The class of immigration coming to this country, has, strange to say, proved more adapted for pastoral than agricultural farming. We require in the Plata thorough practical farmers, men who have been reared to the plough, and who have lived by it; young men who have been trained to the desk may possibly make shepherds, but they rarely make what can be termed farmers, and it is every way desirable that it should be known in Europe, that agricultural labor to any extent is what is required here, and that to the proper parties the estanciaeros to a man are willing to give farms of land, with house, seed, and farming implements, as an equivalent for the labor.

Few people in Buenos Ayres can realize the stupendous losses suffered in many parts of the Plata owing to the recent floods. One portion of the Province of Entre Rios may be said to be completely under water. The river Parana suddenly on Sunday night and completely covered all the camps and the vicinity of Gualeguay. The immense estancias of Santa Cruz, which stretch from the Parana into the interior, and a portion of which formerly belonged to the Britten family, are now one wide waste of waters; cut off by the arroyo of Gualeguay, the cattle found it almost impossible to escape, and several thousand head have perished. Over the unfortunate Gualeguay railway there are in many places seven feet of water; the station house, Port Captain's quarters, hotel, and workshops are completely immersed. Happily the population fled in time, and with the exception of the few people at the saladero, Port Ruiz was quite deserted. The loss and ruin at the saladero is something unprecedented; an immense pile of salt, 6,500 fanegas, was washed into the river in a few minutes. Several large flocks of swine belonging to the establishment were drowned, and the night, and such was the roaring of the pigs that it could be heard in the town of Gualeguay. The saladero is situated on the high banks of the river, yet the waters rose and burst up the floors.
