drug in the Continental markets, and the stocks are far in excess of any previous year; but there are sound reasons for believing that prices will not go any lower, and before the arrival of the new clip all the present stock will be moved off.

The great drought in Australia and New Zealand has swept from the plains millions of sheep, whilst the continued working of the grueleries has, in Africa and South America, immensely diminished the flocks.

Some doubts have existed during the last few months as to the quantity of the Australian wool likely to be imported during the current year, the general opinion being that the quantity would exceed that of 1868 in something like the same proportion that each of the last five years has exceeded the one preceding it.

By our advices just to hand it is now beyond doubt that the imports of 1869 from Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland will show a considerable quantity less than in 1868, and it is accounted for in the following letter from our firm:—

Sydney, April 22. Authentic information has only just reached us of the ravages among the flocks caused by the drought. There are many stations that have lost 50 per cent. of their stock, and we know of one instance where a squatter, who had 12,000 sheep before the drought, has only about 1,000 left.

These ravages have been general, more or less, throughout the colonies, although there are a fair number of favorable exceptions where the stations being in good feed, they have profited by the misfortunes of their neighbors. After a careful estimation of the losses, we conclude that there will be a deficiency in the imports from Victoria, New South Wales, and Queensland of at least 30,000 to 40,000 bales below 1868, while the prospects of the present year's clip, which will form the imports of 1870, must show a far greater falling off.

There can be little doubt that a large proportion of the flocks of the colony will have to be boiled down, not only as the only means of providing for the immediate necessities of the owners, but also for the purpose of judiciously culling the flocks so that in the course of two or three years they may probably recover the character which the neglect of owners during times of prosperity allowed to deteriorate.

Many of the far distant stations will have to be abandoned and the stocks boiled down, as at present prices of wool, they will not pay the expenses of management, while carrying them on will only entail a further annual sinking of unproductive capital.

I have troubled you with this information thinking it might be interesting to those engaged in the wool trade, and should you think it of sufficient importance we shall be glad if you will make it known through the medium of your article.

IMPORTANT FROM PARAGUAY. ARRIVAL OF THE PROVEDOR.

BATTLE OF JARA. Yesterday we received our special despatches from Asuncion, with dates to the 1st inst., the most important being the battle of Jara, where Gen. Portinho fell in with the Paraguayans.

It appears that Lopez, hearing of the advance of Portinho, despatched a force of 1,200 men, with some light artillery, under the command of Captain Romero, who came up with the Brazilians at the above-named place. A slight skirmish ensued, and the Paraguayans fell back on Yuty, but the Brazilian commander followed them up so closely that they were obliged to turn round and fight at the Pass of Jara. The engagement lasted a short time. The Paraguayans lost 100 men killed, 18 prisoners, and a number of wounded. The Brazilians lost 10 men killed and 40 wounded, remaining masters of the battlefield, and the Paraguayans gaining the interior.

After this battle General Portinho, in obedience to his orders, fell back on Cazapa, taking with him a number of families, many of whom he left at Villa Rica, in order not to delay his march, and owing to the great scarcity of food.

He directed his march to the Tebicuari, where he fell in with some monitors and gunboats which had been despatched from Asuncion to protect his movements.

On the 30th the gunboat Enrique Martins arrived in Asuncion bringing 30 wounded from the engagement, who were sent forward by order of General Portinho.

The transport Guyouru laden with supplies has been despatched from Asuncion for Portinho's forces which are estimated at 1,000 strong, but

such possibly will reach 2,000 owing to the number of deserters picked up by Portinho on this march, who have been wandering in that country for the last four years.

The main Allied army is on the more General Mena Barreto occupies Paraguari, and on the 31st General Osoyo with the 1st corps of General marched along the railway without meeting any obstruction.

On the 30th the Argentine locomotive went off the track, and the next day the same happened to the locomotive 'Gaston of Orleans'; thus the railway came to a dead lock, and owing to this some of the artillery was unable to follow up the army, which for the same reason was left without forage and supplies. Luckily the damage was soon repaired, and the locomotives are again running.

Deserters from Lopez's camp state that the Paraguayan Field Marshal is in Asuncion where he is prepared to await the advance of the allies. Recently large batches of women and children have arrived from the mountains of Asuncion, and all state that his troops are completely demoralized, and that there is great mortality among them owing to cold and misery. It is generally believed by well informed parties that with the definite advance of the allies the war will be brought to a termination.

The Paraguayans in Asuncion have at last come to an arrangement for the formation of a Provisional Government, which is mainly due to the indefatigable and coöperative exertions of Councillor Paranhos and Dr. Roque Perez.

On the 29th the Prince in person made a reconnaissance on the mountains of Asuncion. After two hours firing the Brazilians fell back to their encampment—the Paraguayans only replying with musketry—the Brazilians had a few men slightly wounded.

The Paraguayans are known to have a small force to the South of the Cordillera, composed of two regiments of infantry and two of cavalry.

The ironical Silvado went aground in the Manduvira. She was taken off and found to have been injured in her bottom, and has been run aground on a sand bank in front of Lopez's palace for the purpose of being repaired.

General Polidoro with the 2nd corps of the Brazilian army has moved up to Pirayu.

The Prince has placed a division of 5,000 Brazilians under Gen. José Antonio Gaimaraens under Gen. Mena's orders.

The Argentine troops had not yet arrived at Asuncion from Goya, although they were hourly expected.

LATEST FROM ENGLAND. London, July 2.

The Irish Church Bill has suffered so many amendments in the House of Lords that it is no longer recognizable. The minor alterations in points of detail, such as postponing the action of the Bill till 1872, and preserving the present Irish Bishops in their seats as peers for life, might be readily accepted by the House of Commons and the nation at large.

But the idea of concurrent endowment, or levelling-up now advocated by the Lords has been emphatically condemned by all parties, Protestant as well as Catholic, and will be indignantly rejected by the Ministry. In fact, it is simply a ruse to preserve almost all the properties to the Irish Protestant Church, while pretending to divide them between the various persuasions. The Bishops ask for four millions; and other amendments would leave the Protestant Church nine millions, or more than it actually possesses. The Bill, on being returned to the House of Commons, will be a signal for popular indignation, but the Lords seem heedless of the storm they are conjuring up against their order.

The House of Commons had a debate last night on the Overend-Gurney prosecution, Mr. Eykyn proposing that the expenses should be defrayed by Government, as Dr. Thom had spent all his own money, and could no longer appear except by counsel, according to the Judge's order. The other shareholders it seems are slow in subscribing funds for the prosecution, and the army of counsel on both sides is one of the most imposing and expensive seen for a long time. Mr. Gladstone said that the Government could not step out of the ordinary procedure to defray the cost of prosecuting Overend, Gurney, & Co.; and the majority of the House applauded this policy, although some members protested that it would be the greatest scandal of the age if the trial fell through for want of funds.

The question of legislating for the suppression of gambling and betting on the turf has occupied much attention, and it was even proposed to shut up Tattersall's, but the matter seems to offer insuperable difficulties for legislation in detail.

The Viceroy of Egypt, after being feted in princely style by Her Majesty and the leading nobility, left London yesterday and proceeded to Brussels. On his departure he was waited on at the Charing-Cross Station by the Prince of Wales, Duke of Sutherland, and Chevalier Eborall, the general manager.

The French Cable has been cut in the middle of the Atlantic, after the Great Eastern had paid out over 1,200

shares, the end has been bought, and although the shares have fallen, every hope is still entertained of success. The Atlantic Telegraph Company has just paid a dividend of 8 per cent.

The Confederate Bondholders at a recent meeting have protested against Senator Sumner's speech, and resolved petitioning Parliament to allow no U.S. claims until the Confederate loan be recognised.

The House of Commons seems resolved to disfranchise the rotten freemen of Dublin, having passed the measure for a special enquiry by a majority of 103 votes.

The death of Dr. Todd, of Trinity College, Dublin, is much regretted; he was one of the best scholars in Hebrew and Irish of the present day; and had figured favorably as an author in his 'Jale of St. Patrick,' and 'Wars of the Danes.' Although a Protestant divine, he was very popular among all classes.

The news from the U. States shows that the National Debt is being reduced very rapidly—viz., 13 millions in May, and 16 millions in June. The crops look well. Col. Ryan's steamers with Cuban filibusters were seized near New York, and the men confined in the Brooklyn Navy-yard.

There was a great demand for money at the Bank of England before the last days of the half-year ending last week.

The Corporation of London have emitted bonds for £234,000 for a poultry market at Smithfield, bearing 4½ interest.

It seems there is to be a new Turkish loan for 10 millions.

Northern Railway of B. Ayres has improved 10s., 7½. Argentines, 73½. Brazilian, 83½.

LATEST FROM BRAZIL. The baptism of the infant son of the Duke of Saxe was celebrated with great pomp at the imperial palace on the 29th July, the sponsors being the Archduke Charles of Austria and his wife the Princess Mary Adelaide of Saxe-Coburg, who were of course represented by proxies.

Mme. Ristori gave a performance on the 23rd for the benefit of the Deaf and Dumb School; she is playing at the Teatro Lyrico with the Italian dramatic company, and draws crowded houses.

The races of the Jockey Club came off on the 25th, and were very successful. Seven races were run, the owners and riders being mostly natives. There are, however, some Englishmen in the Club.

Yellow fever is not at all so bad as was rumored, the deaths in the city not exceeding one or two daily; the city mortality is not above the average.

Some controversy has arisen about taxing ecclesiastical properties, the monks refusing to admit taxes being levied on the convents.

In the last steamer from New York there were among the passengers three illustrious Japanese visitors, who may also visit the River Plate: their names are, Foo-Ku-Mats, Sta-Fee-Chee, and Too-Ku-Hay.

The Ferry Company has declared a dividend of 12 per cent.

The Halley leaves for New York on August 7; passage £35.

The City of Brussels arrived on the 25th, in thirteen days from Cape Verd and twenty-two from Falmouth, with thirty-eight passengers.

The City of Rio de Janeiro took a large cargo for Europe, including 2,400 sacks of coffee.

Latest advices from San Paulo represent the American settlers as progressing favorably with their crops of cotton and wheat, the former giving about 500 lbs cleaned cotton to the acre. One of the colonists writes from Santa Barbara, June 5, as follows:—

My nearest neighbor, Mr Lang, from ten acres makes eight bales; Mr. Traherne, off fifteen acres makes fourteen bales; Mr. Perkins, from fifteen acres, fifteen bales; Col. Tanner, from twenty-eight acres, thirty bales; Colonel Oliver, from twenty-eight acres, twenty-five bales; Mr. Hull, from twenty-seven acres makes thirty bales.

The bale is put down at 500 lbs of lint cotton, and all the above named planted the last of September and the first of October, and the caterpillar or cotton worm did them no injury; those planting later were seriously injured, by the worm. Mr. McKnight planted eight acres the first of November and makes about six bales; my son, Alex. S. Crisp, planted eight acres and made six bales; Mr. McCann planted fifteen acres and makes about ten bales; Rev. Mr. Baird planted six acres and sold his in the seed; he made a fair crop; having no plow, he worked it with the hoe, and labored more than those using the plow. Mr. Britt, Mr. Ferguson, and Mr. Waddell's crops were injured in the early part of the season by the hail. Mr. Joshua N. Meriwether, Mr. Daniel, and Mr. Barr made also fair crops. I have not yet been able to get the statistics of their farming. The two Mr Bloxans each have about ten acres planted, and make each eight bales. My own crop, thirty-two acres, planted the middle of November and part the 10th of December, is about twenty bales; it offered as fine a prospect at one time as any I saw this season, but the caterpillar came too early and cut it down to the amount stated.

The country generally is making good crops of corn. I am the only one in the neighborhood cultivating corn with the plow; it shows very plainly in the gathering that I shall make very nearly double the quantity produced to the acre by my neighbors, and the size of the ears resembles our old States corn. Mr Provost planted two baco along, which did remarkably well; the seed was from Cuba. The rice crop was good; the little coffee and sugar in this region looks well; our people are gathering the one and grinding the other.

These are the statistics in my immediate neighborhood. Colonel Norris will give you the results of this year in his vicinity. All these planters subdued the forests and took the country in a very rough state. I think the Brazilian Government has a right to congratulate itself on the success of its immigration forming so great a contrast to the colonists' settlements, which at an undefined cost have nearly all proved disgraceful failures; it is even reported here that many of the New York emigrants have left the Itajaly Colony and returned to the United States in one of the vessels of 100,000 Southerners more to place another one or two per cent of its land in cultivation to make it the most important in the Empire.

The French barque Henriette, from Swansea for Maranhao, was lost near the latter port.

The Brazilian schooner Conceicao, hence to Rio Grande do Sul, reports passing on July 6th the schooner Julius of New York, waterlogged and part of her sparring gone. She appeared to be laden with timber, having a quantity on board.

The estimates of 1869-70 are at the 3rd reading. Among the amendments and additions proposed are, one increasing the anchorage dues on vessels from abroad to 500 reis per ton, and abolishing the packet exemptions, and another declaring that foreign vessels employed in the coasting trade are not exempt from anchorage dues.

In the middle of last month, Señor Capanema received instructions to cease all work on the Pernambuco Telegraph Line, and to use up any material upon other lines. The Government purposes contracting for the construction.

The Alagoas cotton factory employs 26 workmen and 18 apprentices. In 1868 it produced 7,035 pieces of heavy cloths. It has been working six years, but as a commercial speculation is not a success.

Decree 4388 of July 15 declares that complete exemption from export and import duties is conceded to the Province of Matto Grosso for two years.

Customs receipts for years 1868-69 were 27,773,230\$331, viz.:

From imports 19,397,310\$391
" exports 8,376,909\$976

Compared with those of 1867-68, there is an increase of 2,719,931\$383, of which 1,604,702\$84 arose from import duties and 1,115,228\$916 from export duties. Comparing the import duties of the two years, there was a falling off in the first half year of 1868 69 of 2,441,865\$891, and an increase in the latter half of 3,746,508\$331.

Exchange opened by this packet at 18½, and up to the arrival of this steamer maintained the same figure, private bills finding takers at 19d and 18½d. After the arrival of the mail the Bank rate fell to 18½, at which rate the market closes. An unaccountable advance was established by the Commercial Bank coming out at 18½d, but after drawing briskly on the 20th, it lowered the rate to 18½d. The amounts drawn are as follows:

Some bears, with large sales effected for delivery, have endeavored without effect to depress the market, and a portion of the profits realised on a tramway speculation has been sacrificed to pay differences by one of the unlucky speculators.

MONTEVIDEO. Wednesday.

The 'Siglo' of this morning notices an uneasy rumor that the friends of Caraballo mean to make another attempt against public order, but adds that there is not the slightest ground for such alarm. Meantime the state of the camp is wretched in the extreme, owing to 'matroses' and marauders who produce great alarm. This week we have had news of two shocking murders in the departments of Paysanda and Salto. Something must be done towards establishing a proper police in the country districts, as at present there is really no protection for life or property. Add to this the decline in wool and it will be easy to foresee what must soon become of

the farming interests of the Banda Oriental.

As regards the arrival of an adjutant from Maximo Perez it is now stated that he is bearer of letters for Caraballo, requesting the latter to sign an official declaration of the manner of his submission and the arrangement concluded with Col. Perez.

The increase of import duties for the year 1870 will give great dissatisfaction to the commercial public and prove highly injurious to the trade of Montevideo. Those articles of primary necessity, such as iron, lumber, coal zinc, &c., were hitherto duty-free and are now subjected to 5 per cent. Import duties on most goods now amount to 20 or 30 per cent. and as the necessities of finance come everyday to press heavier on this infant Republic it is likely the Chambers will increase them to 50 per cent. before long. There is, however, a limit to the resources of tax-payers and the Custom-house will eventually put an end to all import trade or oblige the Legislature to rescind its tariff.

The Hotel Americano is to be reopened on the 15th inst. under the direction of Messrs. Aldecoa and Gradin. The new wing of the Oriental has massive foundations, held together by iron girders, and the superstructure is going forward actively; the building when complete will be the finest of the kind in the continent. The new theatre of Sr. Cibils in Calle Camaras approaches completion, and promises to be elegant and commodious.

Messrs. Pedro Bustamante and Saturnino Alvarez were sworn in yesterday at the Government-house as Rector and Vice-rector of the University; the first-named is, I believe, brother to the prime-minister, and after taking the oaths he waited on President Baile and explained to him the most urgent necessities of the University, which the President promised to attend to.

The Christy Minstrels make their 'debut' to-night at the San Felipe theatre, and will probably have a full house, although there are not at all so many navy officers now in port as there were some months ago. Sig. Chiarini is taking down his circus to go up to Buenos Ayres. The Solis theatre will soon be vacated as we perceive by a notice from the Directors who now offer it for hire on the conclusion of Pestalardo's present and last 'abono.' This would seem to throw doubt on the rumor of Ristori's coming.

An affray occurred yesterday in the Calle 25 de Agosto between a black sailor, said to be North American, and a shopman; the sailor wanted to box the shopman, but the latter drew a revolver and shot his assailant, whereupon Commissary Olave appeared on the ground and arrested the shop-keeper who was attempting to escape.

The sailor was conveyed to the Caridad Hospital where Doctor Fleury at once treated him for his injuries, but it is feared they will prove fatal.

The neighbors of the Cerro have petitioned Government to be allowed to hold two or three bull-fights, the proceeds of which would be devoted towards finishing the new church. To an Englishman's idea this is nothing short of sacrilege, yet it is likely the request will be granted; the Union bull-ring had a privilege for 10 years, but this is now expired.

The municipal revenues are very short at present: the income of the markets produced last month only \$788, but this does not include the New Market which is administered by Government agents.

The mortality yesterday comprised 3 foreigners, 1 native, and 5 infants. The auction of white pine per Oriental comes off on Friday.

The Whiteinch found the light-ship of the English Bank in the port of Maldonado and towed her back to her proper position.

It appears that the Vegesack, which sailed from B. Ayres with a cargo of hides for Antwerp, last December, has never been heard of.

The transport Annacotta arrived yesterday with wounded Brazilians from the seat of war.

The City of Brussels arrived too late yesterday to send up her news. papers by the Rosario to B. Ayres: she has made a fine trip of 30 days, and is the first steamer of Tai's line to carry mails for the British, postal authorities, under the new contract concluded with Tai's company. The days of sailing are unaltered and the Brussels will leave Buenos Ayres on the 17th.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Galileo arrived in this port yesterday morning, and her passengers were allowed to land without being subjected to quarantine, as they had already gone through it at Montevideo. The yellow fever is abating at Rio.

We have important intelligence from the seat of war. The Allies had made a reconnaissance in force of Lopez's position on the Ascurra mountains. The enemy received the advancing forces with discharges of musketry, but without inflicting any loss. The light field pieces of the Brazilians replied, and part of Lopez's camp and several ranchos were soon after observed to be in flames. The Allies retired to their positions without loss.—Gen. Portinho had effected his junction with the squadron on the Tebicuari, having first

attacked and defeated, with the loss of ten killed and forty wounded, the enemy's corps sent to harass his march. The advanced guard of the main army under O'Barrett, had marched, and the first, Osorio's corps, was to follow immediately. The Argentines were waiting for the arrival of the reinforcements despatched from Goya.—The Allied Ministers at first refused to ratify the nomination of the five commissioners named at the public meeting in the theatre, and supported Eguisquiza as candidate for the Presidency; later accounts bring the intelligence that a government has been formed which meets with their approval.—After the reconnaissance on the 30th, a number of deserters from the enemy's lines reached the Allied camp.—Small-pox has broken out in Asuncion; but the health of the army in the field is good.

We read in a Riojan paper that two civilians had been shot there by order of Commander Vera, the grounds of their execution being that they had taken part in political movements in that province five years ago. We can scarcely credit that this was their only crime; nevertheless, the fact of their execution by order of a military commander requires the fullest explanation on the part of the Government.

Letters from Tucuman state that there have been several collisions there between the troops of the line and the populace, in which the former are represented as having got the worst of it. Public opinion is greatly excited, according to the provincial press, and General Rivas has applied to the local Government for a loan of arms, in order to be prepared for emergencies.

The news from Gualeguay is most disastrous. The drought that has prevailed for the last three months is commencing to tell on the herds, which are perishing in hundreds. Many breeders have lost their herds, consisting of five or six hundred head, in toto. We take this bad news from our colleague 'El Parana.'

The tenor of our European advices seems to indicate that in consequence of the important alterations made by the Peers in the Irish Church Bill, a rupture between the two Houses is every day more probable.

The Sublime Porte is said, by the gossiping foreign correspondents of the London press, to be greatly incensed at the regal reception given to his vassal the Viceroy of Egypt in England.

The American gunboat Kansas is to take from the Brazilian port of San Paulo and Santa Catarina many American citizens, under the late decree of President Grant, which accords to all American citizens abroad, who are desirous of returning home, the privilege of doing so free on board the national war vessels.

The Brazilian Government has not yet entered on the right path in the way of fostering immigration. Our readers will remember the case of the unfortunate English immigrants in whose behalf Mr. Buckley Mathew had to raise a public subscription. A batch of French immigrants to the province of Parana from Algeria have lately been refused the privileges accorded to their class by the colonial regulations made law in 1866, and in Rio Grande do Sul, several German newcomers

prospect of its proving a success. The wines and brandies made in that province are of the very finest taste and quality, and were the communication with the metropolis any way safe or regular we would soon have a splendid trade in these commodities with Mendoza. Twenty years ago the high roads in that province were safer than they are today, not a very creditable fact.

The Santa Fe Legislature have imposed a tax of a dollar each on every head of horned cattle killed in that province. The number of animals killed for consumption alone is set down at 200 per diem, and when the salaries are taken into account, it will be seen that this new source of revenue is by no means insignificant to a hard up province—it won't make ends meet however.

The taking of the census has already commenced in Rosario. A census league gives the following particulars of the results already arrived at.—The number of souls in the city of Rosario is 18143. Of these only 300 are English. Of the entire number only 5931 know how to read. The foreigners who all know how to read and write number 4219, which leaves exactly 1712 Argentines in the good city of Rosario who have enjoyed the privilege of even primary education. We commend this fact to the attention of the Minister of Public Instruction, whose late magnificent report to the Government we purpose reviewing in tomorrow's issue.

Buenos Ayres has decided to enter on the path of progress. Who has not heard of that charming institution peculiar to the birth place of Dante, 'La Fiorina di Firenze.' As we were sitting in the Café de Paris some evenings since, a young woman with a basketful of small bouquets suddenly made her appearance, and with a grace peculiar to the daughters of that sunny land, presented each gentleman present with a specimen of her wares. In some quarters she met only with a stare of stupidity and a refusal, but we are glad to say that the daring experiment was so far crowned with success that in a few moments she realised \$300 mpc, on a paid up capital of \$20 41s. mpc, and a comely face. This may serve as a hint to fair 'demoiselles' of all nationalities in this city.

Last evening H. E. the President entertained a select party of his most intimate friends at his private residence Calle Belgrano 105, it being his 59th birthday. Covers were placed for 25, and at 6 p.m. the guests began to arrive and were received by H. E. with his usual urbanity; at half past six the "favoured few" had assembled in the drawing room, and proceeded immediately afterwards to occupy their assigned places at the festive board. The following distinguished guests formed the party: Madame and Miss Carrie, H. E. the Minister of the Interior, Dr. Velez Sarfield, H. B. Dr. Arellano, H. E. Dr. Mariano Varela, H. E. Dr. Gorostiza, and H. E. Col. Gainza; D. Antonio Gonzalez Moreno, Dr. A. Halbach, Dr. Luis Velez, Senor Videla, Sr. Guerrero, Sr. Benitez, Sr. Cornejo, Sr. Toledo, Sr. Carriz, Sr. Villanueva, Sr. Ocampo, Sr. Piñero, Sr. Rufino Varela, General Vega, Major Rickard, and Mr. G. P. Craufurd. The dinner was served from the Hotel de la Paix by M. Marechal, and the wines were exquisite. Amongst the latter were some fine 'Sauternes' from Mendoza, which well deserved the encomiums pronounced by the non-believers in the wines of the country. A few appropriate toasts were proposed, and the party broke up about 11 p.m.

An old friend leaves to-morrow in the Galileo, Judge Hollister, together with Mrs. Hollister and family, for Europe, on their return to the United States. In bidding the late American Consul farewell, we wish again to bear testimony to the great ability, fairness, and knowledge of international rights he has always brought to bear in the discharge of the duties of his responsible position. He takes home with him the regrets and good wishes of numerous friends of all nationalities in Buenos Ayres.

At half past ten o'clock this morning a funeral service in memory of the late Doña Maria Agustina Casares de Borchers will take place, at the Church of Santo Domingo. This lamented lady died in Bremen on the 2nd of June last.

OUR NEW YORK CORRESPONDENT.

New York, June 22, 1869. The Equal Suffrage Bill, or as we usually term it, "the 15th amendment," has been ratified by 25 States. If adopted by only three more, it will become a law of the land. The journals of the Southern States are now boldly advocating the importation of coolies or Chinese. They contend that free negroes are so indolent, unreliable and impertinent, that plantation labour never will be properly and profitably carried on by black hirelings, and the difficulty can only be obviated by the employment of coolies.

States—talking of having a 'Woman's Parliament' for the discussion of political matters—of establishing Protective Leagues, &c.

At a recent convention of the 'Revolutionists' in this city, while Anna Dickenson was urging the right of women to hold official positions, a gentleman in the audience rose and asked whether in the event of war women would fight. This was a poser; the fair speaker hesitated a moment, but Mrs. Stanton, the President, quickly cut the gordian knot by this bold stroke of womanly diplomacy.—'Sir,' said she in her calm majestic manner, 'when women have a voice in national affairs, there will be no warfare in the civilized world.'

While Washington officials, wily statesmen, and Wall Street brokers are shouting "war with England," the Boston Yankees have been holding a "Peace Jubilee," which after a harmonious session of three days has adjourned.

I will explain the nature of this "mass meeting." Some Yankee musicians conceived the idea of assembling within the precincts of the modern Athens all the musical talent of the United States; so they erected a high building of iron and wood, roofed with tar paper, large enough to hold an audience of fifty thousand persons, that is, three times more than the largest amphitheatre of ancient Rome would contain, and then they invited all the musical societies throughout the Union to join in a festival of peace. In response to this call ten thousand vocalists and one thousand instrumental performers went to Boston, and after sundry meetings for practice, the doors of the Coliseum were thrown open to the multitude. The inaugural ceremonies were commenced by the chanting the anthem "Glory be to God on high, and on earth peace—good will toward man," and concluded by the singing of our national song, "The Star Spangled Banner," in the chorus of which not only the audience of fifty thousand within the building joined, but in which a countless throng outside the walls participated.

President Grant and staff, or suite, as well as many distinguished statesmen, naval officers, and military celebrities were present. In 'extra-distinction' to the peace jubilee, there have been several duels in New Orleans between Spaniards and Cuban exiles, and one rencontre, took place between a prominent Cuban gentleman and a Spanish journalist of this city. I must preface my report by an explanation of certain circumstances connected with the duel, especially as many citizens of Buenos Ayres are well acquainted with one of the combatants.

Ferrer de Cauto, editor of 'El Cronista' (which is the organ of Spanish interests in this country) has been in the habit of writing most intemperate and scurrilous articles against Cuba, calling the natives knaves, cowards, &c. Irritated by the continued tirades of abuse, and the false statements of "El Cronista," a gallant young Cuban came on from Havana some time ago, especially to challenge Cauto to mortal combat. The editor refused to fight, on account of the extreme youth of the challenger; then the impetuous Cuban, in order to force an acceptance, struck Cauto in the face in public, saying—

'Villain! will you accept that indignity, or will you resent it?' The Spaniard returned the blow, but at that moment both parties were arrested and bound over to keep the peace. Since the rebellion in Cuba has gained strength, Cauto more bitter, more vindictive than ever, has made the most virulent attacks on the patriots, and tried to injure their cause, by publishing false statements with regard to the various encounters between the insurgents and the Spanish troops. On account of these malicious reports, two Cuban exiles challenged Cauto; he refused to meet either (not that he is a coward, for he has done the cause of Isabella good service in the Spanish army), an excellent swordsman, and a famous marksman, but he thought he could better advocate tyranny by his pen than by any other weapon; and continued to vilify and misrepresent their countrymen in his contemptible little journal.

Finally, last week a Cuban gentleman of high social position, Sr. Francisco Porto, outraged by Cauto's articles against his native isle, challenged him to a duel 'a outrance.' Cauto would again have declined a meeting, but the Spanish residents of the city, his best friends, said to him: "Why man, you are already dishonored, and to refuse for the fourth time would be an indelible disgrace; you must either accept the challenge, or leave for some uncivilized portion of the globe, where the finger of scorn cannot be pointed at you." Cauto admitted the force of these reasonings.

All the preliminaries of a meeting were arranged here, and the parties left for Canada. The duel took place on historic ground, Lundy's Lane, in the vicinity of Niagara Falls. The second of Sr. Porto was Col. Antonio Rivas, of Venezuela; that of Sr. Cauto Sr. Gutierrez de la Vega, ex-civil Governor of Havana; and the surgeons, Doctors Lillias and Quijano.

The weapons used were pistols; at the third fire, the Cuban's ball cut through the clothing of Cauto, and grazed his breast; at the fourth, Cauto shot the brave Cuban exile through both legs, wounding him dangerously, and so the affair ended.

The papers of this morning state that Sr. Porto will be lame for life, even if he does recover, but a gentleman who has just seen Sr. Porto assured me that there is every hope for him, although he is still suffering from fever occasioned by the wound.

Cauto, the surgeons, and seconds have been arrested, but are out on bail in this city.

With heartfelt grief I announce to you the sudden death of Henry J. Raymond, editor of the "New York Times," one of the most able journalists in the United States, and a man universally honored, not only for his talents, but also for his unquestionable probity.

Even his most violent political opponents respected him. His loss, so deeply mourned by the community at large, is an especial blow to the Republican party.

Mr. Raymond's funeral yesterday was a lesson to his memory. The pall bearers were some of our most distinguished citizens, such as Anthony Farragut, General John A. Dix, late Minister to France, an eminent merchant prince, A. T. Stewart, M. Grinnell, &c. The Brazilian steamer which arrived on the 20th brought back that spirit of Junius' James Watson Webb, our late Minister to the Court of Brazil. As soon as he has completed his fatigues against his Majesty Dom Pedro, the probability is that he will be involved in some political embroglio here, and we shall have to send him off again on a foreign mission.

A Boston company has established a line of steamers to Venezuela. The first ship, El Hero, left about a fortnight since.

POSTSCRIPT. June 23. By advices from Washington just received, we are informed that the action of our Minister to the Court of Brazil was not authorized by the U.S. Government, and that the State Department has ordered him to be demanded for his arrest, on account of his difficulty with the Brazilian Secretary of War, relative to the American claims against that Government.

The Chevalier Webb is also censured for his want of diplomatic courtesy and tact on several other occasions, and will probably never be entrusted with any other mission.

We were glad to hear of the safety of our Minister General MacMahon, and think the Allies were, to say the least, very discourteous to a friendly nation, to detain dispatches that would have relieved our anxiety with regard to our representative, whom we feared had been murdered by order of the Paraguayan tyrant. However, I suppose we are necessitated to war! The laying of a submarine telegraphic cable between France and the United States was commenced yesterday at Brest. Good bye, CORA.

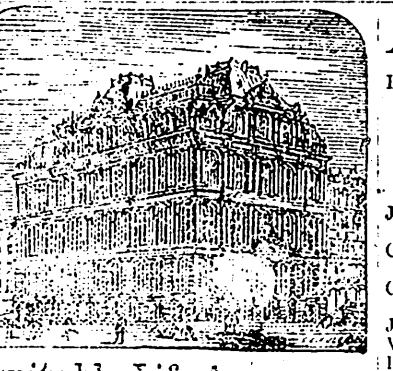
