REPUTATION JUSTIFIED.

All Buenos Ayres is in error,—the whole River Plate gone wrong! In the long history of business transactions, speculations, &c., strict repudiation has never found a voice until now. A speculator in National Bonds has fled—for the sake of his health!—and the commercial world must be remodelled, honor and principle alike trampled upon, to make MANUEL GOMEZ PEREIRA—an honest man!

In fact, we, with others, must confess that this document has taken us all aback, and that we looked more for the arrest of Mr. Gomez, or the particulars of his flight to Europe, than any vain attempt on his part to justify his conduct, or make wrong right; but Gomez Pereira, although he could rule the Bond-market and outwit the brokers, can never hope to set himself right before the public. Dishonor and repudiation are too indelibly stamped upon his brow, and his pathetic protest, which we published yesterday, has been pronounced by the public of the Plate as one mighty, magnificent—LIE!

was accompanied to the mole-head by a number of friends; he might have enhanced the merit of this statement by giving the names of those boson friends—"show me your company and I'll tell you who you are"—and also observing that the day of his memorable Hégira was Sunday, a day when brokers and merchants are usually amusing themselves in the suburbs instead of watching on the mole-head the movements of their clients. Gomez stated that he remained two days in Montevideo, but he should have added, on board the good steamer City of Limerick, and which steamer did not sail sooner; and, furthermore, that when he left Buenos Ayres he took his passage merely to Montevideo, when his bourn was Rio Janeiro!!!

Gomez told all his friends in Montevideo that he was going for the benefit of his health to Rio; strange, very strange, that he said nothing whatever here about his intentions. So ignorant was the public of his movements, that when his departure was announced, it was generally believed he had gone to the baths of Baden Baden or Homburg!

He further states that he left no accounts unpaid at Buenos Ayres, and that it is not to be wondered at that a person should decline to carry out a purchase or sale of National Bonds in the absence of any formal contract reciprocally binding the parties. As regards his leaving debts unpaid we hear on good authority that so improved was his departure that he actually left a small sum to his credit in one of the banks in this city. But his bond business is of a different stamp; he had bought through his broker, Mr. Alkein, 400,000 bonds to receive on the 31st October, and through Messrs. Correa Morales and Larrazabal a still heavier amount to receive on 31st December. Had the bond market held up, doubtless his health would not have given way, and his medical advisers would not have recommended a trip to Rio until their patient had culled the profits of the speculation.

But the bond market had tumbled, and there was no reasonable probability of prices for some lengthened time reaching the figures which he had so incautiously agreed to pay; strict repudiation was the only safe line of conduct left, and hence the begira. Gomez Pereira lays great stress upon his shipping gold, but he omitted to say at what hour the specie in question was brought to the agents of the steamer. We can supply the omission by stating that the gold was brought to Messrs. Woodgnie's at the very last moment; furthermore, Gomez Pereira took exchange in the market on Rio, but he forgot to take it in his own name; and it is really surprising that so sharp a man in such matters should take his bills payable in fifteen days to order, and when the market rate ruled on Rio at 42 mil reis, and 42,000, these Gomez bills were passed at 41,850. Can Gomez Pereira explain this?

But this protest of Gomez Pereira is all one tissue of falsehood and cheat; the plain facts of the case are as we have already stated. Gomez Pereira has fled Buenos Ayres to escape liabilities which every honorable man respects. Had he not funds to meet them, had he lost all in previous speculations, and been compelled to fly to escape imprisonment, his conduct would be less censurable, but he openly states that he shipped the very gold which he won from honorable men, who admitted him into their circle. Take your gold, Gomez Pereira, and take with it the decree of the Camara Sindical banishing you from the Bolsa. As for your reputation, don't seek to defend what would be an advantage had you lost.

The following document, signed by Don Amadeo Gras, one of the brokers who has lost heavily by this Gomez Pereira, speaks for itself:—"Sir, I have just this moment read a letter signed by the swindler Gomez, and published in the Jornal do Comercio. I confess I am astonished at the audacity of this infamous thief, who, not content with having made off with the fruits of my many years honorable labour, pretends to justify his conduct."

"Luckily this man has perpetrated his frauds on others also, and who enjoys a high and honorable reputation, such as Messrs. Correa Morales, and Alkein, and who, by long years of assiduous toil, have earned their high reputation. It is useless to contradict the lies contained in this letter. The public of Buenos Ayres is aware that Gomez fled this city without advising anyone, taking with him bills payable to order, and large sums of gold. My books, and those of the other brokers presented before the Camara Sindical of the Bolsa, prove the fact that we purchased large amounts of Bonds for account of Gomez, and my operations, which were then on the point of being realised, were known to many brokers, who can attest the fact."

"This infamous swindler tries to shield himself by the good faith and the confidence with which we worked for him, and which his grey hairs inspired, which he should not have dishonored, having one foot in the grave, and an unerring Judge to try him!"

CONSULAR HEROISM.

Consuls although filling a very high and responsible post are rarely called upon to play the part of heroes. The following narrative of the conduct of a British Consul (who was accompanied by an American Consul) will indeed be grateful to our readers, for it proves that neither climate nor influence can, when the hour of danger arrives, subjugate the noble feelings of a true Englishman, Scotchman, Irishman or American; appear as we may in the ordinary routine of life when the post of danger comes, we are equal to it.

The humble gentleman who filled the post of British Consul at Santiago, in the Island of Cuba, Mr. W. F. Ramsden, has proved himself a hero in the true sense of the word. In his own country, where such noble conduct is thoroughly appreciated, he will receive the highest praise and reward. Here, even here, in this remote corner of the globe, let Mr. Ramsden and his colleague know, that their heroic action has endeared their names to every member of our community, and we thank our esteemed Italian colleague for calling our attention to a deed which should be published in the columns of every newspaper in the world, and emblazoned history.

Wetrest in our American exchanges to find further particulars of this memorable act. We give our readers today the details as taken from our Italian colleague. Such men as Ramsden and his American colleague are of the true guinea stamp, and their exequials are registered in Heaven.

Mr. Wallaston F. Ramsden, English Consul in Santiago de Cuba. An American sailor, son of an Englishman, was lately arrested in Santiago de Cuba and accused of forming a band of filibusters; although his guilt was by no means fully proved he was condemned to death, notwithstanding the protests entered by the English and American consuls.

On the day named for his execution he was led forth surrounded by all the accessories usual in such cases, the English Consul and American Vice Consul accompanying him to the ground. On arriving at the spot marked out for the execution Mr. Ramsden read in a loud voice a protest on the part of England and America, declaring the accused innocent of his crime imputed to his charge, and that if he were shot the Spanish authorities would be held responsible for murder by both these nations.

While Mr. Ramsden read the protest in a firm and decisive tone, the Spanish soldiers, anxious to sacrifice this innocent life, manifested the utmost impatience. The authorities were hurriedly consulted, and an answer returned to Mr. Ramsden and the American Consul, to the effect that the prisoner had taken arms against Spain, and was for that reason condemned to death; that it was now too late, and that the sentence should be carried out; at the same moment the officer in command gave the word, ready!

In an instant Mr. Ramsden and the American Consul rushed forward on the levelled muskets, carrying their respective national flags in their hands. They covered the condemned man with their bodies, shouting, hold! hold! Mr. Ramsden wrapped the British flag round his own and the prisoner's body, and addressing the captain who commanded the company, said in a ringing voice, "in my character of Consul for Great Britain, I cannot remain a passive spectator of the murder of an innocent man, it is my duty to protect his life, and you shall undertake it by passing over my body."

These words were uttered by Mr. Ramsden, standing in front of the sailor before the levelled muskets, and with eyes blazing with indignation; the American Consul, meanwhile, acted in a similar manner.

At seeing this the Spaniards were thunderstruck, though but little understanding the heroism displayed by both Consuls. The prisoner, overcome by his emotion, shed tears while being held up by both his protectors. Another consultation was held by the authorities, and it was resolved to liberate the prisoner, under the guarantee of the Consuls that he would immediately embark for a foreign port.

IMPORTANT FROM RIO DE JANEIRO. INAUGURATION OF A NEW DOCK. Gentlemen, We have rather a stir in the city today, caused by the formal opening of our new Custom-house Dock, by H. I. M. the Emperor. Notwithstanding the threatening appearance of the sky, about 9 a.m. it cleared up a little, and at ten minutes past 10 precisely his Majesty made his appearance.

The bridge having been already thrown across, H. I. M. accompanied by several Ministers, Custom-house authorities, Capitaes do Porto, &c. then crossed the bridge and walked along the outside pier, looking at everything of note on the way. Arriving at the end we turned round and made for the steps where we got into a boat which was awaiting us, we then rowed along the pier and under several of the arches, the Emperor examining the work very minutely and expressing great satisfaction with every part of the work. We then got out of the boat and followed His Majesty to the bridge where he declared the steps free to the public. We then embarked in a small steamer (Viera do Castro) and made for Rat Island, where his Majesty very carefully examined the lime-stone, which comes from England. The Engineer, André Rebouças explaining the process of reducing it to lime, he then explained the kiln and other works on the island, after which we again embarked. Arrived at the Custom-house pier, walked through to the back part where H. I. M. laid the foundation stone of a new warehouse in continuation of the present new Custom-house. We then passed through the gate into the street which has been lengthened by knocking down part of the old Custom-house; arriving there, his Majesty looked over it, but not saying anything, the engineer, André Rebouças, asked him if the street was open or not, upon which, he replied yes.

The piers were gallily decorated with flags, as were the vessels in proximity to the docks, notwithstanding which, the whole affair passed over very dull. After opening the new street which was named "Visconde de Iraporá" the Emperor got into his carriage and drove off at 12 o'clock precisely. The whole proceeding occupying about two hours.

His Majesty was dressed in dress coat, black pants, white vest and a eaved-in hat. There is nothing more of importance. The Cordillera has made one of the quickest passages on record—20 days from Liverpool, and 13 days from Lisbon. Business very dull and no new quotations.

EDITOR'S TABLE. To-day being the festival of St. Martin, patron of Buenos Ayres, is a strict holiday. St. Martin was Bishop of Tours and uncle to St. Patrick. We publish to-day an account of a thrilling incident of the Cuban revolution, which will be read with feelings of pride by every subject of Great Britain in these countries. Mr. Woolaston F. Ramsden has been English Consul for some years at Santiago de Cuba, and has ever been distinguished for extreme zeal in the discharge of his duties. The act, which will render his name known and admired in every civilized country on the face of the globe, will no doubt meet with its deserved reward at the hands of the British Foreign Office. Things remain quiet in Montevideo. A slight improvement is remarked in business, and paper money has slightly improved in value. Dr. Ramirez has again assumed the direction of the 'Siglo' which now appears as usual. It is said that the Government has come to an arrangement with the Banco Commercial by which the notes of this establishment will be converted in the month of March next. A notice has been issued by the Port Captain prohibiting ships anchoring in the river within four miles E. or W. of the electric submarine cable which lies between Colonia and Punta Lara N.N.E. to S.S.W. the latter point being marked by the Colonia light house, the course in which the cable lies is marked by three red buoys with the inscription Electric Cable in large letters. The Committee of the Buenos Ayres Universal Exhibition have resolved to establish in their grounds a Botanical and Zoological garden, modelled on that at Paris; it will also contain a splendid aquarium. The managers of this company seem determined to do all in their power to deserve the success which according to all appearances seems to await their efforts. Madame Ristori, leaves the River Plate on her return to Europe on the 16th of this month. She did not meet in Montevideo with the same success as in this city, partly, no doubt, owing to the disturbed state of political affairs there. The 'Tribuna' of yesterday morning contains the formal retirement of Don Rufino Varela from that paper. A desire to enjoy the repose of private life after many years of the stirring turmoil of an editors career has led to this step on the part of our late distinguished colleague, to whom, on his withdrawal from public life we cordially wish all the happiness he can desire. The Flametard arrived at Bahia on the 22nd of last month. A singular suicide has just been committed at Chilivico. A Frenchman employed on a chacra in the neighborhood was asked by two of his fellow-laborers to join them in an attempt to murder their patron and his family. Horrorstruck at such a proposal, he informed his master, who dismissed the men in question. They then threatened to murder the Frenchman, who, being of a weak character, went into town, left his property, consisting of 16,000 dollars, to the poor and church of Chilivico, and then blew out his brains. The deceased was universally respected, and his death has caused widespread regret. To-day is the River Plate "Derby Day," and there are but few of our countrymen in town who will not find their way to the downs of Belgrano. Every arrangement that can contribute to the convenience of the public has been made by the stewards, and the meeting promises to be the most successful ever held by the Jockey Club.

the entries promise good sport and many opportunities of improving the occasion to turfites and bookmakers. Trains will run from the Retiro Station every half hour during the day, so that there will be no difficulty in the way of conveyance to and fro. The Opera House presented a brilliant spectacle on Tuesday night, when Millo, Siebs, the gifted prima donna, took her benefit. We have rarely seen a more crowded or fashionable audience in this theatre. A select committee of the Rural Society went on Sunday by express train to Chilivico to inspect the grounds offered for the erection of the Agricultural Institute near that town. The committee returned to town on Monday evening. A number of criminals from Mercedes have been sent up to town, as the prison of that place is full and can hold no more. This is not a state of things at all flattering to the social condition of that partido. A kind of robbery in vogue in European cities has lately been introduced here; we allude to the practice of obbing children of their clothes, or any portable articles of value they may have about them. On Sunday last, a child aged seven years, was stopped in noonday by a Neapolitan, who placed a handkerchief over its mouth while perpetrating the robbery, and escaped before a policeman could come up. Parents should be careful not to allow children of tender years to wander about unwatched. An English gentleman, who is going overland to Chile, would be glad to meet with one or two travelling companions. Any one who may be disposed to join him, can apply at our office.

We received yesterday our West Coast exchanges, but are obliged to defer extracting from them till our next issue. Epicureans should pay a visit to the Café Restaurant of the Ancla Dorada, in Calle Cangallo, established by Messrs. Save Bros. Mr. E. Save, who has had a long experience in France, where he was employed as 'chef-de-cuisine' to Marshal Niel, will, we feel assured, give satisfaction to all who may patronize them. The 'carte-devin' is very complete, and comprises all the different classes of the finest Burgundy, Bordeaux, and other wines imported to this market. Messrs. Carbono and Lesperone, the well known almaceeros, have just received another consignment of Richardson's beer; it is confessedly the best in the Plate, but unfortunately is difficult to obtain owing to the limited quantities.

Next Sunday is the last day available for the inscription of names on the Civil Register. We had a visit, yesterday from Mr. Henly, the energetic pioneer of fax growing in this country. Mr. Henly, is sanguine as to successfully carrying out his intended enterprise notwithstanding Mr. Steam Plough Melrose, having cancelled the lease of the land he held from him in Frayle Muerto. We have no doubt of his ultimate success, as there is plenty of land to be had almost for the asking in various parts of the country. Mr. Henly, informs us that there is at present a great desire in England even amongst well to do people for emigration to the River Plate, but that the want of any reliable source of information as to the state and prospects of the country militates seriously against a steady flow of emigration hitherwards. We have done all in our power in publishing our Handbook to supply this want; the Government has as yet done nothing really practical to encourage immigration, which we want just at present far more than normal schools or German professors.

The Government are about to hand £6,200 to the Cordova Exhibition Committee, to defray the expenses of importing the materials for erecting the Exhibition building. Many of the streets are so broken up by the works of the Waterworks and Animal Gas Company that the Municipality has threatened both these bodies with proceedings unless they at once place the pavement in the position in which they found it. The new theatre was opened at San Fernando on Sunday last. Everything went off in a satisfactory manner, giving promise of greater success during the summer months when our citizens will seek this pleasant spot in greater numbers. The Municipality of the town are about to provide a band for the better entertainment of the inhabitants.

We received yesterday a letter from Mr. Coppinger, who has returned from England in the Cordillera; he has gone round in that vessel to Valparaiso. Mr. Coppinger has brought with him from England some splendid equine, bovine, and canine stock with the view of improving these breeds in Chile; he has also brought some magnificent gold and silver pheasants. The animals are all in splendid condition. The bulls are of the Hereford and short horned breeds. The horse is an Irish stallion of Melbourn blood, and was bought by Mr. Coppinger at the Dublin Exhibition show, he having failed to meet anything suitable in the English markets. The foxhounds and pheasants are presents to friends in Valparaiso, Mr. Coppinger had

many offers to bring out stock to Chile on commission, but preferred working on his own account. We publish to-day the decision of the Court in the rather celebrated case of Uriarte and Co. It will doubtless have a painful interest for many of our commercial readers. Dr. Pacheco, the lawyer of the bankrupt, has won fresh laurels by this memorable suit: the papers have all been drawn up by this distinguished lawyer, who has achieved an unlooked for success in this very remarkable bankruptcy suit.

Chateau Solé, in Calle Florida, promises to be the finest in Buenos Ayres; it lies between Calles Cuyo and Corrientes, next door to Mr. Holmes's. Parties anxious to see a really well built, well fitted up house, would do well to inspect this mansion, built on the newest style and utterly regardless of expense; the very hinges and locks of the doors have been specially imported by Mr. Solé. The house when finished will cost about three millions currency, and the stores below we understand, will rent for nine thousand dollars per month. Mr. Hart's new billiard saloon in Calle Florida will be opened to the public in a few days; it promises to be a very fine establishment. On last Saturday the first trial took place at the Rosario Gasworks, lately completed. Everything went off most successfully. Ten retorts were working, and, although the gas was not on this occasion passed through the purifier, a very good light was obtained. There were a considerable number of persons present, who, after the experiments had concluded, drank Mr. O'Farrel, the manager's, health, and success to the undertaking he directs. Forty lamps in the Plaza, the offices of the company, and Maus's Bank will be lighted up with the gas, to-night (Thursday), when the formal inauguration takes place.

BANKRUPTCY OF FERDINAND URIARTE AND CO. We have been requested to publish the following legal document in reference to this case:—"Whereas, in the suit of bankruptcy in this case, it appears from the documents— 1st. That Ferdinand de Uriarte and Co. presented themselves on Feb. 4th, 1868, before the Tribunal of Commerce, in the plea of pages 1 to 14 begging a prólongation of time, whereupon the judge appointed a committee to verify the report presented. 2nd. That this committee, composed of Messrs. Ricardo O'Shee, and Teodoro Lanuz, reported (f. 18) that there was a surplus of 164,027 hard dollars of assets over obligations. In conformity with the creditors and Commissioners' report (f. 19), it was held that the difficulty of Uriarte and Co. was caused by an unforeseen accident, as stated by the said firm in their first petition. These causes were admitted without contradiction, and the Tribunal granted a delay of 6, 9, and 12 months (f. 19), appointing the above-named committee to act inspecting the management of the house, as in Art. 1,741 of the Code. 3rd. That on the expiring of the first term of 6 months the house was declared bankrupt at the joint request of the committee and Messrs. Uriarte, and the Tribunal ordered the imprisonment of Uriarte, who was released on bail a month later, and the usual steps were taken as in Art. 1,649. 4th. That after the meeting of creditors the bankruptcy suit was proceeded with according to Art. 1,690, having first received the Commissioners' report 'caudacion,' f. 1, to the effect that the bankruptcy should be declared 'casual,' as in Art. 1,514. The Syndics opposed this, begging that Uriarte & Co. should be declared culpable, as in Art. 1,516, on the grounds of the charges they enumerated in f. 3, and to which Uriarte replied in f. 12. And it further appears in respect of the first charge by the Syndics— 1st. That said charge is not true since it is proved that Uriarte & Co. had not twice suspended payments, for, according to Art. 1,728, the giving of time does not imply a suspension of payments, but merely a benefit conceded by law to the debtor when suddenly or unavoidably unable to pay up on the moment. 2nd. That the case of Art. 1,516, quoted by the Syndics, applies to a bankrupt who, after his meeting of creditors, comes to an arrangement with them which he afterwards violates, whereupon he is again declared bankrupt. 3rd. That the evidence given, and Art. 1,516 of the Code show that this is not a second failure, nor is there question of an arrangement made with creditors after a failure and subsequently violated. Therefore the first charge falls to the ground. As regards the second charge it appears— 1st. That Uriarte and Co. when begging for time did not make false returns, since these were verified by the Committee, who reported the house to have an excess of assets amounting to \$164,027 fts. (See O'Shee and Lanuz's report, f. 17). 2nd. That the verification of accounts whenever a debtor prays for time is precisely to correct any inaccuracies, so that the Tribunal, relying on the report of the Committee and that of the Commissary, may grant or refuse the prayer. (Art. 1,731-33). 3rd. That Uriarte's accounts con-
