IMPORTANT FROM PARAGUAY

FURTHER NEWS FROM PROVIDOR.

On Thursday the French Consul, M. Cuverville, gave a grand banquet to Dr. Roque Perez, Argentine Minister.

The officers of the Decade attended, also Mr. Edward Perez, the Secretary of the Argentine Legation.

On Sunday, the 18th inst., General Castro and the Oriental officers gave a grand banquet to commemorate Oriental independence.

H.E. Señor Paranhos and Dr. Roque Perez attended, also about forty invited guests.

We expect by next steamer a full report of the dinner from our new correspondent.

The Provedor brought down the remains of the lamented Major Alejandro Diaz, who fell in Curupaiti.

We suppose they will be duly interred in the Recoleta.

On Tuesday, the 15th, three waggons full of Paraguayan women and children arrived at Asuncion.

They had passed the lines at Pirayu the night previously, and were in the utmost state of misery.

The women were, for the most part, from the country districts, none of them belonging to the capital.

Scarcely any of the families of Asuncion have succeeded in escaping.

A meeting of Paraguayans was to be held on the 20th inst., at the theatre, to consider the question of the new Government.

There appears to be the most decided hostility to Sres. Eguzquiza and Bedoya on the part of the Paraguayan legion, and very poor prospects of any Government being formed for the present.

Dr. Perez, with a view to arrange the difficulty, has proposed that the new Government be formed of the three members proposed by the legion, with Señor Eguzquiza as Prime Minister; but this compromise by no means meets with the approbation of Sr. Paranhos, who considers that the solidity of the new Government mainly depends upon the presence of some representative men such as Sres. Eguzquiza and Bedoya, without whose assistance it is impossible to form anything like a permanent administration.

The interests of the allies seem to clash somewhat on this subject, which is much to be regretted, as it renders the matter more difficult of arrangement.

It is not probable that Dr. Perez will be able to return before the 15th August, which will be H. E.'s birthday.

Mr. Blas Rivero, the agent of Messrs. Lezica and Lanuz in Asuncion, has arrived down in the Provedor, and Mr. Anacharis Lanuz may be expected back next week.

Amongst the passengers per Provedor we notice Mr. Romulo Montedecoa, who has been sojourning in Paraguay for the last month.

He has brought down various collections of plants, birds, and fruits. Owing to the change in the temperature, several of the birds died when nearing Buenos Ayres.

The heat in Asuncion for fully a week before the departure of the Provedor was most intolerable; but on Saturday night a storm burst over the city.

The windows of Sr. Paranhos' house were blown in whilst the minister and his friends were at dinner, the lights extinguished, and for a moment it was feared the house would be blown down.

Sr. Paranhos lives in Barrios' house, it having been elegantly fitted up for him.

Dr. Perez has commodious apartments at the Hotel la Paz, which is now the great Argentine rendezvous in Asuncion.

Colonel Marino, the secretary of General Mitre, came into Asuncion to have a special conference with Dr. Roque Perez, and fresh Argentine troops were anxiously expected to arrive at Asuncion.

The Provedor passed the Worneck; Brazilian transport, near Parana, with troops on board.

She also passed the Cisne and several other steamers, all bound up to Paraguay.

Respecting the new contract for the Provedor, nothing certain is yet known, but it was generally rumored in official quarters that Messrs. Lezica and Lanuz will remain with the army contract, and Mr. J. Barreto receive the contract for the hospitals, but up to the leaving of the Provedor the question had not been finally decided.

NINTH OF JULY IN ASUNCION.

GRAND ARGENTINE BANQUET.

The first commemoration of the Ninth of July ever held in Paraguay, came off this year at Asuncion, under the happiest auspices.

Asuncion, the capital of Paraguay, is at present crowded with Argentines, and the presence of H. E. Dr. Don Roque Perez, the special Argentine Minister, induced some of the principal Argentines in that city to give a grand national banquet, in honor of the day.

Argentine flags hung from the windows of Dr. Perez's legation, as also from the rooftop.

Colonel Aguiro, who is in command of the Argentine forces in Asuncion, took an active part in getting up the banquet.

A large saloon adjoining the Hotel de la Paz, where the Argentine Legation is at present, was engaged for the occasion, and very tastefully decorated; the allied flags were hung around the walls, and two large chandeliers lighted the apartments with much effect.

At five o'clock the guests began to arrive, and were received with the most polished affability by H. E. Dr. Roque Perez, in the saloons of the Legation, and at half-past five we all proceeded from the Legation to the banquet hall, two Brazilian military bands playing stirring airs in the patio beneath.

Amongst those present we noticed H. E. Dr. Roque Perez, who acted as chairman; H. E. Sr. Paranhos, Special Brazilian Minister; Sr. Lisboa, Secretary of Brazilian Legation; Sr. Eduardo Perez, Secretary of Argentine Mission; Gen. Salustiano, Commander of the town; Col. Aguiro, Capt. Fawkes, H.M. gunboat Cracker; Dr. Luis Alvez, Dr. Newkirk, Dr. Correa, Sr. Carranza, Sr. DeMot, and about fifty others whose names we did not know.

The dinner was really very creditable for Asuncion, and the table groaned under all the delicacies which Asuncion could boast of; the wines were excellent, and when the viands were discussed and the champagne began to flow, the chairman, Dr. Roque Perez, rose, and in a short but well-timed address, proposed health and prosperity to the Argentine Republic and to its worthy President Don Domingo Faustino Sarmiento, and to the Argentine army. (Drunk with great cheering and applause.)

Col. Aguiro next rose to propose the Emperor of Brazil, the Brazilian army, and the Brazilian Empire, which was drunk standing and with all the honors.

H. E. Sr. Paranhos rose and said, that in the social meeting this night, he discerned that love of country and love of home which forms the characteristic of every great people.

Sr. Paranhos apostrophized 'love of country' in the most eloquent terms, and was repeatedly interrupted by bursts of applause; he touched on the history of the war, and testified to the firm unwavering alliance of the Argentine Nation, during the lengthened history of the war, which was now happily drawing to a close.

The Argentine Republic has struggled nobly in the cause of liberty and well earned its independence, which to day it celebrates.

The conclusion of Sr. Paranhos' speech was lost to us, owing to the vociferous applause, which lasted for several minutes.

Dr. Perez rose, and in most eloquent terms proposed the health and prosperity of the Republic of Uruguay. (Drunk with great cheers.)

Sr. Dr. Simplicio rose to propose the health of the distinguished Brazilian diplomatist present, Sr. Paranhos [Tremendous cheers.]

He adverted to the diplomatic career of this gentleman as one of the brightest pages in the history of Brazil of the present day.

Brazilians at home and abroad were proud of this man, whose genius and talents are admitted by all to be of the highest order. (Drunk with the most enthusiastic applause.)

Col. Faria Rocha proposed the health of those noble men who freely left their homes to defend their country's flag, 'the voluntarios de la patria'; (great cheers) and with this toast he connected the name of Dr. Luiz Alvez, the distinguished physician present.

Dr. Seyeriano proposed in the most complimentary terms the health of the distinguished gentleman here who represents the Argentine Republic, Dr. Roque Perez. (Tremendous applause.)

Dr. Perez occupies one of the foremost positions at the Argentine bar; his presence here is a guarantee that the Argentine Government is sincere in its desire to restore a proper government to this country.

Gentlemen, let us drink to the health and prosperity of H. E. Dr. Roque Perez. (Drunk with vociferous applause.)

Dr. Luiz Alvez, in a most eloquent address, spoke of the day we celebrate, and in most felicitous terms characterized the month of July as the American month of liberty; he spoke of the Fourth of July, and its glorious associations for Americans; he then touched on the liberties of Europe, and the great French revolution; and apostrophized England as the cradle of liberty, the great nation of trade, commerce, and constitutional liberty; everything English he admired, and nothing more so than the English paper of Buenos Ayres, the Standard, the most independent organ of public opinion in the Plate, and whose worthy editor is present here this night.

He proposed the health of Mr. Mulhall, the editor of the Standard, and

the representative of the press of Buenos Ayres. (Drunk with the greatest applause.)

Mr. Mulhall rose to reply. He thanked Dr. Alvez for his kind expressions, and the company in general for the enthusiastic manner in which they drank the toast.

He was utterly unable to express his feelings of profound gratitude at the honor paid him this night, and was proud to be regarded as the representative of the press of Buenos Ayres.

The generals and officers who surrounded him could point to glorious victories won by their swords at Yutani, Uruguayana, Tuyi, Lomas Valentinas, etc., so also could the humble individual who now addressed them point to still more glorious victories: the Southern Railway, the River Plate Bank, the Montevideo Telegraph, the new lines of steamers, the Central Argentine Railway, and hundreds other such triumphs of the pen; but he would not dwell too long on the services of the press; when coming to this banquet his wife had requested him to drink little and talk less [cheers], and as a good husband he obeyed the injunction.

In conclusion, he proposed the health of Col. Aguiro, the gentleman who had labored so successfully to get up this banquet. (Drunk with great applause.)

Dr. Simplicio in an eloquent speech proposed health and prosperity to the Allied Army. (Drunk with applause.)

Dr. Roque Perez rose to propose the health of the veteran hero who sat before him, the general who commands the Plaza of Asuncion, General Salustiano. (Drunk standing and with three times three.)

General Salustiano rose to respond. He thanked the company for the high honor they had paid him, and asked them to drink to the health of General E. Mitre and the Argentine army, his companions-in-arms. He had on more than one occasion witnessed the cool heroism of Gen. Mitre, shells breaking over his head and balls falling around, but he never shrunk from his post.

For these valiant heroes he now proposed a toast. [Great applause and drunk standing.]

H. E. Sr. Paranhos rose, and in graceful terms proposed peace and prosperity to friendly nations. (Drunk with applause.)

Dr. Roque Perez, in a powerful and eloquent address, proposed the day we celebrate, the glorious 9th of July, 1810.

He briefly scanned the history of those memorable times, touched on the sorrows of Paraguay, and in his peroration apostrophized liberty in the most eloquent terms.

During the delivery of this eloquent address Dr. Perez was interrupted by bursts of applause.

Dr. Perez rose and said, surrounded as he was by a number of Generals, officers, ministers, secretaries, and consuls, he was proud to find a member of his own profession present.

He proposed the health of the distinguished Brazilian lawyer present, Dr. Correa. (Drunk with loud applause.)

The company here adjourned from the banquet hall to the saloons of the Argentine Legation, where the 'feast of reason and flow of soul' held sway until a late hour.

Several speeches were made; amongst others, Mr. Edward Perez, in a powerful address, proposed the Argentine youth, which was received with the greatest applause—and thus terminated the first 9th of July celebration in Paraguay.

MONTEVIDEO.

THE PRESIDENT RESUMES OFFICE.

PROCLAMATION TO THE ARMY.

DISBANDING OF THE FORCES.

ARRIVAL OF THE FRENCH ADMIRAL.

Wednesday.

On Sunday morning, by official decree, General Batlle resumed his post as President, and after reviewing the army in a grand parade, issued the following address:—

TO THE NATIONAL GUARDS AND TROOPS OF THE LINE.

An insatiable thirst of money induced certain ambitious men to lead astray from the path of duty some officers, who had often merited well of the country, and thus kindled the flame of discord among us.

I put myself at your head, and with your valiant aid we have in a few days restored peace to the Republic.

In resuming the high post of Chief Magistrate, I feel bound to thank you for having done your duty, and I trust that you will always be firm supporters of the cause of law and order.

In this manner we shall build up a country, making the law respected, giving security to life and property throughout the camps, and obtaining a respectable name among foreign nations, instead of the public discredit that at present attaches to us, from our incessant broils.

The people that respects not its own government incurs universal infamy. With your assistance, I hope to develop the arts of peace, foment the resources of the country, and march onward towards the great destinies of the nation.

Confide in your President, as he confides in you. Continue to fulfil your duties as citizens towards those who may succeed me in office, and we shall leave to our sons a great, glorious, and prosperous country. I salute you on this auspicious anniversary, champions of law and public order.

Your General and friend, LORENZO BATLLE.

On Monday afternoon Colonel Olava arrived in town with his troops, and was received with drums beating and colors flying.

A military banquet took place next day, and the various battalions specially raised for the campaign have been one by one disbanded.

Colonel Torrens has also returned with his troops from Paysandu, while we hear on all sides of peace and order being restored.

Many of Carballo's officers have quietly come into town, to resume their peaceful occupations, and it is even rumored the General himself has come back to his house, where the Government will probably leave him unmolested.

Tolosa and other rebel chiefs have returned to their various homes in the departments, having first disbanded their followers; it could be wished that they had first been disarmed.—The rural authorities will require a double police force now to protect life and property from wandering marauders.

English society in Montevideo has been principally affected at the death of Mr. John Le Bas. The poor fellow was only 20 years of age and but recently married.

It seems he went out fowling last Sunday, with some friends, and incautiously leaning on his rifle, while throwing a stone at a bird, the shot went off and wounded him mortally.

His comrades conveyed him to town in a coach, but medical aid was unavailing. His funeral, yesterday, was largely attended. Deceased belonged to the firm of Le Bas and Rodriguez.

Mr. John McEachen has also died, aged 28 years. His remains were interred yesterday.

The French war steamer Circe has arrived from Rio Janeiro, with Admiral Figueira on board.

She has been put in quarantine, and it seems the yellow fever continues among the shipping at Rio.

The Flying Squadron left England on the 19th June, but one of the vessels had to put back owing to some mishap in her machinery; the squadron may be expected shortly in this port.

Señor Bonetti takes his benefit on Friday night in the grand opera of 'Africana.'

The noble Lord in the course of this great oratorical display affirmed that there was one thing England prized above all others, and would defend to any extremity, and that was her National honour.

The Provincial Bank Directors have decided upon a measure that most prove of the greatest benefit and convenience to the commercial public of the city.

They have resolved to at once make arrangements for drawing on the principal capitals of Europe at usual dates and terms.

We are only surprised that this step was not long ago resolved upon by our leading bank.

The discussion that has now been carried on for some months in the columns of our London contemporary the 'Field' respecting the merits and demerits of the River Plate, has at last been brought to a close by the editor of said paper crying 'hold, enough!'

Those desirous of continuing the discussion are referred by him to the Central Argentine Railway Company, as no further communication on the vexed subject will be published by the great sporting organ.

port, and is expected to take a considerable number of passengers from Rio for the States.

We regret to announce that Mr. Raymond, late editor of the 'New York Times,' lately dropped dead from an attack of apoplexy.

We had the pleasure of making his acquaintance in the States, long previous to his connection with the paper of which he was lately the editor.

An amusing though extremely important subject is now occupying the attention of Hon. Members of the House of Commons. It is the question of removing the unsightly grating at present in front of the Ladies Gallery in the people's Chamber.

The 'Times' has a powerful leader on the subject. The principal objections to the removal of the 'bated bars' in question are either 'too charming' or 'too filthy,' and that giving greater facility for bringing these qualities into fuller play might have the most alarming consequences as regards the stability of the British Constitution, from their respective effects on youthful and aged senatorial susceptibilities.

A soft glance at some youthful demagogue might seal the fate of many a promising reform, while the harsh rustle of a 'more antique' might send many a hardened Tory into the wrong lobby on a critical division.

We watch with interest the development of this 'Grate Debate.'

The Patagonia is expected on Monday in Montevideo from Valparaiso, and will leave after a few hours stay for England.

Mr. Peabody, the great American philanthropist, has just presented to His Holiness Pope Pius the 9th the bagatelle of £200,000 for the poor of Rome.

On his way back he presented the poor of London with £120,000. The poor of London have at different times received nearly a million sterling from this noble son of the great American Republic.

The vote in the Senate on the Port question has produced the greatest satisfaction in commercial quarters, and hopes are expressed that the Provincial Government will cease to interfere in the matter, and allow the National Executive to carry out a great project which is exclusively within its province, and should be left solely in its hands.

A DAY'S SPORT IN THE CORDILLERA OF THE ANDES.

By Major F. Ignacio Rickard, F.R.G.S. &c., &c.

[Continued.]

He was quietly sitting under a rock awaiting the expected arrival of huancos, having been led there by an old hand at the sport, who knew well the habits of our game.

I joined them at once, and fastening my gun to a shrub, prepared for a quiet wait in case of a rush past.

We could see a quite across an extensive valley, where several of our companions were still chasing the first huancos seen, and some of which were making towards our position.

I could see, however, that they would cross in front of me much lower down, and probably out of range.

they manage to scamper off at their ease. The only certain spot for instant death is through the shoulder blade and heart, when side on to you; and if going from you, through the neck and head. I have put as many as four bullets through a huanaeo in different parts of his body, and breaking one leg into the bargain, yet he went off, and would have eventually escaped but for a gaucha who gave chase with the bolas and brought him down.

But to return to my three first victims. They were splendid fellows—larger than any buck I have ever seen, and in splendid condition. My benchmark—an old gaucha—was on to them in a moment with his hunting knife, and in an almost incredibly short space of time their skins were off and their entrails out.

The skinning of a huanaeo requires some experience and practice before it can be done well, or indeed at all, for if the long slender neck or 'cogote' be not severed from the trunk close to the shoulders, and from there the opening made down the breast, the skin is so tough and hard as almost to resist the best knife in other parts.

Thus the 'cogote' [with the head] is separated from the body and kept apart. The skin of this part is very thick and tough, and serves as excellent things for forming lassoes and connecting strings for the bolas. It is therefore taken off the neck entire, precisely like skinning an owl, and is rubbed and worked about by the hands until sufficiently soft and pliable for the purpose it may be intended.

I must here observe that should any of my readers attempt a day's sport at huanaeos in the Andes, they must bear in mind one precautionary measure so as to avoid losing their game even when well shot and on the ground.

In the Andes there are myriads of conlors, the largest of the feathered tribe—a most daring and powerful bird, and possessed of such instinct that they know well when a party of gauchos go out to hunt huanaeos, and keep hovering about in thousands, following the hunters everywhere. Now if a dead huanaeo be left for five or six minutes on the ground and uncovered, I venture to say that at the end of the 10 succeeding minutes, you will find nothing but the bare skeleton, as every morsel of flesh will be cleaned off by those voracious birds. Therefore the moment a huanaeo falls make up to him and cover, even partly, with your poncho or manta, or other piece of cloth of any description, which will be sufficient to frighten them off. One should thus be provided with materials for this object.

I waited about this lucky spot for some time, but got no other favourable chance, and as night was rapidly coming on, I endeavoured to have the three carcasses conveyed on mules [provided by my old gaucha] to one of our rendezvous on the Upper Plains.

During all this scattering of the party and excitement of the chase, the dog was forgotten until too late to do anything with it for that day, so it was merely placed in its position, and left ready for the following day when we determined to conduct the chase in a better and more systematic manner. The spot selected for the corral was at the end or termination of a tolerably wide and deep gully, opening on to the plains towards the east, and forming one of the highways for the huanaeos when retreating to their mountain fastnesses. When I say plains, I mean to convey the idea of an undulating expanse of ground tolerably level at the immediate base of the Andes, but in which at the same time we stumbled on those plain time before sea level!

GOTTSCHALK IN RIO

Since the arrival of this celebrated artist at Rio, the general attention of our public is absorbed by his concerts; they are forming the topic of the day. It is also only just to observe that never any artist who has visited our metropolis, had such a right to the claim of the extraordinary enthusiasm which he found here, as the eminent American pianist.

His concerts have been a series of uninterrupted triumphs; his compositions, though generally known here for ten years, are now raised by hundreds of copies; his portrait is distributed by the illustrated journals as premiums to the subscribers; the satirical papers have published most witty caricatures; the freemasons have offered him a splendid banquet; and even the confectioners are selling cakes, and the hotel-keepers serving beefsteaks à la Gottschalk. And all this enthusiasm is not artificial, but real, and, indeed, well deserved. Gottschalk's first concert attracted such a crowd of admirers, that one day before, the sale of tickets had to be suspended, as the concert-room was not large enough to hold so many persons. The second concert therefore took place in the Teatro Lirico, one of the largest and finest buildings in S. America; a good many boxes were bought up on speculation, and resold at a premium of seventy-five dollars each.

The success was so great that Gottschalk had to announce a third concert,

in which his celebrated 'Tarantella,' for piano and orchestra, was executed, and, of course, loudly encored. At the conclusion the Portuguese pianist, Arthur Napoleon, appeared on the stage and presented Gottschalk with a magnificent crown of gold and oak-leaves.

All his following concerts have added new triumphs to his artistic career, and the general enthusiasm is at its height.

A few days after his arrival, Gottschalk was also presented to the Emperor, and had a long and interesting conversation with our monarch, who promised him to assist with the Imperial Family at his concerts. The Emperor also requested him to arrange for the piano a patriotic hymn, composed by his father, Dom Pedro I.

This 'moreover' will be executed by Gottschalk at the next Court-concert in the Palace.

EDUCATION OF CHILDREN.

To the Editors of the 'Standard'. Gentlemen, July 21, 1869.

I see by this morning's paper a notice of the new system Dr Bohme has introduced for teaching young children, which I consider an excellent one; but allow me to add that I have already made use of this system for more than a year, having had out from Europe all the necessary things for this object; and if you remember as long ago as last September I had the honor of showing you that the children from three to five years of age all knew the elements of geography, astronomy, &c., which they had learned by this method.

The only thing that prevents the children learning as fast as they would in Europe is that being taught in English it enables them to learn this language it makes it naturally more difficult for them.

In spite of these difficulties, next month when I have the public examination of all the children under my care, I hope and think the parents will be satisfied with the progress made, especially by the Kindergarten, as the above is called in Prussia.
