Where, then, is the enormous relative decrease? From what source did the writer of the article receive his inspiration? Facts are stubborn things. Let me proceed to further elucidate the figures, and it will be seen that England has gone far ahead of her competitors in exports to this country.

We all know that the consumption of German manufactures has increased—why, then, is there a decrease in the official returns? Simply because the greater part of her exports are sent by way of France, and rank in the B. Ayran Custom House as French goods.

Again, the above figures merely show the amount of goods despatched in the Custom House of Buenos Ayres, without reference to those despatched in the other Custom Houses of the Confederation. The writer of the article very significantly concedes, what is patent to everybody, that British manufactures are paramount in the provinces, and of far greater importance than those of any other nation.

Unfortunately, we are not in possession of data to show the relative importance of it; but any of the native houses, such as Alcorta, Ocampo, Mendez, or Yurraque can testify to the immense preponderance of English manufactures. The construction of railroads through the Provinces, will, undoubtedly, divert the trade from Valparaiso to Buenos Ayres, but no matter how they go there, the goods will still be English.

A slight glance at the class of articles exported to this country will convince any disinterested person that in this also England has the advantage, and that the imports from there are of greater intrinsic importance than those from any other nation.

The style of reasoning in the article is sometimes very amusing; witness such a paragraph as this: "The old emigrants from the United Kingdom, who were principally Irish are dying off, and are being replaced by a new generation much more Native than Hibernian. Upon these, as well as upon the rest of the native population, the contact of Italian and French immigration will confer a taste for the newly developed continental manufactures, both cotton goods and hardware."

Does the writer imagine that after having made the Chiripa and Poncho, Recado and botas de Potro things of the past, the natives will calmly adopt the costumes and customs of the Barchinas of Genoa, or of the Lazzaroni of Naples, the bonnet of the Basque, or the Chaqueta of the Gallego, and the Editors of the "Standard" do little favor to the sons of their countrymen by admitting the likelihood of their becoming Fruttsellers, organ grinders or serenades.

The state of the exchange office appears to be most satisfactory, the specie reserve amounts to upwards of five millions of patacones. It is suggested that the heads of our several banking firms might take into consideration the clearing house system of passing cheques current, the benefits from this practice are well known both to bankers and customers, and with a little assistance would soon be adopted.

examine his own statement, he will see that in 1866-67, the increase, even in imports, is in a higher ratio, 2 per cent from France. The exports to Great Britain have 'decreased' about 18 per cent in the years 1866-67, whilst those to France have 'increased' more than 50 per cent! and those to Belgium 30 per cent. If he chooses to take, as he has done, a period of years, he will find, from 1862 to 1866, the annual average increase of exports and imports combined, that is to say, of the course of trade, was 32 1/2 per cent for England, and 35 1/2 per cent for France. We are of opinion that the ratio would be very much more in favor of France. As for the Venetian 'Magnifico's' tirade about the superiority of the English to the French goods and Mr. Ocampo, Mr. Alcorta, &c., all that is beside the question.

There has been an unaccountable stagnation in the import trade; there is a relative decrease in the course of trade between this country and Great Britain. The first fact the 'Magnifico' probably knew before; the second he now knows evidently for the first time, or he would not have exhibited so complete a misapprehension of the whole subject. We, however, thank him for his attempt to rectify any exaggerated inferences that may have appeared in our columns.

The usual toasts, from the queen to the 'Laird,' were drunk with unbounded enthusiasm. The second day was a repetition of the first: races, sports of all kinds, and a sumptuous fare, when, at a late hour, the last toast was given,—happy to meet, sorry to part, and happy to meet again.
