SPAIN.

REMINISCENCES OF THE WAR.

Another of the English sufferers from Paraguay has come to tell us the story of his adventures during the late war, and there are some passages of remarkable interest.

Charles Crane states as follows:— I am a native of Jersey, and came to this country in 1857, as a rigger. I joined the Paraguayan steamer Rio Blanco same year, at this port: her commander was Captain Morris, who had brought out the Tacuary from London in 1853. We took 25 Paraguayan youths to be educated in England, and after a stay of 4 months in London returned to Paraguay. In the following year, 1858, we made another trip to England, this time taking tobacco, yerba, and timber; on the way we got dismasted off Rio and had to put in there for repairs. Returning to Asuncion I was next ordered to the Tacuary as 2nd officer, and in 1859 we brought down Gen. Lopez to make peace between Buenos Ayres and the Confederation. We were detained 4 months in this port till old Lopez paid the Canstatt indemnity: after this we used to run from Humayta to Asuncion. In 1861 I was sent ashore to the arsenal at Asuncion to help Mr. Boyle in the new steamer Igurey, and as soon as she was launched I came down to Buenos Ayres and bought all the rigging for her. We carried the mails to and from Paraguay till the breaking out of the war in November 1864.

When Lopez seized the Brazilian steamer Marques de Olinda, my wife had just died, leaving me with a little girl seven years old, that I had to entrust to my neighbors, for I was ordered on active service. We mounted four carronades, 24-pounders, and an English stern-chaser, 32-pounder, with a crew of 160 Paraguayans, and carrying the flag of Admiral Mesa: the engineers were Kirby and Ximenez, and the physician Dr. Skinner. About the middle of December the fleet was equipped for the conquest of Matto Grosso, comprising the steamers Igurey, Tacuary, Salto de Guayra, Ypora, Jejuy, and Rio Appa, besides two sailing vessels, and six small gunboats, built by Mr. Charles Cousins, each carrying a 90-pounder and a crew of 14 men; the expedition counted about 6,000 fighting men.

On the 4th of January, 1865, about sunrise, we arrived off Fort Coimbra, which refused to surrender, and the gunboats opened fire, while General Barrios led his men to the assault and took the fort after a fight of two hours. The garrison escaped down to the water's edge, and got away in the boats of the war-steamer Anahmbay. The Ypora went in pursuit, captured the Anahmbay and a schooner, with a number of prisoners, the rest escaping to the woods. We got plenty of ammunition in the fort, and 7 or 8 cast-iron guns, for trophies. Leaving a small force at Coimbra we ascended the river to Curumba, and occupied that place; we found some Italian, French and German dealers or artisans, besides some Brazilian women. In the old fort there were some 6-pounders, of no use. The supplies of sugar, salt, and provisions of all kinds found here were of great utility to the fleet. We lay here four months, till ordered back to Asuncion; the Salto, Appa, and Anahmbay remained behind with 500 men to hold the place.

The expedition against Corrientes was ready in the beginning of April, and on the 12th of that month we left Humayta and next morning seized the Argentine steamers lying in the first named port, taking them to Humayta the same day. After this we were engaged carrying troops from Humayta and the Tobiquary to Paso la Patria, till the month of June. The Brazilian fleet was now blockading at the Tres Bocas, and Lopez ordered Admiral Mesa to surprise the enemy before sunrise and bring up the vessels prisoners. Our fleet consisted of 7 steamers, viz. Tacuary (flag-ship), Igurey, Jejuy, Ypora, Salto Oriental, Marques Olinda, and Pirabebuy (Ranger), with six chalcas or gunboats. The Brazilian fleet, consisting of 16 steamers, was lying near the Chaco, below Tres Bocas, and we ran by them unseen at half past 4 in the morning; but Mesa was an incompetent old man and hesitated to attack as ordered. He kept his way down the river, giving the enemy (who soon saw us) time to get up steam, slip their cables, and come in pursuit. We came abreast of the Riachuelo about daybreak, and at 7 o'clock the enemy came down in two divisions of 8 vessels each; one division passed below us, the other remained above, to get us between two fires. At the same time we had a land-battery of 10 guns under Gen. Burgues, which did some service in the fight.

The battle of the Riachuelo began by our flagship boarding the Belmont; the crew of the latter ran down below, and our men held possession for nearly half-an-hour till others of the enemy's ships came up and swept the decks with grape and canister. While our vessel Igurey was engaged with the Jequitinhonha, the latter went aground, and our land-battery killed several of her crew: at the same time the Brazilian riflemen from the tops picked down several on board the Igurey. The superior number and weight of metal of the enemy soon prevailed: they ran into and sunk three of our vessels, the Salto, Olinda, and Jejuy, besides disabling the Ygurey by a shot through her boiler, and sinking all our "chalcas."

At 10.45 a.m. Admiral Mesa, who was wounded in the fight, signalled to retreat, and led the way with the Tacuary; the Ygurey, Ypora, and Pirabebuy following. We had lost 600 between killed and wounded, or about half our original strength; but the Brazilians lost fully 2,000, their heavy casualties being aboard the Belmont, Jequitinhonha, and Amazonas.

We reached Humayta next morning, with our colours flying, and were received with shouts of "Vivan los Venecadores del Riachuelo."

At this time Lopez had his headquarters at Paso Pucu: the garrison of Humayta was 15,000 strong, and the whole Paraguayan army, including the forces in Corrientes, exceeded 80,000 men. After the battle we took the screw and guns out of the Yequitinhonha, mounting the guns at Curupaity. Lopez afterwards gave me \$150 for my services in the battle.

As soon as the Igurey had her boiler repaired we went up to Asuncion. In December 1867 Lopez abandoned Paso Pucu and we took him up to his new head-quarters at San Fernando, about 15 leagues above Humayta. The allies took Pilar soon after, and burned the Olympo and 25 de Mayo, but did not see the Igurey and Tacuary although we were in a "rache" so near that the flames of the other vessels were visible. The Brazilians afterwards put a chain across from Tayi to the Chaco, which prevented our going up to Asuncion. We then went to Humayta and took away sixteen 68 pounders, with which we threw up a new battery at Timbo-

When the fleet forced the pass at Humayta we deserted our ships and got ashore, leaving only two old carronades and some tercios of yerba. The Brazilian vessels on coming up sank both the Igurey and Tacuary in fifteen fathoms of water. We were then ordered to cross the Chaco to San Fernando, a distance of eighteen leagues, our only food being beef. We remained a fortnight at San Fernando; Lopez was there, and Burgues acted as commander: he was afterwards lanceet with Barrios.

FROM SAN FERNANDO I WAS SENT TO

Asuncion, where I took ague and fever, and was ill for three months during which time Dr. Major Parody was very kind to me. I joined the Yberá at San Fernando, and again took fever. At this time Lopez's fortunes growing desperate, he ordered our captain to take the ships to Lanabari and sink them there, to prevent the ironclads passing up. I was then sent to Mr. Nesbitt of the arsenal to lend a hand there, and all my countrymen treated me very kindly.

FOREIGN ITEMS.

A PROPOSAL TO MAKE A NEW SEA.

The London "Standard" says:—"L'opinion vient en avantage. M. de Lesseps is not content with diverting the commerce of the world, and carrying ships across an isthmus, he now contemplates a project for remodelling a continent and creating a new ocean. He has ascertained that the general level of Sahara is below that of the water in the Red Sea, and he is represented to be thinking of cutting a passage for it into the interior. There is something almost absurd in the idea of making a new sea, but next to the audacity of the project the most remarkable thing about it seems to be its simplicity. If only these things were ascertained by M. de Lesseps to be true, what is to prevent the desert from becoming a vast lake of salt water? The voyagers sent to investigate the matter declare that the ground slopes down to an average level of twenty-seven metres below that of the adjacent gulf. Cut a canal through the intervening patch of high land, and what is to prevent the water from flowing in? It is becoming evident that M. de Lesseps is not a man to be trifled with, and we sincerely hope he will not find the British Islands anyhow in his way, if he might propose to dredge them off the map of Europe. If he disestablishes the desert of Sahara nothing will stop him afterwards, and we shall expect to see him undertaking to warm the North Pole, or getting up a company for supplying the nations of the world with inland lakes, rivers, forests, and all physical phenomena on the lowest terms. An International Congress with the following programme is to open at Brest on the 20th September:—"To maintain and encourage the study of the language, literature, customs, and history of the Celtic races, and create a bond of union between the men who take an interest in those questions in France, Great Britain, and elsewhere."

UNITED STATES COLONISTS IN BRAZIL.

The day before yesterday there arrived at this port the U.S. steam frigate Commodore, from Rio de Janeiro, where she has long been the flag-ship of the American squadron in the S. Atlantic. Her return voyage throws an additional interest from the fact that she brought home as passengers twenty or more ex-rebels, who, after the downfall of the Confederate cause, resolved upon expatriation, and sought to establish a colony for the culture of cotton, sugar, and coffee in the interior of Brazil. Their husbandry was successful, but the disadvantages of climate and soil were so great that they repented of their hasty step, and at last resolved to come back to their old homes. 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keep and not sell them, and they will always get their 12 per cent.

By adopting the United States system, with which the present President of the Republic must be intimately acquainted, and by continuing the punctual payment of the interest as hitherto, the Government and the country will secure the following advantages:

- 1st. Increase in the value of their bonds, and consequent increase in their credit.
2nd. Popularity and publicity of their debt.
3rd. Facilities for future negotiations in financial matters without the intervention of agents, or the payment of commission, &c.
4th. Security to proprietors of bonds which does not exist under the present system.

In conclusion, I would suggest that the whole of the present debt should be called in, and new Bonds issued for the amount, calculating 16 hard dollars to the gold ounce, and not 17, as hitherto.

At the same time, a more perfect document might be made at a trifling cost, and which would prevent forgery.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Rosario sailed last night for Montevideo, taking a supplementary mail for the Anis, which vessel leaves that port for Europe to-day.

Three days will not be sufficient for taking the census of the city on the system adopted. It would take a couple of months, even allowing the employés only five minutes to ascertain in a personal interview the approximate age of each lady in the metropolis, the most difficult operation connected with the taking of the census.

'Punch' is no more to be sold than the Archbishop of Canterbury, or the Poet Laureate, or the British Neptune, or Gog and Magog, or any other undying representative of the power, the truth, the wit, the quaintness of Old England."

"Mary Stuart" was repeated by Madame Ristori on Monday night before a house filled in every part. "Elizabeth" was announced for last evening.

Authorship has become popular of late years amongst crowned heads. His Majesty the Emperor of Brazil has lately entered the lists as a translator of Whittier's poem, 'The Cry of a Lost Soul,' into Portuguese. The Imperial author has sent to the poet an autograph copy of his translation, together with two specimens of the 'alma perdida,' whose desolate cry suggested the poem.

Our esteemed colleague 'El Rio de la Plata,' in an excellent article on immigration, states that the present class of immigrants is by no means what is wanting to drive the country ahead on the path of progress, and that the advent of a proper kind of home and sinew for this purpose depends chiefly on the measures adopted by Government to attract it to our shores. President Sarmiento's Government has accomplished much during the short time it is in power; but this important question has as yet received but a trifling share of its attention. The only really good colonists are those of Anglo-Saxon, Celtic, or Teutonic race, and no number of any other blood can make up, in the long run, for this absence. To attracting such to this country by wise administrative measures, the attention of Government should be devoted.

It is said that Congress will continue its sittings longer than usual this year in consequence of the numerous important measures still lying before it. The session has been wasted in political discussion, and the time has now come for "the slaughter of the innocents"; they will, we fear, receive small consideration from tired out Congressmen. Limbo till next year is the destination marked out for most of them.

The speculation in Bonds increases as the date of the coupons (30th inst.) approaches. English brokers buy largely to-day, and it is known that some parties buy in order to get the dividend and themselves again. The sales to-day were 2,000 cash at 62 1/2, and for the month 8,000 cash at 62 1/2. The sales on long dates were 14,000, the rate for end of October being 62 1/2, and for Dec. 31st. 63 to 62 1/2. There were no 'venditions.' In another column will be found a letter from Mr. Russell Shaw on the payment of coupons in London.

An opinion has recently been given by Dr. Roque Perez which will probably have more influence on the price of National Bonds than the united efforts of bears and bulls; it is to the effect that excoeters are duly authorized to invest any monies entrusted to their charge in National Bonds, in lieu of a deposit in the Provincial Bank. The difference in interest is too great to be overlooked, and the excoeters of the Jacomet estate have purchased close on twenty-eight thousand Bonds.

Exchange on England is weaker, and the rate may be quoted at 4 1/2. Money for discount continues about the same, from 8 to 12 per cent. according to the kind of paper. The Argentine Bank shares are not at 5 1/2 but a premium as yesterday; we note a sale of 50 shares at 6 per cent. premium.

Don Antonio Cané and Don Miguel Pondal have been admitted members of the Bolsa, and the following persons seek admission—Juan P. de la Barra, Juan M. de Emparanza, Pablo E. Ferrari, and Pedro S. Zumarán. The committee of 'ambassadors' for the current month is composed of Messrs. Maschwitz, Mendez, and Ramos.

Sheepskins continue in demand, and the price of fat sheep for the saladeros is remunerative.

The Savoie and Magellan have arrived in Montevideo: the former has dates to August 16th; the latter was advertised to leave Liverpool on the 20th August, but her papers are not yet to hand, as the Capitania had not sent off the visit when the telegram was sent—3 p.m.

The news per Savoie is as follows:—Liverpool, August 16—cotton sales, 19,000 bales at 13 1/2, cotton rising everywhere. No sensible change in European markets for River Plate produce. No political news. New York, August 11—gold 3 1/2, exchange 10 1/2. News from Montevideo is—Lopez, 88 weeks, three thousand American hides at 60 gold despatched, and five thousand at barter, supposed to be at same price. The Magellan leaves for the West Coast tomorrow. The Rosario takes the supplemental mail this afternoon for the French packet. The City of Buenos Ayres leaves on Friday, and the Savoie on Monday 20th inst. The Uruguay is hourly expected from Liverpool.
