The Fifty-ninth Anniversary of of May is kept a civic holiday throughout South America. Owing to the exertions of President Sarmiento the May feasts this year were of unusual splendor, reminding one somewhat of the great 4th of July in the United States. The flag decree did not amount to much, still there were more flags flying than usual, and the general aspect of the city was unusually gay. Owing to our last edition being our packet number, our enstomary salute to Argentines on this national occasion was omitted. We avail ourselves of .the epportunity now to greet our Argentine friends. In a political point of view the state of the country shows a decided improvement - the public moneys, so long expended on the battle field, find now employment in school houses and public colleges. We are preparing now for a new campaign -the Exhibition in Cordova-and the -wealth, the energy, the genius of the country is now concentrated on the peaceful arts-trade, commerce, and agricultural industry. Commercially speaking, the condition of the nation is far from being satisfactory-the rural districts are depressed; but let us hope that it is but a passing cloud, which will be dispelled by the aurora of enlightened views and sound practical economy of Congress and our legislation.
