A TRIP TO MONTEVIDEO.

MIRACULOUS ESCAPE AT THE BUCEO.

BELL'S BEEF-PRESERVING FACTORY.

THERE is ever something peculiar about Montevideo since the period when we made the memorable Monday expedition to this town...

When we visit Montevideo there is always something fresh to write or some amusing incident to narrate.

Our last trip to the Queen City of the Plate forms no exception to this rule.

We left in the Rio de la Plata on Monday evening, and hardly had we steamed to the outer roads, when a terrific storm came on, which for a while endangered the safety of the vessel.

The passengers had just taken their seats at the dinner-table and soup was being served round, when the squall came on. In an instant the harmony of the scene was disturbed—the steamer pitched and tossed and rolled; dishes, plates, soup-tureens, glasses, and toothpicks were pitched into our laps.

Mr. Wehrner, who sat beside us with the most Teutonic imperturbability, observed that we were all in for a dance. The ladies rose and staggering from the board fled to their cabins. Dinner on the table and half the passengers seasick—what a dilemma! So severe was the gale for a few minutes our gallant commander, Captain Page (one of the best and most affable captains in the Plate) found it necessary to anchor. Soon, however, we pushed on again. The storm had calmed somewhat, but the sea was frightful. The waves made a clean sweep over the bows, and the lurching of the vessel, the cries of the ladies and roar of the elements formed a scene which we hope never again to witness.

After a most miserable night, we landed at Montevideo about 5 a.m. At the custom-house we found the officials much more particular than formerly, in the inspection of luggage; our small valise was overhauled; our clothes tossed about; best coat thrown on the side-walk; and evidently the custom-house clerk regarded us as smugglers. I thought then how happy the man whose only luggage is a paper collar and a walking-stick. Having passed the ordeal, we made for the Hotel Oriental, where, with the exception of a small boy, we found every soul in the house asleep. There is something extremely disagreeable on arriving at a place, to find every one asleep; we feel as if we are one too many on the occasion; to go to bed at

5 o'clock on a fine summer's morning, is out of the question, and yet, to sit quietly in a small two story back room waiting for the inhabitants to get up, is equally unpleasant. Availing ourselves of the spare time, we started for the Rompeolas Barraca to have a swim, and returned to the Hotel in time to see the waiters getting up. As usual the Hotel Oriental was crowded; a rumor had gained ground that Dr. Rufino Elizalde, the ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs, had arrived, and Oriental politicians were on the 'qui vive' to see his ex-Excellency. Some Orientals seemed to eye me as if I had charge of the portfolio during the Mitre administration. At 9 o'clock all was bustle at the hotel, in the street and at Buela's rooms. Capt. Haddock of the City of Brussels had just come ashore, with fresh dates from England. Securing a couple of English papers we rushed to the Telegraph Office to send the news to Buenos Ayres. Here we found merchants and brokers busy sending despatches about tallow and hides. At one p.m. we attended the Municipal meeting, a report of which we published yesterday, after which we started on a tour through the city to see the improvements going on, and to look up some printing ink!

Nothing that we could write would give our readers an exact description of the gigantic march of Montevideo. In every street, almost in every square, new houses going up. House-rent is rising to the most extravagant figures. A house that in Buenos Ayres would be considered well rented at \$2,500 m.c. per month, in Montevideo with ease fetches 250 National dollars per month. Population appears to have gained on house-builders—the hotels are filled with parties who, from the impossibility of getting a decent house, are obliged to become hotel lodgers. One of the finest houses in course of construction is that of Mr. Varela, alongside the Montevideo Bank, four storeys high, with a commanding view of the city. Such is the rage for building that the brick-makers are all making fortunes, and building sites even in the most out of the way streets sell at what appears to us the most fabulous prices. The new houses going up now are called Fomento Buildings. Fomento companies are all the rage at present—from the hod carrier to the capitalist all have shares in Fomento Companies—how long this fomento fever will last it is impossible to say, but there can be no doubt that the fomento business is driving Montevideo ahead rapidly.

We arrived in Montevideo in the most dejected spirits, what with the miserable night on board the La Plata, and the rather unpleasant nature of our business with the Municipality, everything Montevidean was more or less tinged with gloom, but the admirable speech of Mr. J. R. Gomez, the straightforward manner in which the Municipality offered to pay up, coupled with a refreshing swim in the bay, had dispelled the gloom, and we saw Montevideo as we were wont, gay, happy, and prosperous. Sr. Juan Ramon Gomez, (who, apropos, turns out to be of Irish descent, his family name being Commyns, which the Spanish language has tortured into Gomez,) is as fine a sample of an Oriental gentleman as we could wish to see: he spoke the truth when he said that the public owed the Municipality millions, and that the Municipality owed a mere trifle, when the splendid roads, streets, and highways, were taken into account. We drove through the quintas in the evening, and found that the building fever was not limited to the city—new quintas, pavillions, cottages on all sides!

At 5 a.m. next morning, determined to make the most of our trip, we started for the Buceo in company with Mr. George Freyre, of the firm of Freyre Hermanos, and Mr. Henry Eggers, of the same house. The carriage drive from the hotel to the sea is one of the finest in South America. The morning was delightful, and the bracing zephyrs, as they gushed from the ocean, gave an indescribable buoyancy to our feelings. Mr. Freyre, who many years ago, resided in Montevideo, pointed to every turn in the road, around which were gathered some pleasing associations. The road to the Union will soon be a street: nearly every inch of it is built on—shops and private houses on all sides. We met the tramway cars crowded with passengers coming into town at that early hour; carts with wool and sheepskins. At last we approached Union, and wheeling to the right, we drove along a hedgy road which led to the sea. Messrs. Freyre and Eggers filled the coach with towels and shawls at the hotel, resolved to bathe with every convenience. But when we drove to the beach and got down at the rocks, we found, to our surprise, that neither of our companions could swim. Here was a difficulty—for to bathe on the sandy beach was dangers, owing to the spongy character of the sands, whilst from the rocks it seemed still more perilous, owing to the depth of water. Determined to have a good swim, we proceeded to the outermost rock, and head foremost jumped into the Atlantic. After a short swim and immense

struggling with the surf, we gained the rocks, to find our two friends still about, uncertain where to go; in fact at a small quiet creek in the rocks, Mr. Eggers discovered a spot which he pronounced safe and comfortable. No more intensely ludicrous sight has it been our good fortune to witness than what now followed—Mr. Eggers, divested of all his garments save his shirt, proceeded slowly, and with the aid of an umbrella, to sound the place. Mr. Freyre following: the rocks hereabouts are sharp, slippery, and covered with shells; unfortunately Mr. Eggers, in his anxiety to find out the exact depth of the water, stepped on a rock covered with sea moss; in an instant down he slipped, and, but that he held on to Mr. Freyre he would have gone to the bottom; the emergency was fearful, and whilst our friends were struggling to retire, up came a wave which completed the disaster.

We rushed to the scene of trouble, and after immense exertion succeeded in saving both their lives, and dragging them up on the rocks. This unforeseen disaster nearly brought to a melancholy end our bathing excursion, but Mr. Eggers, nothing daunted, stated that as he had come such a distance to bathe in the ocean, he would not return without carrying out his purpose. Seated therefore on the edge of a small rock, where about a cupful of salt water remained, he endeavored to bathe by throwing the water with both hands on his head and shoulders. Mr. Freyre, more heroic, entered a large pool in the rocks and completed his bath, but what was his horror on returning to their clothes to find that the tide had risen, and Mr. Eggers' fine shawl and his hat, in which he had placed two small pieces of rock to keep it from being blown away, had also taken a bath.

Most of the under garments were saturated with salt water. The distress of our friends was enhanced by the sudden appearance of Messrs. McColl and Bell, who came down from the Buceo to invite us to breakfast. Our friends Messrs. Freyre and Eggers would have declined if possible, owing to the wet state of their garments, but Mr. Bell would take no excuse, and after a hearty laugh at the morning's adventure, and a strong recommendation never again to go bathing at the Buceo with an umbrella, we took our seats in the carriage and drove up to Mr. Bell's meat-preserving factory, which is now doing a very excellent business, and a full description of which we reserve for tomorrow.

LATEST FROM BRAZIL. Rumour continues to point to a contemplated call for 20,000 more men to increase the army in Paraguay but no decree to such effect has yet appeared. Pressing is however carried on with great vehemence all over the country, causing a multitude of complaints especially on the part of the liberals, who accuse the government partisans of using the engine of oppression both from personal spite and for electioneering purposes. 260 recruits to Paraguay early in the fortnight, but larger remittances of men must soon be possible from the proceeds of the police battues going on all over the empire. They should however, cease shortly, as by law they are forbidden for two months before and one month after imperial elections and these will take place on the 31st of January next.

A daily newspaper, the "Correio Mercantil," has disappeared from the Rio Press. Of late years it had been the principal organ of the conservatives, but having long been in embarrassed circumstances it was finally resolved by that party to close its transactions and concentrate the divided support upon the "Diario do Rio de Janeiro."

General Webb, United States Minister here, goes in the New York packet upon a temporary visit.

Mr. Washburn, late Minister at Paraguay, is now here. He says that Paraguay is in a terrible state of penury and despotism, but that the allied purpose of separating Lopez from the government is utterly hopeless, as the Paraguayans look up to him as their greatest patriot and are willing to make any sacrifice he may demand of them. Luxuries and provisions had been hitherto easily procured from Bolivia. Many very strong positions existed to which the Paraguayan army could retire should that of Villetta become untenable, and Lopez's policy was not to fight but to exhaust the Brazilian army and finances by prolonging the struggle.

Brazil is about to receive a considerable number of European immigrants wealthy if not remarkable for industry and progress, namely the lately demoted friars and nuns of Spain, who now look to Brazil as their Cannan.

We understand that the Government has decided on transferring to companies the finishing of the Custom House, the completion of the docks and the working of the capatazias, i.e., the loading and discharging of vessels by the Customs. We also understand that announcements calling for tenders for those services will appear in a few days.

The drought in the western parts of Pernambuco and Bahia still continued

and was causing much injury to graziers and planters.

In the province of Bahia an ex-Deputy of the Imperial Legislature, Dr. Pedro Moniz Barreto de Aragao, who had just ratted from the Liberal side, had been waylaid and severely beaten by order, it is alleged, of some prominent politicians who have been arrested.

In S. Paulo the railway traffic returns show receipts of 13,700,000, or about £9,000, for the month of October. The extra tariff for the payment of the bonus to the contractors has ceased.

In Rio Grande do Sul the electric telegraph from the city of Rio Grande to the bar was at work.

The Dutch schooner Reinhardt, taking a cargo of wool and hides from Montevideo to Antwerp, was wrecked on the coast about 100 miles south of the Rio Grande, but all the crew were saved.

COMMERCIAL NEWS.

Exchange.—Though a very active business has taken place in exports of Coffee and Cotton during the fortnight, it has produced no response in the rate of Exchange but on the contrary this has experienced a further serious decline. One month past we predicted rates had seen their highest but not attained their lowest figure. Unfortunately our prediction is realizing: then rates were 19s. 3d.; by last English Steamer rates opened at 19s. 3d. and closed at 18s. 3d.; and for this Steamer the opening rate was 18s., whilst it closes flat at 17s. 3d. for private drafts, Banks refusing to open rates.

This decline in face of the bills which have been thrown on the market against shipments of produce, is significant and proves that the Commercial public are now beginning to comprehend more clearly what the effect of the continuation of the war must ultimately be on the finances of the Country, and that the Currency is as bound to further depreciation as that sparks fly upward.

The most sanguine supporters of Exchange are beginning to lose heart and well they may, for ruin, in a financial sense, appears to be looking the Country very closely in the face, and even should the war terminate the moment, enormous expenses must continue for at least six months afterwards.

Government Stock 6 per cent.—Maintains high rates, and sales during the fortnight have been made at 83 to 84 per cent. This security will always remain firm as the law obliges the funds of all institutions and of minor legatees to be invested in them.

Gold Bonds.—As the payments become due holders get more anxious to realize. Last sales have been at \$70 to \$75 premium.

Bank of Brazil Shares.—We have to note an advance on these shares, and large sales have been effected at 186 1/2 000.

Gold.—During the fortnight about 100,000 sovereigns have changed hands. The closing price is Rs. 138 5/10, with an upward tendency.

THE EARTHQUAKE IN IRELAND.

Subjoined are fuller particulars of this extraordinary phenomenon. The Cork Examiner says:—"About half-past one o'clock on Friday afternoon, a number of gentlemen were following the hounds on the lands of Newton, Clydaville, the residence of Captain Perry, and about three miles from Mallow, in the Ballylough direction, when they were startled by a dull hollow rumbling, resembling distant thunder, but perfectly distinct in volume and in the unmistakable subterranean character. While still speculating on this unusual sound, and in about a minute after it had ceased, the ground commenced to exhibit every trace of internal commotion, and the startled spectators in another instant had the singular fortune of feeling and witnessing that rarest of natural phenomena in this country—an earthquake. Accounts vary as to the character of the appearance. From one gentleman it has been learned that the shock was continuous for half a minute, and consisted of a slight but perfectly palpable vibration, which would apparently indicate the vertical direction of disturbance. Another gentleman present describes it as a gentle-undulating movement, intermittent, but lasting for half a minute. The earth-ways passed from east to west, and immediately after its cessation some claps of thunder broke overhead. The circumstance has awakened considerable interest in this locality.

The Irish Times has the following letter from Mallow, dated October 24, evening:—"Yesterday unusual incidents occurred simultaneously, but at different places, near the town of Mallow. At about one o'clock several gentlemen of this town were hunting on foot with a pack of beagles belonging to William Bourne, Esq. They were in pursuit of a hare, and were running at a quick rate on the lands of Newtown, within three miles of the town. Mr. Bourne noticed that the ground was shaking violently under his feet, and the other gentlemen who were with him also remarked that there was a great heaving of the ground. Thunder at this time pealed over their heads. About the very

same time, Captain Perry and Mrs. Perry, who lived at Clydaville, within one mile of the town of Mallow, were talking in their parlour, and they were alarmed at hearing under their feet a low, rumbling noise. Presently they perceived the walls of the room stirring, several articles in the room fell down. Their children, who were playing in the garden, ran in, and told Captain Perry that the garden was shaking."

The Mallow correspondent of the "Cork Herald," writing on Saturday night, says:—"I have already informed you by telegram of the shocks of an earthquake which were felt on Friday in this neighbourhood and the town of Kanturk, and I have now gathered full particulars of the remarkable occurrence. I had a conversation this evening with one of the men from the neighbourhood of Kanturk who had felt the shock. He is a very intelligent young man, named Daniel Murphy, and he describes it as follows:—"Murphy and nine others were digging potatoes on the lands of Killeenah, about two miles from the town of Kanturk. About 1 o'clock, the rain having ceased, they resumed work, having stopped in consequence of the wetness of the day. They were at work for a short-time when three or four of the men spoke out together, and inquired if the other had felt the greatshaking of the ground. Murphy felt it, and says that the ground shook violently under him, and that he saw it going up and down. The men were surprised, and suggested many explanations, and one said that it must be a bog about two miles distant from them which must have begun to move, and that the ground they were on was following it; for it appears that some violent convulsion within the same bog, about 30 years ago, caused it to advance, and spread itself over the adjoining lands. The shock was felt near Ballylough, within four miles of Mallow, and was accompanied by loud peals of thunder. It was distinctly perceived by Mr. Bourne, and several other gentlemen, who were with him hunting with his beagles."

Another account says that the shock was felt in different parts of the tract of country stretching from Mallow towards Kanturk, and that the same idea of a volcanic agency seized all those who felt it there can be no doubt. The appearances of its approach seemed to be similar to those usually taken as forewarners in more serious eruptions, as, for instance, darkness of the sky, peculiar tremulousness of the air, succeeded by the long, low rumbling sound in the earth, described by some as resembling the sound of a train over a shaly bog, and by others as not unlike the hiss of a threshing machine. The only visible feature of the occurrence of the supposed earthquake was the shaking of the walls of the houses as if they would fall, the creaking of furniture, and the noise of jingling crockery. The shock lasted for some minutes, and by the indefinite distance of the sound seemed to be the result of some far off convulsion, although loud enough to denote its strength. Several persons in the neighborhood of Mallow have given us the above account of the shock. Captain Perry, of Clyda, some miles from Mallow, was seated about half-past one o'clock on Friday in his parlour, with Mrs. Perry his wife, when he heard a noise such as described, and immediately the walls seemed to shake as if they would come down, and the furniture in the room was knocked about in the greatest confusion. At the same time two of the children ran in from the garden, where they had been playing, and reported that they heard a similar sound, accompanied with a visible heaving of the ground. Much about the same hour Mr. Bourne, of Mallow, who had been out hunting at Droum-downey, experienced a similar shock with similar appearances, as did also his servant. A man thatching a house in the neighborhood of Captain Perry's has reported a like occurrence.

Sir W. R. Wilde writes to the Freeman as follows:

"In confirmation of the account given in to-day's 'Freeman' of a shock of earthquake having been felt in the vicinity of Mallow on Friday last, the 23rd inst., I think it may be of interest to record the following facts:

"I was at Mojura, near Cong, on the banks of Lough Corrib, in the county of Mayo, during the past week. The weather had been most severe and tempestuous, but there were occasional hours of bright sunshine and great heat.

"About nine o'clock on Friday morning I observed the following phenomena:

"The lake assumed an intense purple colour, flecked after a few minutes with patches of white, as the waves, with scarcely any wind, rose upon its surface. The sky became one dense slate-coloured mass of cloud that traversed from west to east, between which and the water appeared a broad belt of light, through which poured in detached slanting masses columns of heavy rain.

"Going out of doors to view this state of things more accurately, my attention was immediately attracted by a loud, rumbling, ground noise, as if several carriages were rolling down the avenue, which caused me to turn a

corner to see who was coming. Not perceiving any animal, I remarked upon the circumstance to the bystanders. Some said they thought it was thunder; but one old workman remarked, 'if it was thunder it was in underground.' The direction of the noise, which evidently came from a distance, and grew louder as it passed under my feet, was nearly from north to south, but I was not conscious of any movement in the earth."

THE RIOT AT NEW ORLEANS.

FRAYLE MUERTO.

Nov. 30, 1868.

Having just read your weekly issue of 25th November, I beg to add my testimony to the truth of what your correspondent W.R.S. states, in regard to the proposed railway to Rio Cuarto. Being a Frayle Muerto settler, I am, no doubt, an interested party, but wish, nevertheless, to give my opinion that the subject may be the more ventilated.

It was my fate several years ago to pass from Villa Nueva to Rio Cuarto on horseback, in the month of August, and the prospect that met my view two leagues south of the Villa could be better imagined in some Arctie region than in the fertile Pampas of South America. It was a great sandy desert as far as the eye could reach, without a blade of grass; its only inhabitants myriads of 'bisachos,' and its only vegetation the deadly 'chuzchub.'

I remember how, after a weary day's ride, when we arrived at a solitary estancia and got permission to pass the night there. We had to walk a full mile from the house to get a few scanty blades of grass for our unfortunate horses.

The following year, at the estancia of the Totoral, the entire stock of horses, cattle, and sheep died off. The soil in these districts is impregnated with salt; the dry beds of the lagunas are white with the same deposit. The traveller is blinded with the fine sand which the wind is continually drifting about, opening up into large bills or 'medanos.' Why should the Mendoza trooper risk his life and his mule's by choosing the south or Saladillo road, but that he knows that the Villa Nueva road, though secure from Indians, has other dangers which he fears still more, namely, the inevitable death of his animals from scarcity of pasture and abundance of 'chuzchub.'

So much for the country through which the line from Villa Nueva will pass. Regarding the other from Los Leones, it will pass up the valley of the Saladillo and Rio Cuarto, the most fertile part of this province abounding in fresh waters and pastures of trefoil. The richness of the Saucos camps is proverbial, and the 'resses' from that district are the only fat animals killed in Frayle Muerto and Villa Nueva during the winter months. So well known, indeed, are the comparative merits of the Villa Nueva and Saladillo lands, that even the supporters of the Villa Nueva line admit that in this respect the Saladillo line is preferable. It must also be remembered that the latter would make the distance between Rio Cuarto and Rosario, twenty miles shorter than the other, while all that can be urged in favor of the former is that it will bring the Rio Cuarto traffic over a larger part of the Central Argentine line. However desirable an object this may be, a Government which has to care for the general good of the whole country, will not, in order to foster the Central Argentine Railway Company, make such sacrifices as I have alluded to.

Let us hope that an enlightened Government will take an impartial view of the matter and fix upon the route which will provide the shortest means of communication between Rosario and the Cuyo provinces, and open up for colonisation a fertile region once covered with herds of cattle, but now he haunt only of the Indian and the Gaucho.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

No better proof could be given of the favorable impression produced in England, by the announcement that Sr. Sarmiento had been elected President of this Republic, than the fact that the news sent up the Argentine Bonds in the London market. The London and River Plate Bank shares rose £1, no doubt partly owing to the same cause.

We are informed that our worthy Governor Sr. Castro intends forming two new bands of music for the special purpose of playing in our public squares on Sundays and week days.

The National Government has ordered the sale by auction of the two war steamers, 'Chacabuco and Libertad,' with the view of 'purchasing' newer and more useful vessels, most likely some ironclads, so as to put the Argentine navy on a becoming footing. The above steamers are now lying in the Lujan river, near the Tigre, and their sale, which is entrusted to Du. Florencio Madero, is to take place on Sunday, the 20th inst.

The Italian emigration into this Republic is steadily increasing every year. From 5,000, which a few years back was the average yearly number of immigrants from 'La bella Italia,' they reached 14,000 in 1868, and 16,000 in 1867. In the current year their number promises to be much higher.

Since Dr. Avellaneda took charge of the Department of Education, Worship, and Justice, the great activity displayed by him is worthy of all praise, and has already produced most excellent fruits. The various branches of the Administration under his immediate control have received great impulse, and none more than that of Education. One of his earliest measures was to issue a circular, urging upon the various Governors of those Provinces, where as yet no National College existed, to proceed without delay to supply so great a want, and placing at the same time at their disposal the sums voted by Congress for this purpose. He also expressed a hope that the Provincial Governments would contribute to the more effectual realization of this measure, by granting a piece of ground, and raising upon it the necessary building. In the case of Santa Fé, it was recommended that the National College should be located in Rosario, and Sr. Trionfo, the Provisional Governor of that Province, has sent a most satisfactory reply, stating that although the Government possesses no building in Rosario adapted to the proposed end, it is ready to contribute handsomely to the sum required for the purchase of one, and adds that several residents of that town have spontaneously come forward and offered their co-operation towards the construction of the building.

The Estrella arrived yesterday at the Tigre from San Pedro, with seventeen passengers and leaves again this morning for Rosario. We regret to see that the opposition to this steamer is still carried on with unabated fury. We are at a loss to comprehend the motives for it, since the traffic is of sufficient magnitude to give occupation to all. At any rate the popularity of Captain Davis who by his extreme affability has so materially contributed to render his boat the Estrella a decided favorite with our travelling public, is so deeply rooted that he need feel no great uneasiness and we are glad to notice that he continues to enjoy a very flattering preference.

A good deal of attention is being given to the subject of the cultivation on a large scale of the mulberry, for the purpose of raising silk worms. A Mr. Zuveria has been carrying on some experiments in Belgrano, and receives a subvention of 3000 dollars per month from Government. He has lately introduced from Europe machinery for the elaboration of silk cocoons which he intends setting up in Belgrano. Our colleague the "Nazione Italiana" has published a proposal from two Italians to make a large mulberry plantation in twenty squares of ground if the government will give them the land with a house for ten years, and a monthly subvention of 10,000 dollars for the first year—the proprietorship of all the trees falling to the Government at the expiration of the ten years.

The total silence and apparent inaction of the commission appointed to collect contributions to a relief fund for the sufferers by the Peruvian earthquake—is creating much comment. In England we are happy to see that large sums have been subscribed for the same purpose and they are being remitted to their destination as soon as received.

We are able to contradict a report circulated in Montevideo and copied by our contemporaries here, that Dr. Don Rufino de Elizalde had gone on a visit to the sister city. The report has originated in the fact of the arrival there of Dr. Elizalde's secretary which led people to jump at the conclusion that the ex-Minister of Foreign Affairs had arrived too.

Besides the fetes at Belgrano and Lujan on the 8th inst., Quilmes also is going to hold public rejoicings in celebration of that day. The most attractive item in the program of the fetes being a grand popular banquet.

The 'Cassini,' did not leave on Thursday as announced, but will sail without rail this afternoon.

The 'Pacific,' that sailed from Valparaiso on the 14th of September, and touched at Montevideo on the 25th of the same month, arrived in the Mersey on the 30th of October. She was delayed two days off Belleisle, being unable through stress of weather to enter the port of St. Nazaire. She was also delayed in the Channel by severe gales. She was to sail again from Liverpool for Valparaiso, on the 13th ult. and may be looked for in Montevideo, on the 10th or 11th inst.

The following extract from a letter dated Chascomus 29th November, informs us of another camp murder. I was called very early on Monday last, to attend in the Tigre camp an Irishman, named Pat Cormack, who was stabbed. The Doctor and myself went together but the poor fellow was dead before we arrived. He was buried in Chascomus on the same day.

The next Liverpool mail steamer will be the Hipparchus, Captain Carroll. She may be expected in Montevideo on the 18th inst., bringing news up to the 20th November. The Copernicus will come in about the same time. The consignees, Messrs John P. Boyd and Co., inform us the Hipparchus will load for Liverpool, for which port more than half her cargo is engaged. The Copernicus will probably load for Antwerp.

The "Tribuna" of yesterday mentions the startling fact that the Corrientes purveyors for the Brazilian Hospitals introduced, in three months, for the consumption of the hospitals, 73,000 fanegas of salt, 9,000 barrels of flour, and several thousand boxes of tea. As all articles for hospital consumption are free of duty, it is not unreasonable to suppose that the purveyors are made the means for carrying on contraband trade on a large scale. It does not of course follow that the purveyors themselves do it, or even connive at it, but still it may be done in their name without their knowing anything about it.

The remedy proposed by the "Tribuna" in order to put a stop to this abuse, is to declare free from all custom duties all articles landed in Paraguayan territory, leaving the duties on goods introduced into Argentine territory. Corrientes included, to be charged indiscriminately on all purveyors not excepted.

With regard to the Chacabuco robbery we were not correct in stating that all the goods abstracted had been recovered. Only a portion of those stolen from Messrs. Darcieux Grault and Co., were found in the store near the Plaza 11 de Setiembre. All the effects taken from Messrs. Cohen and Joseph, and a good portion yet of those belonging to the first mentioned firm are still missing, though the police is on the scent which it is hoped will eventually lead to the discovery of a second depot of stolen goods.

Mr. Cox who has lately arrived in this country, proposes to get up a Gymnasium in connection with a gentleman many years a resident here. He has obtained possession of extensive premises, which with certain alterations, in course of being carried out, are well adapted to the purpose in view. Mr. Cox comes from Paris, where he had the management of the Grand Gymnasium Therevin. Champs Elysees, during the Great Exhibition of 1867, and ought therefore to be thoroughly qualified to organize here, on European style, an establishment the want of which is greatly felt. We are glad to hear that he already counts with numerous support among the British residents in this city, and trust his efforts will meet with every success.

We have received for publication an appeal to the Swiss Nation in general, and in particular to the Swiss abroad, in behalf of the sufferers by the great inundations in various Cantons, more specially in those of St. Gall, Grisons, Ticino, Valais and Uri. We shall be happy to give insertion to it in to-morrow's issue. To-morrow a number of Spaniards accompanied by the band of the Sociedad Aurora have arranged a pleasure trip to San Fernando to celebrate the success of the Spanish Revolution.

The America leaves this afternoon for Montevideo. We understand that several people go down in her for the sole purpose of being present at the bull-fight to-morrow in the sister city. It has been erroneously stated that this far famed toreros company would pay a visit to Buenos Ayres. There is a law in vigor here prohibiting bull fights although cock fighting is a legal amusement. The above law strange to say was passed in Rosas' time.

WE CLIP THE FOLLOWING FROM ONE OF OUR EXCHANGES: "Every hundred years.—The first earthquake on record in Peru occurred in the year 1563. "A century after, on the 23rd of April, 1663, at half past 6 a.m. Arica and the towns within its jurisdiction were destroyed by an earthquake which extended its ravages to Arequipa. "The year 1763 passed off without any unusual phenomenon; but the great earthquake of the 19th ultimo, at a distance of two centuries from the last mentioned, may very well count for two. "It is not a little remarkable that these stupendous convulsions of nature should each have occurred in the 68th year of three different centuries."

There was a slight reaction in the bond market to-day. Bonds opened and closed weak. For cash there were no sales, but for the end of the month and for January the sales amounted to 216,000. The rate for the end of the month closed at 49 1/2. In the liquidation room prices ruled a shade firmer, but the bears are working hard to drive the market down, and offering bonds on time and for cash. Money rules so cheap and abundant, it is not probable prices will recede much; on the contrary, there are more probabilities of an improvement before the end of the year.

The news by the City of Brussels respecting Argentine securities is very favorable; it would seem that the election of President Sarmiento has inspired capitalists with fresh confidence. Argentine stock has gone up to 78 1/2, ditto scrip 4 1/2 to 5 premium. River Plate Bank Shares have gone up to £1 per share; Great Southern Railway are also firm and with an upward tendency; and the River Plate Telegraph Company has declared a 20 cent per annum dividend. Upon the whole, River Plate securities are beginning to look better abroad, and the English press speaks in the most complimentary terms of the new magistrature of the Argentine Republic.

The latest advices received respecting tallow are not so favorable a nature, contracts to deliver having been made at 47. The Liverpool steamer Halley arrived in Montevideo to-day. Her dates from England are to the 2nd inst., the same as the City of Brussels. Mr. Wm. Hollands, the manager of Messrs. Lampont and Holt's in Liverpool, we understand comes in her. We salute this gentleman on his arrival in the Plate: he represents a firm which has done much to further the trade and commerce of this place. The Astronomical, or Lampont and Holt's line of steamers is well and favourably known here, and the quickness and punctuality with which these steamers make their trips has secured for them the patronage of our commercial community. II.—In strengthening and adding lustre to the Wool. III.—In Washing Sheep shortly before Clipping, leaving the Fleeces in a pure state.

IV.—In Dipping Lambs, even whilst suckling ewes, as they cannot be injured by the Material. V.—In Dipping Rams at any Time of the Year, without danger of producing the excoriations which always follow the use of other Dips, especially in the Autumn Season.

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
