MICHAELMAS DAY.

This day is associated with many

peculiar customs of our ancestors,

some of which are handed down in the

pages of writers of the olden time,

others are still preserved to the pre-
sent day, perhaps with the idea of re-
garding them as "guardian-angels"

of which St Michael was always reput-
ed prince. A more famous custom was

that of eating roast goose for dinner,

the origin of which has puzzled all our
antiquaries. It is vulgarly thought

that Queen Elizabeth gave rise to the

custom, from the fact that Her Majes-
ty was eating goose on Michaelmas

day when she learned the glorious

news of the destruction of the Spanish

Armada. It is, however, not the real

origin of the custom, for we can trace

it back as far as the reign of Edward

IV., more than 100 years before.

When the Gregorian Calendar was

adopted in England, in 1582 altering

the date by 12 days the middle class-
es made much objection on the grounds

that it would cause confusion if Mich-
aelmas day was not celebrated when

the stately geese were in their highest

perfection. There is an old proverb: "If
you eat goose on Michaelmas day,
you will never want money all the
year round." It is really a pity that
these are so little in request in Buenos

Ayres, but we may at least console

ourselves with the idea that our friends

in the mother country still keep it

in the old custom. To-day is a holiday

in many Catholic countries, but not in

South America. The function of the
day is however celebrated with great

pomp at San Miguel church.

OUR AMERICAN CORRESPONDENT.

New York, Aug. 23, 1869.

The Emperor is even now, after a reign of upwards of 40 years, only 46; he would, therefore, come to Europe in the full maturity of his great faculties and of his physical vigour, be able to see and observe for himself, and return full of those matured and competent impressions which would constitute a new point of departure in the administration of the Empire. Of one thing his Majesty may be certain, that, come when he may, his reception in Europe will prove equal to his merits as a prince and to the modest unassuming recitative of his private life.—*River Plate Mail*.

DEATH OF WELLS THE CELEBRATED AERONAUT.

(From the *Courrier de la Plata*.)

Our readers will probably not have forgotten the first aeronaut who made a balloon ascent in Buenos Ayres. Mr. Wells lost his balloon on the occasion of a second or third ascent, and was near losing a life, which has at last come to a close in the following manner.

This intrepid North American made an ascent on the 12th August, and descended at Cascina de Mezzo, near Milan. His balloon was only half inflated, and he resolved to bring it back to Milan in this condition. He inquired from the peasants the shortest and most open way, whereupon the trees would not impede his progress towards the high road. Some pointed out one way, others a different one, and at last Mr. Wells chose his own route. The balloon was placed in a cart, which had soon to come to a halt from the numerous obstacles in the way. The wind at this moment began to rise and threatened to carry away balloon and cart together.

Mr. Wells is trying to set things right fell into a ditch, but managed to get out the best way he could. At last the cart with its freight was brought on the high road, but such was the force of the wind here that 50 men proved unable to hold the balloon down.

The aeronaut-inspired by a spirit of daring then resolved to reascend, and thus try to reach Milan. He jumped into the cart, cut the cords, and the balloon immediately shot upwards with awful rapidity. When at a height of 6,000 feet the aeronaut thought himself over Milan and determined to descend. The weather was very warm and the balloon inflated rapidly under the influence of the heated atmosphere. Not anticipating danger Mr. Wells set about preparing the anchor, but suddenly perceived that the netting was about to burst; he snatched at the cord attached to the valve, but he was too late; the balloon burst, and he fell from the giddy height to earth, and was carried dead into Milan at 7 o'clock that evening.
