THE NEWTONS MAIL'S

The five steamer Newton arrived in port on Sunday. Thanks to the kindness of Messrs Lamport and Holt we have received files of the English Papers up to the 30th from Liverpool.

The Markets for Stocks and Shares have not varied in a great degree. The business was again limited, the operators being principally engaged with half-monthly accounts. The "making-up" occupied the chief attention to-day and the prospects of the settlement appear satisfactory.

Little or no movement took place in the English funds, and from quotations were fairly supported. Foreign and American securities were slightly better in the advanced hours, the transactions having been in favour of improvement.

Railway shares took an especial start in the latter part of the day, but the extreme advance was not sustained. The departments for banking and miscellaneous shares presented no important change, the transactions having been insignificant.

On the French Bourse the quotations exhibited a slight reaction. Consols for money and the account were last mark 9 1/2 to 1/2.

The demand for money at the Bank was of the lightest possible character, notwithstanding the end of the quarter. Among the bankers and bill-brokers the inquiry was of the most restricted description, a great number of the engagements forward having been already arranged.

The quantity of paper seeking negotiations remains most limited, for, although in some quarters a few fresh orders have been given-out, the bills for them have not been brought into circulation.

The joint-stock banks make their advances at about 1 1/2 per cent. The ship White Rose is announced from Melbourne with 40,145 ounces of gold, value in sterling £192,380; and the steamer Tanjore has arrived from Alexandria with £5,338 in specie.

The half-monthly accounts it is believed will pass over in a satisfactory manner. The fluctuations have not been violent; and the differences to be paid either way will not be heavy.

It was thought that the arrest of the payment of the Caledonian dividend would have created a greater effect than it did, but these kind of proceedings have become so common that the operators do not regard them with the same apprehension as formerly.

The feature in the railway department was the recovery in prices immediately after the "making up" quotations were adjusted. The tendency to the close was favourable; though the amount of "bona fide" business was not important.

In a commercial point of view, the late earthquake in Peru, it is stated, will not affect any particular branches of trade in this country, with the exception of alpaca wools, Peruvian bark and nitrate of soda. This latter has become a very important article of export from Peru, and has not been found in any other quarter of the globe hitherto.

The quantity exported last year was £16,000 tons, representing a

value of fully \$4,000,000, of which rather over one-half came to this country, the remainder went to Continental ports and the United States, where it is largely used as a substitute for saltpetre.

The nitrate ports, Iquique, Pisagua, and Mejillones, have been destroyed, and large quantities of nitrate carried away by the sea, and the works in the interior much damaged.

The surviving inhabitants were suffering from want of water and provisions, the nitrate plains being destitute of a blade of grass or vegetation of any description, or a drop of water.

All provisions and provender for animals are supplied from the neighbouring republic of Chile, and the water was obtained from the sea by means of distilling apparatus and establishments, all of which have been swept away.

The mules and asses employed in the transport of nitrate from the plains to the shipping ports have to be driven to the slopes of the Andes for water and pasturage. In most places where the earthquake has done much damage trade will be almost suspended for months, and the cessation of shipments of nitrate of soda must, ultimately, considerably increase the value of saltpetre.

The Emperor Napoleon has lost another of his faithful supporters, Count Walewski, who was struck down by a fit of apoplexy, on Sunday, at Strasburg. The deceased had filled some of the highest offices in the state; he was ambassador in England in 1854; in the following year he held the portfolio of Foreign Affairs; in 1860 he became Minister of State; and after the death of the Duke de Morny was appointed President of the Corps Legislatif. The count was in his 59th year.

An explosion of a terrific character has occurred at the Mosley Steel and Iron Works, near Bilston. The works were in full operation at the time of the accident.

The forge is laid in ruins. Five of the puddlers were killed on the spot, and their bodies were mutilated in a most frightful manner.

Several other men who were employed at the works have been very severely injured. Some of them are dying as this telegram leaves here. Men are now busy searching the ruins.

The "Panama Star" says:—"Counting only what is known up to the present, the evil extends over more than 200 leagues, and more than 300,000 persons have remained without shelter and without bread in consequence of this terrible catastrophe, and with difficulty shall we find in history an instance of a calamity which has embraced such an immense extent of territory."

Severe gales have at intervals during the last few days visited the southern coast, and done much damage to shipping. Several vessels have been entirely lost and many sailors drowned. It is on these sad and unfortunately frequent visitations upon our rock-bound coast that the great advantages of the life-boat service are displayed; and on this occasion it will be seen by the reports in another page that the gallant men employed in this perilous duty have lost neither skill nor courage.

There was no great movement in the Founds yesterday. Consols for money and the account were last quoted 9 1/2 to 1/2. Foreign stocks exhibited little change, but the tendency was rather more favourable. Railway shares opened with heaviness; towards the close there was a recovery in values, and prices then stood generally higher. On the French Bourse quotations were about 2c lower.

CHURCH CONGRESS IN DUBLIN. Dublin, Tuesday. The Church Congress opened to-day with a sermon by the Dean of Cork, St. Patrick's Cathedral who densely crowded. The Dean said the national recognition of Almighty God and the proper provision for His worship was not now considered the first duty of the State.

The axiom of modern statesmen was that nations had no God—that the church was like any corporation. This idea of a creedless and Godless state was a great peril to the church, which should call upon all members of the Anglican communities to resist it.

To-morrow (Wednesday) there will be a "conversation." The Bishop of Oxford will preach on Thursday evening in St. Patrick's Cathedral. On Saturday afternoon the sitting of the Congress will be brought to a close with a lecture on Church Music, by Dr. Stewart, Professor of Music to the University of Dublin.

LATEST LONDON TELEGRAM OF THIS MORNING. Liverpool, Sept. 30th 1868. The London "Times" has the following special telegram dated Madrid, 29th inst, 4.45 P.M.

The force under General Novaliches, has been repulsed near Cordova. News has caused great excitement in Madrid. Concha has yielded and troops fraternized in order to avoid collision with the people. No blood was shed. The Queen's bust and arm dragged through the streets. Provisional Junta appointed. Perfect order prevails.

The London "Herald" has the following dated Madrid, 29th 7.50 P.M. The whole of Madrid garrison, pro-

claimed for Revolution. A junta has been appointed which has declared a downfall of dynasty, for universal suffrage and for a constitutional Cortes.

Consols less firm, Spanish securities heavy at a decline of 1/2. Advices from Oporto report a small vintage in the Douro district.

THE PAPAL STATES. Rome, Sept. 28. According to an official statement issued to-day, the present strength of the Pontifical army is 16,405 men, including 673 cavalry and 933 artillery. The latter consists of one mountain, three field, and two mounted batteries. Rome is defended by 157 guns. There are 1,800 sick men in the military hospitals, and many captured deserters in prison.

The Pontifical gendarmes have captured the notorious brigand chief Zarfala, near Falvaterra. Nine of the prisoners convicted of complicity in the blowing up of the Serristori barracks in the autumn of 1867, have been condemned to death. The congregation of Rites, at the request of the Canton of Oberwalden, will again take into consideration the canonisation of Nicholas Fench.

SPANISH REVOLUTION. REPORTED DEFEAT OF THE ROYAL ARMY. Madrid, Sept. 29. The Royal army under General Novaliches, is concentrated upon the left bank of the Guadalquivir, near Cordova.

The insurgent forces, commanded by the Duke de La Torre, occupy the right bank with formidable defences upon a bridge called Alcala, the capture of which however by the Royalists would not necessarily result in the overthrow of the insurgent position.

The Royal army have received orders to attack to-day. The insurgents have abandoned the town of Alcoy and, withdrawn to the mountains. The insurgents at Bajal continue their resistance, and have repulsed several assaults.

Letters from Ferrol state that the Government troops have abandoned the Castle of San Felipe, and that it has been taken possession of by the insurgents. There are insurgent bands in Galicia, Catalonia, Valencia, and Murcia. It is asserted that Loja and Granada have made "pronouncements."

Barcelona, Sept. 2. The "Diario" of to-day says that the Captain-General of Catalonia has heard officially of the arrival of Satorre, Publico, and other officers, at Perpignan.

Paris, Sept. 29. Advices from the Spanish frontier state that Marshal Serrano was expected to arrive yesterday at Andujar, at the foot of the Sierra Morena mountains, province of Iden. The advance guard, commanded by General Izquierdo, is at Roda. The corps of General Novaliches is in cantonments in La Mancha.

The "Moniteur" says there is no news of interest to report to-day from Spain. The city of Granada has made a "pronouncement," whereupon the garrison withdrew. The same fact is said to have occurred at Cathagena, where the appearance of three frigates had determined the officer in command to evacuate the town with his troops. The encounter believed to be imminent between Marshal Serrano and Marshal de Novaliches has not yet taken place. It is agreed on all hands that such an event would have important results.

The "Gaulois" of this evening confirms the news already announced from Madrid, that Colonel Baldrich, at the head of a body of insurgents, has landed at Vinaroz, in Catalonia. The same paper contains the following:—"General Prim is hourly expected at Barcelona, and his arrival will be the signal of a rising in that city. Marshal Espartero is confined to his bed, but has nevertheless given in his adhesion to the insurrectionary movement. The Marquis of Havana, José Concha, and the Duke del Duero, Manuel Concha, have forwarded their resignations to the Queen at St. Sebastian, who thereupon summoned Count de Cheste, to St. Sebastian to form another Cabinet. The reply of the count is not yet known. The Jesuits are exerting themselves to induce the population of the Basque provinces to arm in favor of the Queen. It is said that the regiment commanded by Count Girgenti has revolted. Bands of insurgents are considerably increasing in the interior.

The official Gazette of Madrid of the 27th, received here to-day, affirms that the greater part of the provinces and all the towns, even those of minor importance, are happily free from insurgents. General Calonge has returned to Valladolid from Santander.

The "Siecle" of to-day states that the brothers Concha Manuel, Marquis de Duero, and José, Marquis of Havana, have conjointly addressed a letter to the Queen, declaring that, owing to the

refusal of her Majesty to proceed to the capital without being accompanied by Señor Majori, they were unable any longer to guarantee the situation. On the receipt of this letter the Queen gave orders to General Pezuela, and formed a new and complete Cabinet at St. Sebastian, and to summon the members of the State Council. This step is considered to indicate resolutions of grave import.

PARIS, SEPT. 29, EVENING.—The *Avenir* and *Epoque* of this evening mention a rumour as having been current on the Bourse, that the Royal army, under Navaches, has been defeated, and that Madrid has risen in Revolt. No confirmation of this news has yet been received.

The *France* of this evening says that an agitation in favor of the Carlists had commenced in Arragon and Navarre. Letters from Barcelona, of the 27th, state that tranquillity continues to prevail in that city.

The *Times* says the latest news from Spain is still unfavorable to the Royal cause. It is evident that the insurrection is extending into every part of the country, and that nowhere had the Queen's generals as yet gained any decisive advantage. To begin with the southern provinces, we learn that Novaliches has not been able even to recover Cordoba. The defection of some of his troops may have checked his operations. Be this as it may, the Royal force in Andalusia still halts at Montoro, north-east of Cordoba, while Marshal Serrano is at the latter place, and commands probably all the resources of Andalusia. The important cities of Seville, Cadiz, and Malaga are completely in the hands of the insurgents. In short, the authority of the Queen has almost ceased in the southern portion of her dominions. Should the insurgents be strong enough to drive the Royal forces back through the Sierra Morena, the most wealthy part of the kingdom will be entirely rid of the Bourbon power. The Queen still remains at San Sebastian, and this very inactivity depresses her defenders at home, and her well wishers abroad. The total defection of the navy is a remarkable and most important event. It is not the Minister at Madrid, but the leader of the insurrection at Cordova, or elsewhere, who now commands the Spanish naval power. The Queen has not the power to enforce the blockade of a single port. On the other hand, the insurgents can blockade or bombard Cartagena, or such other places as may venture to hold out against them.

General Prim's proclamation, issued at Seville on the 20th inst., says:—"Spaniards,—You cannot resign yourselves any longer to the present state of things without becoming degraded. The hour of revolution has struck! The Government, by persisting in its evil course, has unfortunately rendered tardy concessions impossible. Let us avoid coming prematurely to a decision upon the question before us which circumstances and events might render impossible of realisation, and which might prejudice the judgment of the people." General Prim proceeds to advise universal suffrage, adding that Marshal Serrano (Duke de la Torre), with General Dulce, and others were to have commenced the movement before with the squadron, but had been delayed at sea. After stating that he speaks not in his own name only, but in theirs, he concluded with the words:—"Long live liberty! Long live the sovereignty of the people!"

A revolutionary manifesto, issued at Seville, proclaims universal suffrage, the absolute liberty of religious belief, and of commerce and trade, a prudent and liberal reform of the tariff laws in order to protect complete commercial liberty, the abolition of capital punishment, the inviolability of domicile and of letters, the repeal of the articles of the constitution relative to the religion of the state and reigning dynasty, and of the regulations respecting the succession to the throne, the organization of the army and navy on the basis of voluntary enlistment, the equalisation of the taxes, and the decrease of the excise duty upon salt and tobacco, and lastly the election of the Cortes by direct universal suffrage. This manifesto concludes with the words, "Long live liberty! Down with the dynasty! Long live the sovereignty of the people."

A proclamation, signed by Marshal Serrano [Duke de la Torre] and General Prim, Dulce, Beyoda, Topete, and others, was issued at Cadiz, solemnly refused obedience to the Government sitting at Madrid, and that they would not lay down their arms until the nation recovered its sovereignty and its will was made known and accomplished. This proclamation vigorously attacks the Government, and says "Enough of these scandals! We wish for the a Provisional Government representing all the great forces of the country in order to insure public order, and for universal suffrage to lay the groundwork of our social and political regeneration. Let all assemble with arms, avoiding all excesses, and we shall show ourselves worthy of the liberty of which we have been deprived. Long live Spain! This proclamation says nothing against the dynasty.

SANTANDER RETAKEN BY THE INSURGENTS. Bordeaux, Sept. 28. "La Gironde" of to-day publishes advices from Bayonne to the evening of the 27th inst., stating that General Concha has ordered that several regiments should be refused their pay in consequence of their having manifested a disposition to revolt. The same journal says that the insurgents retook Santander to-day. Great excitement prevails at Orviedo. The Spanish Deputy Moncassi, who was arrested recently near Toulouse, has escaped, and is believed to have succeeded in entering Spain.

THE FRAUDULENT COUPONS. In the letter of Mr. Arenales, published in last Saturday's edition, we gather, that the amount of foreign claims adjusted in the Parana was about \$1,200,000, and from the notice issued by the Accountant General, this sum is represented by 156 series, of coupons, of 103 in each series; consequently, 16,068 documents were handed over to the foreign legations, to be distributed to the claimants for compensation, each document representing an average value of about \$75. The offers of the Confederation being at the time empty, and its public credit not organized, the mode of payment adopted, doubtless, seemed the most easy for its finances, and the most secure for the recipients. Indeed, it was considered at the time a masterpiece of ingenuity and calculation.

The cumbersomeness of the arrangement was not thought of, nor the inconvenience of signing so many documents, which, however, appears to have soon become apparent to Mr. Riestra, who only signed the first and last coupons of every claim, leaving the rest to be signed by Messrs. Garcia, Ponzal and Aranzadi, of whose integrity no doubt has as yet been entertained, but with the multiplicity of coupons placed before them by the subordinates, it is impossible they can have examined every one. It was very easy to slip in a few blank forms, and had they made a remark, the answer would have been, 'it is a mistake,' and no further notice would have been taken. In presenting for signature 16,000 documents, it is to be supposed, therefore, from what has been stated in the newspapers about the employés of the Parana, that some hundreds were signed in blank, and carefully stored up until an opportunity occurred to make use of them; and this is probably the origin of the so-called false Coupons, but which, however, bear the true signatures that entitled them to credit.

Anyone who, as treasurer of a club or other society, has had to sign 300 or 400 receipts, can testify how irksome is the task, how anxious he is to make an end of it, and how little, after signing the first few, he looks at the remainder; the same may, therefore, have happened to Mess. Garcia, Ponzal, and Aranzadi, with the 16,000 documents placed before them, by persons who enjoyed their entire confidence. It may be said there were three persons to sign, and consequently, if anything was wrong, one of them would surely find it out; but we know, in such cases, when No. 1 has signed, Nos. 2 and 3 suppose it is all right, and follow suit; besides, No. 1 might be offended if 2 or 3 thought he could make a mistake.

The Government seems to have had a very rough idea of the amount of the Coupons, in circulation, and, judging from Mr. Arenales' statement, was not aware of its annual liabilities on this head, until the 21st of October last, but the Government should have known accurately its engagements, under the conventions with the foreign legations, and no doubt Mr. Arenales consulted them in making up his statement.

It is, therefore, to be believed, that the original estimate of Mr. Gonzales, of the annual sum required for the service of this debt, was the correct one, and, when the coupons presented during the year exceeded that amount, the matter should have been at once enquired into, and the public cautioned; but years passed on and the public was kept in ignorance of the swindle perpetrated, and only on the 23rd of October of this year, after the change in the administration, is the affair brought abroad. It cannot be denied that the late administration in concealing this fraud, assumed a grave responsibility for itself and the country.

GREAT NEWS FOR ENTRE RIOS. ANOTHER TELEGRAPH LINE. The mission of Dr. Velez Sarsfield to Entre Rios is likely to prove of the most beneficial effects for this Republic. Not only has it saved the country from all further expense and trouble in the Correntino war, but we learn on high authority that Dr. Velez Sarsfield is at last acquainted with the full importance of the Entre Riano trade.

Whilst Dr. Velez was travelling through that province, he took the trouble to make every inquiry into the import and export trade of the province, also its resources, agricultural wealth, &c., which far surpassed all his previous notions about the province in question.

Fully appreciating the onward march of the Uruguay on the Entre Riano shore, Dr. Velez Sarsfield is now considering the advisability of connecting this city with Entre Rios telegraph. The proposed new line will, we believe, run from Colonia to Fray Bentos: thence to point on the river slightly above Gualeguaychu, where the river is narrow, and thence across to Gualeguaychun. The expense would be trifling, and the convenience great. It is considered that the growing trade of Entre Rios and the Uruguay will prove amply sufficient to give fair returns to the Uruguay Telegraph Company.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE OF A BARAQUERO. AWFUL STATE OF THE BARBAQUERO ROAD. On more than one occasion we have called attention to the terribly neglected state of the Callo Larga Barracas, once the very best road about town in rainy weather. About a month ago the state of the road near the bridge was such, that the carts from Mr. Clarke's Chacra Quilmes, laden with grass and other rural produce for the city, were compelled to return to the Chacra with their loads, owing to the utter impossibility of being able to get across the bridge. So chronic has the nuisance become, that we would not now trouble our readers any further on the matter, but that, last week one of our most respected baraqueros nearly came to his last end in front of Mrs. Atkin's Quinta.

Don Luis Martinez, a well known baraquero, was driving down the Calle Larga last week, intent on business purposes, when, right in front of Mrs. Atkin's door the gig broke down in the very middle of a horrible pantano. The horse plunged and reared in the mud; the shafts gave way—harness smashed, and poor Mr. Martinez and his servant were pitched into the mud. The neighbors rushed to the rescue, and with the aid of long poles, staves and branches of the trees rescued Martinez and his servant from a muddy grave. Nothing could equal the excitement on that peaceful highway. Mr. Martinez was well known; a man of position with a wife and ten children—another instant, and he would have been smothered in the mud. When dragged out, his plight was too terrible to depict. A Portuguese gentleman who happened to see his friend in this too disgusting state could not resist, from laughing and expressing his regret that the President and Governor had not also been in the gig.

The fate of the horse is not known, for the affrighted animal took to his heels. The tiburly is irretrievably smashed, and may help to fill up one of the pantanos on the road. It is, however, with sincere pleasure we learn that Sr. Martinez, after much ado, was restored to the bosom of his family, and is gradually coming round.

An American gentleman, who unfortunately has a quinta on the Quilmes Road, narrowly escaped on Sunday at the Puente Chico. His description of the road baffles all who have ever heard about roads. He admits that he has seen much, but the Barracas and Quilmes Roads beat his most terrible experiences. If Calcutra was the judge at the Barracas, he opines the roads could not possibly be in a worse state.

WATER SUPPLY, BUENOS AYRES. REPORT PUBLISHED BY ORDER OF THE GOVERNMENT. Señor Don Emilio Castro.—In compliance with your desire to have an estimate, based on data as nearly exact as possible, of the amount likely to be realised by the sale of the water supplied by the system of works now in course of execution, I have had a careful investigation made in the streets through which the pipes are to be laid, as well as of the area comprised between the Calles Parque, Suipacha, Do las Piedras, Belgrano, and the river, for the purpose of classifying the different dwelling-houses, establishments, and buildings of all kinds. The annexed table shows the result of this inquiry. It includes an extent of one hundred and ninety-eight squares, corresponding to ninety-nine blocks [manzanas]. The number of doors in that area is five thousand five hundred and seventy-two: of houses, two thousand seven hundred and forty-nine.

The number of establishments and places of business, such as hotels, cafes, stores, shops, &c., is shown in the detailed table. The calculations for my estimate are based on the following principles: 1st. A uniform monthly rate of ten dollars currency for each door for defraying the expenses of watering the streets and of supplying public fountains, stand pipes, hydrants, &c. 2nd. The assumption that one half of the private houses, stores, and shops will take in water at the rates mentioned. 3rd. That, although it is certain that the other establishments will immediately avail themselves of the opportunity of laying on the pipes necessary for supplying their wants, a reduction of 20 per cent. is allowed for possible non-consumers.

The result derived from these bases is the following:

Representing a capital, bearing 7 per cent. interest, and with a sinking fund of 2 per cent. per annum, of \$32,000,000. The estimate for the works in the districts included is as follows:

According to the estimates already submitted to you, a sum of 12,500,000 dollars, in addition to the above sum of 8,500,000 dollars, would be required for the laying down of pipes in five hundred and twenty blocks [manzanas], and for increasing the daily supply of water to three millions of gallons, say 30,000 pipes, and allowing for duplicate machinery, as provided in the present works. That sum would be little more than half of the available balance shown in the preceding calculation, so that when we take into account the income which will accrue from the additional four hundred and twenty blocks to be supplied, there can be no doubt of the correctness of the opinion expressed by you that the income produced by the sale of filtered water will be sufficient for paying the interest and amortisation of the capital necessary for the construction of all the sanitary works required for the city.

The tariff established in these calculations is graduated according to the scale usually observed in European and North American cities, the basis being the charge of 10 reals per pipe of one hundred gallons, or four hundred and fifty-five litres: the usual water pipe holds four hundred and twelve litres, and its cost would be about 9 reals. The deductions made for non-consumers are greater than those furnished by practical experience in other places.

It should be observed that the rates mentioned in the tables are taken simply for the purpose of forming an estimate. The Commission has not decided on the system of rating, or sale of water most suitable for recommendation.
