Whether we regard the endless formulae prescribed by law, the various characters of the aspirants to office, or the numerous wagers of hats and cigars made on the result, we are free to say that the business of Congress on Sunday is the most important, most interesting, and most serious for the country at large.

The general impression is that Mr. Sarmiento will be the new President.

And Governor Alsina Vice-President.

Politicians agree that this must be the result. All the returns sent in give the majority in favour of these men; but "there's many a slip between the cup and the lip."

The opposition candidate hopes to the last. There is some scrubby work going on about the returns for the Vice-President, which, if successful, it is said, will hoist Gen. Paunero to the throne of office; but Dr. Alsina is the man voted by the people, and we have no doubt, will carry the day.

Sunday may, therefore, be regarded as the political Derby Day of the Plate.

Enormous wagers have been made on the result. One English gentleman, in the event of Sarmiento being elected, will find himself under the necessity of opening a fashionable hat store, since he will win 1,142 hats; another a cigar store, having no less than 75,000 cigars on the same man.

In the country parls the wagers partake more of a pastoral character; some unfortunates have 100 cows on Urquiza, others 500 sheep on Elizalde, and a few have risked all the mares on their estancias backing up Paunero. As wagers are legal in this country, all these bills have to be paid. We have risked six months' subscription on one of the candidates, and hope to win and get paid in advance.

The plaza in front of Congress Hall, we suppose, will be occupied by one or two regiments, and possibly a band will be in attendance. The admission to the strangers' gallery is free; but parties who wish to attend should secure their seats at an early hour, as the strangers' gallery will, doubtless, be greatly crowded.

All the foreign Ministers will be in attendance, as also the Consuls; but none of the National Executive will be there. We, of course, shall attend to report the proceeding.

When the session is concluded, the guns will be fired, the names of the successful candidates trumpeted by the hautboys of the house—and then, "Hurrah for the happiest man in the Republic, the new President!"

THE "STANDARD" AFLOAT.

HUMAITA.

The first thing that strikes the attention on landing at Humaita, is the number of arms of all sorts strewn on the beach or immersed in the water; the great-majority of them are useless flint-lock guns, with the Tower mark, and rusty swords; but now and then you come across good and still serviceable weapons; among others, we fished up a Spencer rifle out of the water, and some well-preserved swords and sword-bayonets. No restriction is put on their appropriation, and as every visitor carries away something, all vestige of them will ere long disappear. Strewn about also, in great profusion, may be seen numberless cannon-shots of all sizes and calibres, the remains of the protracted Brazilian bombardment. Near the northern extremity, we saw close by the river side the celebrated gun Cristiano, cast in Asuncion in the year 1867. It fired round ten-inch solid shot of 150 lbs., heaps of which are now lying by its side. It was mounted on the top of the barranca, from whence it appears to have been pushed into the water at the last moment, before the evacuation took place.

The London Battery is a casemated battery, with one single row of guns, and sixteen embrasures; eight of them however were walled up from behind, perhaps to prevent the arches from falling. The few guns that were found in it have been already removed by the Allies, and only one remains in its position, a fine breach-loader, burst at the breach, perhaps purposely. Behind the battery are some well-constructed bomb-proof magazines. Beyond this battery, which is now in course of demolition, were two more earthen batteries, with embrasures, from which likewise the guns had been removed.

All the guns from these batteries, as well as those that were mounted on the land side defences, have been divided into equal parts among the three Allied Powers, about eighty falling to each. The Brazilians claiming only that in their share should be included the burst breach-loader and the Cristiano. From all I could learn, the number of really serviceable guns did not exceed twenty: I noticed, among others, two very old ones with the Spanish arms, one called the S. Gabriel, bearing the date of 1671, and the other the San Juan de Dios, with the date of 1684.

The shore end of the chain passed through a tunnel solidly built with masonry, and had a powerful windlass to make it taut, and was made secure in a building about one hundred yards from the barranca: it consisted of seven heavy iron cables twisted together; and on the Itaco side was fastened to posts and trees.

I learnt from a very reliable source that only about fifty pieces were found in position, on the river and the most ever mounted never exceeded sixty. This portion of the defences of Humaita is certainly the most respectable. On the land side, all what I examined consisted of an earthen parapet, about a yard and a half high, where the guns were placed "en barbette," affording no protection to the gunners. The outside ditch varies from 24 to 18 feet in width, with very little water in some parts, and in others perfectly dry. A very clumsily constructed abatis of thin branches surmounts its outer bank, and a few yards beyond is a small trench, not more than four or five feet wide.

Innumerable piles of ammunition in bags, and loose, are met at almost every step, purposely scattered about. We also came across several powder depositories, some of them unopened, and none of them bombproof.

The scene of the memorable attack of Osorio, on the 16th of July, was pointed out to me, and there is no doubt that he penetrated to the parapet, crossing the ditch, and that if he had been properly supported the Allies would have at least had the glory of wresting the place by force. There can be little doubt also that the narrow escape the Paraguayans saw they had incurred determined their leader to evacuate, and that it is, therefore, incredible to say they were starved out. Considerable depots have been discovered of yerba and palm oil, and perhaps other comestibles may be unearthed.

The whole line of the defences, including those on the river side, extend over 7 1/2 miles. Within them there is no citadel or point where the garrison could make a stand if once the outer works had been carried. The barracks are long, low buildings of mud, plastered outside and whitewashed with thatch roof and not even loopholed.

Lopez's house stands in a conspicuous place by itself, not far from the church: it has not suffered much from the bombardment, though it bears in various parts vestiges of the enemy's shrapnel. It is now occupied as the Argentine head-quarters in Humaita, and Colonel Amadeo, with a battalion of National Guards, is quartered there. This gallant officer received us with much cordiality, and showed us all over the place. A box of furniture from Paris, unpacked, was found in it when first occupied, but otherwise the place was bare of furniture.

The room on the left of the passage was the reception-room, and in it Lopez communicated to his assembled officers the disastrous news of the fall of Uruguaiana, which was received by them in mute silence, whereupon he fell into a storming passion, abused them in no measured terms, and with his own foot kicked them out of the room, saying that when any calamity befel the father of a family it was the duty of his children to show some sign of sorrow. A prisoner officer who related the story, and who had been present, added with great ingenuously—"After all he was right, as it was a great omission on our part not to express our condolence." The day after the iron-clads passed Humaita, in February last, Lopez, with Mrs. Lynch and all his staff, left Humaita, and has never set foot in it again.

Colonel Amadeo kindly presented me with a curious and original document, with Lopez's autograph signature. It is a petition from a Paraguayan citizen, one Manuel Gomez, setting forth that having contracted holy matrimony with Ventura Olmedo, he is anxious to remove his residence to another department, and prays for leave to do so, to which Lopez's "concede" is affixed. This rare document, which reveals the servile state of bondage established by the paternal government of Lopez, I shall be happy to place among the collection of curiosities that adorn the Standard office.

GREAT LOSS OF LIFE AND PROPERTY.

The storm that burst over our city on Thursday night was one of the most violent and attended with the greatest loss of life known for some years. The day had been unusually sultry, and about sunset a thick cloud westward portended the coming Pampero. At 10 p.m. the thunder and lightning began, and soon came the rushing wind, and torrents of rain, which lasted altogether about 40 minutes. As soon as the storm lulled, those who ventured out of doors found the streets converted into rivers, with a current of water several feet. At the same time the lightning was exceedingly grand: the city was at every flash lighted up as clear as in daylight, and this display of electricity continued till after midnight. Happily the vessels in port had timely notice of the coming storm, but the smaller craft of the Italian lightermen were overwhelmed by the catastrophe: these boats, by reason of the low tide, were all aground in the Boca channel and the hurricane suddenly capsized 9, and sank 2 others, causing the loss of over 30 lives, all Italians. The Austrian lighter Libera, and two belonging to Sr. Serrano, were among those lost: one poor "patron," with his wife and sister, perished. An Italian poleacre is supposed lost, but not known for certain; a brig near the

guard-ship, nationality not known, has been capsized. The mail-steamer Arno is all right, and hopes are entertained that Tail's steamer City of Brussels, with £250,000 on board, will have escaped harm, as she is now nearly due. As far as we can learn, the railways are quite uninjured; but the amount of damage to private property in the city and suburbs has been very great: the force of the whirlwind is generally considered to have been equal to that of the great St. Joseph storm of March 1866.

About San José de Flores there are numerous traces of the fury of the elements. Mr. Gowland's quinta suffered severely: a cypress fully 60 years old, and an algarroba that had stood nearly half a century, were thrown down, besides a 'galpon' blown away and another unroofed.

In Barracas the destruction has been also great.

The neighborhood of the Parque has some walls blown down and houses unroofed. It is remarkable that Mr. Jackson's wall, about which he had a lawsuit with the Municipality, is blown down, and the wall of the same gentleman's property in Barracas was blown down a couple of years ago in the same way. Mr. Turmeau reports the damage at his residence, Hong-Kong, Lodge, in the Calle Santiago del Estero, is considerable and estimated at \$10,000; a wall fell in and destroyed his out-houses, killing a number of Cochinchina fowl.

Mr. Parody's school was at first thought to have been struck with a thunder-bolt, but it was found to be the roof of a neighboring shed which caused a general smash in its descent, carrying away a chimney, and filling the place with debris: fortunately no one was killed.

The Southern line has not suffered. But the greatest damage seems to have occurred in the neighborhood of the Plaza Constitucion and near the Corrales, houses and puestos having been bodily carried away. The barraca of Sr. Arias is a heap of ruins, the roof having been blown off to a distance of thirty yards, and all its debris fallen in an adjoining yard, where Mr. Arias had a depot of 1,700 arrobas of wool for which he had refused \$55 m.c. the day before: his loss is calculated at \$200,000 m.c. The splendid barraca that was in course of construction, belonging to Mr. Federico Roth, has also been completely destroyed, and all its walls and the roof are on the ground; \$300,000 is the estimated loss. Mr. Prange's and Mr. Cerrada's barracas have also suffered greatly. All the carretas in the Plaza were upset, and presented a melancholy sight. One of Messrs. Casares' fine new vessels went to the bottom at the Boca.

It appears that the storm was purely local, as passengers by the mid-day train from the South did not remark anything particular on the whole line until they came in the vicinity of Barracas. They also state that the outside camps have had copious rains, and are covered with water.

An English family living in Calle Maipu report the glass gallery of their upper story blown away, and the list of such injuries to house-property would be endless.

We regret to hear that the telegraph posts suffered in some places. Messrs. Furze and Vick started off early yesterday to repair damages.

LATEST FROM MONTEVIDEO.

August 12, 1868.

It will be seen by the daily papers that both the Deputies and Senators have authorized the Government to raise the loan for \$400,000 to be exclusively applied for the purpose of providing sufficient Custom-house store room. We confess we do not see why the *Siglo* should oppose this measure; it will prove an economy to the Treasury, inasmuch as it will put the government into possession of a means of saving about \$20,000 per month in the item of warehouse rent. The fact of the money being applied solely for the purpose of building warehouses will be a guarantee to the public, who take up the bonds, that their cash is not squandered upon the carriers of gold-headed canes, or the wearers of gold stripes, epaulets, spurs and cocked hats; nor even upon those sage looking gentlemen who occupy Ministerial Benches. The buildings themselves will be a guarantee for all the money expended on them, and the rent they produce besides the word of the Government will cover interest and the amortization. It appears to us that a loan of this nature is much more satisfactory, and likely to inspire much more confidence than one which is to be used for the purpose of passing off pressing claims, the nature of which will probably never be known.

New companies are starting up on every side: one is to take possession of all the centres of public amusements and cater to the public taste; shares, &c., and limited liability—another is to supply the city with every class of vegetable and fruit, which is to be brought in carts to the hall-door of the purchaser—another is to do the same

with butcher's meat. The amount of 'bubbles' proposed is too numerous to mention. Anonymous societies are on the wane, as lately on one or two of those who professed always to give money have been found to have a predilection for doing exactly the opposite.

The Chambers continue to transact business with an apathy unworthy of many of their members.

The formation of the Health Committee is a move in the right direction, and will, we trust, lead to important and beneficial results. The committee has a police force of fifty men attached to it, so that any hygienic measure which they may deem necessary may be peremptorily carried out. We note that they purpose allowing deposits of uncleanness to exist under certain conditions. We think that this should not be allowed in houses that have the main sewers passing in front of them. These deposits are the curse of the country. In cold climates it is bad enough, but in latitudes like those of the River Plate, and in towns so well adapted for drainage as is Montevideo it is unpardonable that they should be permitted to exist for a single day.

The Municipality is unremitting in its attention to the work before it, and often, indeed generally, sits for four hours at a time. It is to be hoped that the eggs which they are hatching will produce a useful brood of improvements.

The poor President is to have no more rabble riding after him when he or Mrs. President go out for a drive, as the Deputies think that \$10,000 per annum for an escort for the Chief Magistrate of the country is unnecessary. To such a pitch of pretended democracy are we getting, that we shall be surprised to see either a President or Minister allowed, before long, to live in anything but a 'rancho' (mud hut), eat anything but 'puchero' or 'asado,' drink anything but 'maté,' or sit on anything but the skull of a dead horse. A little more external dignity, on the part of our rulers, would do no harm, and might produce an internal improvement in themselves. The Chambers seem to have forgotten the old adage, "too much familiarity breeds contempt."

The Police-office has published an edict, requiring the removal (under a heavy penalty for non-fulfilment) of all soap and tallow manufactories, distilleries, and other establishments likely to injure the public health, which may exist in the centre of the city. These factories are to be confined to certain points beyond the present limits of the city. We have so often seen published, edicts of a similar nature, that are so frequently, or, we may say, generally disregarded, that we attach no importance to the present one until we see that its conditions are being carried out.

The French Consulate will receive letters for Europe up to four p.m. on the 14th inst., as it is expected a steamer will leave on the 15th to catch the French mail in Rio Janeiro. Should such not be the case, a steamer will positively leave this on the 21st, and go direct to Bordeaux, so that no loss or inconvenience may be caused in postal matters by the premature sailing of the *Aunis*.

The French company of Bouffes made their 'debut' last night at the Solis Theatre, in the piece entitled 'Les Canotiers de la Seine,' but the public was disappointed, their principal and most attractive actress, Mdle. Gandoh having 'bolted,' per French steamer. The company is far from a competent one, and quite unable to offer attractions sufficient to fill, with a respectable audience, so large a theatre as the Solis.

There was a good attendance on the Bolsa! Considerable sales of shares in "Fomento Territorial" and in "Fomento Montevideoano" were made; the latter undertaking is working hard to raise the value of its shares, and has succeeded in getting them up to 80 per cent. during the last week from their former value of 70 per cent. for 100\$ written value. Tramway shares are offering in the market; 60 shares sold to-day at 90 per cent. for paper, payable 30 September next.

Bank notes were somewhat lower than yesterday, and some parties are working for a still further decline. There are sellers of gold at 82 per cent. for 31st inst., but the holders of notes have not yet convinced themselves of the absolute necessity which they will be in of securing their paper money in time! The closing rate for "moneda corriente" is 83 1/2 per cent.

We understand that some very humorous verses entitled "Paraguayan Pastoral" have been received by several parties by the last mail steamer! The are said to have been written by a well known former resident! We have not yet seen them, but will do our best to obtain a copy!

We regret to have to announce the death, at an early hour this morning, of the wife of Robert Davidson, Esq., a lady much regretted by a large circle of friends, and whose many amiable qualities had endeared her to all who knew her.

There are a good many English estancieros in town just now, but they keep very quiet, having evidently reached the conclusion that the sheep-farming business is not sufficiently lucrative to-day to allow them to carry on their former style of riotous living.

It is unusual to see so many of them in town at this season of the year, and it is just possible the tightness in the money market may have something to do with it.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

To-day is the great French holiday, called the Fete Napoleon, and also the festival of the Assumption, a strict church holiday. At the French chapel Calle Libertad, there will be a grand Te Deum, attended by the French Minister, Consul, officials, &c. In the evening His Excellency, M. Noel, gives a diplomatic banquet, to be followed by a soiree, at the French Legation.

It may not be generally known that the Fete Napoleon takes its name from a Corsican saint, who suffered martyrdom, if we remember aright, under Diocletian. When Buonaparte, a pupil at Brienne, was receiving confirmation from the Bishop the latter asked the boy's name, and was told "Napoleon," whereupon he said he had never heard of a saint of the name. "That is because you are not a Corsican" was the prompt reply of the future king-maker.

M. Baraille's balloon will make an ascension to-day at 2 p.m. from Plaza Parque, the French residents having subscribed for the purpose in honor of their national fete. There will be also a salvo from the war-vessels, and flags will be hoisted at all the Legation and public offices. We offer also our best compliments to the French residents on this anniversary, and congratulate them on the prosperous condition of the French empire and French commerce. We salute our Colleague, the *Courrier de La Plata*, and wish it every prosperity.

The new English Minister, Hon. W. Stuart, was received yesterday at the Government House by President Mitre, and the usual complimentary speeches were exchanged.

The pampero on Thursday night has been unfortunately attended with great loss of life and property; still it is good in a sanitary point of view, and the atmosphere yesterday was so buoyant and invigorating as to make us welcome such change.

</

The Musical Committee of the Philharmonic Society request us to inform the members that the next rehearsal will take place on Monday night at 7.30 p.m. at the Coliseum.

The City of Brussels will be looked for on Monday or Tuesday with the second remittance of £250,000 for the National Government.

Mr. Estrada's last Historical Conference touched on the occupation of Buenos Ayres by the 'Ingleses.' The lecturer very gracefully commented on the subject, and showed that in the end it was a triumph for England and a gain for these countries, inasmuch as it engendered the spirit which ultimately threw off the Spanish yoke, and, furthermore, brought Buenos Ayres into increased notice in Europe.

We take pleasure in saluting Mr. William Barnard, the able agent of the Anglo-Argentine Mining Company, on his arrival in town yesterday, from the San Juan Mines. We are happy to remark that Mr. Barnard appears none the worse after the fatigues and perils of his two journeys across the Pampas.

Owing to press of matter, we have to hold over an interesting letter from our new Rosario correspondent. He confirms the news of the Indians at Cañada Gomez, who have made a clear sweep of the native estancias. The gentlemen laying telegraph lines along the railway were startled by Indians, but the latter cleared out.

The Marseilles steamer Savoie, with a large number of passengers on board, has arrived in Montevideo, with dates from Rio Janeiro to the 8th inst. The greatest anxiety prevailed to know the fate of the Paraguayans in the Chaco.

RECEPTION OF THE BRITISH MINISTER.

At two o'clock yesterday the President's coach conveyed the Hon. Mr. Stuart to the Government House, accompanied by the Staff of the Legation. A regiment of artillery was drawn up in front, and the band played some stirring airs.

The British Minister, on presenting his credentials, said:—

"It is my agreeable duty to present to your Excellency the letter by which the Queen, my gracious Sovereign, has done me the honor to accredit me in the capacity of her Majesty's Minister-Plenipotentiary to the Argentine Republic; and I have been commanded to take this opportunity of assuring you of the esteem which her Majesty entertains for your Excellency, and of the deep and friendly interest which her Majesty, in common with the British nation, continues to take in the development and welfare of the people over whose destinies you are being called upon to preside.

Believing these feelings, founded alike upon political sympathies and upon commercial interests, to be cordially reciprocated by the enlightened Argentine Government and people, it ought to be an easy task for me to maintain and even to strengthen the relations of friendship and mutual respect which so happily subsist between the two countries.

Such, Sir, in accordance with the wishes of my Sovereign, will certainly be the principal object of my mission, in the fulfilment of which I confidently hope to be aided by your Excellency's high and patriotic spirit."

THE PRESIDENT'S REPLY.

"Most Excellent Sir, I receive with pleasure the letter in which your August Sovereign accredits you her Minister-Plenipotentiary; and I most cordially acknowledge the friendly sentiments which you have expressed towards the Argentine people and Government.

"I flatter myself, Sir, with the well-founded hope that your mission will do much towards drawing still closer, if that be possible, the perfect friendship which, happily, exists between the two countries, to the promotion of their mutual interests, and the equal advantage of both.

"While following these important objects, you may count, Sir, on the entire sympathy, and all the co-operation possible, of the Argentine people and Government, who greet in your distinguished person the free British nation and its august Sovereign, her Majesty Queen Victoria."

LAS FLORES.

I have just received a letter from a friend in the far north giving a deplorable account of the state of the camps in his locality and enquiring for camp in the district.

Almost every year some of the northern camps are beaten up at some season or other; this may partly be accounted for by the injurious system of overstocking carried on there by the majority of farmers.

In this district we have had, so far, a splendid winter, the condition of the camp could not be better at the season; sheep are fat and the lambing has been in general very good, much better than that of last season. This winter has been unusually warm, the thermometer inside doors was never under 44°, and that only on a few occasions, it generally ranged between 46 and 50° Fahr.

Many of our farmers have sold two troops of fat sheep this season, and hope to effect a third sale before shearing; the number of guis despatched from here with troops of sheep already exceeds three hundred.

As a general rule, farmers prefer selling at their houses, many have sent in troops to be sold or slaughtered at the saladeros in town but somehow they have been disappointed in their expectations.

The man who makes up his own troop gains a point that should not be lost sight of by the farmer who intends to improve his flocks, inasmuch as, he will undoubtedly part old, bad woolled and defective sheep that the butcher or grasería buyer would not part unless very fat. Farmers wishing to sell the cull of their flocks without running the gauntlet of the saladeros should, in my opinion, keep such sheep as they intend to sell in a separate flock or flocks if their stock is numerous; when the buyer comes round he can see the sheep already parted out for him and offer his price; no doubt he can tell to an ounce the quantity of tallow each sheep will give, and offer accordingly. We are told that buyers are the only persons capable of judging fat sheep, that farmers know not one iota about the matter, that a farmer is barely capable of discerning a very fat sheep from a very lean one.

In fact, farmers should be thankful for being allowed even that much knowledge of the business; it is not long since they were supposed incapable of distinguishing fine wool from tow. I would like to know at what school these saladero sheep buyers learn to be such good judges, many of them are mushroom farmers and their experience in buying dates only from this season.

The prices paid in this district for fat sheep and wethers during the month of July and first week of August, range between \$24 and \$30. Some troops have been purchased for Chascomus but the majority were sent to Buenos Ayres; in good weather troops of sheep reach Buenos Ayres from here in four, or five days at most. Mr. Lasalle sold at \$26 and a great many from this price down to \$24. It is now very difficult to get sheep in this locality by the cut at anything under \$20; most of the farmers have lightened their flocks and consequently are careless about selling anything but fat sheep; some of the farmers have sold so many that they are now looking out for sheep by the cut to stock their lands, but they find to their surprise that a great many of their neighbours are just in the same predicament: all willing to buy and none willing to sell. Those who will sell, ask \$20 without any deduction for young lambs.

Mr. L. Ramirez, having lately lost his wife, is about selling off his stock and renting his estancia which consists of nine leagues of camp; he is now in treaty with Mr. Villanueva, for camp and stock, as the bargain is not yet closed I cannot give the prices. A good many of those who were anxious to sell or rent their lands at the beginning of the year are now determined to continue farming them themselves.

There are yet some very good lots in the market which may also be withdrawn later in the season. To be rented four leagues from the Saladero, a small estancia half a league long by an equal width for twelve thousand dollars a year; in the same locality a nice estancia for sale, a league by half a league with puestas, corrales, &c. for two hundred and thirty thousand dollars. Its original cost; outside this town, half a league to be rented, rent conditional; six leagues from the Saladero four leagues to be sold or rented in one lot on conditional terms. These are the only lots of really good land that I am aware of in the market just now a few months since there were eight leagues in the market.

The rumour of a branch line of the Southern railway from Jeppener station to Terrero's bridge on the river Salado is again on the tapis; no doubt such a branch would be of more general utility, and, a better speculation in a commercial point of view than the extension of the main line to Dolores. The branch to Terrero's bridge would be in direct route to Azul and would embrace all the traffic of the South Western districts; Dolores is too near the coast to embrace any traffic but that of the far South. Azul, in time, will have its iron-road; if a branch of the Western railway is carried on to Lobos, it is probable this branch will be extended hereafter to Azul; it remains to be seen whether it would suit the interests of the Southern railway Company to lose for ever the traffic of the South Western districts which, will be inevitably lost to that Company if the Lobos branch of the Western railway is made before the Salado branch of the Southern railway. The commercial prospects of Chascomus would be seriously injured by the extension of the line to Dolores, whereas

a branch line would not at all affect it. This course is of little importance to the company and of no consequence to the interests of the country in general.

MONEY CRISIS.

I have merely time to say one word on your article on "Money Crisis," in which you say that the accepted relation between paper issue and capital stock as three of issue to one of capital. I hardly think this is fairly stated, and certainly if such were acted upon in any part of the globe, collapse and burst-up would inevitably be the result. My financial gleanings are to the effect that three of issue to one of specie reserve, the issue, in no case, exceeding the absolute capital of the banks; and thus capital held in an available form, in securities of an unquestionable character, is nearer the mark. The Bank of England issues to the amount held by it (in the 'bona fide' capital of the shareholders of the bank) of certain specified national securities, as for every £5 note it issues over and above this, it must hold an equal gold reserve, and practically the gold reserve is always maintained at a little over one-third its total issue, and, in addition, there is maintained a reserve fund.

In the United States of America the banks of issue are compelled to hold to the last dollar of their issue, a capital invested in certain state or specified securities. This is a very different state of things to issuing three times the amount of the professed capital of any establishment or bank. No wonder, indeed, that there is a general burst-up of banks in the Plate States, where they issue three times the amount of their written actual, or subscribed capital, with three specie reserves and where 'carteras,' chiefly formed out of depositors' monies, and the bills of creditors who have received their advances or discounted in bank paper.
