Montevideo, Oct. 29, 6, P.M. Bank paper opened at 11 1/2, and closed at 11. Nothing political. All quiet. The "Triumph" appears as usual.

THE BRITISH LIBRARY.

The usual yearly meeting took place on Thursday night, there being less than dozens members present. The outgoing committee handed in their report for the past year, which may be summed up in a few words. The number of subscribers is exactly the same as at the beginning of the year...

Nevertheless there are two or three untoward symptoms likely to cause uneasiness to the friends of the Institute. It is remarked that among the subscribers who have lately withdrawn their names are some of the oldest supporters of the library and leading merchants of the city. We can hardly suppose that motives of economy have induced men of large fortune to suspend a paltry subscription of £2 per annum...

Corporal Pio Galliano, recently arrived from Lopez's camp, made the following statement:—He started from Caraguati about the end of December, with orders to chase the allied force at San Joaquín, where he arrived eight days afterwards. The Paraguayan force there numbered 200 men and boys with twelve pieces of artillery and about 80 bullock carts. In Caraguati all the families banished to Yeha are at present. That Lopez has a cavalry regiment at Panadero; that Lopez has told the people the allies are at last retreating, and that he no longer makes entrenched encampments; that in the month of September Lopez shot three Colonels and sixty soldiers for treason. This is the old story.

A correspondent of the 'Siglo' of Montevideo states:—I have during the last few days seen the corpses of eight poor boys in the public market of Asunción who have died of sheer starvation!!! The health of the city could hardly be worse; disease and sickness everywhere, and a fearful stench in all the streets.

The present revenue of the Library is only sufficient to pay the more immediate expenses of rent, gas, and librarian's salary, leaving nothing for new books except the surplus cash on hand, now amounting to 10,000\$. Hence it appears that if the in-coming year be like the last, the above sum will go to pay for new books and then the institute will find itself without a dollar in reserve. Here we come to a point that involves serious consideration. Would it not be advisable to sell every year a lot of old books at least equal in number to the new volumes added?

As to the advantage of possessing a British Library in this city we cannot imagine that anyone would seriously call it in question. It must be maintained at all hazard, and for this end we must devise some means of making it more popular, more ostentatious, and more generally useful.

THE SAN CARLOS COLONY. PROCLAMATION OF CABAL.

Governor Cabal has thrown off the mask and publicly laments the death of the scoundrel Denis: His Excellency has even the temerity to call the colonists assassins, for avenging their slaughtered compatriots. If the Nat. Government is powerless to help the colonists we should advise them to abandon their homes and fields once for all, and seek some more civilized and hospitable abode than Santa Fé. The following is Cabal's proclamation—

LATEST INTELLIGENCE FROM PARAGUAY.

LOPEZ IN THE MOUNTAINS. Yesterday we had fresh dates from that ruined land, called Paraguay. Things seem to be going from bad to worse up there, and the new tonnage tax placed on vessels will probably effectually do up the trade of the port of Asunción.

Hard by the theatre is a large deposit of gunpowder which, when least expected, may blow up, tumbling the whole city. The sun is so hot, and people so careless, that the danger is imminent. Amongst the shipping community there is increased disgust at the conduct of the Provisional Government in imposing such taxes on the shipping. Passenger steamers will now have to pay from \$25 to £30 per trip. This, of course, must come out of the pockets of the passengers.

General Camara has lauded a strong force at Concepción, and is trying to extend his lines from San Estanislau, where the Prince is encamped. The weather has been very severe—constant rain and wind—roads in a terrible state. In all the small towns along the rivers the people have gone back, and are settling down; but the poverty that reigns is something fearful. The people in these little towns have nothing to eat, save the roots they can pick up, and the leaves of the trees; even mandioca is now scarce, and can with difficulty be found by the unfortunate, ruined, exhausted people.

The new organ of public opinion, 'La Regeneracion,' has had great difficulties to contend; few people will subscribe to the journal because it refuses to attack the Government, and the small subscription it does enjoy has been walked off with by the rascally repudiator, who has made tracks. Some English merchants from Montevideo have arrived at Asunción to look after the sunken steamer Doña Francisca. The river is falling fast and all along the route from Buenos Ayres to Asunción there are schooners and steamers aground.

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LATEST FROM SANTA FE. PETITION TO PRES. SARMIENTO.

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San Carlos Colony Oct. 20th. Fellow-citizens and foreigners! The double crime of which you have been at the same time witnesses and victims has horrified the people of the whole Province. The horrible murder of the honest family of Lefebvre, and the no less horrible and barbarous assassination of Colonel Denis, have brought me here to prevent the fatal consequences of this double crime which threatens to overwhelm the colony with ruin and desolation, and I have also come to seize the criminals and hand them over to the tribunals for punishment. A portion of the criminals who committed this double butchery are already in the hands of justice, and order is now restored, owing to my arrival at the lucky moment, in time to prevent a new outrage a collision between natives and foreigners under the pretext of making private vengeance take the place of law and reparation.

When you set foot on the territory of this province, which receives you with hospitality and with open arms as if you were her own sons, you are at once invested with the same rights as natives, and protected by our institutions, which are the most liberal in the world; but at the same time you contract the sacred duty of respecting the authorities and obeying the laws of the country. The murder of Colonel Denis is a double crime against the authorities and against the laws of the land that gives you so generous a reception, and the Government is determined to oblige you to fulfil the most primary of your duties.

The foreigner who lands upon our soil is our guest, to whom we owe every kind of protection, for his rights are as sacred as our own. The Constitution treats him as our brother, overlooking the difference of race and color, for all are alike within the limits of this fatherland of ours. The crime committed upon the honest family of Lefebvre is one to which you assented, because it casts a slur upon each and all of you. Until the tribunals chastise this crime according to law, be assured that the Government will cause to be respected the foreigner who lands upon our shores, and we have both the means and intention to do so.

Now that peace and tranquillity are re-established, after the painful events alluded to, I am going to disband the forces which I brought hither to vindicate the cause of law and order. I trust that no further disturbances will occur to break in on the harmony that should prevail among you, and that the remembrance of past misfortunes will serve as a lesson to all of you; then, when rivalry disappears, may the bonds of love and fraternal affection unite you, as well as all the nations from one end to the other of the globe.

The undersigned by virtue of the guarantees of the Constitution beg to petition the President of the Republic and respectfully lay before Your Excellency the lamentable state of insecurity owing to the present Government in Santa Fé. All of us, natives as well as foreigners, are reduced to the condition of seeing our lives and properties in jeopardy, for the Government lends us no protection. Witness the recent tragedy at the Swiss Colony and the way in which the matter was settled. The Government has no funds, and our lives and properties are in hourly danger. The occasion is so pressing, that if speedy measures be not adopted the Swiss Colonies will be ruined, immigration will be stopped altogether, and this Province, instead of becoming a blooming garden, will be converted into a desert and a hot-bed of crime.

We, therefore, pray Your Excellency's assistance.

The following is a translation of a letter addressed to our Rosario colleague 'La Patria' which contains some important information. San Carlos Colony, Oct. 21, 1869. Sr. Don Pedro Ruedo. My esteemed Friend, Being aware of the noble sentiments you have at all times manifested in favour of foreigners, I have no hesitation in addressing myself to you, and give you an account of the disagreeable events of which this colony has lately been the scene, hoping that through the columns of your enlightened and popular newspaper you may exert your influence on the National Government and see that those securities and guarantees which the laws of your country grant to immigrants may be duly enforced in our case.

The great drawback against which the colonies have to contend in the road of their prosperity and progress are the Indians of the Sauce who are located in the centre of those most flourishing colonies of Santa Fé. The evils inflicted upon us by these indigenous settlers are incalculable and inevitable. As those Indians are nearly destitute and depend for their maintenance upon Government which protects them, their existence is no
