts, and they had the power to order all flocks to be burnt in the disease exceeded a certain average. The owners were partly indemnified—on the one hand by the Government; on the other by a fair assessment among surrounding neighbors, at the rate of 5s per head. The greatest evil there was felt to be, not so much sheep having a little scab on the estancia from natural causes, which is easily cured, but from other infected flocks passing through your property and camping there at night. For instance—my sheep are perfectly clean, and it is dry weather; a neighbor or other person camps on my run at night with a flock of scabby sheep on their way to market or elsewhere. My sheep may lie down afterwards on the same spot, or rub against the same trees or posts, and are pretty sure to catch it. If it is dry weather it may take some time before it shows itself; but two or three days of moist, humid weather will bring it out in all its virulence. A judicious measure taken by the Government may stop it, and be a boon to all; although I must say the disease in this country, if not different, is not by any means so catching or virulent as in Australia. I would suggest the adoption in this country, as I have seen it at the Antipodes—viz., the system of having on the outskirts of an estancia an "hospital lock," where the dipping vat is sunk, and to where all diseased sheep are drafted until cured. This prevents their coming into contact with the other flocks. All sheep seen rubbing themselves are at once called out and sent to the said flock to be cured. The Government in Australia makes the curing of sheep compulsory. Another act in force in Australia is the destruction of thistles. In this country moderate-sized patches of them are useful, as they afford the only shelter the sheep get; but when they are allowed to spread indiscriminately, and you are compelled—as I have often been—to ride through miles of them almost as high as yourself on horseback, they are not only a nuisance, but an injury. In this measure also the Government of Victoria voted a sum of money (either 1850 or 51) towards their destruction, at the same time compelling the squatters to carry it out.
