THE COURTS OF JUSTICE.

At last the Augean stables are going to be cleansed, and for the first time since the period of Independence a wholesome ventilation is about to take place in the murky atmosphere of the Cabildo. The law-courts of Buenos Ayres have long been worse than useless; they are in fact the great stumbling-block to the progress and welfare of the country.

No society could subsist long with such a state of things. Fraud, violence, and the knife of the assassin threatened to throw us into chaos. Public indignation raised an outcry against the judges, to whom is intrusted the sacred duty of dispensing justice and administering the laws.

The whole judicial system now in vogue must be swept away. Trial by jury, open law-courts, secure prisons, responsible jailers and officials, and a gallows at each end of the town: these are indispensable if we would have law and order as becomes a Christian country.

The following letter from such a high authority as Dr. Gomez speaks volumes and merits attention. We hope to-morrow to be able to deal with this subject as it requires.

Thank Heaven! A wholesale reaction has set in against the vices and immoralities in the administration of justice, which I have been vainly attacking for the last fifteen years with my pen and with my voice, in the press and at the bar.

The movement which is beginning to be noted in public opinion with regard to the manner of administering justice, has begun in the very conclave of the votaries of Aetrea, who have begun to say their sacred hats at each other's face.

Shortcomings of Judges! Inventions of cavilling pettifoggers! It is only in this land that judges are not delinquents. Since they alone can pass sentence upon one another, I should not wonder if they convened a council to declare their infallibility.

At the same time Dr. Agrelo, who called the Cabildo a Callejon de Ibañez charges Dr. Garcia-Fernandez with having made the fortune of one advocate and making that of another, whilst the Supreme Court accuses Dr. Agrelo of having enriched some public actioneers with detriment to the freedom of industry and to private rights.

The Legislature, the Courts, the bench, all of us citizens, and inhabitants have a vital interest of safety and dignity, and an imperative duty towards others and towards ourselves to cut off all the heads of the hydra of immorality, or bury for ever calumny which can never hold its own against publicity and discussion, and only feeds and fattens on flippant gossip whispered in the ear, after staining for ever names perhaps worthy of the veneration of mankind.

I once denounced a contract entered into by some of the late Mr. Sheridan's heirs by which Don Gregorio Lezama sold for a million or more of dollars his influence over the courts of law. My friend Mr. John Deuby, an English merchant, held the possession of this contract, and it ought to be now in the hands of his representative.

Light! Let us have light to dispel the shades of these secret tribunals and 'Real Audiencia.' Let every man do his duty, and let the Supreme Tribunal appoint a committee of lawyers and civilians to examine into all lawsuits in which lawyers or attorneys are supposed to have been partners with the judges: the Tribunal knows well the names of the cases in question.

If it results that justice was fairly done, by all means let the judges have all the merit of it. But in a long series of cases it appears that justice was systematically outraged in favor of this or that lawyer, we must not let them hang a cloak on the sun, but make a clean sweep of the whole lot.

The Legislature is supposed to ensure its protection for life and property, and to protect the rights of the citizen from any inroad by the ministers of the law. But it is idle to make codes of laws; we have excellent laws and the evil lies not in them but in the men who are raised to public positions, where their corrupt passions are a disgrace to the sanctity of their office.

I have lived here 50 years, and served as a lawyer for 25, and my experience of men in office is, that we can never have a right administration of justice till we institute 3 fundamental things: 1. Separation of Escribanos from the Tribunals.

These are three measures that the Chambers could pass in one night. I hope, therefore, that the Press will take up the question, strike the iron while it is hot, and make a searching enquiry into the past and present of our Law-courts so as to give us some guarantee for the future.

JUAN CARLOS GOMEZ. CHILE.

In is our painful duty to lay before our readers the particulars of a most distressing outrage committed upon a British subject, by a Chilean officer holding a very high rank in the navy.

It appears that, a short time since, the Navy Department decided upon adapting four gun carriages, originally intended for fort purposes, to the use of pivot guns for service on board the Chilean corvette Chacabuco.

The task of adapting these carriages to their new use was entrusted to the proprietor of the Caledonian Foundry, who sent on board for that purpose a Mr. Thomas Inkpen, who is a skilful and experienced mechanic and fitter.

During the progress of the work the commander of the vessel, from motives unknown to us, saw fit to employ some other men—upon one of the carriages, and they, "made a botch of it." When Mr. Inkpen had finished three of the carriages, the commander requested him to proceed with the fourth. This Mr. Inkpen politely refused to do.

Several of our joint stock companies have presented their half yearly reports to the shareholders. The Directors of the National Bank propose a dividend of 7 per cent. for the half year, ended December 31st and in addition a bonus of two per cent.

There is being formed in this city for the establishment of a first class Hotel at Linache, for the accommodation of the numerous visitors that through to that place, more especially during the summer months. We understand that the project has been very favorably received, and success appears to be certain.

A VISIT TO CUNAPIRU.

(From a Correspondent.)

The country about the gold-fields is very elevated, but broken into numerous ridges called the Cordilleras of Cunapiaru. Veins of quartz seem to be plentiful, in many places intersecting each other, and to all appearances the surface has undergone a sharp search for the precious metal, every quartz stone being broken into fragments.

The first mine I visited was the San Pablo, where Mr. Posado has expended a great deal of money: it is about 50 feet in depth and seems to abound in rich auriferous deposits. I was present when some very rich quartz was brought to the surface. The crushing operations are at a stand-still for want of water.

The San Geronimo mine belongs to General Suarez and has given satisfactory results: he has about 20 tons of quartz piled up in his store, that will yield from 8 to 10 ounces of gold per ton. This mine is about 30 feet deep. The General is at present actively occupied in erecting his pulverizing machinery, driven by water-power; but this did not prevent his entertaining our party, and we warmly congratulated him on the flourishing state of his labors.

The Cunapiaru Company has made a start although the new machinery has not arrived. It seems to me that with a practical and energetic man the results ought to be very successful and give a fine dividend to the shareholders.

I returned to the surface I was surprised at the richness of a piece of quartz that I had picked up down below. The proprietors told me I was welcome to the prize, and on examination it was assayed at 20 ounces of gold to the ton. The tribulating machinery of this mine does its work slowly but well.

Another time I shall give you more information about these mines, the kind of people one meets here, and my impressions in general.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Royal Mail Steamship Douro sails to-day for Europe with the English and General Mails. The Baby leaves the mole with passengers at three o'clock p.m.

It has been ascertained beyond doubt, according to a Montevidean colleague that it is the bishop of Panama who died at Rome, and not Dr. Gelabert bishop of Parana as it was at first supposed. Official communication of the decease of this prelate was made to the Council. Two Cardinals have also died in the Eternal City since the opening of the Ecumenical Council.

The Montevidean Legislature has commenced its preliminary sittings. On Friday the Senators met for the second time, and on Saturday the Deputies held a third sitting. Some important measures are expected to be brought forward during the approaching session.

General Castro has had to postpone his intended trip to the Litoral in consequence of the sudden illness of the Oriental War Minister General Pazola. General Castro assumes pro tem the war portfolio.

A French Steamship Company at Marseilles has had the honour of despatching the first vessel to India through the Suez Canal. The arrival of the Asia belonging to this line has been telegraphed from Bombay, and she has been advertised for a return voyage by the same route.

A number of the Italian residents of the metropolis gave a dinner on Sunday at the well known 'El Pobre Diablo, on the Palermo road, in commemoration of the abortive attempt to establish a republic in the Roman States in 1848. This vessel will arrive at Rio in time to catch the steamer to New York from that port. A mail for the States will be despatched by City of Limerick.

Mr. Muller, who has acquired some reputation for his efforts towards solving the eternal meat-preserving problem, returned last week to the Sociedad Rural some specimens of meat preserved by him, which had made two trips to Europe and back. The result of the examination instituted to ascertain the condition of the meat proved, we are informed, highly satisfactory, though some indispensable points remain yet to be attained in order to render the commodity suitable for the home markets.

The construction of the iron bridge for the Boca Railway has had to be suspended, in consequence of the loss of a vessel with a large quantity of materials intended for it.

An architect has written to us for information respecting the competition for building a new custom-house in Buenos Ayres. We are not aware of the exact position of the scheme, if there be such a one, at present.

A home correspondent informs us that Mr. Baillie's scheme for importing live cattle from the Plate into England is just now attracting increased attention at home, as the question of meat supply can never be satisfactorily solved by the Australian preserved article alone.

The Brazilian Customs receipts show a large increase since the beginning of the present year as compared with 1869; this is wholly accounted for by the new and increased tariff. In view of the anonymous pamphlet attack on the Rosario de Santa Fe Bank, many leading houses in Rosario are said to have signed a round robin, expressing their confidence in the concern.

A Spanish resident of Gualeguaychu, Sr. Zabala, was found dead in his house a few days ago; he is supposed to have destroyed his own life. Our French contemporary devoted a leader to the inconveniences arising from the habit of employing English weights, measures, and systems in estimates for contracts, &c., which our countrymen have anything to do with in the Plate, and consequently naively advises all foreigners to learn the language of the country.

The performance of Marta at the Opera House on Sunday night attracted a very fair audience. Madame Gasc as Marta was charming and sung and acted splendidly; we must also congratulate Madame Passi and Sr. Ordinas, on the way in which they filled their respective roles; Lelmi was also quite up to the mark, and sang the lovely 'm' appar' with great feeling, the spinning wheel chorus brought down a vociferous encore.

The people of Tandil rejoice greatly at the assumption of the command on their frontiers by General Rivas; they have every confidence in the energy of this veteran officer putting an end to Indian raids. It is said that Madame Carozzi, will leave Montevideo for Europe on the 21st inst.

We received yesterday some pears grown at the quinta of our friend Mr. Lawson at the Tigra. We have seldom seen finer specimens of this fruit; they leave the famed Montevidean pears 'nowhere.'

MRS. STOWE'S DEFENCE.

(By English Atlantic Cable.) New York, Jan. 5. Mrs. Stowe's 'Lady Byron Vindicated' is published to-day. It is disappointing in so far as it contains no documentary evidence and few new statements of fact. The author confines herself very much to argument, rather forcibly stated, and does her best to explain away the various objections that have been made to the credibility of her story.

We understand that a solemn ceremony took place lately at Cordova on the occasion of receiving into the Roman Catholic Church the distinguished American officer, Major Joseph Clarendon Washington Hall. We believe the gallant major will shortly lead a lovely and wealthy Cordoveña to the hymeneal altar.

We learn that Don Tomas Moncayo has been appointed Consul for Ecuador in this city. This is the first time we have had a consular representative of that Republic in the Argentine Confederation. Señor Moncayo is a young man widely and favourably known in Buenos Ayres for his business talents, and his appointment to the post in question cannot fail to give general satisfaction.

respondent of a contemporary in that place, the Minister of the Interior, Dr. Velez Sarsfield, has addressed a despatch to the Governor, approving of the course adopted by H.E., and his intention to prosecute the paper in question for libel.

We have seen a magnificently bound copy of Signor Calvari's Italian translation of Mrs Mann's biographical sketch of President Sarmiento. The work is dedicated to King Victor Emmanuel. The copy forwarded by the author to the President is beautifully bound in blue velvet, with the national arms emblazoned in gold.

Messrs Rosetti and Peña, C.E., who were sent by the Provincial Government of Buenos Ayres to Chile for the purpose of having preliminary inquiries made as to the feasibility of making a railway across the Continent to the West Coast, have arrived in Valparaiso. They have been most cordially received by the authorities there, the Minister for Foreign Affairs giving them a marked welcome and every assistance in his power towards beginning their important task.

A report was maliciously circulated yesterday that we were about to consign our Museum to the auctioneer's hammer, and there was consequently great excitement in art circles; we deem it right to state that there is not the slightest foundation for the unfriendly 'canard' in question.

A colleague asserts that Colonel Bederra who is said to be distinguishing himself in Mendoza, by the most outrageous persecution and annoyance of the foreign residents in that city, is out of his mind.

The contract for making a tramway from the railway station at Lujan to the Plaza of that town, has received the official approval of the Provincial Government. A colleague says that Messrs. Thomson and Company, have laid a project before Government for the colonization of Bahia Blanca.

H. E. President Sarmiento, left town yesterday afternoon by the Northern railway for a few days sojourn at the Tigra. It is probable that H. E. will not resume his post at the Government House till next Monday.

We extract the following paragraph from a Rosario paper in reference to our friend Mr. Bollaert, who sails to-day for England in the Doqro:—'We are informed that Mr. Bollaert who is highly esteemed in this country, and has for a number of years successfully acted as manager of the house of Messrs. Duguid and Company, is about to establish a house of business on his own account in Rosario on a large scale. We feel happy in wishing Mr. Bollaert the success which every energetic man in Rosario knows so well that he fully deserves.'

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he could not be expected to confine himself to her, neither should he expect or wish that she should confide herself to him.

One night in her presence he treated his sister with a liberality which both shocked and astonished her. Seeing her amazement and alarm, he came up to her and said, 'I suppose you perceive you are not wanted here. Go to your own room, and leave us alone. We can amuse ourselves better without you.' She said, 'I went to my room trembling. I fell down on my knees and prayed to my Heavenly Father to have mercy on them. I thought, what shall I now do?'

Byron boldly avowed the connection as having existed in time past; and as one that was to continue in time to come, and implied that she must submit to it. It was no sin: the world was first peopled in that way. Afterwards he took another turn, and said that the horror and crime were the very attraction. He had worn out all ordinary forms of sin, and longed for the stimulus of a new kind of vice.

She spoke of the danger of detection; and then he became furious, swearing that she, at any rate, should never be the means of his detection. She should leave him—that he was resolved upon; but she should always bear all the blame of the separation. In the ensuing tone, which was common with him, he said:—'The world will believe me, and it will not believe you. The world has made up its mind that By is a glorious boy; and the world will go for By, right or wrong. Besides, I shall make it my life's object to discredit you. I shall use all my powers. Read Caleb Williams, and you will see that I shall do you just as Falkland did by Cabel.' Lady Byron said she at first believed her husband to be insane, and pitied and excused him.

Mrs. Leigh was weak and wholly under his control. She afterwards repented, and became a truly good woman, and Lady Byron seemed to take comfort from the recollection of her subsequent intercourse with her. Lady Byron said, in reply to a question, that she had letters and documents in proof of her story, but Mrs. Stowe did not see them. The memorandum which she alluded in the article published in Macmillan's Magazine was returned by her to Lady Byron. It contained only an outline of the facts, and was without dates. Mrs. Stowe conjectures that Mrs. Leigh persuaded Lady Byron at first that her brother had only made insane attempts which she resisted, and that she alone could control his insanity. It was in this belief that the letters published in the Quarterly Review were written. Fuller revelations were, however, made later. Mrs. Stowe has no proof of this theory, but shows that Mrs. Leigh did represent Byron to be insane. Lady Byron told Mrs. Stowe that there was a daughter, who gave her friends much trouble.

From other sources Mrs. Stowe learned that the daughter escaped from her friends to the Continent and that Lady Byron assisted the efforts that were made to recover her. An English correspondent, it seems, has written to Mrs. Stowe averring that the crime was first committed, and the child born shortly before Byron married. The child, a daughter, must not be confounded with the natural daughter of Lord Byron born about a year after his separation. The history more or less of that child of incest is known to many, for in Lady Byron's attempt to watch over her and rescue her from ruin she was compelled to employ various agents at different times. An allusion possibly to this child is made in a letter to Moore, February 2, 1818. Mrs. Stowe pronounces the letter of Forbes Winslow fatal to the theory of hallucination, and writes at length of Lady Byron's strength of mind and high regard for truth. She also supports her story by passages in the poems and diary and by what is known of Byron's conduct at the time of the separation; but she adds nothing to what has been said already on those points in the Saturday Review and Temple Bar.

She treats the controversy as a question of veracity between Lord Byron and his wife; and fills nearly half the book with a review of the poet's effort to make good his threat of treating her as Falkland treated Caleb Williams, a threat that has been at the bottom of all the assaults upon her character from 1816 to the Pall Mall Gazette and Blackwood's Magazine in 1859. She declares that her disclosure in Macmillan's Magazine and Atlantic Monthly was prompted by a sense of duty to a slandered memory, and was made after it had been notified to her trustees that Lady Byron had determined that no memoir should be written, as the papers in their hands could not be published in full.

Here in America the public indignation at Mrs. Stowe's conduct in this matter has only been intensified by the publication of this so called defence.
