THE MEAT QUESTION IN EUROPE.

PROGRESS OF HORSE EATING. The Falmouth Mail of the 3rd of January having been detained till the 4th, Mr. E. B. Neill, the Consul General for Montevideo in London, sends the following particulars from the Pall Mall Gazette of the latter date; and they are assuredly not among the least convincing of his innumerable proofs of the ever augmenting need among the flesh consumers of the old world, for that particular article which Rio Plata is so preeminently qualified to supply.

"We are sorry to say that the hippophagists are advancing with rapid strides. In 1868, during the months of September, October, and November, 565 horses (including a few asses and mules) were eaten in Paris. In 1869, during the same period, the special slaughter houses disposed of 633 horses, showing an increase in three months alone of 118 horses, or 26,000 kilogrammes of horse meat.

In the departments also horse cooking progresses at the same rate. These accounts are most painful to those who for years have been accustomed to sit behind the noble animal without a thought of transferring him from the shafts to the dinner table, and who feel that if once called upon to eat horses and donkeys there is nothing to prevent their being requested some day to swallow dogs and cats.

That horse dinner at the Langham Hotel was a great mistake, and shows what serious consequences may ensue from a moment's thoughtlessness;—people can get anything down if it is well covered with sauce, and its tastes more strongly than the thing it hides. We all professed to take immense interest in the horse dinner, as we should in any dinner eaten by a crowd of notabilities.

If a duke ate a donkey several people would follow his example; but the vast majority of us never thought that hippophagy was anything but an amusement for a few people with depraved and eccentric appetites, or that the world in general would be expected to draw on the stables for the requirements of the kitchen. If however, as appears to be the case, the French really do mean to live on horseflesh, and the channel between the two countries is to be filled up, the next generation will see a more mighty revolution in our habits than railways and telegraphs have yet effected, and not the most pleasant anticipation of England as it will be the prospect of Dobbin revolving on the spit."

MISCELLANEOUS. From the Statesman's Year Book for 1870, an invaluable little volume, published by Macmillan, we call the following suggestive particulars:—"The sum of the imports into the United Kingdom for the year 1868 was £294,693,605. In 1867 it stood at £275,183,137, showing an increase of £19,510,471. In 1866, £206,993,547 came from British possessions, and £227,700,061 from foreign countries. In 1867, £50,734,545 were derived from British possessions, and £214,448,592 from foreign countries. Meanwhile, the exports for the year 1868 amounted in all to £179,677,812, against £181,961,123. The exports to British possessions were, in 1868, £49,779,531, against £49,709,610 in 1867, showing a decrease of about £20,000. In 1868 the exports to foreign countries were £129,684,081, against £131,102,313 in 1867, showing a decrease of £1,418,232.

There were no sales of Bonds to-day, and during business hours only 10,000 sold for the 28th Feb. at 63. At after hours there was business of importance transacted and one large sale for the end of June, 30,000 at 66 which shows an advance in the rate. Money it was said was a shade easier to-day; and the brokers stated that for first class paper plenty of money was offering at 1 1/2 per cent per month. Within the last week over \$1,300,000 have been drawn on Montevideo, and this has given rise to the market in certain circles.

There is a good deal said about the tramways, and it appears that on one line old tramway rails have been employed, but only from the New Market to the Calle San Martin; that is, we know not with what foundation; that the old rails employed are from the Parque. The City of Limerick leaves to-night; she does not take a full cargo, but will fill up in Rio. She took several passengers. In the wool market there is great firmness; prices still have an upward tendency, owing to scarcity of the article and the falling off of arrivals. Mr. Rom, in his report for the packet, states that the arrivals for the fortnight amount to 230,000 arrobes, against 130,000 last year; the sales amount to 240,000, and the falling off of the clip he estimates at 800,000 arrobes, but experienced wool brokers give it at a million and a half arrobes. The total output for the season amount to 2,380,000 arrobes, 2,286,000 last year; the stock is 120,000 arrobes; the stock last year was at this time 265,000 arrobes; the arrivals last year amounted to 2,450,000 arrobes, and the sales last year 2,220,000. Messrs. Russell & Anderson, in their last circular, give the following about wool:—

Wool.—Supplies this month amount to 840,000 arrobas, of which 778,000 arr. have been sold, and 65,000 arr. put in store, making the stock in deposit 120,000 arr. Total receipts of this season 2,170,000 arrobas, against 2,080,000 arr. last year. The month opened with a brisk market, without change in prices—later on it became quieter, inferior and ordinary kinds fell \$2 to \$3 per arr. but lately they have again been more inquired for, and have regained their former price. During the last few days, arrivals have fallen off; it is supposed that lots are being withheld from the market with a view to keep up prices. Cordoba, &c.—Sales 20 bales unwashed Cordoba, &c. Entro-Rio—Some 30,000 arr. have been sold at 13 to 12c, and one lot of 2,000 arr. at 22c. Corrientes—Sales 1,000 arr. at 16c weight. No stock. Sheepskins.—The season for long woolled skins having passed, the few that come over are eagerly looked for at higher rates. The principal arrivals consist of storn skins. Lambs, in good demand. The arrival of the Pascal was telegraphed at the early hour. She has made a splendid passage. The sale of all the sheep stock of the Liebig Meat Co. at Fray Bentos is reported, 10,000 sheep including the fine flock, sold all round to Mr. Dale of San Salvador at \$10 m/c per head. Another sale of sheep in the Banda Oriental is reported, 5,000 good mestiza from Mr. Eliza's estancia at Grés, bought by a new English estancia.

The following advices received from California respecting the growth of the wool manufacturers may interest the wool growers in this country:—The large supply, cheapness and good quality of the wool grown in California has given great impetus to the manufacture of woollen goods in that State, and this is one of the most extensive and prosperous branches of manufacturing in California. The blankets and flannels made at the "Mission Woolen Mills," of San Francisco, have long had a great reputation, and it will be remembered that they were awarded the premium medal at the Paris Exposition in 1867, over all competitors from the United States. The buildings pertaining to these mills cover an area of ten acres, and the gross value of the products of the establishment is about \$1,000,000 per annum. The products of these mills are blankets, broadcloths, tweed and cassimeres, flannels, cloakings, and traveling shawls. The Pioneer Woolen Mills, in San Francisco, manufacture on nearly as large a scale, and much the same articles. The Pacific Woolen Mills spin yarns and manufacture knit goods. In all these mills Chinese labor is largely used, and greatly to the satisfaction of the employers. Respecting the new post-office building at the Captain of the Port's, we learn on the best authority that all will be ready before the close of the year. Mr. Poindexter has already written to the States for the plans.
