The failure is announced of Messrs. Morgan, Melbourne, & Co., merchants, with liabilities estimated at about £500,000. The firm, which has occupied a very respectable position, was established about half a century ago in Batavia, but the branch establishment here has not been in existence more than three or four years.

The pretended "Sir Roger," who arrived from Australia claiming to be the long-lost heir, has left England, not intending, it is thought, to reappear. It is said that a brother of his has revealed the plot, but however this may be, the representatives of Sir Alfred Tichborne, the infant holder of the title, have resolved to prosecute the pretender and his friends for conspiracy should they show themselves in England.

The disastrous history of Overend, Gurney, and Co. has advanced one step more. Saturday's proceedings at the Mansion House communicated to the impoverished shareholders the disheartening intimation that a further and immediate call of £5 per share is necessary, and yesterday, in explanation of this unexpected step, a statement was put forth by the liquidators.

The shares in this notorious concern were originally of £50 each, upon which £15 was paid during the brief duration—about nine months—of the limited company. Since it passed into liquidation two calls of £10 each have been levied, making £35 paid, and leaving £15 still to be met, of which £5 is now required. Thus £40 out of the original total of £50 may be regarded as already engulfed.

A paper published in the London "Spectator" and "Times" on the Paraguanians as a distinct South American race, has caused immense attention in England. We extract the following: "Whatever their Guarani ancestors may have been, the Paraguanians of the present day are not 'dark-skinned men' fighting at the bidding of a white man. Explain it who may, they are probably the fairest in complexion of all the present races of South America (for the English, Dutch, and French colony cannot be considered as such), whilst their now sole opponents, the Brazilians, are the darkest.

The late Charles Mansfield, whose matchless powers of observation enabled him to be the first to divine the capabilities of this wonderful little people, dwells in his 'Paraguay' repeatedly on this fact. On the first boat's crew which came to fetch him over the Parana from Itapiru he writes—'The men were utterly unlike the rest of the South Americans that I have seen; there were seven of them, and I should have supposed they had all been picked men from England or Italy, some of them quite fair, none of them with any signs of Indian blood.' Elsewhere he says—'The most curious thing about the people in this country, where undoubtedly the fusion of the Spanish and Indian blood was complete, where all the Conquistadores took Guarani wives, and where, too, there seems to have been less opportunity for mixture with the fair-haired European races, is that among high and low there is less appearance of Indian blood, and more resemblance to English complexion, than in any part of South America I have seen.

In poor cottages in the country I have seen numerous children whom I should have supposed to be the offspring of some high-bred English family, with delicately-cut features, rather long than broad, and hair fair as any Saxon; among many of them I see reddish hair, quite Scotch. And again in another letter—'The curious thing is, the number of fair English and Scotch looking faces that one sees with fair and even red hair; you see none among the Spanish-speaking natives lower down the river.' And repeatedly in conversation with me he has reverted to the English look of the Paraguanians as a people. Indeed, so far as the Spanish type of feature and complexion yet lingers, it seems to be chiefly in the 'upper hundred,' whom Mr. Mansfield terms 'comparatively a miserable set, though good-natured,' whilst 'the peasantry are a noble
