THE NEW PORT FOR BUENOS AYRES.

It is a lasting stigma on the Argentine character that for so many hundred years the important city of Buenos Ayres has been without the slightest semblance of a port.

Paved with wrecks, bisected with sandbanks, and snagged up with sunken anchors, the wretched roadstead of Buenos Ayres has become the terror of the mariner; foreign insurance companies, whose risks extend over the globe, have marked with a red cross the Outer Roads of Buenos Ayres.

With no ordinary attention, therefore, does the public of this neglected city read the new contract entered into by the Argentine Government with Mr. Edward Madero for the construction of a port or harbor of safety which will meet the wants and requirements of the shipping interests of Buenos Ayres.

a dock, speaks for the lethargic state of the Argentine mind, and betrays a lack of enterprise which augurs badly for the future of the Argentine people. Could we here enumerate all the woes and sorrows which beset the shipping interests of Buenos Ayres we might indeed fill columns of our paper. Suffice it to say, that such is the wretched state of our roadstead, that it costs as much to land a bale of goods from the outer roads as it does to bring the goods from Europe to the Plate.

In view of all this it is with undisguised pleasure we perceive the Argentine Government has at last made an effort to remedy the evil. The contract with Mr. Edward Madero, which we publish at foot, will, when carried out, supply Buenos Ayres with docks for its shipping. That the scheme is vast, comprehensive, and expensive, none can doubt, but happily, it is in good hands, and we have the fullest confidence will be ultimately carried out.

Buenos Ayres April 8, 1869. Considering that the Executive is authorized by the law of September 7, 1868, to spend the sum of \$1,500,000 in the construction of a custom-house, and that the law of the 14th October, 1868, authorizes the construction of a harbor in Buenos Ayres, the President of the Republic resolves to accept the proposal made by Mr. Edward Madero for the construction of these works.

SARMIENTO. DALMACIO VELEZ SANSFIELD. CONTRACT. His Excellency the Minister of the Interior of the Argentine Republic, Dr. Don Dalmacio Velez Sansfield, with the authorization conferred by the laws of Congress, of September 7, 1869, and October 14, 1868, on the one side, and Mr. Eduardo Madero by himself, and in the name of a limited company, on the other side, have agreed:—

Art. 1. Mr. Madero for himself, and in the name of those whom he represents, binds himself to construct the works described in plans Nos. 1 and 2, signed by the hydraulic engineers R. B. Bell and D. Miller, which are deposited in the office of the Home Department of the Republic, and to construct them as detailed in the report that these engineers addressed on the 8th February, 1869 to Mr. Madero, Prudhoff & Co., the original being also deposited in the Home Office.

Art. 12. The Government of the Republic reserves to itself the right to purchase the works—docks, dock-basin, and warehouses—paying 30 per cent. advance on the amount of capital employed.

Art. 13. The Company shall have a local Board in the Argentine Republic with full power to transact business with the National Government.

Art. 14. All questions that may arise between the Argentine Government, and the Company shall be decided by arbitrators, who shall have the privilege of naming a third with a casting vote, and whose decision shall be final.

Art. 15. The Company undertakes, and at the same time has the right of the future extension of the works when necessary, under the same conditions as this contract, with the exception of the subvention, having also the preference for the construction of similar works, under analogous conditions.

Art. 16. The Argentine Government shall have the right to inspect the materials and construction of the works, with the object of being assured as to its solidity and worth.

Art. 17. On the formation of the United Company that shall undertake the construction of these works, with the same obligations and rights as the present contract, the responsibility of the concession shall cease, and shall pass to the Company, said Company being able to sell the whole, or any part of the works that it may construct, since the purchaser or purchasers would acquire all the obligations and rights stipulated in this contract.

Loading Produce. Fifty cents per ton measurement or weight.

Dock and Basin Dues. Twenty cents per month, or any part of a month, on every ton register, and five additional cents for each week after the first month (not including passenger and mail steamers in favour of which the most moderate possible charges shall be established).

STORAGE. Twenty cents per month, or any part of a month, as an average per each cubic metre, or 100 kilometres weight.

PORTERAGE. An equivalent to the existing tariff of the "ordenanzas de aduana."

Art. 4. If the dividends of the company should exceed one and a half per cent per month on the employed capital, after providing for 2 per cent reserve fund for the preservation and improvement of the works, the National Government shall have the right to oblige the company to modify its tariffs, or to apply the excess in improving the system of lighthouses in the river, or it shall appropriate the surplus for its own uses.

Art. 5. The cargoes of the National Government shall be loaded and unloaded free of charge.

Art. 6. National vessels of war shall have free access to the basin at any time, to load and unload, and to receive and land troops, ammunition, stores, &c., free of charge, but shall remain only such time as may be necessary for effecting these purposes.

Art. 7. All materials and articles necessary for the construction and maintenance of the works, which the Company shall have to import, shall be admitted duty free, and the works described in the plans shall not be subject to any taxation, existing or to exist.

Art. 8. The National Government shall concede to the Company the land required on the river's banks in this city for the construction of the docks, basin, and other works described in the plans.

Art. 9. The Company undertakes to make an embankment round the docks and basin having more or less the same surface as described in the plans, provided that the line of the interior limit facing the town shall be at a distance of 65 or 70 yards, measured from the existing buildings on the Paseo de Julio, and this shall be the dividing street, the raised land to be subdivided into blocks in the greatest possible harmony with the streets of the town, as shown in Plan No. 5, constructing these streets 20 or 30 yards wide, in order that they may respond to the increased flow of traffic.

The Argentine Government shall deliver to the concessionaire in a single subvention the sum of one million hard dollars in 6 per cent. stock with 1 per cent. amortization, the same being payable in five instalments as follows:— 1.—One month after the first materials and instruments are imported, and the works commenced in a decided manner.

DISASTROUS EXPLOSION IN PARIS.

An explosion occurred in Paris on Tuesday afternoon which seems to have been of a frightful character. About three o'clock a loud detonation was heard in the neighbourhood of the Place de la Sorbonne, and the shop of MM. Fontaine and Bal, manufacturing chemists, forming the corner of that square and the Rue Victor-Cousin, was found to be in flames.

Some further facts in connexion with the explosion of the Hon Mrs Vivian with the Marquis of Waterford have become known. The lady is the second wife of her husband, and is said to be ten years the senior of her seducer.

It seems that for some time past the lady's name has been mentioned in circles in connexion with that of the partner of her flight, and that her disappearance was not wholly unexpected.

She left her home on Monday evening, alleging that she intended to proceed to Brighton, to see her mother, and would return the same evening. As, however, she failed to make her appearance, Captain Vivian proceeded to the Victoria Station, and there ascertained that the Marquis of Waterford and Mrs Vivian had the previous morning taken tickets for Paris by way of Dover, accompanied by a friend.

It is reported that her husband has started in pursuit with the view of recovering possession of them. PABANA GUAZU.

This river is "el mas grande parlante del mar", its length being from its source in the mountains to where it joins the Plata nearly three thousand miles.

Sebastian Gabot was the discoverer of the Paraná, the Yzerje, and the Paraguay, and entered this river for the first time in 1527 through the Las Palmas mouth.

At night we passed the Naeva Vuelta, timid passengers recalling to mind around the tea table the dangers of the passage, the thousand punken rooks, the robbers, the corsairs and pirates with which fantastic legends peopled these islands, tales gaining force from the distance, and the yawns of boatmen.

Rosas, the greatest tyrant the New World had seen until Lopez was born, had his rock here. These two scourges of the human race, bear even from their birth a certain degree of resemblance to each other, and there is more than one point of contact in their history which may well be called immediate, the second edition corrected and enlarged from the first.

Rosas laughed at the world; he had cooks for foreign ministers, and the English and French squadrons were the sport of his whims.

The great usurper of the Continent, who trifled with Louis Philippe, and sent the English Minister to the right-about, was in his turn worsted by a brave Correntino, who had nothing but his lance and horse, and was so poor that he had no name.

So an obscure tyrant of Paraguay made a plaything for his concubines of the Minister of the most powerful nation in the New World, who had come to demand satisfaction from him, after he had made game of all Europe.

The legend of 'El Correntino,' published by the Baron de Viell Castell in the 'Tribuna' ten years ago, is not a tale of fiction. About twenty years ago a Correntino used to keep moored close to his hut about twenty cutters and luggers; he attacked with his band of daring pirates, he robbed and chastised those masters of vessels who had denounced him, and then bundled them off, boats, sailors, and all, down the river.

Rosas sent expeditions by sea and land, but never could succeed in surprising him. Here, under the very beard of Rosas, a poor gaucho laughed at all his power; and he who obliged France and England to sign peace after the blockade, could not catch the Correntino who boarded every vessel passing up or down the Paraná, infusing such terror by his exploits, that every sailor coming down this river, when he reached the Nuevo Vueltas, begged St. Anthony to send a northerly wind, that he might keep clear of sandbanks, and that the Correntino might sleep, for if he was awake his little vessel was certain to be taken, and everything in her declared lawful prize.

My fellow travellers were beginning to shiver when the noise of the engine ceased, and they imagined they could perceive looming in at the stern windows the fiery red hair of the famous Correntino; but we soon found out that this was not the cause of the stoppage, but that we were taking passengers on board from another steamer. We were soon en route again, and awoke in our comfortable berths next morning to find ourselves off Baradero.

WOOL WASHING. It has frequently been noticed how great a loss accrues to the country from shipping unwashed wool to foreign markets, paying thereby a freight that is unnecessary, and depriving part of the population of the means of livelihood they could obtain in the preparation of said wool for exportation.

The same can be said of sheepskins, although they are generally shipped in a clean condition. We therefore call the attention of capitalists at large to the auction which is to take place on the river Conchas, on the 25th inst., where they have a permanent and sufficient supply of water for washing purposes.

Looking as we do with the greatest interest on the general produce of the country, we cannot abstain from recommending so important a sale, and hope that by doing so it will tend to remove the evils mentioned, and that we will thereby add another effort on behalf of the estanciero, consulting at the same time the interests of the purchaser.

ON CHANGE.

April 21, 1869.

Onnces, Sovereigns, Patascons, National Bonds, The Bourse continues to decline. The Bourse opened and closed flat, some few outsiders have commenced selling, and as none can know how much more will be thrown on the market by bona fide sellers, there is a general disposition to avoid the market as much as possible for the present, but no broker attempts to bear prices, as people are becoming apprehensive as to the wind up of the months accounts. The losses at present are very severe, and if bonds fall much further it is feared they may be too much for the market to bear. The cash sales to-day amounted only to 5000 at 54 1/2, but for the end of the month the sales were heavy, 140,000 at 54 1/2. For June 30 up to to-day there has been some little speculation, many have bought freely at 56 and many are calculating that at that date bonds will command 1 1/2 per cent. higher, but to-day prices tumbled and the closing rate for June 30 was quoted in the liquidation at 54 1/2 for cash 54 sellers. For May 31st there is not much doing 70,000 at 54 1/2; The total sales for the day 245,000.

There was a good deal said on 'Change to-day about the miserable state of the Boca. The lighters are again locked in, and the mouth of the Riachuelo is so blocked up with mud that it is feared unless the Government take instant steps the business in the Boca will be brought to a complete stand still. A petition to the Government praying for relief was handed round and extensively signed. It is proposed to ask Mr. Hopkins for a loan of his steam dredge for a few days to clear away the mud.

Exchange rates very flat, and part of the business done to-day was done at 49 and 49 1/2, also at 49 1/2. The Argentine Government has taken about £40,000 sterling at 49 from the River Plate Bank, and 404 merchants bills. The auction of Mr. Green's estancia at Chacabuco came off on the 19th; the land was sold in lots of 200 squares, or the 1/2 of a league, and averaged \$40,000 per lot, or \$20,000 per league.
