LATEST TELEGRAMS.

London, Wednesday Evening.

The minimum rate of discount in the general market has been maintained at 2 1/2 for short first class paper, and

there was a fairly good demand for accommodation.

Consols opened without change, but closed 1/2 better at 92 1/2 for money and 62 1/2 to 92 1/2 for the account.

Foreign stocks were a shade firmer at close. Mexicans were 3/4 better.

It is intimated that the long-talked-of Russian loan for £12,000,000 sterling will be introduced on the principal continental bourses and London market immediately, through the firm of Messrs. Rothschild and Sons.

The suspension has been announced of Messrs. Amott and Co., silk mercers, of St. Paul's Church-yard, with liabilities stated at £36,000.

The New York advices mention the failure of Messrs. Hugh N. Camp and Co., sugar refiners, with liabilities for about £130,000.

The America has brought £11,600 in specie from New York, and the Oneida £29,628 from Brazil.

The privilege has just been granted to an American company by the Portuguese Government to land and operate a cable to the Azores, thence to England, near Brighton, and thence by two lateral lines to France, near Havre, and Holland, near the Hague.

The directors of the Hudson's Bay Company have received no information in support of the sensational statement forwarded an attack by Sioux Indians, and reporting the seizure of a large amount of specie at Red River.

The laying of the Cable between Salcombe and Brest, in connection with the French Atlantic cable, was successfully completed yesterday.

£20,000 in bar gold has been withdrawn from the Bank.

At the annual meeting of the proprietors of the London and Westminster Bank, a dividend and bonus were declared at the rate of 16 1/2 per cent. per annum.

No serious disturbances are reported to have occurred last night. The Gazette des Tribunaux of to-day says:—

About six o'clock some 400 individuals stationed themselves near the Palais Bourbon, shouting 'Vive Rochefort,' 'Vive la République,' 'A bas Ollivier.'

The trial of Judge Fernandez by his peers, will form one of the most memorable episodes in the history of the Cabildo, it will lift the veil that has so long clothed in Gimmerian darkness every office and every court-room in that hated edifice.

Conduct so highly honourable, on the part of this self accused Judge, asks more than a passing remark; and although we are not in a position to anticipate the result, still we are slow to believe that a man who bows so much to public opinion can be guilty of the charges laid at his door.

M. Estalineclin and Des-Rotours spoke against the system of free trade, which was defended by M. Haentjens and Johnstone. The latter in the course of his speech said—"Our agricultural classes do not complain of free trade, and our commerce has gained by it. Our exports to England are four times as large as our importations from that country; we have exported goods to the value of 400,000,000 francs more than we have imported, and if our treaties of commerce are to be modified, the modification should be in favour of greater free trade, not in the opposite direction."

The discussion will be continued to-morrow.

It is said that the trial of M. Rochefort will come off on Saturday before the Correctional Tribunal of Paris. Madrid, Jan. 18.

The Cortes took to-day into consideration a proposal to make the Canaries free ports. It is asserted that General Cabrero will seek the suffrages of the electors of Yatova.

It is expected that Signor Sella will not be prepared to make his financial statement before the last fortnight in February. By the savings to be effected in the various departments, and by the measures which are to be adopted to render the existing taxes more productive, the deficit will be reduced by from 60 to 80 millions of lire.

Rome, Jan. 17. The Empress of Austria left to-day for Ancona, whence she will embark for Trieste. Her Majesty was accompanied to the station by King Francis II. of Naples and his family.

The Chamber of Deputies have authorised the Government to collect the revenue and defray the public expenses of the first quarter of the present year in the same manner as provided by last year's budget.

The International Consular Jurisdiction Commission closed its sittings yesterday. The report, which is signed by all the members of the Commission, urges the carrying out of the reforms, both in civil and criminal matters, proposed by the Government.

Toronto, Jan. 19. His Royal Highness Prince Arthur will leave Montreal on the 20th inst. for New York, travelling in the private car of the president of the New York Central Railroad.

New York, Jan. 19. A banquet and a ball are to be given at Washington on the 27th instant in honour of Prince Arthur, Mr. Thorton, the British minister, has engaged the Masonic Hall for that purpose.

THE RESIGNATION OF JUDGE GARCIA FERNANDEZ.

We are happy to inform our readers that Judge Garcia Fernandez in consequence of the charges brought against him by his fellow Judge Dr. Arguelo, and the imputations which he himself created owing to the edit of the Supreme Court, has resigned office, and descending from the bench to the bar, demands a trial.

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Cabildo stairs followed by a melancholy band of ruined litigants.

If we turn to our Criminal Courts we find an apology for crime in the slovenly, negligent, and impotent attempt at administration of justice. Two hundred prisoners are this moment in the Cabildo, many of whom are charged with the most heinous offences known to society, whose hands are steeped in every crime. Villains whose creed is the knife, whose theology is assassination, ruffians who despise judges, courts, 'alcaldes,' and policemen. Our readers may be unprepared for the fact, but we have it from one of the first lawyers of this city, that the Cabildo prison to-day is one vast gambling room where under the very noses of the Judges up stairs the felons pass the time playing at 'monte and truco.' And are we to be astonished at the increase of crime in this country when such a vampire of corruption is tolerated in the very heart of the city, and the prisoners who are under arrest for what is termed here trivial offences, emerge from that hole of iniquity schooled villains. Six months imprisonment with card-playing in the Cabildo nine hours daily, and free and easy intercourse with cutthroats and assassins is the apprenticeship to crime which the present system affords.

Again, if we enter our Civil Courts, we find that the simplest questions, matters which in other countries would be decided in a day, here require long years of litigation. The rogue, the fraudulent debtor, the polished thief, finds within the precincts of the court-room and under the colour of procedure and statute and common law, a protection and relief, which robs property of its rights, and justice of her attributes. Better lose a debt 'in toto' than sue for it in any of our courts, is the motto of every experienced merchant in this market, and it is really creditable to the traders that with such judges, and such courts, there are so few swindling failures. As the courts are at present, if the Judge of the first Inst. declares that three and two make ten and the higher court ratifies the decree, there is no relief; the decision stands, and there is no power in the country to disturb it. We are here to assert it, and we are here to prove it, that in certain failure cases, last year, decisions of such a character have been made, and the whole foreign commerce of Buenos Ayres compelled to bow to the judgment.

To the high honour of Judge Garcia Fernandez, let it be said that he has wrenched this anchored abuse from its moorings, and given the public a chance to once and for ever get rid of the greatest and most disgraceful evil that ever afflicted a civilized community. Down with the Cabildo and its Courts and on the ruins give us—

TRIAL BY JURY.

THE REPUBLIC OF CHILE.

The pamphlet on the sister republic which has just appeared from the pen of the ex-Secretary of Legation in Chile, gives a very complete idea of the resources, statistics, and institutions of that country, which we shall try to condense as follows:—

The Republic of Chile lies between the Andes and the Pacific, with a coast-line of about 1,200 miles, bounded on the N. by the desert of Atacama, in Bolivia, and on the S. by Magellan's Straits. There are fourteen provinces, viz:—

These figures are according to the census of 1865, showing an increase of about eight per cent. since that of 1843. At present the population is about one-tenth greater than that of the Argentine Republic.

The proportion of the sexes is much the same as in Europe, showing 101 women to 100 men, but in the province of Atacama there are three men to two women. The number of foreigners is relatively small, being as one to seven; seven men, or about one and a-quarter per cent., whereas, in the Argentine Republic, we have more than twenty per cent. foreigners.

There are 263,882 persons who can read and write, or about fourteen per cent. of the population, the ratio being as eight men to five women: popular education has made great progress, for in 1854 the number was about half the above.

The government is a Unitarian Republic, each province being governed by an 'intendente' appointed by the President, and the whole by the President and Congress; this latter is composed of twenty Senators and ninety-six Deputies. The President is elected for five years, the senators for nine, and the various municipalities for three years. The church dignitaries are, one archbishop, four bishops, and 140 curas; the number of churches is 350. There are seventy-one convents for men and women, including schools and institutions under charge of the sisters of charity.

Public instruction is well attended to; besides the University of Santiago there are twelve lycées, four seminaries, two normal schools, and a polytechnic institute, attended by 3,044 students, and 392 state schools, attended by 36,000 children; also 346 private schools, with 11,074 pupils; making a total of 938 schools, with 47,976 scholars. The Normal School was founded by Sr. Sarmiento, actual President of the Argentine Republic. There are numerous public libraries, there being one in each department, besides those of the various convents, one of them counting as many as 18,000 volumes.

Charitable institutions are innumerable; suffice it to say, there are thirty-one hospitals, which accommodate 50,000 patients yearly; also asylums for idiots, deaf and dumb, foundlings, invalids, mendicants, and thirteen establishments of the Vincentian Society. The barracks, military schools, etc., are remarkable for neatness and ventilation.

The police are splendidly organized, being composed of very respectable men. In Santiago the force numbers 600 who do duty alternately day and night, 12 hours at a time, in the streets, plazas, theatres &c. There is a night school for the men and a day school for their children.

The prison-system is very good. Anyone placed under arrest to await trial is kept at the Policía; respectable prisoners are sent to the Plaza de Armas; convicts for lesser crimes go to the Presidio, and those sentenced to penal servitude are confined in the Penitenciaría. The prison for women is apart at the Buen Pastor. All the convicts are put to various kinds of work, as joiners, shoemakers &c. and one-half the proceeds is put aside for them; they are also obliged to attend school, and the boys are not allowed to mix with the men. In the Penitentiary each prisoner is photographed on entry, and then put in a cell by himself; every Sunday they meet at Mass, when the priest gives them a sermon.

Chile has 420 highways and 57 navigable rivers, with a total length of 16,018 miles. There are 3 roads being made across the Andes to the Argentine Republic: 100 men are at work on the Uspallata road, and have cleared a passage 1 1/2 feet wide to the summit with 2 per cent gradient. The Portillo pass is clear as far as the Cuesta del Lica and has cost 50,000\$. The Planchon follows the Rio Teno and is now within 5 leagues of the top; this is very practicable for a railroad.

There are 6 railways open to traffic, two belonging to Government and four to joint-stock companies:

- 1. Santiago to Valparaiso, 118 miles; cost £2,900,000, took 13 years to construct. Pays 4 1/2 per cent. and belongs to Government.
- 2. Santiago to Curicó and Cañada, 140 miles, cost £1,200,000, pays 7 per cent. and belongs to Government.
- 3. Caldera to Copiapó and Chañarillo, 120 miles, pays 10 per cent.
- 4. Carrizal to Cerro Blanco, 50 miles, pays 8 per cent.
- 5. Coquimbo to Serena and Ovalle, 100 miles, pays 8 per cent.
- 6. Pabellon to Juan Godoy, 42 miles, with an incline of 5 in a hundred.

The Caldera and Copiapó lines is one of the most productive in the world, having paid in 10 years 220 per cent on its cost.

A 7th railway is near completion, from Tomy to Tamaya.

The following lines are projected and surveyed.

Although the population of Chile is larger than that of the Argentine Republic the revenue is less, the taxes being lighter. The receipts in 1868 were 10 1/2 millions, of which the Casa-tom-house gave 6 millions, and the Government railways &c. the rest. The revenue comes to 5 1/2 per head, whereas in the Argentine Republic it is about 8 1/2 for each inhabitant.

The imports in 1867 represented a value of 40-million dollars: the value of exports is not stated, but we find there were 220 million lbs. wheat and 45 million lbs. flour exported to Europe, &c.

The shipping arrivals in 1867 were 3,535, with an aggregate of 1,724,253 tons.

Public debt \$37,937,106 Annual interest 2,824,476

The city of Santiago, which is the capital, was founded in 1541 by Pedro Valdivia: it is a fine handsome town built on the banks of the Mapocho, and famous for its splendid churches and buildings, its 200 free schools, its literary institutions, museum, and newspaper press. It has an excellent municipal council, and is much better kept than Buenos Ayres or Montevideo. The Cathedral is of stone, and the Government-house, Mint, University, Town-hall, &c. are princely structures. The streets are smooth and clean, the town is well lighted and drained, and has a first-rate water supply. The Alameda is the most beautiful promenade in the world, overtopped by the snowy

peaks of the Cordillera. There are seven Banks, viz.

There are numerous insurance companies, seven fire brigades, and several literary associations. At certain times the wealthy families repair to the ferruginous sulphur, or mineral baths at Apoquindo, Colina, Chillan &c.

Valparaiso is surrounded by fortifications and built almost into the sea; the inhabitants are chiefly merchants and more European than those of Santiago. The city-tramways are well served. The police are on a first-rate footing.

The churches are not to be compared with those of the capital, but the schools are excellent. There are eleven fire brigades, all volunteers, who render great services. The banks are—National, Valparaiso, Edwards, and Thomas. The Chilean and American insurance companies have a capital of four millions. The shops are very fine, the hotels better than those at Santiago, and the Bolas and other buildings worthy of notice.

Nothing can exceed the courtesy of the women, the honest bearing of the men, and the good order that seems to pervade everything in the way of public administration, while telegraphs and railways aid powerfully to develop the riches of the country in every direction.

CIVIC REGISTERS.

The parochial registers that are now being published contain some interesting information, being a return of all the persons entitled to vote at municipal elections. We have now before us the parish of San Nicolas one of the most populous and fashionable in the city. The names enrolled as voters make up a list of 329 natives and 24 foreigners, the latter comprising only Italian or Spanish names.

The 329 native voters are made up as follows:—

The number of lawyers is out of all proportion, but this is compensated by the health of the neighborhood, for we only find six doctors in a population of some 20,000 souls. Shop-keepers and trailers are numerous, so are the 'empleados,' this heading including not Government clerks but also railway porters and the like.

Seeing that there is universal suffrage it seems extraordinary that we do not find a list of three or four thousand names, but this is accounted for by the fact that three-fourths of the inhabitants are foreigners, who do not care to have the privilege of voting. As we have stated above there are 24 foreigners enrolled on a list for themselves, but we do not find an English, German, or French name in the number.

This is a melancholy state of things, for it results that the management of municipal elections is in the hands of a small minority. We cannot, however, expect a change so long as the Municipality exists on its present footing.

LATEST FROM ROSARIO.

Rosario, Feb. 16, 1870.

The most important news from this quarter is the mooted arrival of several thousand Paraguayan women, who it is said, are coming down by vessels in tow; that we want women up here there can be little doubt, but that our Paraguayan cousins will be any acquisition; I most seriously deny; the prosperity of Rosario hangs more on money than women, although we cannot well do without both. There is at present a screeching row going on about the question of legal tender. The Banco de Rosario, a new concern, has made the money market much easier, but a man requires a blunder-buss and sabre to make the notes pass current in some quarters. We have lost so much money by inconvertible notes, that we fear the new notes as a burnt child dreads the fire. Only yesterday a friend and subscriber of yours sent his clerk round to collect a bill the clerk got paid, but in the new notes, and the patron, when he saw them, dropped them like a hot potato, and sent the clerk round with a den in his ear to have the notes at once changed into specie.

Some extracts from a 'brochure' on Chile, lately published by Don Santiago Estrada. This little pamphlet is of thirty pages, is written in the clearest and best style, and should be in the hands of every one who can appreciate reliable and interesting information respecting the Republic of Chile.

Mr. Justice Fernandez has taken a very wide, unavailing, yet still honorable step in surrendering his functions and demanding that he should be tried by the Supreme Court. In another column we devote some remarks to this last phase of the great reform question of the day.

A leading colleague calls attention to the inconvenience and danger in crossing the Catalinas branch of the Western Railway on the Palermo Road. When the trains commence running these will be increased tenfold. The construction of a viaduct is the only way to avoid the danger in question; but this might have been thought of when the line was being planned; to carry out such a work now will require a smart additional outlay.

At the meeting of some members of the Bar of Buenos Ayres, held on Thursday, for the purpose of considering the present state of affairs in the Courts and at the Bar, it was proposed by Dr. Gomez, that a public meeting should be convened and induced to adopt a petition to Congress, praying that the judges should be by law declared removable, and pointing out that body various legal reforms urgently required. To better carry out the objects of the meeting a committee was formed, composed of Drs. Gomez, Argerich, Perez Gonnar, Ocantos, and Alcobendas. Dr. Ugarte intimated to the meeting, through Dr. Paz, that as Fiscal of the Superior Tribunal, he would always be ready to lend them every co-operation towards reforming the administration of justice and guaranteeing the purity of the bench and the rights of citizens. The meeting pronounced against Dr. Gomez's proposal to call a public meeting.

"Beaullieu is raising its head," and apparently intends going in for a "combat a l'outrance" with tramway proprietors in particular, and the hydra-headed public in general. The owners of houses in Calle Saipacha have called a meeting for to-night in San Miguel Church, to protest against the laying down of rails in that street, and to expose what they consider their reasons for so doing. We can fully understand that the parties likely to attend such a meeting may at first suffer some inconvenience from the introduction of tramways, but in the end they will partake of the general benefit to accrue to the public therefrom; the greatest good of the greatest number must be considered, and opposition to the tramways must prove futile, no matter from what quarter it emanates.

A friend yesterday recalled our attention to a subject that deserves consideration for the benefit of the community. In this favored land, abounding in the choicest flowers, but little, if any attention is paid to horticulture, and we lose much of the refined enjoyment to be derived from it. It should be an easy matter for some of our merchant princes to initiate the foundation of a Horticultural Society, which would give an impulse to this delightful pursuit, and afford through periodical Shows the upper ten of this city an additional source of enjoyment. A Kew Gardens at Palermo would certainly prove in time a brilliant success, if properly taken in hand by wealthy and competent parties. The fair portion of society might turn this matter over to their minds and see what their influence can do towards giving our idea a practical form.

There was a scrimmage at Rosario a few days ago which was very near leading to bloodshed. The members of the Argentine Club, in that town, held a stormy meeting on some political subject or other, and when dissolving came in collision with the police. Stones and cabbage stalks were freely used, and fire-arms were appearing from side pockets, when the exertions of the Club Committee and a commissary succeeded in throwing oil on the troubled waters, and the "politicians" went home quietly.

The passenger traffic on the Central Argentine Railway during the last month of the year 1899 showed an increase, as compared with the previous December, of 556 travellers; all other branches of traffic also showed a most gratifying improvement. Even in its infancy this enterprise gives signs of the great future awaiting it. The Rosario telegraph line, according to the official returns published by the Director General of Telegraphs, has given on the first eight months' working a net return of more than 18 per cent on the capital employed in its construction.

Masked balls are announced to-night at the Opera House, Argentino, Victoria, and the Alcazar. Ladies, masked, are now admitted free to the first named, unmasked fair ones pay \$10 mpc admission.

The mayor, aldermen, and town-councillors of Tucuman have a free and easy way of doing business, which is only equalled by that of their secretary. It appears the worthy aldermen when in session assembled, smoke like locomotives, and the latter functionary, the minutes of the last meeting once read, is in the habit of stretching

himself at full length on the table. We should expect this sort of thing at a backwood sitting of the town-council of Iowa, but it is just one of the 'notions' of our northern fellow-republicans which should not be imported with the ploughing and threshing machines they make so well, and which are of such service to us.

Our active and enterprising friend Mr. Rom, of Bolsa fame, has risen to be proud of having endowed the flourishing village of San José de Flores with so necessary an institution as a market place, which was inaugurated with great éclat on Sunday last. The building, which was made at Mr. Rom's expense, cost him about eight hundred thousand dollars; the stalls he has erected already bring him over four thousand dollars a month—and it may be fairly supposed that when all the stalls are occupied he will get an interest of at least two per cent. per month on the capital employed.

According to some of our contemporaries the yield of wheat in the province of Santa Fé this year is calculated at 100,000 fanegas, at a valuation, more or less, of one million of dollars. This year's produce is thus distributed:—

The news per Pascal is not of importance. Accounts of the wool markets at home continue favorable. The Pascal made a magnificent run this time, having left England on the 21st, arriving at Montevideo early on Thursday.

Quinteros and market gardeners are crying out loudly for rain, and almost all the 'algibes' of the city are getting dry while the water-carriers are making fortunes. There is as yet no sign whatever of a change, and our weather-baronometer not having as yet recovered the effects of our moving to Bond Street, we are unable to consult it for the public benefit.

We find by our English exchanges that the statement that Argentine Bonds had touched 90 xl in London, in January is incorrect; the highest figure reached was 88 1/2 ex div; this is, however, a fair price, the last quotation was 88.

The Poiton will sail to-morrow; the Port Captain's office will remain open till half past twelve o'clock for the postage of letters. Great curiosity was excited at the Alcazar on Thursday night by the appearance of a burly individual accompanied by a younger man, and a commanding looking and handsome woman, evidently born north Albion's murky sky. The news spread like wildfire that the interesting trio were no others than Mr and Mrs. and Master Howard Smith, alias Lopez-Madame Lynch and their eldest son; Lopez was evidently afraid of being arrested, for he speedily retired with his interesting companions. The detective police are making active enquiries to where Mr. Smith has put up; we believe he has left his late quarters in Calle Victoria.

The yellow fever has sensibly abated in Rio, and it is believed that the worst is now over.

Monsieur Hausmann late 'Prefet de la Seine,' whom every one imagined a millionaire has retired from his post with barely £1,000 a year. He has left in modern Paris a lasting record of his administrative talent and energy.

A number of bathers on the beach the other night were stripped of their clothes and watches by some thieves who availed themselves of the darkness to make off with the articles, while the legitimate owners were disputing themselves in the pellucid Plate. The police captured a youngster who confessed to having stolen one of the watches.

A passenger who came from the Tigre by the second train of the Northern Railway on Thursday last, calls our attention to the bad driving of the cars on the tramway. On the arrival of the train at Retiro Station he entered one of the railway carriages, which was in charge of a peon, (cannot call him a driver). The two leaders seemed to be quite new to the work, and not understanding what was required of them, kept diverging from the line, whereupon the peon and a companion alighting from the carriage began to blather them with the butt and end of their whips, occasioning a great deal of plunging and rearing, to the no small alarm of the passengers.

A start was at last effected, but our informant was compelled to leave the cars at the foot of the mole, in consequence of another disagreement that took place between the peons and the horses, in which the former showed themselves greater brutes than the latter. Such ignorant treatment is calculated to ruin the best tempered horses in the world.

Lopez and his fugitive followers have now only four horses between them; but he has such a start of General Camara, that he is not likely to be captured.

On Monday Dr. F. Elizalde will lead to the hymeneal altar the lovely and accomplished daughter of Mr. Ramos Mejia.

Yesterday the attendance at the funeral service for Miss Dorrego was unusually large.

Thomas St. George Armstrong, who for the last two years has been sojourning in Europe. Mr. Armstrong had the honor to be on guard at St. Peter's, in Rome, on the opening of the Council, being a Knight of Malta. Mr. Armstrong denies the death of Dr. Gelabert.

Mr. Stuart, of Salta, leaves to-morrow. This gentleman has been for many years resident in that distant province, where he has lent the State good service.

On Thursday, whilst the workmen were putting the gas and water into our new offices, and connecting the main in the street, the Sororro or Belgrano omnibus narrowly escaped falling into the chasm in front of Mr. Loedel's door. The escape was really miraculous.
