The Pacific Mails.

QUESTION OF THE ARGENTINE FRONTIER.

(From the West Coast Mail.)

Valparaiso Jan. 7th The trial of the Rev. Mr. Swaney, a Protestant missionary stationed at Talcahuano, for having married a Protestant to a Roman Catholic has not yet terminated. It may be remembered that Mr. Swaney was summoned to the bedside of a dying man, and married him to the mother of his children to heal the man's conscience...

The Record informs us that the Union Missionary Society of this city has recently forwarded a request to New York that two additional preachers of the Gospel may be sought for this country. The design is that they should preach in English to our countrymen residing at ports along this coast...

The Rev. Dr. Denuet, British Consular chaplain at Valparaiso, having resigned his official connection with the Episcopal congregation, left this city on his return to England on December 28th, by sailing vessel for San Francisco...

Business is generally very quiet. The principal buyers are engaged in taking stock and balancing their books. Some purchasers from the Argentine provinces have been in the market, but their purchases have been limited, especially in staples.

WHEAT.—As we anticipated, prices have given way slightly since our last, and the reduction would have been still greater had it not been for a rather brisk competition among millers, who have been paying an average price of \$2.04 per fanega, in bulk, in Santiago, equal to about \$3.20 in stout bags on the spot.

The British barque Architect left B. Ayres in ballast on November 22nd, passed Cape St. John on December 4, and rounded the Horn on the 7th, meeting with light variable winds, which also continued on this side, with the exception of a squall of the Straits, when the bowsprit was lost; arrived on 27th ult.

The question of limits between this country and the Argentine Republic apropos of the Magellans' Straits colony, has been again brought on the tapis by an editorial in the Nacional of Buenos Ayres, which has provoked considerable comment on the part of the press of both countries. The colony was founded in 1843, and it was not till four years afterwards that the Argentine Government took any notice of the circumstance, then limited to a mere protest, on the ground of the colony being within the Argentine boundaries...

The Italian Minister, Count de la Croce, made a speech in French which was understood by everyone; but failed to meet with as much response as the sonorous periods of the Spanish tongue. From Bolivia we learn that a public trial of the new machinery for the Mint, was to take place on the 28th ult., that day being the anniversary of the elevation of General Melgarejo to power. The President, and his cabinet, and other important personages, were to assist on the occasion.

The tenders for the construction of the railway from Llaillai to San Felipe were announced to be opened on the 2nd instant at the Ministry of the Interior at Santiago, before a commission appointed for that purpose; but the result is not yet known.

In conformity with a decree of the Minister of the Interior, express trains have been established on the Valparaiso and Santiago railway, one daily each way—to do the journey in five hours and twenty minutes; they commenced to run on the 1st inst., and touch at the following stations only: Salto, Quillota, Calera, and Llaillai.

The amount of Customs duties collected at the port of Valparaiso during the year just concluded is estimated at about six millions of dollars. The number of vessels despatched amounts to 1,355, being an increase of 54 over that of 1868.

It will be seen by our Liverpool correspondent's letter that the first lot of rails for the Chillan and Talcahuano railway was to be shipped during the month of December, as also the materials for the Concepcion Gas Co.

THE ROSARIO FESTIVITIES.

GRAND BANQUET TO THE PRESIDENT.

(From our Special Correspondent.)

Rosario, Saturday, 3, A.M. It is next to impossible to write anything for the STANDARD in the hurry and bustle around me. Our rooms are invaded from early morning by crowds of visitors, with noisy manifestations, music and speeches, that leave not a moment's leisure. I sent you a long telegram of 300 words with an account of the banquet, and the Reforma of today contains a lengthened report and a flattering allusion to your humble servant and the STANDARD.

The banquet of Thursday evening was the grandest ever seen in Rosario, and might well compare with similar fêtes in cities of greater pretensions. At 7.30 the rooms of Signor Franzini began to fill with the leading merchants of the town and their distinguished guests. Covers were laid for 250 persons, and the arrangements and decorations were admirable. President Sarmiento occupied the seat of honor, and on either side were the various Foreign Ministers and high public functionaries. The carte comprised 30 dishes; the wines were excellent; and when the champagne was served, the speeches began.

Dr. Paz, on the part of the Committee of Merchants, called on Hector Varela to give the first toast, but the latter declined, whereupon

Dr. Paz proposed the health of President Sarmiento. He offered his Excellency a cordial welcome on behalf of the town of Rosario, the inhabitants of which entertained, he said, three great ideas—peace, industry, and loyalty to the National Government (applause).

President Sarmiento returned thanks and said that peace and progress were his program, that the Argentine Republic extended the hand of good-fellowship to the various nations so worthily represented at that table, and that the happy auguries of the new year assured us that this country was entering on a new era, to take her place among the foremost peoples of the age.

Hector Varela, on rising, was received with loud cheers. His speech was a splendid piece of eloquence, holding his auditory wrapt in breathless attention, rushing from flight to flight in poetic imagery, and kindling the utmost enthusiasm by sentiments of progress, patriotism, and the comity of nations. It was a greater triumph than that which he won at the Peace Congress of Geneva, and as the Reforma says, if he canvasses next time the Provinces to elect him President he is sure to carry every thing before him by his forensic talents.

The Italian Minister, Count de la Croce, made a speech in French which was understood by everyone; but failed to meet with as much response as the sonorous periods of the Spanish tongue. He spoke on behalf of the Corps Diplomatique and thanked the assembly for the friendly manifestations already expressed. Dr. Paz then toasted the representative of liberated Spain, His Excellency Sr. España, whose name was enthusiastically received.

The Spanish Minister spoke with great feeling. He mentioned that the moment Serrano and Prim overturned the rule of Queen Isabella, they sent circulars to all their agents in South America to lose no opportunity of strengthening friendly relations with the mother country as the friend of freedom (loud cheers). After a short speech from Sr. Muñoz, a call was made for Canon Piferno, who made a fine discourse.

He was followed by Sr. Cané, one of the Tribuna staff.

Sr. Gorostiaga, Minister of Finance, said that Sarmiento had decreed an era of six years of peace for the Republic. The speaker proceeded to review the favorable condition of the national finances. The Government had just received offers of a loan of four millions sterling, to be emitted at 82, and, as a further proof of our good name abroad, Messrs. Baring, Bros., in acknowledging the receipt of the last remittance (\$170,000 sterling) for the English Debt, stated that it was difficult to quote the exact value of Argentine Bonds owing to their great rise. He made a pleasing allusion to his labours in past years for the growth of Rosario while yet in its infancy; which elicited long and hearty applause.

Dr. Perez spoke with reference to the Cordoba Exhibition, pointing out the immense good that it is destined to yield to the country at large, by showing both to ourselves and to European nations the great resources of the Provinces.

Mr. O'Farrell, engineer of the Gas-works, addressed the company in English, and returned thanks for the cordial friendship shown to Englishmen by the National Government.

Mr. Woods stood up and proposed the health of Queen Victoria, which was drunk with all honors.

Dr. Paz took this occasion to call on the townfolk of Rosario to testify that if that town had not given a single vote in support of Sr. Sarmiento as candidate for the Presidency it was because the election was a manoeuvre of the authorities (general assent). He added that the present banquet fully proved their esteem for Sr. Sarmiento.

Col. Olmedo called to mind the hardships and fatigues of his brothers-in-arms in the painful campaign of Paraguay.

President Sarmiento stated that he regretted beyond measure that he had been unable to carry out his promise of sending 200 soldiers to help the English farmers of Frayle Muerto to gather in their crops. The sight would, have been novel and edifying to see soldiers returning from the battle field to reap the harvest (loud applause).

Sr. Carrasco in allusion to the epoch of six years, peace promised us during the present administration, said that when President Sarmiento should descend from office we could say—"We have enjoyed La Paz Faustina."

Colonel Berraist followed with another toast, and then the company broke up: preceded by a band of music they accompanied the President to his lodgings and then paid a similar compliment to Hector Varela.

The impression caused by the banquet has had an excellent effect: it is impossible to exaggerate the kindly feeling it has produced towards Buenos Ayres and the National Government.

P.S. I have just come home from a grand ball to change for the journey. Our express train for Frayle Muerto starts at 4 a.m., and I am only waiting for the cab to call for me. We purpose coming back on Sunday afternoon; at least so the President says, but I may stop at Cañada Gomez to pay a visit in the neighborhood and come on here next day. On Tuesday we leave for Santa Fé, and I will do my best to write something for Monday's post, Adieu.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

We find in the columns of our colleague and namesake, The London Standard, the following remarks respecting the sheep and oxen from the River Plate, exhibited at the late Smithfield Club Cattle Show. "The specimens of first-class stock exhibited, although few are good, and we observe that the 'concessionaires' of the Argentine and Uruguayan Governments have exhibited as first-class animals reared in the Plate, and supposed to be of Spanish race. The ages and mode of rearing these animals are unknown; they are said to have been fed on dry grass, maize, and roots, but competent persons consider that this is not the class of animal that will suit our markets, at least for some years; that the best parts of South American cattle are their hides and horns; and that such meat as they furnish must be sent to us in a preserved state."

We are sorry to see our influential contemporary take such a gloomy view of our prospects of exporting live cattle; yet, in time, we are inclined to think that our live stock may be profitably sent to the home markets. One of the most interesting auctions held in this city since the famous Lopez furniture sale will come off tomorrow, under the direction of our esteemed and good friend Mariano Billinghurst. The articles to be offered for sale have been sent down by the Provisional Government of Paraguay, and consist of an immense variety of silver and plated ware, chiefly church plate and other sacred ornaments of great antiquity. Many of these valuable relics are known to have been made by the Guarani tribes, under the direction of the Jesuits, when those devoted missionaries first settled in the wilds of Paraguay. The weight of these precious objects is upwards of 1,000 pounds, and amongst them are found jugs, tea-pots, altar-basins for washing the clergyman's hands, and a

tablet of silver on which the ten commandments are exquisitely engraved. There is a rumor prevalent that they will be bought for the British Museum, and they are in every way worthy of a place in that unrivalled collection. The proceeds of the sale are to be devoted to the relief of the thousands of Paraguayan women and children rendered homeless and penniless by the war. Such an object should bring every man with money in his pocket to Don Mariano's sale-rooms to-morrow.

Information of this character would be useful also to private families, who might prefer making their own dinner wine to using the somewhat doubtful articles sold at 'ramates.'

The overcrowding of the dwellings of the lower classes in this city is becoming so abominable as to call for speedy interference, and the no less pernicious mode of cheap building, now so common amongst the Italians, also demands remedial supervision. A man buys a plot of land, say some fifteen yards by fifty; he plants two houses in front, with a passage between; then fills up the whole of the back with rooms like salt-boxes, some score of them, let to separate families, with no opening for ventilation, save the door in front, which, for that purpose, is useless. During the visitation of the cholera a dozen corpses were carried out of some of these purities in a week, and at all times they are nests for engendering contagion. Surely the Board of Health is 'in nubibus,' or these filthy sties would be swept away instead of being allowed to go on increasing and accumulating disease, demoralization, and wretchedness.

In reference to the action against our colleague La Republica, for copying an article from our columns respecting Sr. Bullrich, the Nacion has a leading article of great judgment and ability, which says, "the accusation, even if brought against the STANDARD, is contrary to law in form, and has been brought in the wrong court; as against the Republica it is illegal and against the liberty of the press, no matter in what form it be indited, or what tribunal it be brought before."

At the recent banquet in Rosario, Mr. Sarmiento expressed his regret that the exigencies of the service prevented his fulfilling his promise. Mr. Melrose's crops were, nevertheless, saved in prime condition.

Sunday was the hottest day we have yet experienced. At 1 o'clock p.m. the thermometer marked 91 in the shade, and so fierce were the sun's rays, that the streets were unusually deserted, and the attendance at the various places of worship much below the average, people being afraid to expose themselves, even for a short time, to the broiling temperature out of doors. About 10 o'clock a.m. yesterday rain fell, and drizzling showers continued throughout the day, cooling the air somewhat. We want, however, a good downpour to set the temperature right.

This is a magnificent passage and but for the fogs she encountered in the Channel and the head winds she had to contend against throughout the entire passage, the Coopericus would have shortened the time by fully two days." We congratulate her commander, Captain Hairby on the sea-going qualities his vessel has developed. She leaves on Friday.

The Verdad has some alarming news from the Nueve de Julio frontier. It appears that Califucurá meant business in ordering our troops to withdraw from the present frontier line. He has formed an offensive and defensive alliance with other caudillos, amongst them Ramirez, and intends soon to attack our positions. This intelligence was sent by a friendly caudillo, Chilingo, to a respectable estancero in the partido, Don Juan E. Trejo. Wolf is so often cried in reference to the savages, that we often know not what to think till a raid actually occurs; it is as well, however, for the Government to keep a sharp eye on the doings of King Califucurá, who seems not in the best of tempers at present.

The Plaza Parque is being transformed into a pleasure garden; broad walks are being marked out, and handsome gas-lamps erected. This park will make a most delightful lounge on a summer's evening, when the improvements now making are completed.

Verdi's Nabucco was given at the Opera House on Sunday night before an audience that the excessive heat reduced to small proportions. The opera was very well put on the stage, all the leading characters receiving their due share of applause. Madame Gasco more than sustained her reputation, and was repeatedly and loudly applauded.

During last week 60,000 notes for a dollar, each were presented at the Damaged Note Office of the Provincial Bank; they have all been burned.

The Immigration Committee are about erecting a spacious building as an Asylum, where newly arrived emigrants from Europe can be lodged and housed on a better scale than at present. The cost will be \$1,000,000 mps, the greater part of which, it is believed, the Provincial Government will pay. Such an institution as that proposed is of primary necessity now that immigration to this country is setting in so strongly and steadily.

On Friday last a sudden squall in the Outer Roads upset a small boat in which an Italian boatman with five of his children had gone out to fish; two of the little creatures, one aged seven, the other five years, were drowned; the father and the others were saved. Poor Paraguay is to have a department in the Exhibition at Cordoba. Specimens of wood and minerals are the only objects she can send, but some of these are of considerable value.

Art. 9. In the first two months of each year the Manager shall call a Meeting of Shareholders, to report to them the progress and condition of the Company's affairs; and two months before the meeting of the material, he shall call a General Meeting to present a general statement of the approximate condition of the Company, and advise steps either for finally winding it up as in Art. 8, or for prolonging the Company's life, as in Art. 10.

Art. 10. In the case above contemplated it shall be a 'quorum,' if one-eighth of the individual shareholders attend, and they must then resolve the business of the day, and if one-fifth do not present, a second summons shall be issued, and the business then resolved by whatever number may attend.
