CENSUS OF THE REPUBLIC.

ANOTHER EDITORIAL TRIUMPH.

The census returns confirm in a wonderful manner the estimates which we gave in the Handbook of the various provinces.

Some of the provinces have as yet only sent in the bulk figure in round numbers, and as regards the Indians of the interior the Commissioners have merely guessed at their number, putting it down at 50,000.

It may be interesting to compare our editorial estimates of last March with the tables now returned by the commissioners:

Table with columns: Handbook, Census. Lists population figures for Buenos Ayres, Cordoba, Entre Rios, etc.

The difference between our estimate and the census returns is only 4 per cent., and it will be seen that with the exception of Cordoba and Santa Fe we almost guessed the exact population of each province.

Some people throw doubt on the census reports, which they say are exaggerated in Santa Fe and some of the other provinces; with the object of getting an increased number of deputies to Congress (these being distributed in the ratio of one for every 20,000 inhabitants).

Others on the contrary say that the census has hardly given even a proximate return, seeing that most of the able-bodied men in the interior provinces evaded enrolment, leaving it was for the purpose of fresh contingents for the army.

Both these objections are well-founded, and may, therefore, be said to destroy or counteract each other. Whatever defects the census may have, we must take it for what it is worth and accept it as the only guide for our calculations and statistical bases.

As this is the first census that has been taken we have no means of judging the increase of population since the epoch of Independence, in 1816; but we may safely assert that some of the upper provinces have lost ground, while Buenos Ayres has made wonderful strides in that interval.

Next to Buenos Ayres in the path of advancement is Entre Rios, formerly a wild uninhabited territory, which now ranks as the 3rd province in the Republic.

As regards the provinces of Jujuy, Rioja, and San Luis, none of which can boast 50,000 inhabitants, it is quite superfluous for them to have distinct Governments and Legislatures; a justice of peace, with 20 good policemen, would be all that is required.

The provinces which are now likely to begin to rival Buenos Ayres in growth of population and elements of progress are Cordoba and Santa Fe; as soon as the Central Argentine Railway shall have been completed from Rosario to Cordoba the lands on either side of the line will be rapidly taken up by settlers, and Cordoba will become the great emporium of the traffic of the interior. The other provinces will not exactly remain stationary, but it will be likely to expect in a short time great things from them.

Nevertheless we feel confident that the Argentine Republic has a great future in store. In population and territory it is not much behind what the U. States could claim at the period of Independence, only 93 years ago.

The detailed returns for the province of Buenos Ayres show that there are nine towns in the camp having a population of 3,000 and upwards, viz:—

Table with columns: Town, Population. Lists Chivilcoy, Barracas, San Nicolas, etc.

The other camp towns are really no better than villages, and it is remarkable that the largest of our rural

towns, Chivilcoy, is a place of yesterday, founded by Señor Sarmiento in 1854.

If we bear in mind that President Sarmiento has promised to found a hundred Chivilcoys throughout the Republic, this would amount to an increased population of 778,000 souls.

Taking the total population of the Republic at 1,780,000 souls, and its area at 768,000 acres, we find an average of 432 acres to each inhabitant. This shows that the country can conveniently support a population a hundred times greater than we have at present.

In fact, while the area of the Republic is 24 times as great as that of England, the total population of the 14 provinces hardly numbers half that of the city of London.

HORNE ON EXPORTS.

Mr. Charles R. Horne, of Montevideo, has rendered a very high service to the community, of which he is so distinguished a member.

His export tables for the port of Montevideo are elaborately drawn up, and serve as an unerring guide both for the merchant and political economist.

The care and labor bestowed by Mr. Horne on his subject are not lost upon his public. Humble though the occupation of a ship broker, and brief the glory of such a career, it affords rare opportunities for men of superior talents to throw lustre around the desk, which are denied to more pretentious occupations.

The ship-broker has the entrée of the custom-house, he sees daily the real balance-sheet of the country in the very figures which he himself has to tot up; he can teach the statesman and the banker things worth knowing; even the money market is at his command, he holds the key of the commerce of the country, he knows the amount that must be drawn against exports and remitted for imports, the rate of exchange for each packet for the next six months is at his fingers' ends; more still, he knows the vessels that are loading abroad for his country, when they should arrive, and more or less the prices the cargoes will fetch.

He carries in his head all the multifarious business transactions of importers and exporters, and though polished, affable and unassuming, he is fixed as the polar star in questions of freight, and rough as a ship captain in charter-party disputes.

There is really no more useful man in a commercial port than the ship-broker, and had we a vote at the elections we should record it for a ship-broker in preference to men of any other walk in life, in fact these countries will never make any real sound practical headway until we get the ship-broker into the Government house, and all the great politicians of the day placed on the berth.

Mr. Horne's excellent tables fill the whole sheet of the 'Telegrafo Maritimo,' and that well-edited paper never published more interesting matter.

The attentive study of these tables will guide both the merchant and the politician, and reveal the true cause of Oriental prostration: the great trade of the country with England has changed its course, and is now running towards the continent.

LATEST FROM TIJUCA.

Great Excitement at Bennett's.

The French mail has brought us news of the most startling importance from Rio de Janeiro.

Mr. Bennett's charming private house has been the scene of romantic heroism, worthy of a conspicuous place in the history of Brazil.

Bennett's, of Tijuca, is a sort of household word with us all. Even those who have never been there have read and heard so much of the place, that they sigh and dream to visit it.

'Tis the Eden of South America, and with a few milreis, and a copy of Milton's Paradise Lost, any of our readers have within reach as much of human

happiness as is realisable in this second half of the memorable 19th century.

For the last 20 years it has been the pleasurable custom of the overworked merchants and clerks to seek on every Saturday night in the quiet dells of Tijuca that peace which the world cannot give, and even the merchant princes of Rio make it a habit to spend in this, Nature's sweet temple, the Rio Sabbath.

Sunday morning at Bennett's reminded us of our schooldays—the lessons of life, the classes we ranged in, the weekday cares are forgotten for the nonce. At the breakfast table every seat is occupied—wives have their husbands, children their papas, and sweethearts their lovers.

The bank, the countinghouse, the Praca—all are forgotten on Sunday morning, and every countenance beams with joy on the serene Sabbath morning at Bennett's.

Well, 'twas on a Sunday morning, and not many weeks ago, the house was crowded. The night previous all the mules at Andarahu had been engaged taking up the visitors.

The hotel below and the house above, all were crammed full. Veinte-un and billiards kept most of the gay party up until long after midnight, and consequently the next morning there was a later attendance at the bath than usual.

Towards seven o'clock a.m. there was a stir. The fishermen from the lake below were bartering their fish with the charming daughter of the Baroness de Pineda, was preparing for her morning ride. The neat, prim slaves were busy serving coffee at the different chambers of the guests, people were up and stirring, when suddenly one of the most extraordinary hubbubs ever known or heard of, brought every one to the windows, the stairs, and the patios.

Had the house taken fire the tumult could not have been greater; windows were thrown open, and shouts heard in every direction. The tall, commanding form of Mr. Cerf was seen at the window of his chamber, and he it was who first explained the cause of all the disturbance.

Mr. Cerf shouted in the most excited manner, a snake, a snake, a snake is in my room! in my boots! In an instant everyone was armed with broomsticks, shovels, pokers, and sticks. Mr. Gavia Norton, accompanied by Captain Lecky, of the Halley, rushed out of his room with a boot in each hand, and headed the onslaught.

As yet none could see the snake, but great fears were entertained that a box constrictor had got into poor Cerf's room, and perhaps winding round his legs whilst he was shouting at his widow. Messrs. Drysdale, Gordon, and others, cleared the whole flight of stairs at a bound, and collaring the butler, charged him on his life to lead them at once to the scene of suffering and woe; meanwhile, Norton and Lecky began battering down the door of poor Cerf's room, aided by Don Manuel Viera, who presented a most melo-dramatic appearance, having only jumped out of bed to see what the row was about.

Mr. Norton's brother came on the scene with a long billiard cue, and after much ado, the door was forced open, and Gavia Norton dashed, boot in hand, into the chamber. The sight was truly awful; there on the window-sill, stood Mr. Cerf, whilst on the floor, with his head in Mr. C.'s boots, lay a hideous snake, some four and three-quarters yards long; such a snake was never before seen or heard of at Tijuca. "A green and gilded snake had wreathed" around the boots. Lecky, the Irish captain, aimed a well directed blow, and knocked both snake and boot clean over into the corner. Blow followed blow, shout after shout—the danger was passed, the snake killed, and Mr. Cerf saved.

Mr. Norton's brother, who displayed great heroism on the occasion, skinned the dead reptile, and purposes taking the skin as a trophy to England. Thus ended this memorable scene which, when the packet left Rio, was the absorbing topic in the city.

MONTEVIDEO.

Saturday, 20th.

The electioneering campaign which had been suspended on account of the stringent and arbitrary measures adopted by Government by imprisoning and banishing obnoxious opponents; now that more moderate counsels seem to prevail at the Government board, is being resumed with renewed vigour.

The 'Club Electoral' is trying to make the most of the short time still left, barely eight days, and has issued summonses for a public meeting to be held on Monday. The elections take place on Sunday next 28th, and whether we are to have another row on the occasion, depends upon the attitude which the Government will be advised to assume.

Everything leads to hope that within a twelve-month the Central Uruguay Railroad will be open to public traffic as far as Canelones, and shortly afterwards to Santa Lucia. The Board of Directors have signed a contract for thirty thousand sleepers of quebracho, which will enable the rails to be laid as far as Canelones. It has called in tenders for making the embankments, earthworks, and masonry for Piedras to Canelones. There are in the Company's workshops, four engines of superior force, and another is expected shortly, and besides a rolling

stock, calculated to carry twelve hundred passengers, fifty more waggons have been got ready within the last few days. The Directors have just received a letter from their agents in London, dated 19th October, announcing the purchase of rails and other materials ordered for the extension of the line to Santa Lucia, which will be embarked between this current month of November and March next.

We read in the 'Tribuna' that Don Alejandro Mackinnon arrived in London on the 14th October, and the day following his arrival published in the London newspapers the basis of the loan he is charged to make. There was every probability that he would soon succeed in realizing the loan on favorable terms.

Doctor Rodriguez, Minister of Foreign Affairs, left yesterday on board the America for your city en route for Asuncion, where he will take part in the conferences which the Allied Representatives are about to hold on the proximate termination of the war.

With reference to that enfant terrible, Fortunato Flores, it appears that the rumors of his having sallied forth at the head of an armed party from the Department of Soriano were unfounded. On his landing on the left bank of the Rio Negro the Gefé Politico, Sr. Varsi, endeavoured to apprehend him on the strength of the sentence of banishment pronounced against him by the Government being still in force. But this having come to the knowledge of Maximino Perez, the latter not only disapproved of the proceeding but gave shelter to Fortunato in his estancia, which is looked upon as consecrated ground. Perez's interference did not stop there, but he sent a special messenger to Montevideo, asking that his guest should be pardoned together with one Captain Quitana of the Colonia Department.

The Montevideo Alcazar Lyrique promises to equal in roydism and public demonstrations of disapproval, the violent scenes of disorder that disgraced at one time the performances of its prototype in Buenos Ayres. The measure adopted by the managers of not allowing refreshments to be served in the body of the theatre is one of the main causes of these unseemly demonstrations, and we certainly think it is an innovation that deprives this establishment of one of its peculiar characteristics.

During this week not less than 300 Italians have come to swell the numbers of the Italian colony in the River Plate. The Poitou brought 520 and the Clementina 180.

In consequence of information received at head quarters Mr. Rucker, accompanied by some policemen, proceeded to search the house of an employé of the General Post-office, who lives in Cordón, and found a box full of letters abstracted from the Post-office, and which had been violated by said employé. Several of them had contained documents of importance as well as money.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The decision come to by the creditors of Messrs. Uriarte and Co. at the meeting held on Monday at the Bolsa has given universal satisfaction, as a very strong opinion as to the conduct of the bankrupt had prevailed in mercantile circles; the estate will now be wound up by the official assignees and is expected to yield from 25 to 30 per cent. No case in our bankruptcy annals has created more excitement and comment amongst the mercantile community than this one, the features of which we trust may serve as a warning to over rash speculators who may feel inclined to go and do likewise.

From the sister city the news is devoid of interest. The Bolsa remains from day to day almost deserted, and general business languishes. The Navia and Oriental banks have been authorized to issue notes for 1,200, and 50 centimos against an equal amount of larger notes lodged with the Fiscal Commission of Banks.

The Secretary of the 'Sociedad Rural Argentina' has published a letter denying in explicit terms that that body has any intention of throwing its influence into either scale at the approaching elections, as announced by some of our colleagues. We confess to experiencing lively satisfaction on the perusal of Sr. Olivera's sensible and patriotic letter. This useful Society is the only one in the Republic that has up to the present stuck to its last, and remained unstained by the political fever, that in this country impedes progress, and ruins so many promising prospects. The moment the Rural Society elects to dabble in the muddy waters of political strife, its utility will vanish, and the confidence the public have hitherto reposed in it be destroyed for ever.

Madame Gasé, the prima donna at the Colon Theatre, makes her debut this evening as Valentine, in the Huguenots. There was a rumor lately that Madame Uberti had been re-engaged, and would shortly appear. Such is not the case, though it would be difficult to find a more thorough artiste than this lady, her quality of voice is rare even in Europe. The opera-going public would be glad to hear of her re-engagement.

No fewer than 625 immigrants landed here on Monday; 461 of these came from Genoa in the Clementina, the remainder from England and Spain in the Halley and Sirena.

We call attention to the advertisement of Messrs. Temple and Co., of Cordova, which appears in another

column. This firm has established a grand agency in Cordova for the sale and exhibition of agricultural machinery.

They offer their services to intending exhibitors at the approaching exhibition to be held in their city, and undertake the care and working of all machinery sent to their charge. The services of these agents must prove of advantage to European and North American houses, which by employing them will save the expense of sending agents from home to look after their goods.

The respectable town of Paysandu, has lately taken to gambling and card playing on a somewhat large scale; the Gefé Politico in order to put a stop to it has decreed a fine of five hundred dollars against any proprietor in whose house gambling of any kind may be discovered to be going on, and one hundred dollars fine, or a month's imprisonment and hard labour to the players. Messrs. Jolu Keinsley and Robert Young are candidates for return as National Representatives.

We notice by our English exchanges the announcement of the death of the Morning Star the ultra-Radical organ of the Manchester, no intervention, and 'peace at any price' party. The paper has been declining in popularity for a considerable time past, and it is a significant 'and we will add healthy' sign of the times to witness its collapse at a moment when many of its doctrinaires are apparently in the ascendant with a considerable fraction of the English people.

The leaders of a gang of cattle stealers to the number of eight have been captured in Rosario. They are known to have a numerous band of accomplices who have fled to the upper provinces; the telegraph has been set to work in their behalf. It is believed these men are the same as have lately been ravaging the estancias in this province, and they will be sent to B. Ayres for trial.

Provincial advices represent things as quiet in the extreme. Nothing new, if we except the opening of a 'school' here and there, and by this time the frequency of the occurrence detracts somewhat from its interest. In Salto there has been held a great meeting to sympathize with the National Government. In Santiago there is still a little local excitement, caused by the late pretended conspiracy.

A mortuary service takes place today in the San Nicolas Church, for the repose of the soul of young Casares, lately so foully murdered in the Plaza Parque.

When the new service is established between the Parque Station and Floresta, on the Western Railway, there will be trains every hour at half the present fares. This is the right way to foment traffic. Flores and Flores will soon eclipse Belgrano and San Isidro as summer resorts, if the Northern Railway does not look sharp.

The City of Brussels, due here early next week, had to refuse both passengers and cargo in England, so great was the demand for space for both on board this favorite steamer.

Child stealing is said to be rife in Asuncion just now. The inhuman wretches who have adopted this traffic steal the children in the hope that their unfortunate parents will make every effort to find them, and pay for their recovery. So demoralized are the people, however, by the war, that the trade does not pay, and the poor little creatures are turned into the streets and roads to starve and die. The Provisional Government is doing what it can to put a stop to this crime, and punish the perpetrators.

Castillo, the assassin of young Casares, has been lodged in the Penitentiary. We trust he will be zealously watched till his trial. He comes apparently out of a bad stock; a brother of his now lies under sentence of death in the goal of Montevideo for a series of the worst crimes.

Mr. Alfred Rumball left for Montevideo yesterday evening on business of importance. We notice Mr. Rumball's name on the Board of Directors of the new Fuel Company started at Brazil.

M. Noel, the much esteemed French Minister to the Argentine Republic, leaves for Europe per French packet with madame Noel and family.

We are happy to see by our English files that our friend Mr. David Robertson of Ladykirk, M. P. for Berwickshire, will probably soon be raised to the peerage.

We have received a copy of the magazine entitled 'The South American Monthly,' published by the Rev. Mr. Carter, of Rosario. We have to compliment this gentleman on the finish and general 'get up' of his periodical.

An English gentleman, experienced in farming at home, arrived here last week with his family. He is the first of the settlers to be sent out by the Argentine Railway Company, from whom he has taken one hundred square acres (about 400 acres), which he will at once commence to cultivate.

Don José Manuel Estrada, Inspector of Schools, is about to leave for the United States on a special mission from the Provincial Government to inspect the working and internal economy of the public schools in the Northern Republic, with a view of introducing the system in the educational establishments of this country. It is said that Sr. Estrada will be accompanied to the States by our friend Mr. David Lewis, professor of English in the National College.

The French ambassador in Rome has informed the Pontifical Government that any decisions come to at the approaching Ecumenical Council which may be contrary to the laws of France, will be considered by the government of that country as absolutely null and void.

The causes which led to the cancelling of Madlle. Siebs' engagement at the Opera House no way originated with the empresario, on the contrary, similar incidents to that now alleged as the reason for the rupture were passed over in silence by the managers. Madlle. Siebs has, we understand, for those reasons of her own, which ladies can always command on emergencies, been for some time anxious to cancel her engagement. In any case the public loses by her departure. It is rumored that she is going to Rio.

It is proposed to form a joint-stock company to explore and develop the deposit of iron, which is known to exist in the Gran Chaco. The late Sr. Carranza had this in hands when his lamented and premature death intervened.

Another murder was committed on Monday in a tavern on the Paseo Julio. A dagger thrust put an end to the victim's life instantaneously. The assassin was captured 'mirabile dicta.'

The letters by the Gironde were not delivered till yesterday morning; the vessel lying so far out may have had something to say to the delay, but the officials should have been prepared for the emergency.

The Indians have made another sweep on the Santa Fé frontier, carrying off 47 cavalry horses and a thousand head of cattle. The official report to the Minister of War, throws the onus of this occurrence on the cowardice of the officer commanding Fort Caliguincol, who is to be at once tried by court-martial on this most serious charge.

THE URIARTE MEETING.

We have received the following report of the meeting of creditors in this celebrated case, which comes to us duly guaranteed:—

On Monday the meeting of creditors was held to consider the proposition of a 'Concordato' made by Mr. Uriarte.

The assignee Mr. Cibils, read a peculiar balance sheet prepared 'ad hoc' in order to convince the creditors that they will receive 40 PER CENT!!!

He said: Gentlemen, the liquidation of this estate will produce 40 PER CENT, as the debts due give 35 per cent.

Mr. Uriarte remarked, that the debtors were widely scattered, and the assignees would require a special agent to collect each and every of these debts. That in such liquidations the commissions charged eat up everything, fees, travelling expenses &c., but that all this changes when the party who has been the head of the house takes charge of the business, and that it is thus he can explain to the creditors the meaning

are more favorable than those published in the newspapers:—

- 1st Dividend—10 per cent cash.
2nd do.—10 per cent, at 10 and 18 months, guaranteed by Mr Joseph B. Constanango, with his own signature, besides available securities worth 1,000,000 m/c.
3rd do.—5 per cent at 24 months, guaranteed by Mr Joseph B. Constanango with his own signature.
4th do.—10 per cent at 24 months, in promissory notes signed by Mr Uriarte, whose payment he said the business of the house during two years would be sufficient to secure, because since the first second, and third dividends were payable from funds foreign to the resources of the business, the latter, under the superintendence of Mr Uriarte, would be fully capable to pay off the fourth dividend.

A profound silence prevailed for a few minutes.

There was no answer to the request of Mr Uriarte, that somebody should come forward to guarantee, as the result of the liquidation, 15 per cent.

It was remarked that a great majority of the creditors were well disposed towards Mr Uriarte; and nevertheless when the Juez Comisario called upon those who accepted the "concordato" to sign, nobody chose to be the first!

Let the creditors reflect. If the Code determines that there shall be only one meeting for a "concordato", the Superior Tribunal of Justice has established in a matter relative to this same bankruptcy, when Messrs T. Duguid and Co. appealed against the delays of 6, 9, and 12 months as contrary to the Code—that the Code was not opposed to the resolutions of a majority of creditors.

PIONEERING IN THE PAMPAS.

Mr. Seymour, as he tells us, sailed from Liverpool in January, 1865, with the intention of making a rapid fortune by sheepfarming in the Argentine Republic. In the little book before us he gives us an unpretending and straightforward account of the progress hitherto made in that undertaking, and we may safely say that his readers will part from him with the sincere wish that his efforts, though hampered by unforeseen difficulties, may ultimately be crowned with success. He seems to have the necessary qualifications of perseverance and energy, and the report which he brings back, if it reveals certain drawbacks upon the felicity of life in the Pampas, may at least encourage young men with nothing to do, and a genuine desire of abandoning that objectionable occupation, to follow his example.

The advantages of settling in South America are indeed many and obvious. The River Plate, he assures us "ought to be one of the most flourishing countries in the world, and the settlers there would appear unable to avoid shortly becoming millionaires." A new settler, however, requires more capital than Mr. Seymour could command—the possession of money being unfortunately a very essential condition for making money. Accordingly Mr. Seymour went far up into the back settlements in the province of Cordoba; and for the benefit of those unfortunates of mind of which he speaks, in whose opinion the Argentine Republic is situated somewhere in the Southern States of the Union, we may mention that there is no such thing as a house between his establishment and Cape Horn. It would be easy, however, if we possessed a little of that genius for poetical idealization which seduced Martin Chuzzlewit to Eden, to make out that the country round Mr. Seymour's settlement is something like an earthly paradise. Some labourers from Warwickshire went to join him, and their letters home may afford matter for reflection to persons lamenting the condition of the British agriculturalist. This, they say emphatically, is "a fine country for living; plenty of beef and mutton, and fowls, ducks, and turkeys." Dogs, they declare, may be seen dragging bits of mutton about the streets sufficient to dine twenty people. Mr. Seymour's farm is described as consisting of 25000 acres of most beautiful soil, with six miles of river frontage; the river is covered with swans, geese, ducks, and "other beautiful birds too numerous to mention." There are "thousands and thousands of each sort"; and in the plains are hundreds of wild deer. It is not much like starving, as the writer forcibly observes, to see ten or fifteen ducks cooked at once, as large as English tame ones, and as fat as they can be. Any quantity of eggs are to be had for picking up; and the only thing in the way of diet of which this happy person complains is that he cannot eat a whole ostrich egg, "though he is so fond of them." Then the soil is so good that as much may be dug before breakfast as in a whole day in England; three horses were bought on one occasion for £2 12s.; there are melons, cucumbers, and vegetable marrow, twenty or thirty acres of the last being planted for the pigs on the farm; and there are radishes in the

garden eight inches long and twenty inches round.

If the overworked and underfed English peasant who can just keep on the safe side of the workhouse could only hear of a land where the chief source of regret is the impossibility of eating a whole ostrich egg, he would surely contrive by some means or other to raise the necessary funds for reaching a land more blessed with its turkeys and geese and beef and mutton than any imaginary Eldorado with gold-mines. And, in sober earnest, there is indeed a wide field for intending emigrants in the plains watered by the giant rivers of South America. Moreover, a large number of Englishmen are living there already, and with more or less success labouring, like Mr. Seymour, to make a fortune. The climate is admirable; the ground need only be tilled to bring forth abundant crops of wheat and maize and flax; there are countless herds of horses and cattle and sheep; and, in short, there are attractions which ought to divert to the Argentine Republic some part of the swelling stream of emigration that leaves our shores.

And yet there are drawbacks, which require to be noticed in a faithful picture. Mr. Seymour has not made his fortune there in four years; though he modestly hopes that this year he will pay expenses. He does not despair of success, though he does not speak with absolute confidence; and he has apparently returned to carry on the struggle in good spirits.

On one or two occasions, described by Mr. Seymour, an Indian horde succeeded in setting fire to an insufficiently guarded house, and massacring the inhabitants; but it is obvious that a very small party would be sufficient to keep them at bay. That, however, does not make it the less provoking to have two or three hundred head of cattle or horses carried off before your eyes when the Indians are lucky enough to take you by surprise. For the most part, they do not meddle with sheep, as they are unable to drive them off quickly; but, on their last appearance, they helped themselves to twelve hundred of Mr. Seymour's flock, besides his few remaining horses.

Now that the war in Paraguay appears to be ended, it is to be hoped that President Sarmiento, of whom Mr. Seymour speaks with the highest respect, will be able to put a stop to the expeditions of these marauders. The Indians once kept in check, there seem to be no serious obstacles to an amazingly rapid growth of prosperity. The fall in the price of wool, consequent upon the end of the American war, was a considerable temporary discouragement; but the natural resources of the country are immense. If any satisfactory means of preserving meat for European consumption should be discovered an immense impulse will be given to cattle-breeding; and nothing but the unsettled state of the country can prevent energetic settlers from rapidly increasing in prosperity, if they do not all become millionaires.—Saturday Review.

The estancieros in this Department are taking advantage of the present fine dry weather, and are all very busy shearing. The price per head paid for shearing is a vinten to six coppers. A good shearer will shear his hundred or more sheep daily, making a good thing of it while it lasts.

A party whose wool realized thirty-five rials in Montevideo last clip, was offered on his estancia twenty-five rials only for this year's, offer refused.

Our Gefé, Don Luis E. Perez returned a few days since, after making a long stay in Montevideo. It is rumored that Fortunato Flores intends paying Porongos a visit. It is also confirmed that the good citizens of that town will be ready to meet him, but not with open arms!

This year's supply of fruit will be very limited, with the exception of grapes, of which there will be a great abundance.

The wheat and maize is looking well, but both require rain. A countryman of ours living a few squares from the town, had his house broken into and ransacked a few days since, while paying a visit in town. The housebreaker besides stealing a small amount in money, carried away with him two Henly raring medals, one gold and the other silver. The fellow, (who is a well known scoundrel) has since cleared for Montevideo, where he will try and dispose of them. Now as your valuable paper is read everywhere and by almost everybody, perhaps it may be the means of recovering the said medals. The owners name J. Elisee is stamped on each. If one of your numerous subscribers should hear or see anything of the medals, he would be doing Mr. E. a very great favor by sending a few lines addressed to the Telegraphic office of this town.

THE GREAT AUSTRALIAN MEAT FIRM FAILURE IN LONDON.

We learn by the French mail of Oct. 23, from Mr. E. B. Neill, the Montevideo Consul General in London, that the affairs of Messrs. McCall, the great importers of Australian meat into England, were in process of being wound up under liquidation, with fair prospects of a good dividend, the liabilities being £35,000, as against £17,000 presumably realizable assets. As Mr. Neill has already stated in our columns, although this failure may for a little while derange the trade in Australian meat, as regards the single channel in which it chiefly flowed hitherto, it must not be supposed that the effect on the traffic itself will be permanently serious. On the contrary, day by day the demand increases for wholesome meat of any kind from any quarter; and, unfortunately for the English consumer, so also does the price. Mr. Neill reports that new systems of preserving continue to be announced, and that several of them seem to answer every possible requirement, as to inexpensiveness, facility, and rapidity, in every way that can be desired, as far as it is possible to judge from experiments on a small scale. But the great and decisive test still remains to be determined, namely trial on a large scale; that is, as regards fresh meat in large masses, including the bone, and uncooked. As for cooked meat without bones, that question is already settled, and most satisfactorily, as already repeatedly stated by the Uruguayan Consul General, and almost any quantity of equally well preserved Rio Plata meat, in six pound tins, which is the popular size, find a prompt sale, at prices abundantly remunerative to the owners of stock in Rio Plata, more especially as the English prejudice against preserved mutton is now fast disappearing, and it is becoming as readily saleable as beef, at a fractionally lower price. Preservation by ice being one of the earliest processes advocated by Mr. Neill, we look with curiosity to what he may say on recent consignments hence.
