Today there has been some important sales of the Sociedad Poverin, opening at 80 and closing at 75.

REVIEW FOR EUROPE.

There is nothing important to note in military matters. The Paraguayan campaign still drags on. Lopez holds the Allies in check, in a place called Villeta, which is represented as a position of great strength.

The political disturbances in Corrientes have undergone a slight change. Ex-Governor Lopez has separated from Caceres, and appealed to the National Government for assistance to regain power.

Under date of the 8th inst., President Mitre, with the counter-signature of Gen. Paunero, the Minister of War, has sanctioned a Bill of Congress, whereby a new loan of \$2,000,000 is granted to the National Executive to provide for the extraordinary expenses of the War in Paraguay.

The end of September saw the panic at its height, the commencement of October its subsidence. During the three days excitement which has been before referred to, the number of persons withdrawing deposits was so large, the supply of unnecessarily frightened bank customers was nigh exhausted; and the remainder, perceiving that the wealthier supporters of the solvent banks were in no way influenced by the agitation of the minority, and being reassured by a more moderate evening, has been put off for a few days.

On the 4th inst., 'El Federalista' published a correspondence on this matter. A letter has been addressed to the managers of the three solvent banks here by native and foreign firms of Rosario, saying they hear with profound alarm, the rumor of a projected forced currency of the bills of the banks in the Province, and wish to know if managers of existing banks will shelter themselves under such a law, or take legal means to prevent its being effected.

Our advices from the country districts could be no more favorable, the camps are in splendid condition, the grass so high, that had the farmers time might be mowed down. The flocks clean and fat, some shearing notwithstanding the weather, has been going on during the week in the neighborhood of Chascomus, and a lot of wool inspected to-day at the Barraca Bardwick from Sr Fernandez estancia.

THE PINE OF BRAZIL. This tree is found between 15° and 30° S.L. in the province of Rio Grande do Sul, Santa Catharina, Paraná, São Paulo and in Minas Geraes as far as Barbacena, the northern limit. It is continually the native of temperate climate, and even in those provinces where it abounds, it disappears where the elevation of the terrain diminishes so greatly as to restore or to approach the warmth of the tropics.

The Brazilian pine is sometimes found, measuring 7 feet 3 inches in diameter, and bearing a trunk of 130 feet clear of branches.

SANTA FE—A LAND FOR EMIGRATION. PAVON, Oct. 2, 1868. I have enclosed you an account of a most villainous outrage, committed on a brother of mine, and by a Government official, in the broad daylight. By giving it a corner in your widely-spread paper, you would greatly oblige me and perhaps thrill on their guard against the man who are entrusted with taking care of life and property in the camps. The facts are these:— On the 22nd ult., a brother of mine had business in Rosario, for which he

took three horses; he got on well until he came to the Monte Flores, five leagues south of Rosario, when a soldier came after him from a pulperia that he had just passed, and told him to return back to the pulperia, "por orden del Señor Comisario"; he asked for what, but the soldier, without giving an answer, turned the two horses that he was driving up to the pulperia; out came the 'Señor Comisario' with seven soldiers, and accosted him thus:—'Have you got a pass?' 'No, I am a farmer, and never yet have been asked for one.' 'Have you got a pass for your horses?' 'No, but if you think there is anything wrong about me or my horses, there are several neighbours close by here, (pointing to 3 or 4 houses) acquainted with these horses.' 'Well then,' said 'Señor Comisario,' 'as you have got nothing to show for yourself or your horses, it is a proof that you are clearing out, and it is my duty to make you my prisoner; deliver up your horses and arms, or any other articles you have by you.' There was nothing else for it, by this officer's appearance, so he had to deliver up his three horses, revolver, and some letters. When he got these he said in a jeering manner, 'have you got any money?' 'Yes,' replied my brother, 'do you want it along with all the rest?' This reply was too good for the officer, and he struck him across the shoulders, saying, 'do you think I am a rogue?' Then he was given an old poor horse, and told to saddle and march with them; but, before leaving the pulperia, my brother asked the pulpero to be so kind as to send word of what had happened to him, over to a friend's house that was close by. He promised to do so. The Comisario was listening to what passed, and when he saw the pulperia, he asked, 'what would you pay to have a note sent to your friend?' he was told \$20, but that was too low a figure. He settled up again and said 'creo que mandará un hombre por semejante porqueria.' He was asked what he wanted, and his reply was 'quiereis pagar \$300?' He was told no, and let it be remembered that the house was in sight. Finally, night coming on, and after passing the greater part of the afternoon going from one rancho to another, in taking to one rancho 'vigarrillo' in another. The Comisario came and told my brother that if he would pay \$200 he would let him go. As it was dark, and he did not know where he was to pass the night, or whether he would ever pass it in such company, he accepted the offer, on condition that everything was delivered up to him that had been taken from him. The Comisario agreed, but said he could not let him go at the house where they then were, as he said the people would see him, and that would not do. They made another move, the \$200 was paid, the revolver, letters, and the three horses returned, but he was told that two horses were enough for him to go about his business. At the time he thought himself very lucky to get away from such company—it was then night. He got lost, and passed the greater part of the night in the open camp. The next day he sent to the pulperia, to know what officer's name was; he was told it was Sr. Leandro Guardia, Comisario en general del departamento.

It is very well to hear in mind that the expenditure latterly so increased is made in gold and that gold must be paid for the cost of retiring our forces, for the settling of the debts to the farmers &c., &c., and for those of the great divisions of the army and squadron left in occupation in Paraguay and the River Plata.

So, therefore, with the augment in this item alone the next estimate in time of peace would rise to 70,723,000\$; if it were possible to return to the expenditure previous to the war, which Great Britain itself could do after the Crimean campaign.

The least expenditure which can be counted on is the double of what the army and navy then cost, that this 20,000,000\$ a year more with which the peace estimate will rise to about 90,000,000\$.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF RAILWAYS. B. Ayres, Sept. 2, 1868. To the Chief Secretary, the Department of Finance, Dr. Don Dardo Rocha.

I have the satisfaction to submit to you the accompanying report, plans, and synoptical tables handed me by the accountant, Mr. Perez del Cerro, on the examination with which I had discharged him of the accounts of the Southern Railway for the last eighteen days of 1865, and the whole of the year 1866, which you will be pleased to bring under the knowledge of His Excellency the Governor.

In my opinion, this expense is proper for looking after the interests of the Company, but not for the working of the line, for which the manager and his staff ought to be sufficient. It is not, therefore, proper to pay this item, but rather add it to the reductions proposed by the notary.

Whereas—1st. The system of according a guarantee on the capital invested in the construction of railways has been accepted by the public authorities of the Province, by reason, it seems, that it is an inducement, and, at the same time, a guarantee for the introduction of capital into the country.

2nd. It is understood that a country like ours will not stop at certain sacrifices when these are made to endow it with railways built by foreign capital.

3rd. That in practice the system of guarantees offers serious difficulties in the liquidation of the accounts, to which must be added that in the present instance the amount of the obligation is quite uncertain and variable.

4th. It is believed that the Companies themselves would accept a modification of their respective contracts and in harmony with the ideas already expressed.
