THE PRESIDENT'S JOURNEY.

(G. P. Craufurd to THE STANDARD.

Saturday, 9 A.M.

Esperanza Colony.

We are this moment starting for San Carlos colony.

All well.

President and party in great spirits. Compliments to all friends.

Montevideo, Jan. 31, 1870.

6 P.M.

Paper opened at 5 1/2 and closed at 5 1/2.

One thousand cow hides, at 100 cents, 60 trials gold.

One thousand pipes tallow, 190 gold on board.

The English steamer Ptolemy is expected here to-morrow from Liverpool and Rio.

From the 1st of January up to the present time there have been killed 51,150 head of cattle.

Weather hot.

THE QUINTANA LETTER.

There can be little doubt that we are fast changing round, and that in a few years the present miserable state of the judiciary will be replaced by a healthy system of open court justice, trial by jury, &c. Dr. Quintana's lengthy but able letter, published by our colleagues last week, shows up in a very masterly manner the judiciary reforms necessary. The writer of this letter is a lawyer of the first rank, a man of immense experience and high position, and his opinion on such matters should be certainly carry weight; but it is to be regretted that Dr. Quintana, who is Speaker of the House of Deputies in Congress, should prefer advancing his opinions on such very grave matters through the medium of a letter to some young men about to found a new political club rather than by a direct appeal to the House of Legislature, of which he is so distinguished a member. As regards the attributes of a Justice of the Peace and such like we know Congress has nothing to do, but in the higher branches of judiciary it might certainly use its influence. We speak the opinion of the public of Buenos Ayres when we say the whole system of judiciary in this country is false, useless and expensive. The high civil courts, where the judges try by appeal the decisions of the court below, are unwieldy remnants of the glorious age of Fernando and Isabel—the judges sit and try the causes before them, with possibly every wish to accord justice, but to get to the pith of the case, to come to the real merits of the question they have to wade through a pile of papers which would almost fill a wheelbarrow, and every a set of which boasts of a three dollar stamp.

In the lower courts or courts of first instance the case, as far as the author is concerned, is tried in the 'escribano's' office, and not in the court as it is the only occasion when a plain-liff or defendant ever sees the judge who tries his case, is when there is what is termed a 'juicio verbal,' which is, generally speaking, conducted upon such irregular terms, that it ends in a flare up between the contending lawyers, aided, assisted, and abetted by the clients, who are, of course, in the most excited state.

In the criminal courts the prisoners are tried on paper, and pen and ink, whilst the assassin is smoking a paper cigar or drinking 'mate' in his cell, the court is either hearing the case or giving judgment. Not unfrequently the criminal is tried, convicted, and condemned, although all the while he is galloping over the camp, and possibly committing some new offence.

If we turn from these courts to the Tribunal of Commerce, the court of all others which lawyers, judges, and confidants have toiled hardest to reform, we find the whole business of the place snuggled up by judges, 'escribanos,' 'procuradores,' 'comisarios,' all busy up to their eyes and ears about failures, bankruptcies, insolvencies, which, properly speaking, should be decided the very week they occurred, but which, under the splendid system here, hold out as long as there is the least chance of the insolvent estate paying the expenses. Driven to the very portals of the Bolsa, have we not seen victimized creditors distributing in the shape of hand-bills vain appeals to the public for some reform?

This letter of Doctor Quintana reminds us that we have in our midst one who is every way capable of effecting the desired reforms, if he only thinks proper to make an effort. Dr. Quintana is himself the man. We are glad to note that there is a very great change in the tone of some of our colleagues as regards these matters. Gen. Mitre, the editor of the 'Nacion,' boldly advocates trial by jury. The 'Tribuna' speaks of a vigilance committee. We trust our other colleagues will join in the cry, and that at last the present costly, useless, lazy and non-sensical judiciary system will be at once and for ever abolished.

COLONIES OF THE ARGENTINE REPUBLIC COMPARED WITH THOSE OF BRAZIL.

The Directors of the Colonial Association at Hamburg (est. 1849) published in the 'Hamburger Nachrichten' of 3rd December, the 18th report of the Colony Doña Francisca, in the Province of Santa Catalina, Brazil, for the year 1868.

From this report we take the following statistics. The colony had a population of 1072 families, with 5237 souls, and an extent of 21,883 hectares (a hectare being about two acres English) of which—

4463 hectares had been cleared of wood.

17420 hectares were still under forests.

The exports consisted of timber, cigars, arrowroot, butter, leather, rice-flour, brandy, and other products, at a total value of 206 million reis, or about £20,000 sterling.

The imports consisted of dry goods, mandioca, tobacco, wine, dried beef, iron, soap, cattle, &c. amounting to 182 million reis, or £18,000.

The Directors mention, as a very satisfactory result, that the export had exceeded the import for the first time.

The live stock consisted of—

1740 head of cattle. 725 horses. 15 mules. 2520 pigs. 50 goats. 120 sheep. 13600 poultry. 413 bee-hives. and 73300 fruit trees.

The means of transport consisted of—

212 four-wheeled carts. 30 boats, and 1 sloop for water transport.

Figures are always more eloquent than words, let us now proceed to the Santa Fé colonies.

Esperanza was established in 1856; the first stock of 200 families was picked up in the streets of the larger cities of Switzerland and Germany, people who did not know how to manage a plough.

They had to undergo the greatest miseries and hardships during the first four years, and the desertion of the colonists could only be prevented by the public forces on various occasions driving them back to the settlement. Passage from Europe, implements, seeds and food, were defrayed by the 'empresario,' Don Aaron Castellanos.

Better times began in 1860, and this colony in 1868 was composed of 365 families, or 1992 souls, of whom 381 persons are not pursuing agricultural labors.

They have about 3100 hectares of cultivated land.

The exports of 1868 consisted of— 7845 fanegas maize, worth \$31,380 4180 wheat 50,100 4850 arrobes potatoes 4,850 3818 dozen eggs 6,300 140 arr. horse hair, 1350 dry cow hides and skins 4,146

\$96,836

£15,654

The proceeds of poultry, cheese, beans, vegetables, timber, charcoal, fat animals, are not officially stated, but may be put down for £12,000

Total £27,654

The colonists had in 1868, 7945 head of cattle, producing 136,894 lbs. of butter at a value of \$30,000, but, on account of scarcity of pasture-ground, have been reducing the stock until 1868 to—

5633 head of cattle. 1446 horses. 687 sheep. 396 pigs. 4100 poultry. 83,500 fruit trees. 2000 vines.

This settlement possesses 140 azotea houses, 245 ranchos of brick with thatched roofs, 1 cabildo, 1 Catholic church, 2 Protestant chapels, 3 schools, 1 wholesale store and barraca, 4 inns, 2 billiard rooms, 1 brewery, 3 steam mills (one of these cost £10,000), 1 windmill, 4 horse mills, 11 shops or stores for dry goods, 7 pulperias, 2 saw mills, &c.

Esperanza and San Geronimo together exported during 1868 to Paraguay 100,000 arrobes (2,000 tons) of maize in grain.

The taxes collected by the Santa Fé Government during 1869, stood for—

The following deeds of sales and purchases of property were drawn up by the Justice of Peace in Esperanza:

The colonists of Esperanza and San Carlos have subscribed as shareholders to the projected railway of the Gran Chaco 100,000 pesos fuertes, or about half a million of francs.

The lands of the Humboldt colony, with 300 concessions of 20 cuadras (80 acres) each, and Grutli, have been nearly all purchased by Esperanza colonists.

San Carlos colony was established in 1859, and had in 1868, 200 families, numbering 1200 souls, 180 families being farmers and occupiers of about 21,600 hectares, of which 4800 were under tillage.

Exportation of 1869 consisted of— 18,206 fanegas wheat value \$243,351 53 " barley " 371 12,220 " maize " 122,200

or £58,547

without taking into consideration the export of butter, cheese, eggs, potatoes, vegetables, skins, and live cattle, for all of which official data are wanting. The wheat of San Carlos commands, on account of its superior quality, one to two dollars per fanega more than from the other colonies.

4033 head of cattle. 1145 oxen. 1798 horses.

Of pigs, poultry, sheep, fruit-trees, &c., there are no official data.

Means of transport in 1868, 197 four-wheeled carts.

Agricultural implements—275 American ploughs, 44 cutting machines, 1 steam threshing machine.

Colony San José, Entre Rios was established in 1859, and counted in 1868, 300 families with 1,788 souls.

Exportation of 1869.

20,754 ar. potatoes, value \$15,600 14,757 fanegas wheat 103,300 369 do barley 1,500 6,874 do maize 28,000 80,000 dozen eggs 20,000

This statement does not include the Villa Colon, a port on the Uruguay.

There are at present 18 or 19 Colonies in the province of Santa Fé; it would be tedious to enumerate the produce of each; suffice it to say that the Emilia colony, about 20 leagues north of Santa Fé, on the left bank of the Rio Salado, is likely to harvest this season, between 30 and 40,000 ar. of tobacco.

LATEST FROM ROSARIO.

Sunday.

President Sarmiento and suite embarked on Tuesday evening for Santa Fé, being accompanied to the water's edge by an immense crowd of citizens who cheered most enthusiastically.

Previous to his departure His Excellency took leave of the townfolk in the following brief salutation.

"The President of the Republic thanks the people of Rosario for their spontaneous manifestations of regard during his stay among them. He salutes them cordially and regrets his inability to return personally the numerous visits he has received, but he is prevented by the delicate state of his health and the want of time."

The Finance Minister made a similar apology to his friends, regretting that press of business prevented his returning their complimentary attentions.

The Spanish banquet or Monday was a very grand affair, it was given by the Spanish residents to their Minister, and among the other guests were Governor Cabal, Minister Gorostiza, Mr. Weldon and the officers of the Spanish gunboat Ceres, Hector Varola's speech was greatly applauded, and he was accompanied home in triumph. Next day the Italians led him in like manner. On Tuesday morning the storm carried away the triumphal arch in the Plaza, also the roofs of various ranchos and one or two gas-lamps.

No news has arrived from Santa Fé of the progress of the President and his party, but they will probably spend a couple of days at the Colonies, and they are not expected here till Wednesday, 2nd. Feb. The Capital states that Gen. Urquiza is going to give the President a magnificent reception, having called out 15,000 National guard cavalry from all the departments, to line the road from Concepcion to San José.

Respecting the barbarous murder of Messrs. Robert Bold and Harry Tait the principal assassin has been taken: he is a pulpero named Zapata, and he and his accomplices went to Bold's estancia with the pretext of buying fat wethers. Our unfortunate countryman kindly invited them to stay and cook some dinner, and gave them permission to pass the night. The murderers took him unawares, for an open book that he was apparently reading at the time was found near his corpse: the room bore witness of a fierce struggle, and the deceased received 12 wounds before he was overcome. Tait's corpse had 3 wounds on it. The corpses were decently interred here. At first the horrid news was kept secret from Pres. Sarmiento, but the moment he came to know he offered £1,000 sterling for capture of the assassins. It seems all the praise of seizing Zapata is not due to D. Pascual Rosas. The first to start in pursuit was Major Casas, accompanied by several English and other neighbors, following the route suggested by Sr. Rosas. At 4 o'clock next morning they reached a house near the Villa-Nueva station, and there caught Zapata, whom they conveyed by train to Frayle Muerto, where Sr. Rosas was waiting to take charge of him, Rosas had a letter from President Sarmiento to the authorities of Cordova, requesting them to aid in every way in the capture of the assassins.

A rupture has occurred in the Gran Chaco between the tribes of Vilelas and Chinipis; the cacique Chico of the former was recently killed by a wood-cutter from Corrientes and 40 Indians went to the Governor of Corrientes to demand justice, but in vain. Meantime the Chinipis sided with the wood-cutters and the Vilelas have just been routed in a pitched battle, several prisoners and wounded being sent captive to Corrientes. The safety of all the Chaco wood-cutters is compromised, but it is not likely the Vilelas will molest the Californian colony or other settlements in the Chaco.

A project is on foot by Messrs. Beron and Hernandez to render navigable the River Feliciano, which falls into the Paraná, near the town of La Paz. They propose to deepen it so as to allow vessels to ascend to the town of San José de Feliciano, which is the centre of an important and productive district. They ask no subvention, but merely a monopoly of the traffic of the river for a number of years.

The Capital states that the cultivation of tobacco is making great strides in the agricultural colonies, viz:—

Emilia 250,000 plants. S. Javier & Colastines 120,000 " San Justo 150,000 " Caronda 70,000 " Huermes 80,000 " Various 40,000 "

Total 710,000 plants.

The tobacco is said to be equal to that of Paraguay.

There is some talk of another grand banquet to the President if he stop here two days on his return, but this is doubtful.

FRAYLE MUERTO.

ADDRESS TO THE PRESIDENT

To H. E. Don Domingo F. Sarmiento President of the Argentine Republic.

May I please Your Excellency, We the members of the Frayle Muerto Farmers Society, and in the name of the foreign population of this district take the opportunity of bidding you a welcome to this place.

We esteem the visit of Y. E. as a proof not only of your interest in the new industry of agriculture, but also of your desire for the personal good of the foreigners who have adopted your country.

We thank Y. E. for the security we have obtained through the National Government in the protection of the frontiers, and we rejoice to believe in the sure coming of prosperity to the Republic, consequent on that security and the termination of the Paraguay an war.

Although we have suffered from such misfortunes and difficulties as are always the accompaniment of the introduction of a new industry, and our settlements have been therefore much kept back, we hope that our difficulties are now overcome and we look forward to an era of prosperity for ourselves as well as for the Republic in which we labour, and that is so worthily presided over by Y. E.

We regret not having been able to show Y. E. a larger exhibition of our agricultural instruments in consequence of being now in the middle of the reaping season, which has also prevented a larger assembly of the farmers from meeting Y. E. here.

Wishing you every health, happiness, and prosperity, and to the Republic a happy continuance of your Presidency.

I shall be most happy, gentlemen, to be of any service to you in forwarding as far as my humble assistance can serve, the interests of the Colony; and I take this occasion to offer you the various Reports and informations of the French Departments of Agriculture and Commerce, and also supplies of seeds, proper to the various sections of the French empire and our colonies.

In this I only fulfil the idea of the Emperor and his Government, namely that the advancement of Science and civilization is of universal interest to all men, without distinction of climate or nationality.

Permit me, gentlemen, in conclusion to thank you for your cordial hospitality, and offer you the assurance of my highest regard.

BANQUET ABOARD THE ARIADNE.

Saturday.

The banquet given by Mr. Alex. Baillie to the President and Ministers, previous to the departure of the Ariadne with live cattle for England, was attended by Admiral Lobo, the Spanish Minister, the British and Prussian consuls, Messrs. Rob. Wilson, John McColl, Isaac, Roosen, Charles, Lecocq, Lavuedra, Rodriguez, Major Ellis, Saavedra, Castellanos and several U.S. officers. The Ariadne has 2 decks, well ventilated, and every accommodation for 320 head of horned cattle, with supplies of maize, hay &c. There is machinery for cutting the food up very fine and mixing it.

After inspecting the ship, the guests were invited to dinner.

President Baillie occupied the chair, having on his right the captain, and on his left Mr. Baillie. Mr. John McColl sat at the other end, and his speech was the event of the day.

Gentlemen, it would be unpardonable in me were I to fail

the most influential deputation that has yet issued from their "tolderias," together with six of their chief warriors to be kept as hostages for their good faith.

On Sunday a select party visited the far famed Alexander Selkirk's island in the Cerapachay; which is familiarly known to most of the English engineers in the Plate.

General Mitre's interesting article on River Plate wool, in Sunday's Nation attracted much notice. We regret that owing to its great length, we are unable to reproduce it in English.

Our country readers will regret to see in to-day's issue a notice of the death of Mr. Lawrence Casey, a well known Irish estanciaero of the district of Navarro.

Mr. Paul Frugoni, the well known English Procurador, or attorney, passed on Saturday his examination as "Contador," for which important office he has now taken out his patente, as general accountant, granted by the Superior Tribunal.

We feel bound to allude to an invention long in use in large cities in Germany, and lately introduced here by an Italian Company. People may have remarked when out after night-fall large carts standing at house doors with a tabe attached running in to the 'patio' and losing itself in the darkness.

We remind those of our readers [and they are many] who love the noble game of cricket that the Railway Eleven will meet a picked team of the B. A. C. C. to-morrow at Palermo; the play promises to be first rate, and we hope the weather may prove propitious.

We have now in use at the STANDARD OFFICE a simple and most effectual filter, which we can, from experience, recommend to those who are careful to drink water only when it is perfectly clean and pure.

A list has been opened in Gualeguaychu for starting a new joint-stock bank in that town; shares to the amount of 10,000 hard dollars were subscribed for the day the list was opened. There is a good prospect of success.

Everyone says that three dollars for a tramway fare is far too high; so it is; two dollars, with 'correspondence' between each line, is low enough to start with, but in a year we expect to see the returns such, that the fare can be further reduced, and a person go all over the city for a dollar.

French barque Mariadi was fitted up by the house of Steward at Tahiti, and despatched for the island of Gilbert, ostensibly for the purpose of trading with the natives, but in reality to traffic in Coolies.

The voyage of the Mariadi proved such a brilliant business for the company that without waiting for the noise caused by it to cool down, another vessel was despatched on the same unholly mission.

The Margarita Brander was fitted up like her lucky predecessor. In neither instance were precautions taken against a "rising in the hold."

Arrived at her destination, the Brander commenced to take in cargo without loss of time. This time the difficulties were increased, nevertheless 300 Coolies of both sexes were got safely on board.

There is no knowing to what pitch their ferocity might not have carried them, [it is said that in former years the natives of those islands were cannibals] had not the 2nd mate who was locked up in the cabin, with the few that remained of the crew wheeled over the barrel of powder to the door.

There was not a second to be lost; next moment the door would have been forced in, and the poor fellows knew too well what they were to expect at the hands of their relentless foes.

Prefering instant death the brave mate applied a lighted match to the powder, and had scarce time enough to run to the other end of the saloon when bang went the barrel with a terrible crash.

The British Hospital at Montevideo is situated in the Calle de Patagones, and on one of the finest points of the bay. In it there is accommodation for about sixty patients.

A Californian paper gives the following horrifying account of a mutiny on board a slaver.

TEMPERATURE. Jan. 31—Monday, 2 p.m. Fahrenheit 81. ON CHANGE. January 31, 1869. Ounces 400. Sovereigns 122 1/2. Patcoines 25. National Bonds 60 1/2.

This being the last day of the month, it was thought that the Bond Market would be a little more active; generally speaking, the closing of the various transactions for the end of the month necessitates various sales and purchases, but so completely are Bonds at present of the market that, although there were many who had to purchase to deliver, they got the Bonds from outsiders, and thus the bulk of the business of the day was done outside of the Bolas.

The business in the produce markets to-day was extremely limited; wools may be quoted at an advance of five dollars, owing to non-arrivals from the camp and the limited stock on hand. Nearly all the wools in Montevideo, it is said, have been bought up—so that exporters find the wool markets on both sides of the Plate all but closed.

THE BRITISH HOSPITAL, MONTEVIDEO. In the year 1867 it was found to be necessary to provide a Hospital for the reception of this city for our fellow-countrymen. A Building, affording a sufficient number of Wards to meet our wants, it is said that was accordingly rented, and furnished with all the usual appliances. But in the year 1868, from the vast increase which had taken place in the number of vessels frequenting the Port, this Building became so overcrowded, that the appearance of an infectious disease, it was felt that the lives of the patients were seriously endangered, while many applications for admission could not be received, and the Committee, it was then resolved to put forth a special effort to procure larger and more suitable premises, and for this purpose an Appeal for Funds was made to the British residents, and was by them most liberally met. A site was then purchased and a Building erected on it, furnishing Beds for Fifty Patients, besides a Hall, a Dispensary, a Hospital, a Surgical, and all the usual Offices; while it was so constructed that, should a necessity arise at a future day, additional wards can be added at a trifling expense. The Hospital, in all respects, admirably adapted to meet our necessities, and incurring expenses for general management never exceeding our annual income. The total cost of site and building has been thirty-six thousand dollars, of which sum twenty-one thousand have been paid, leaving a deficit of fifteen thousand dollars. This sum has been lent to the Committee at interest by several British residents; but, with a community so small, and continuing to support their other Institutions, and monetary distress, it is hopeless to expect to pay it off without assistance from other quarters. The Committee propose to hold a Bazaar in September, 1870, and they make a general appeal for contributions of money, and of useful and ornamental articles, suitable for sale, believing that such a Bazaar will be successful, and that this City has not been backward to help themselves, but that they have been willing to their power, and beyond their power; and the Committee trust this Appeal will be met by men with a generous and liberal response.
