"The surprise caused by the fraud has given rise to many remarks. Some say that the Chevalier Saint Hilaire and the soi-dis'ant Baron de Lemos began the business in Paraná, profiting of some Bonds left in blank for the sum. These individuals arrived here from Europe as poor as Job, and soon lived in grand style, banqueting, feasting &c. Baron Lemos was a clerk in the Contaduria, and St Hilaire had been dismissed by the Paraná Government for misconduct in the custom. house of Rosario. The wonder was, were did these gentlemen make their fortune: still, there is nothing yet against them but this vague suspicion. We hope the Government will leave no stone unturned, to bring the culprits to justice. Meantime it is said that so far back as two years ago, when the coupons of the foreign debt were paid, a clerk informed the Finance Minister that "the founds voted by Congress for this purpose were out," whereupon the Minister never took the trouble to inquire into the matter, but ordered the future payments to be made out of another branch of the public revenue. This resolution was come to after a Cabinet council on the subject, and this is the way that the forged coupons have been regularly paid during the last two years. H. C. B. THE GREAT SOLAR ECLIPSE.

Astronomers Sent to India.

[From the 'Daily News,' Aug. 25.] The news from Bombay which we oublished vesterday may have led many of our readers to suppose that the hopes of astronomers. with respect to the great solar eclipse, have been dissapointed. At Bombay the eclipse was nearly total, as predicted, but the weather was very unfavorable for observation, and rain fell at the time of greatest obscuration. We are glad to be able to announce, however, that the eclipse has been arrived at by the observers. Telegrams have been received almost simultaneously from Major Tennant, who commanded the expedition sent out by the Astrono mical Society, and from Dr. Janssen, who commanded the French expedition. Major Tennant states that light fleecy clouds covered the sky, but that the eclipse has been, in the main, successfully observed. This news is very promising, because his party had undertaken the duty of photographing the eclipse. The Government of India had optained from England a Newtonian preflector, specially constructed for the occasion by Mr. John Browning, F. R. A. S., the optician; and arrangements had been made by means newly elected Governor, to succeed of which it was hoped that six photographic pictures would be taken duing the totality. Major Tennant wouldhardly have described the observation of the eclipse as succesful unless several trustworthy photographs had been taken. From the careful manner in which Major Tennant's party had been trained in astronomical photography, may safely assume that the photo-


