



The various attempts made at different points and at different periods to explore them have not, except in some exceptional cases, given the results that might have been expected; but this has been due more to extraneous and contingent circumstances than to any inherent miscalculation as to the soundness of the speculation.

The commission entrusted to Major Rickard, to examine the principal mining districts of the Argentine Republic, and embody in a report all the information he could gather about them, will have the most beneficial and important results, and will no doubt animate foreign and native capitalists to foster an industry that is likely to contribute so powerfully to the progress of the country.

One of the great drawbacks that has hitherto made mining speculation a subject to be taboued rather than encouraged, has been the disturbed state of the interior provinces, and above all Zue insecurity on the roads and ways communication. Since. however, the accession of Sr. Sarmiento to the Presidential ehair, bis Government has spared no effort to remedy this evil, and even in the short time that has niapsed, a great improvement is to be noted, which will, no doubt, be progressive, until the risk of going places seven feet of water; the station from Rosario to Rioja will not be greater than that to be met with in travelling between London and Caith.

This steamer was the Alice, with the Royal pennant at the main. She ran up first towards the Pozos, and finally anchored within a few squares of the Pier.
