It is a strange coincidence in the misfortunes which have befallen the steamers Vileta and James T. Brady, that both belong to the firm of Lezica Lanuz and Co. We have received information of the Swedish brig which came into collision with the Vileta. Mr. Thomas Howard, pilot, coming up from Montevideo at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, steering West-half-North about 14 miles from Chico light-ship, passed across the bows of the brig, which was lying on her beam ends heading South. Only 2 or 3 feet of her starboard rail and her mast-heads were sticking out of water.

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We understand that the works of the Belgrano tramway, which will be such an advantage to that pretty suburb will shortly be set on foot.

Nothing could be more brilliant than the ball at D. Hector Varela's on Saturday night. There were 300 guests, including President Sarmiento, the Cabinet Ministers, some of the Foreign Ministers, and a grand gathering of the families and beauty of Portela society.

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The news from Montevideo is of no importance.—President Batlle is still in the capital, and Caraballo is represented as retreating before Maximo Perez's forces.

In the last published number of the 'Revista Argentina' which we received yesterday we find an able paper intitled 'The Foot of the Andes,' by Don Santiago Estrada; it is well written and reflects much credit on the author.

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PARAGUAY AND THE U. STATES.

INTERESTING LETTER FROM MR. BLISS. Department of State, Washington D.C., May 21, 1869.

Dear Sir. As I am at liberty to write you freely, without any restraint from the censorship of Admiral Davis, (as was not the case when I sent you a line from the Guerriere, by that officer's permission) I will give you a rapid resumé of what has happened concerning the Paraguayan affair, since my arrival in this country on Feb. 21.

After making a verbal statement to the representatives of the Associated Press, which appeared in the 'Tribune' of Feb. 23rd, and in other papers, I proceeded to Washington in compliance with my parole given to Admiral Davis, and arriving there Feb. 26th, immediately reported myself by letter to Secretary Seward. I had seen Mr. Washburn in New York on the day of my arrival, and Gen. Webb on the succeeding day on board the South America, on which he was embarked for Rio.

I need not say that my interviews with both were eminently satisfactory, nor need I dwell upon the fact that there is, and has been a complete conformity of views and opinions upon all essential matters relating to this subject, between myself and Mr. Washburn. He had preceded me at Washington, and my subsequent steps have generally been determined upon after consultation with him.

I was informed by Secretary Seward that the Government did not claim any jurisdiction over me in the sense contemplated by Admiral Davis, but was invited to a personal interview, at which it was suggested that I should inform the Department in writing of the circumstances connected with my imprisonment. I had an interview with Gen. Grant on the day of his inauguration, two hours before he taking the oath of office, having been presented to him at the Army Headquarters by one of his staff, Gen. Ely S. Parker, a Seneca Indian, and consequently a fellow citizen of mine. (He is now Commissioner of Indian Affairs.) I immediately drew up a succinct statement of the principal facts in the case, and along with a similar one from Mr. Masterman it was presented to Congress, accompanied by a petition in which we requested an investigation of the circumstances, in order that such action might be taken by Congress as the vindication of the national honor and justice to ourselves might demand.

The request was granted, and the Committee of Foreign Affairs appointed to make the investigation.—On March 10th I was, without any solicitation on my part, appointed to a clerkship in the State Department, which I still hold, being a member of the Bureau of Translation, a very pleasant and congenial occupation.

I have visited my parents and brothers, and most fortunately found them all alive and well. The sensation they experienced at meeting one who for them literally "was dead and is alive again, was lost and is found," can be better imagined than described. I am requested by all my family to convey to you their heartfelt thanks for your efficient and highly prized agency in affording what information you might conceiving me, to which I beg to add my own still deeper sentiments of gratitude.

I had but arrived at my home when a telegram was received requiring my immediate presence in Washington to give my evidence before committee, so that I have spent but two days with them.

This evidence, which is quite voluminous, is now being printed, as is also that of Mr. Washburn, Mr. Kirk, Captains Crosby, Wells, &c. The impression produced upon the minds of the committee you will doubtless learn from various American papers; it is such as you might naturally expect.

What excuse Admiral Davis and the members of his staff will give for their conduct is a mystery to all, but those gentlemen (having been recalled) will have an opportunity to speak for themselves before a sub-committee, which will meet in New York in September.

You may look for some lively times when the "Herald's" firm of "Webb, Washburn, and Co." (in which your humble servant represents, I suppose, the company) bring their batteries into action upon the "gallant and courtly officer" lately commanding the South Atlantic squadron.

I have delivered several lectures on Paraguay, two of them at New Haven, where several Professors of Yale College were present, and one at Fredonia, N.Y., where I prepared for college. I send you a summary of the latter, cut from the local paper.

In brief, I have met with a kindness and general sympathy from press and people wherever I have been or formerly been known, which, to say the least, is in marked contrast with the treatment I experienced during my six weeks ignominious imprisonment on board the South Atlantic squadron.
