PROPOSED CONQUEST OF ARAUCANIA. (From the "West Coast Mail.") Valparaiso, Sept. 10th.

The terms which have already been submitted to the Indians through the mediation of Father Estanislao Maria Lecocq, are substantially as follows:

As for the Prince's garb, he wore a dark blue coat; grayish plaid trousers, a plain black necktie and lavender-colored kid gloves. So he came

down the gangway with his hat held gracefully aloof from his head, bowing and smiling anon to spectators and the Highlanders, who saluted, and followed to his carriage by the Governor General and other dignitaries.

Passengers by the City of Paris report the Prince as very affable on the voyage, winning all folks' good will. This afternoon he attended one of the Episcopal churches. To-morrow he is to have a formal and, maybe, enthusiastic reception, and several festivities are contemplated in his honor.

THE LATE MARSHAL NIEL. Adolphe Niel, Marshal of France, Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour, died, on the 13th inst., at his official residence, the Ministry of War.

General Niel was placed in charge of the engineering department in the Ministry of War, named a member of the committees on engineering and fortifications, and appointed one of the Council of State.

Goods in Lighters. Buenos Ayres, Sept. 27, 1869. To the Editors of the 'Standard.' Gentlemen,

As your much-read paper appears to me the best to make general grievances known, I ask of you the favor to insert following:—

It is a known fact that merchandise despatched from the vessels in port, into lighters, on their way to the Custom-house very often diminishes not in number, but in contents, and in nine cases out of ten the Captains are made responsible, and have to pay for it.

It being in the interest both of Captains and receivers of cargo to know what happens on board of some lighters, I feel it my duty to state the following case, for which I have the best reliable information.

Yesterday in the middle of the day a lighter was anchored in the inner-roads, a number of barrels (perhaps 15) apparently sugar, were taken out on deck, and quantities taken out, whether this was for the sake of testing the article or other purposes, I do not venture to say; but any one whom it might interest can get more information.

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
