Montevideo, Feb. 7, 1876, 6.50, P.M. Paper opened at 5. Exchange on London, some quantities for Douro at 52 gold.

On Paris, offered, drawers at 5.50. 1,500 dry cow hides, 'al barrer,' at 60 1/2 rs. gold, despatched. Forty pipes mutton tallow, 20 rs. ar. in barrero.

Weather unsettled. The Douro Mails. SIX DAYS' LATER FROM EUROPE. ANARCHY IN SPAIN. ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE THE REGENT.

The Douro has made a splendid run this time, only 27 days from Southampton to Buenos Ayres; she is commanded by our old friend Captain Thwaites; the passengers are in quarantine.

The following is the list of passengers: From Southampton—Mr Armstrong, the Misses Armstrong and servant, Mr Aucherley, Mr Bell, Mrs Bell, three children, and two servants; Mr Mastermann, Mr Hubbard, Mr Boardman, Mr Stephen, Mr Mackenzie, Captain Mackenzie, Mr C. From Lisbon—Mr G. Reid, Juan Maria Bravo, Ricardo Herrero, Pereyria Hermida and child, Rosa Rodriguez and two children, Maria Christina, and a 2nd class.

The Douro sailed from Southampton on January 10 at 4 p.m., arrived at Rio on January 31, at 5 a.m., sailed from Rio on February 1, at 9 a.m., stopped off Maldonado, in consequence of thick fog, February 4, at 8 p.m.

The Daily Telegraph of January 10 says: Saturday Evening. The Stock Exchange markets were firm to-day, the continuous buoyancy on the Paris Bourse having produced a favourable effect.

The recovery in the premium on gold at New York is beginning to tell on United States' stocks, which, after rallying a little in the morning, subsequently gave way, and closed with considerable heaviness. In the English Railway market most of the fluctuations tended downwards.

The Tanjore, from Alexandria, with Australian gold, has arrived. The amount is £428,500, and the whole has been purchased for export to France. Bar silver is in demand for Holland at 5s 0 1/2 per ounce standard.

The price of gold at Paris is par, and the short exchange upon London, 25f. 17c.

On 'Change this afternoon there was an increased demand for bills on Paris and Amsterdam; otherwise the alterations were unimportant.

The corn market was again dull at the prices of Monday last.

The directors of the Union Bank of Australia have resolved upon a dividend of £1 1/2s 6d per share, being 7 1/2 per cent for the half year.

A Suez telegram to-day says four steamers (three English) passed through, and cleared the navigation very easy.

An extraordinary general meeting of shareholders of the China Submarine Telegraph Company was held to-day, when resolutions were passed authorising the directors to take the necessary steps for completing the line from Hong Kong to Shanghai, and for this purpose to increase the capital of the company by an additional issue of £300,000.

The following extract from a telegram, has been received at Savannah: "Discovery of gold in Nicaragua.—Norfolk, December 8.—The British steamer East Indian has arrived from Aspinwall. She brings reports of rich discoveries in the district of Cautalus, Nicaragua, by a party of Englishmen. Two hundred pounds in aggregate weight of nuggets had already been taken out."

The directors of the London and Brazilian Bank (Limited) have issued their report. They state that, notwithstanding the small return on the two-month's operations, the working of the last six months shows a recovery in business.

The net profit for the half-year ending 30th September amounted to £9,937 8s 8d, after providing for the bad and doubtful debts incurred during that period, with the exception of the claim on the estate of Franghiadi and Radocanachi, which it is estimated will involve a loss of about £3,000. The deficit is now reduced to £14,062 1s 8d.

In discount quarters the demand was quiet, and the tendency of the rates was to further ease. First-class bills in exceptional instances were taken at 2 1/2 per cent.

On Saturday M. Gelot had a motion on the roll of the Second Division of the Court of Session, Edinburgh, for a new trial in the case of Gelot and Stewart. Counsel will be heard in support of the motion this week.

Advices from the North report the failure of Messrs. Robertson & Co., shipbuilders, of Greenock. The unsecured liabilities are estimated at £13,000, but nothing is known as to the probable assets.

At the meeting of colonists at the Cannon-street Hotel, yesterday, a series of resolutions was adopted, affirming that, as the people of the colonies rendered allegiance to the Crown, they were entitled to the constitutional rights of British subjects, and that to withhold any such rights would be a grave offence on the part of a British Minister.

The importance of encouraging emigration to the colonies was also insisted upon, and a scheme for the formation of a National League for Colonial purposes was agreed to.

A telegram has been received at the Admiralty announcing that the Monitor, with the remains of Mr. Peabody on board, arrived at Madeira on the 30th ult.

Her Royal Highness the Princess Mary Adelaide was safely delivered of a prince at eleven o'clock this morning. Her Royal Highness, and the infant Prince are doing perfectly well.

Dublin, Tuesday Night. The returns from Granard and Ballymahon did not reach Longford until a late hour to-day, and the man who brought them was escorted by cavalry.

Gross poll: Greville Nugent, 1,491; Martin, 432. Although the rioting at Granard was very serious, only one man dangerously wounded. The rival mobs attacked each other violently, and proceeded to a field to fight it out.

The officer in command of the 40th Regiment declined to order his men to fire until called on the third time to do so by the resident magistrate. Only ten or twelve fired, evidently taking care not to hit any of the mob.

Mr. Edmund Dease was elected for Queen's County to-day, without opposition.

Intelligence has been received of the death, to-day of Mr. Walsh, who was fired at and wounded near Tuam on Saturday.

Paris, Jan. 4. The Official Journal of this morning announces that M. Parisien has been appointed Minister and President of the Council of State.

The members of the new Ministry, after taking the oath to the Emperor yesterday presented to the Emperor.

Her Majesty said that she wished to avail herself of the opportunity to assure them that Ministers when invested with the confidence of the Emperor would always meet with her cordial esteem.

The Gaulois of to-day publishes a telegram from Madrid, dated 3rd inst., according to which the question is said to have been raised of investing the Regent with sovereign power. This solution, however, meets with considerable opposition from the majority of the Cortes, and the partisans of the Duke de Montpensier are also very active in resisting it.

According to the Patrie, the impression created by the new French Ministry has been as favourable in the departments as in the capital. Everybody feels, says the Patrie, that the Ministry is one of conciliation.

An Imperial decree, dated the 5th instant appoints M. Chevreaux Prefect of the Seine, vice Baron Haussmann, who has resigned.

The Official Journal of to-day publishes a statistical table showing that 92,411 persons have taken advantage of the amnesty of the 14th September, 1869.

Baron Haussmann has declined all compensation on relinquishing his post as Prefect of the Seine.

The memorandum of association of the Ottoman Railway Company has been ratified to-day at the Turkish Embassy. The company is now definitely constituted.

Most of this evening's newspapers express great satisfaction at the removal of Baron Haussmann, which even they consider as a striking evidence of the inauguration of Parliamentary Government.

January 7. Count Daru has issued to-day a short circular to the Diplomatic Body, notifying his appointment as Minister of Foreign Affairs. The concluding sentence of the circular is as follows: "It will be my constant endeavor to cultivate these friendly relations which happily exist between your Government and that of France."

Yesterday Count Daru received the heads of the foreign legations. The reception lasted four hours. It is asserted that Count Daru declared France would continue to abstain from interfering in the domestic affairs of other countries.

A rumor is current that some members of the Conseil d'Etat will be placed on the retired list, in order to make way for others who are in favor of the new line of policy.

Count Daru said that the Government was prepared to give explanations on all the interpellations which had been brought forward relative to the Ecumenical Council, the commercial treaties, and its home policy. He added: "We wish to explain our policy on all points. We are honest, and shall do all we have said, and fulfil all the promises we have made, without any exception."

At Count Daru's request, the discussion of the interpellation on the Ecumenical Council was fixed to take place on Tuesday next; that relative to the treaties of commerce the following Thursday; and the one on the home policy of the Government on the 15th inst.

A great meeting in favor of free trade will be held in Paris on the 16th inst., under the presidency of M. Leon Say.

The trial of the *Rappel* for an article of a seditious character addressed to the army took place to-day. M. Charles Hugo and M. Felix Pyat—the latter by default—were sentenced to four months' imprisonment. M. Barbieux to three months', and each of them to a fine of 100f.

Paris, Jan. 8, (Evening). The *Public and Liberte* of this evening deny the rumor that the Marquis de Lavalette and M. Benedetti have resigned their posts in London and Berlin.

The *Liberte* says: "We believe that the Ministry will present to the Legislative Body on Monday a measure for the reduction of this year's army contingent from 100,000 to 75,000 men."

Paris, Jan. 9. A Ministerial order, dated yesterday, has been issued, definitively restoring to all newspapers whatsoever the right of sale in the public streets.

A large meeting was held yesterday at Montpellier, at which the principle of Free Trade was loudly affirmed. Rentes are quoted at 75.

Bordeaux, Jan. 9. A numerously attended meeting was held here to-day in reference to questions connected with the mercantile navy.

M. Puyeu-Quertier, who spoke for several hours against the Treaties of Commerce and the abolition of restrictions upon importations in foreign bottoms, met with great success.

Rome, Jan. 6. The second public sitting of the Council was held this morning. The number of persons present was considerably smaller, and it was opened with less ceremony than on the previous occasion.

The labours of the Council in reference to questions of dogma have not made sufficient progress to allow of any decree being promulgated.

After Mass had been celebrated, every Prelate presented to the Pope a written profession of the Catholic faith, in accordance with the formula laid down by Pope Pius IV.

The health of His Holiness continues excellent.

The ceremony of the profession of faith was first gone through by the Pope, who made it in his own name. It was then read by Bishop Fabiano, in the name of the other Fathers, each of whom took the oath in his own language on the Gospel. The Pope then bestowed his benediction.

The Bishop of Panama is dead. January 8.

The Committee on Matters of Faith held their first sitting to-day.

Cardinal Bizzani has been appointed President of the Committee on Regular Orders.

Four Fathers spoke at today's Congregation of the Council.

Madrid, Jan. 3, [Evening.] The whole Ministry have resigned. This step was taken after the news was received that the Italian Government definitely declined to permit the Duke of Genoa to accept the Crown of Spain.

Jan. 4, [Evening.] The Cortes has suspended its sittings until further notice, in order to leave the Regent unfettered in dealing with the Ministerial crisis.

Jan. 5, [Evening.] The 'Imperial' states, that two pistol shots were fired at the Regent yesterday, but, fortunately, without wounding him. The Ministerial crisis still continues.

Advices from Barcelona, dated Jan. 2 (evening), state that Senor Zorilla, Minister of Justice, was followed as he passed through the town by several groups shouting "Long live the Federal republic!" and hissing. A bottle of spirits of turpentine was thrown at the carriage in which the Minister was seated, and he was obli-

ged to be escorted by a troop of cavalry. The troops of the garrison were confined to their barracks.

Jan. 7. General Prim has not yet succeeded in the formation of a new Cabinet. An understanding on the basis desired by him has been found impossible, the majority of the Cortes being opposed to an extension of the Regent's prerogatives.

It is probable that a course will be adopted (postponing the question of candidature to the Throne for the present, until the majority of Deputies shall have arrived at an understanding on the matter, and the Cortes shall have completed their work of legislation on the organic laws of the country.

Madrid, Jan. 8. The 'Iberia' continues to advocate the establishment of a dictatorship.

The Ministry has been constituted as follows: Senor Rivero, Interior. Senor Sagasta, Foreign Affairs. Senor Montero Rios, Justice. Admiral Topete, Marine.

The other portfolios remain in the hands of the Ministers who held them in the last Cabinet.

The Ministry will present themselves to-morrow to the Cortes.

Vienna, Jan. 4. It is semi-officially stated, that there is no foundation whatever for the rumor that it was the intention of the Emperor to proceed to Rome.

Florence, Jan. 8 (Evening) The King has left for Turin. Dresden, Jan. 8 Evening.

In to-day's sitting of the Upper House, several resolutions against the new Federal Penal Code came on for discussion. Count Hohenhausen opposed the further extension of the agreement enabling the North German Confederation to dictate laws relative to the internal affairs of the several component States.

Berlin, Jan. 5, Evening. The semi-official *Provincial Correspondence* of this evening publishes the following with reference to the change of Ministry in France:—"The circumstances under which the change has taken place, as well as the names of the statesmen who have been called to form the new Cabinet, afford a fresh guarantee for the maintenance of those peaceful and friendly relations which, on the strength of the sentiments of the Emperor Napoleon, already subsist between France and the North German Confederation."

St. Petersburg, Jan. 3. The Government commission appointed to inspect the Charok-Aza Railway have sanctioned the opening of the whole of the line, and passenger trains will commence running to-morrow.

Bombay, Jan. 1. His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh will visit Bombay in March.

Her Majesty's ships *Daphne* and *Nymph* have returned from the Persian Gulf, and bring five Arab chiefs who had been implicated in the suppressed rebellion at Bahrain. They are to be kept as State prisoners.

LATEST FROM AMERICA. Washington, Jan. 3. The Secretary of the Treasury has issued his usual monthly statement of the debt of the United States, which amounts to \$2,668,000,000, showing a reduction of \$4,750,000.

The coin in the Treasury is \$109,000,000, being an increase of \$3,000,000; and the currency \$12,000,000, being an increase of \$500,000.

Mr. Bontwell has ordered the sales of gold for January to be reduced to four millions, and the purchase of U. States Bonds to six millions of dollars.

New York, Jan. 3. The municipal authorities of numerous cities have appointed delegations to be present at the obsequies in honor of Mr. Peabody, to be celebrated at Portland upon the arrival of her Majesty's ship *Monarch*.

The Cuban Junta at New York deny the truth of the report that the revolutionary movement in Cuba has been temporarily abandoned.

Jan. 4. Advance sheets have appeared of Mrs. Stowe's volume, entitled 'Lady Byron Vindicated.'

The press almost unanimously condemns the book in severe terms. The *New York Times* declares that she evades dates, and proves nothing; and it regrets that she should persist in recording herself as the authority for a revolting slander.

The *Herald* says that her arguments are weak, and that her motives are to make money, or to gain notoriety, by pandering to depraved tastes.

The *World* also very strongly condemns the book.

New York, Jan. 5. Governor Hoffman, in his message to the New York Legislature, urges legislation to secure the payment of the principal and interest of the New York State Debt in coin.

He declares that the currency payment which has been going on since 1863 has been a practice of bad faith and bad policy, and a virtual repudiation.

Jan. 5. The New York Legislature have rescinded their former resolution ratifying the Negro Suffrage Amendment.

Intelligence from Hayti announces that Salnave, with 1,000 adherents, still holds Fort Alexandre, and refuses to capitulate. The insurgents in large force occupy Port-au-Prince.

New York, Jan. 8. The twelve Spanish gunboats which

remained in New York sailed yesterday for Cuba. The Missouri Legislature have ratified the Negro Suffrage Amendment; The Maine Legislature have appointed a delegation to attend at the mortuary ceremonies to be held at Boston in honor of the late Mr. Peabody. The common council of the town will attend in a body.

The Monitors *Miantonomah* and *Leror*, and the ironclad corvette *Alaska*, will act as guard of honour to the funeral fleet. The *Plymouth* and other steam frigates will follow in line. Closing prices: Gold closed at 122 1/2; Exchange, 108 1/2; Flour, extra State, \$5 20c to \$5 80c.

Toronto, Jan. 6. The Red River insurgents have tried by court-martial and sentenced to banishment forty-five loyal Canadians, retaining, however, four as hostages.

The recalled Governor McDougall is expected at Ottawa this week.

Private letters received by merchants here state that a reign of terror prevails at Winnipeg. Scotch, English, and French inhabitants are anxious that the Canadian Government should take possession of the country, but are powerless against the armed body of French settlers. Those who have been banished are now on their way to Canada.

Toronto, Jan. 8. His Royal Highness Prince Arthur gave a ball at Rosemont on Thursday night. There was a large and brilliant assemblage.

THE PRESIDENT'S TOUR. San José, Thursday night.

I tried to write from Concepcion to-day amid all the turmoil and bustle of our landing and preparations to come here. The cortege started from the landing place headed by Urquiza's carriage, four in hand, in which were the General, Sarmiento, Gorostiaga, and Cabal. The second carriage, also four in hand, contained Kirk, Le Maistre, España, and Varela.

A string of carriages followed containing the principal authorities of the place, and the rest of our party, officers and soldiers on horseback, and the President's escort. A halt was made at Col. Santa Cruz's house in the Plaza. Splendid mansion—furnished with exquisite and costly taste.

Mrs. Santa Cruz received us with Parisian grace. Carriages started again at 9.30. I stopped behind to breakfast with Peralta, hoping for a spare moment to write to you. Started, however, almost immediately after breakfast, reaching this after two. Heat tremendous. When at Santa Cruz, National Guards marched past, under windows—about 400 men. Another 200 men were formed near landing place. This was all the 15,000 that had been announced would await our arrival!

San José sumptuously decorated. Principal patio as big as a plaza—covered over with awning and ornamented with colored festoons, flags, etc. In centre a trophy with the four flags that won the day at Caseros, Argentine, Brazilian, Oriental, and Ejiro Riario. Large portrait of Sarmiento placed at one end of patio, above the arches, surrounded with Argentine and other flags. Floor covered with brilliant scarlet baize; a table laid out for 150 covers. Urquiza pleased as Punch. Mrs. U. and daughters charming. Found Colonel and Mrs. Mitchell located as guests. Mrs. Mitchell the patio. Very nice people both. Sat down to dinner at 6. Afterwards Sarmiento made a happy speech—re-

membered the glories of the 3rd of February—alluded with great felicity to the political divisions in the Republic, hoping that the event of to-day would be an earnest of union and good will among all parties. Dr. Victoria then rose and in an eloquent speech proposed the health of Sarmiento. A call was made for Varela, but evidently he was not inspired, as he did not rise. No more speeches were made (thank Heaven), and we rose from table, to wander about the corridors, till the sound of music called us to the drawing room where Miss Justa Urquiza played with effect a piece on the violin, accompanied by eldest sister Lola. In the meantime the table and dinner things were removed, and the patio turned into a splendid ball-room.

Dancing now going on with great spirit. An unfortunate misunderstanding occurred with French and Italian Ministers. Went straight to Colon, thinking that was 'rendezvous.' Not seeing Pavaon there waited, and then came to Concepcion to find us gone. Nobody left to tell what to do, and no carriages left to take them on.

After a time LaCroce managed to get one, and arrived here with the captain of the *Veloco* and of the *Etna* at 10, after being bumped about across camp in a dark night. Minister Gorostiaga and Santa Cruz leave at 3 a.m. by and by to fetch Count Amelot.

We expect to leave this to-morrow afternoon, and attend a ball given by Sarmiento in Concepcion by subscription. Two or three houses have been fitted up to give us lodgings in Concepcion. One I saw very comfortable.

Here at San José, notwithstanding that a hundred extra beds had been prepared, they are found insufficient. On Saturday we leave for Villa Colon, and from thence visit the colony which is close to it, and where a breakfast awaits us. General Urquiza, Dr. Victoria, Dr. Peralta and others will go with us to the colony. It is not decided whether we stop a night at Colon, or if after visiting the colony

we go on board the *Pavaon* and steam for Buenos Ayres. In the former case we cannot be with you before Thursday morning, but it is probable we shall do the whole thing in one day, and that Sunday afternoon will see us in Buenos Ayres. We are all tired beyond description with so much feasting, and long for a good rest. The paseo has been highly interesting, and I would not have missed it for anything, but as the Italians say— "Ogni bel gioco dura poco."

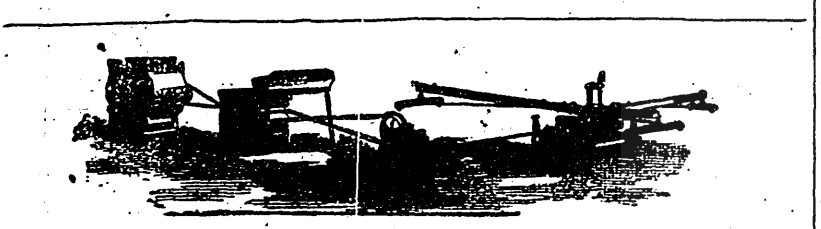

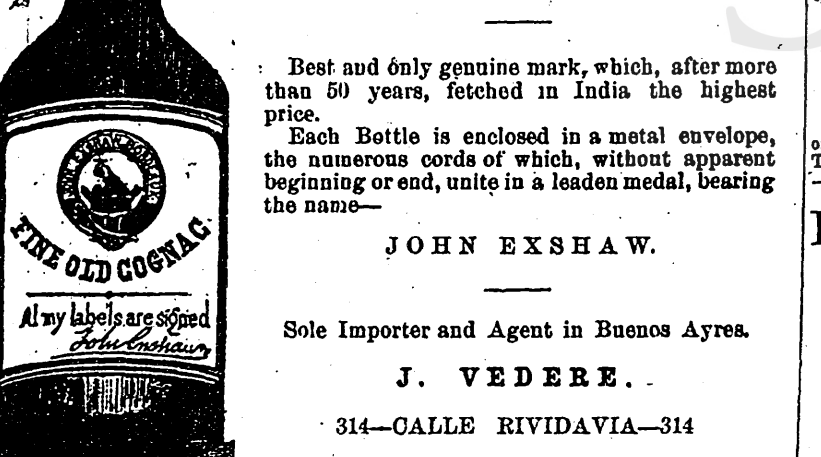

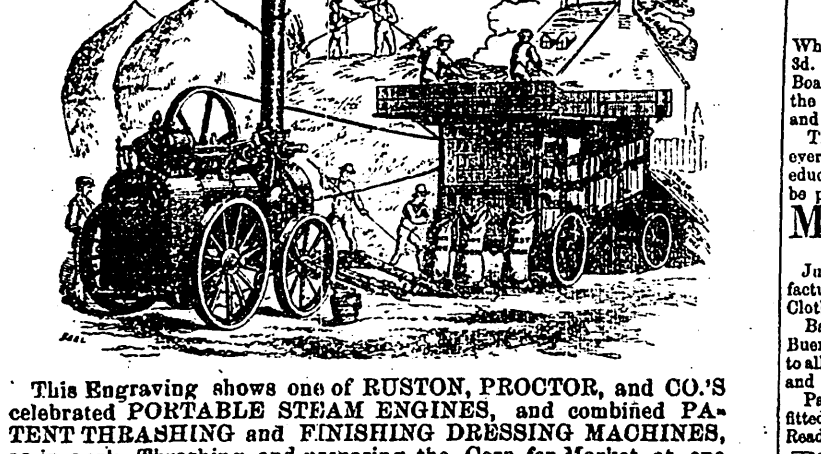

STATUTES OF AN ASSOCIATION UNDER THE NAME OF SEAMEN'S UNION IN BUENOS AYRES.

ARTICLES. 1. The Seamen's Union is an unlimited Association which cannot expire nor dissolve.

2. Any sailor may become a member of the same, by paying \$10 m/c (ten pesos top), at his shipping or getting his discharge, no matter where he boards.

3. Any Boarding Master may become a member of the same by paying \$500 (five hundred pesos top) in the hands of the Treasurer of the Association, Treasurers, or Presidents...

4. All Captains may sign their men with the Society's Office without any commission, but are bound to pay the men their respective Bounties in Cash, and in the hands of the respective Treasurer of the sailor or captain's Consul.

5. Only those sailors will be admitted as members of the Seamen's Union, who produce their discharge in due order, or in want of the same, by other documents, to have fulfilled their duty.

6. In case a member of the Seamen's Union, shipped at the Society's Office, should leave his ship before his departure, or within a month from the date of his having been shipped, the Society will be responsible for the members...

7. The different cash-boxes of the Seamen's Union will be opened every six months, in presence of the President, or in want of the same, the Trustees, and its contents shall be distributed as follows:—

One-third to the German Poor House. One-third to all the Hospitalized. One-third being left as a Reserve Fund.

8. The Committee of the Society is formed, besides the Foreign Consuls, who represent President and Treasurer of their respective nations, by six members, viz:—

1. A Vice-President and Representative, and two Trustees and Representatives as Honorary Members, without any remuneration for their services, besides the Consul of the Office, whose salary will be fixed by the Commission, and whose duty it is to be at the Office from ten a.m. until three p.m., to receive and book in the respective Cash-books of the members...

13. The Trustees of the Seamen's Union are elected every year, by the Association, and are for a year of office. Every Trustee has two votes in an election. Should a Trustee withdraw before his time, the member of the Society who, in the preceding election, received the highest number of votes, will retain his place until the next election takes place.

14. A General Meeting will be called for twice a year, say the first Sunday of the month of January, and the first Sunday of the month of July, and held at the Office, where the Committee will designate for this purpose. The presence of at least Ten Members is required for any deliberation or vote.

15. HONORARY MEMBERS.—Any person who forwards the interest of the Seamen's Union Association with sincerity, or may merit such distinction by presents made, or any other laudable deed for or on behalf of the Association, may be declared and named Honorary Members of same. The Society will reimburse a Shipping Office, near the Beach, or in the neighborhood of the Consulate, the cost of the Association, which, under the immediate inspection of the Society's Committee, will provide captains with the necessary crew.

17. Invalid seamen will be maintained by the Society without any remuneration. Sick seamen will be sent to their respective hospitals from the Central Office, with the permission for admission granted by the respective Consuls.

18. These Statutes will be printed for the term of one month, in the English and German Newspapers, as well as in the "Tribuna," and will be produced every six months, together with an extract of the same to each Association.

19. Every member of the Seamen's Union obliges himself to lend all his zeal, aid, and influence for maintaining, forwarding, improving, and giving publicity to the Statutes of the Association.

20. The association will be constituted formally on the 16th of January 1870, up to which date the Executive Committee endeavor to make these Statutes known amongst seamen.

21. The preceding articles, signed by the provisional committee, will be handed over to all Consuls in the river. The list of the members, which are already laid up, will be published in all respectable newspapers every Saturday.

22. No member of the association can be expelled or discharged, without notice being given to his consul, or the Central Office of the Seamen's Union.
