ENGLAND.

From all parts of the country we hear the same record of loss of life and property from the terrible and destructive gales. Our report from Great Yarmouth states that a foreign bark went on the Scroby Sand on Saturday afternoon, and hoisted signals of distress. The lifeboat of the station was at once launched, and succeeded in bringing the crew ashore.

A fearful storm and flood have swept over the coast of Ireland. At Tramore, on Saturday night, the sea rose and destroyed part of the road. The next morning it did still greater damage, covering the reclaimed land, and destroying the lifeboat station. The farmhouses in the neighborhood are quite destroyed.

The Isle of Man has been flooded. At Ramsey the tide rushed over the quay into the marketplace. At Castle-town and Douglas there have been similar accidents.

The "Gazette" publishes the usual notice for the election of Dr. Wordsworth to the bishopric of Lincoln.

A notice from the Board of Trade states that the navigation of all rivers within the Republic of Peru is opened to merchant vessels of all nations.

The trial of the Bradford election petition ended yesterday, when Mr. Foster was declared to be duly elected.

The grand jury at the Central Criminal Court has found a true bill against all the defendants in the Overend Gurney case.

A statement which appears in one of the morning papers says "that on the reassembling of Parliament, Lord Westbury will take a prominent position in the House of Lords as the legal leader of the High Church party."

A penny Conservative weekly newspaper, to be called the "Britannia," is to be published every Wednesday on and after Feb. 24.

The Russian Government has devised and begun to carry out a gigantic scheme in connection with the navigation of the Volga, by which it will be enabled, in the course of a very few years, to discharge a large army of picked troops, fresh and ready for battle, somewhere in the neighborhood of Balkh.

A correspondent writes—"On Friday last, at about 1.10 p.m., was felt a distinct shock of earthquake at Newton-le-Willows and neighborhood.

myself, sitting in a room, felt a movement, which at the same time was accompanied by a rattling of doors and windows, the rattling of bolts to French windows causing a very considerable rattle. This was succeeded by loud, though apparently distant, noise, like the bursting of a powder magazine, or other similar causes. In about ten minutes afterwards there set in a very heavy thunderstorm, which continued more than half an hour."

The West African mail steamer brought to Liverpool yesterday the crew and passengers of the barque Florence Nightingale, which was wrecked off the west coast of Africa on the 26th of Dec. Their sufferings appear to have been dreadful. Twenty persons were crowded into a small boat, and exposed for nine days to a tropical sun with only 20 lbs. of provisions, and no water. One of the seamen became insane, and was led by the captain, and his blood was greedily sucked up by his comrades, who were very quarrelsome and violent. They at last resolved to draw lots who should kill the man before he died. The lot fell upon a colored boy, who refused to act. Just then the captain caught a fish three pounds weight, which was eagerly devoured, and they soon afterwards reached land.

William Carleton, the Irish novelist, died on Saturday at his residence, in the suburb of Sandford, at the age of 75 years. He is the last of the class of writers who have devoted themselves specially to the illustration of Irish peasant life, and he was probably the most successful, having besides his natural ability peculiar advantages in his early associations. He was the son of a small farmer living at Clogher, in the county Tyrone, and he mingled in the scenes which he depicted with such touching pathos and graphic power. He has worked up some of the incidents of his own career in his 'Traits and Stories of the Irish Peasantry,' which first introduced him to the public as an author, and among the most striking characters in it are persons of a type familiarly known to him. He was educated for the priesthood under great difficulties, but changed his mind and his course in life, and coming to Dublin with £2 4s in his pocket, betook himself to literary pursuits. He became editor of the "Christian Examiner," which pious periodical was his first source of permanent employment, and contrasted rather strangely with the humorous tone of his works. He did not, however, very long remain in a position which was not quite in keeping with the character of his mind. He wrote a second series of 'Traits and Stories,' and a number of novels upon a larger scale. The most popular were 'Pardonough the Miser,' 'The Fawn of Springvale,' 'Valentine McClutchy,' 'The Irish Agent,' 'The Black Prophet,' and others of more modern production. His later works, commencing with the 'Agent,' were intended to depict some of the features of the Irish question, and had a political tendency different from that of his first writings. He was allowed a pension of £200 a year, and has left a numerous family utterly helpless, and dependent upon the hope of its continuance.

Five vacancies in the House of Commons have been declared, through the action of the new tribunals, for the trial of election petitions, viz., at Bewdley, Bradford, Norwich, Drogheda and Wexford. "London Morning Post" referring to the wholesale treating at public houses at Bradford, declares that more utterly shameful conditions of things was never disclosed in a court of Justice.

There was a rumor four or five days ago that the Count de Girgenti, the son-in-law of Queen Isabella, contemplated an expedition to Spain, no doubt with a view to a restoration. I heard there were no grounds for it at present, and it was subsequently contradicted by an official telegram from Madrid. The "Journal de Paris" now alludes to the subject, and professes to explain its origin as follows:—A Mexican officer, General Taboada, has been trying for some time past to enrol Spanish officers for an enterprise in Mexico to establish Monarchy. About 300 officers, it was supposed, would join the expedition with the consent of the Provisional Government of Madrid, and they have obtained leave of absence for two years. It was further stated that the funds placed at the disposal of Gen. Taboada amounted to \$20,000,000, and that there were in Mexico 1,600 men waiting only for the arrival of these officers to take up arms in favor of Girgenti, and place him on the throne as King of Mexico. The officers were to assemble at Gibraltar, where each would receive an advance of \$200. Santa Anna was said to be the promoter of the enterprise. "We need not add," observes the "Journal de Paris," "that we publish these details with much reserve, and only to lay before our readers what is said in the 'Journal du Havre' gives the following account of the fatal accident to the steamer Periere:—

"This vessel, which left Havre on the 15th for New York, with 83 passengers, put back the day before

yesterday afternoon with a fearful catastrophe in the mid-Atlantic. On the 20th, four days after touching at Brest, and in 40 deg. W. long., a violent tempest sprang up; on the following day the storm had increased to a hurricane, when about 2 in the afternoon an immense wave, formed of about 700 tons of water, fell like an avalanche on the deck, crushing in the roof of the second cabin, sweeping away the bulwarks and two boats suspended from their davits, and breaking down the bridge, which fell on the deck with the officers' watch-house. The immense mass of water then penetrated into the interior of the vessel and inundated the cabins and engine-room, extinguishing twenty-four out of thirty-six furnaces. In a moment Captain Duchesne, who had gone below to put on some dry clothing, was on deck, and had the vessel put about, which manoeuvre at once afforded relief to the steamer. But a most fearful spectacle presented itself, several killed and wounded, passengers and crew lying in the midst of the wreck; four persons were found dead, and 21 more or less seriously injured. On calling over the names Leizour, a seaman, and Cabague, a waiter, were found to be missing, having been swept overboard. The other deceased were:—Jouan, a seaman, killed by the fall of the main yard; and three passengers—Mr. O'Callaghan, a Lazarist priest, crushed to death; M. Foulquier, died from congestion of the brain; and Mlle. Finckelberg, a young German lady, aged 18, whose back was broken by the mass of water falling on her. The captain, finding that he could no longer continue the voyage in safety with the fore-deck open and exposed to a fresh disaster, at once decided on putting back, and reached Havre at about the time the vessel should have arrived at her destination at New York. On re-entering the French port, the injured passengers, one only of whom, another Lazarist priest, is in a dangerous state, were removed into the town, while the others, the mails, and the cargo were transferred to the St. Laurent. The passengers, before quitting the Periere, drew up and signed a testimonial bearing witness to the solid qualities of the vessel, and the coolness and intrepidity of the captain under such trying circumstances."

THE WAR IN THE NORTH.

Corrientes, March 4, 1869. The longer I remain here, the more apparent it becomes to me how difficult it will be for Dr. Guastavino to put his Administration into order in the midst of the general corruption of parties and inevitable abuses in every thing relating to the public service. Habit and private interests on one side and on the other an inept and young government, that coming from the bar seeks to apply to the administration of public affairs the forensic system with the rectitude and severity of a judge, render abortive its best intentions, thus throwing away the best opportunity and the most favorable time for the reorganization of the province. Dr Guastavino disagrees with every body and everything, and cannot bring the Legislature together. The Municipality, for every step forward, takes two backwards.

The organization of the National Guard is causing much discontent, and is full of danger. The Government wishes the enrolment to be carried out to the letter of the law, but people here are accustomed to see the dominant party enjoy privileges and exemptions. One of Dr Guastavino's propositions respecting education was cordially received at the first sitting. Statutes were enacted, &c.; but now, scarcely 10 individuals can be got together to consider the subject, although the projects of the National Government respecting Colleges in the Provinces are in every way in accordance, and render urgent the necessity of devising some means for carrying them out.

If any financial project is proposed, or tax levied, and under its provision, a herd of cattle be confiscated, the people are alarmed, the press shrieks, and everybody cries out that the Government wishes to confiscate property,—that such a law has not been published; and that Don Varito himself would not dare to enforce it.

The 'Aviropa,' a little paper established by the Missionary Fathers, has a caricature of Dr Guastavino mounting an ass carrying two baskets: out of each appears a bull's head, and a flag with the word "Confiscation" inscribed on it. If the truth must be told, the cut is as like Dr Guastavino as an egg is to a chestnut.

The ambition of those aspiring to become National Deputies increases the difficulty of the situation, through their canvassing throughout the province, exciting the people, and trying to secure or nullify the influence of the Government according as it suits their purpose. Under these circumstances, Dr Guastavino has named Dr D. J. J. Camelinio Minister of Finance, and a young man whom he brought with him from Buenos Ayres, Dr D. José V. Fernandez Attorney General. I know neither of these gentlemen, but I know that the Correntinos regard them both as stained with 'original sin.'

This stain is common to all not born here. Even the press has said that Dr Camelinio is an excellent subject, honorable, distinguished, &c.; but he is not a Correntino. I have said enough to show to what a degree of civilisation these unfortunate people have attained, and the amount of respect they pay the Constitution, which says— Art. 10. All citizens are equal in the eyes of the law, and eligible for public offices, requiring no qualification but that of capacity,—but this article is a dead letter in Corrientes.

THE EXHIBITION. Yesterday, the committee for this province was named, and elected as its President Don Cecilio Echavarría. There is some hope of these gentlemen doing something, especially Sr. Echavarría, who is an enthusiastic respecting Exhibitions. In my next letter I will refer to this subject, which merits the attention of every Argentine.

I can at present only give you this news, that the Central Committee are shabby enough as regards the distribution of their bulletins. How is it that in Buenos Ayres nothing is understood about the provinces? The most intelligent men when shut up in the Argentine metropolis become dull-heads.

PARAGUAY. The news is still the same—viz., that the Argentine army has moved from Truidad, as I said in my last. I must inform you of what I have just heard, although it comes from Brazil, since, and is therefore unreliable. It is said that Lopez' mother has hanged herself. The unfortunate woman had been rash enough to advise her son to give up the war, and leave the country, seeing that he had no resources, and fate was against him: The braque reception she met with induced her to expect punishment,

THE FALKLAND ISLANDS. The Falkland Islands, a British settlement hitherto deemed both undesirable and hopeless, are rising in importance. The stream of immigration flows largely towards South America just now, and of course the irrepresible Briton forms a considerable portion of it. To protect English interests, the Falkland Islands are of some consequence. Many sheep-farmers from Australia and New

which the poor mother forestalled through suicide. If this be true, how frightful the episodes of this war! Merchants in Corrientes complain that the contraband trade of Montevideo is ruining them. It was present yesterday at a warm discussion on this point; and I think the press intend calling the attention of the National Government to the matter.—'Republica.'

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Provincial Government has granted to Messrs Zuviría & Gentile a monthly grant of three thousand dollars, to assist them in establishing and working a silk thread manufactory. This industry is a very important one, capable of obtaining here a great development, and we trust that the new firm will succeed.

We read in a Parana paper the following horrible occurrence:—The infant child of a lady in this city has been for some time alarmingly and dangerously ill, no efforts on the part of the doctor having any effect on the child's health. Last week the mother, while turning the mattress of her bed discovered a large snake, which it is supposed, during her sleep, had been robbing her of the sustenance intended by nature for her child. The infant is since much better.

Notwithstanding that the vasa contractor was fined heavily last month for neglect of duty, we daily hear complaints as to the state of the markets, and the late and uncertain hours at which the carts go their rounds in some quarters of the city. This probably arises from trying to do the work with an insufficient staff; if so, the contractor should for his own sake, and that of the public health, at once put his establishment on a proper footing, or be made to do so.

Some time ago the Provincial Bank issued a notice cautioning the public against taking from other parties their notes of a certain date and amount without duly examining them, as false ones were in circulation, at the same time stating that the forged notes were badly done and could easily be detected. It now appears that there are \$1,000 notes of the last issue in circulation, so well imitated that detection at first sight is impossible. Three of the notes were passed into the Bank itself, and only after minute examination were found to be forged. Let the public then be on their guard; a false ten or twenty dollar note being passed to you occasionally is not of much consequence, but a 'stick' for \$1,000 m. is by no means desirable.

It will probably be considered in the light of good news by fast young men about town, that 'tableaux vivants' are soon to be added to our list of public amusements. We hear that an entertainment of this kind is about being got up by a private company. We dare say it will pay, but we cannot look on such places as either necessary or conducive to public morality.

The Municipality of Corrientes has resolved to call for tenders for the lighting of that town by kerosene. The measure is highly needed, and it is hoped will soon be realised.

Mr. Jones, the active promoter and manager of the Welsh Colony at Cluap, in Patagonia, brought up in his last trip a large collection of Patagonian produce, and among other things a kegs of butter made in the colony. Messrs. Barry and Walker, of Calle Defensa, have bought it all up for retailing in their stores. We have no doubt they will find a ready sale for it, as it is greatly superior to any butter imported from Europe, and even, in our estimation, surpasses the best Cork butter we have ever tasted, which is not saying little.

Stocks of Colonial wool are moderate. In London the delivery since last sales has been exceedingly brisk, and only about 10,000 bales remain in the warehouses undelivered. But there are besides about 15,000 bales old wool held over from previous sales, which have not been offered yet. Of River Plate the stocks in England and on the continent are likewise small. Dealers and manufacturers seem well but not excessively supplied. It has been one of the good services the great fall in autumn has rendered, viz., that it has really cleared the market, and thrown the wools direct into actual consumption.

Prospects: What can the trade expect from the new year? On the one hand—and that is the most certain prophecy—an increased production; increased not perhaps quite in the former ratio, but probably not far short of it; to be equalized either by lower prices, or by a proportionate improvement in business. Weighing the probabilities for either of these courses, the balance seems at present to incline towards the latter. The last year has left us a good legacy—small stocks of wool and cheap bread. The effects of the abundant harvest will probably be felt more in the present year than in the past; prices of wool stand on a sound basis, and manufacturers, though working at low rates, are yet well and profitably employed. Whether the export trade will receive a fresh impulse is doubtful, and in the case of the United States the probabilities are against it, but the general tendency is towards improvement; money is getting more employed, and with confidence gradually returning, it is not unlikely that enterprise and speculation will bring fresh life also into those channels. Of course complications on the political field may not at all nought the most moderate expectations, but barring this

Putting murderers and thieves in prison for the purpose of allowing them to escape in a day or two, is a scandalous outrage on the public, and cannot be tolerated much longer.

The 'paseo' to the islands of Carapachy on Sunday came off well. About one hundred passengers assembled on the deck of the little Oran, and thoroughly enjoyed their sail, returning to town by the four o'clock train.

Colonel Mansilla appears to be working indefatigably to ensure the permanent security of the frontier entrusted to his charge, south and south east of Cordoba. He has called for proposals for erecting barracks, galpones, &c., and is bent on showing the Indians that their day for plunder and murder is past. We congratulate the gallant Colonel on the success of his efforts up to the present; we have no doubt they will be equally so in the future.

Recent arrivals from twenty or thirty leagues beyond Tandil report the hills in that neighborhood as covered for some days past with snow. It is unusually early for snow to make its appearance even so far south. Sheepfarmers and estancieros (principally English and Scotch) report things as looking well, and everything going on favorably down there.

The National Government has given another proof of its go-aheadism, by the call for proposals to construct telegraph lines, which we publish in another column. The immense distance, miserable roads, and lazy postillions have ever been found a serious drawback in the administration of affairs. President Sarmiento rightly believes that in the telegraph he will secure the best ally to maintain peace and order throughout the country, and that the public moneys cannot be better employed than in bringing the various provincial capitals into immediate contact with the capital. So excellent a measure deserves the full support of the country; and we look forward with pleasure to the immediate carrying out of this most useful and most necessary scheme.

The Royal mail steamer Newton left yesterday, true to time. Considering the few hours she had in port, the heavy cargo she had to discharge and also take in, we can well afford to congratulate Messrs. Casares on this lighterage victory. Since the town of Buenos Ayres was built, there never was a European steamer discharged and loaded in such quick time; it only shows what can be done when we have the right sort of men in the right place.

Yesterday we received from a kind friend some splendid samples of Correntino woods, beautifully polished and got up. These woods are well worthy an inspection, and may be had in any quantities in the forests of Corrientes.

Respecting the afflicting news of Mr. Burton's death by drowning in the Pavon river, there is as yet nothing authentic, and we hope the rumor is without foundation. Mr. Burton was engaged in putting up the telegraph wires to Rosario, which line is now all but finished. The office here will be next the Mauá Bank.

The Argentine Government or rather people, have just come in for a windfall in the way of a curiosity (every thing connected with Lopez is a curiosity) seized in their own Custom House as lawful prize of war. It consists of a magnificent set of furniture destined for Lopez' palace, the greater part of it for the private apartments of Madame Lynch. The style is that known as Louis XV every piece being gilt in the most gorgeous manner, and covered in red damask, there are also six magnificent cornices with their corresponding curtains, and a chandelier of surpassing workmanship.
