CENTRAL ARGENTINE RAILWAY INAUGURATION.

Rosario, April 27, 9. a.m. M. G. Mulhall to STANDARD. Eighteen hours—splendid trip. Sarsfield and Secretary at Wheelwrights. Special train to-morrow morning.

The passengers for the Cordillera, amongst whom were Messrs. Green, Crabtree and family embarked this morning. Weather very fine.

THE JORDAN WAR.

It is a rather amusing fact that the Khedive of Entre Rios, Mr. Richard L. Jordan, although in the very infancy of a struggle, purely of his own creation, and before firing a shot or breaking a lance with Gen. Mitre, is admitted by all to be on his last legs.

Wars nowadays must be of short duration; the instruments of destruction are so complete that art defeats force, and a campaign is often decided by an opportune telegraphic message. But in this Jordan war we have the enemy beaten before a shot is fired, and the campaign all but concluded before even a battle has been fought.

Lopez appears to have declared war too soon and began his revolution too late. Many are of opinion that we, here in Buenos Ayres, know, after all, little of what is going on in Entre Rios; that we see things through the prismatic glasses of the Government House; and that when we least expect it, some stunning news will come to destroy all our hopes. But what ever may be the strength of the enemy, whatever his secret movements, we have the fact before us, which cannot be contradicted. Gen. Mitre with but a handful of men has made his stand in the enemy's country, and Jordan, with all his boasted strength and prestige, has not dared to attack him. A fortnight has now elapsed since the national troops, 600 strong, landed in Gualeguayehu. During that time Jordan could have marched round the whole province and called out the whole military strength of Entre Rios, but instead of this we have him sending commissioners to treat with the President, and writing despatches to a government which refuses to recognize him.

Meanwhile the National Government has lost not a moment to strengthen its position in Entre Rios. General Mitre has been reinforced, Paraná and Diamante have been occupied, and a banner hoisted around which all the Entre Riano chiefs who either fear or hate Jordan can gather.

It is really a matter of surprise that an administration such as Mr. Sarmiento's which is acknowledged as a peace one, should on a sudden betray a military energy of the very highest stamp; our last advices from Paraná show that the National Government has stoken a march upon the lefthand Jordan; uncertain how to act the people hovered between treacher and alliance, suddenly the steamer from B. Ayres arrived with thousands of the Presidential proclamations; troops were thrown across the rivers from Santa Fé, and in less than 24 hours the whole country declared in favor of the National cause.

A French gentleman who has just arrived from Concordia states that there is no enthusiasm whatever up there for Jordan or his revolution. The people may be dragged from their homes and compelled to serve, but none willingly espouse his banner; none have pronounced in favor of the National Government because the Gov-

ernment has no representative there, and people are afraid to declare openly either way.

But the steamer which came down yesterday brought good news which few anticipated, General Galarza, one of the most influential men in Entre Rios, has declared in favor of the National Government. Col. Hereño and others of less note have also given in their adhesion; thus, in fact, General Emilio Mitre will have a walk over; for we read that Jordan, in view of the turn of affairs, has expressed his unwillingness to continue any longer in the field, and sighs for that privacy for which his talents and genius are so well adapted.

It was reserved for Lopez Jordan to prove to the world the real stability of the National Government. A few years ago his revolt would have plunged the country into a hopeless civil war, but we are happy to say that South America has turned over a new leaf in the River Plate; the era of civil war and revolution is past, and with the fall of Lopez Jordan the power of the 'poncho' and 'chiripa' is crushed for ever.

LATEST FROM ENTRE RIOS.

A bulletin of the Tribuna, published yesterday at midday, gives the following news, brought by the Villa del Salto:

Lopez Jordan has placed under arms all the Argentines in Uruguay, whether employes, professional people, or citizens. Nothing but foreigners are left in the capital, who are personally watching over their property.

Concordia has also been abandoned, all the inhabitants having been obliged to march and join Lopez Jordan's army.

The Department of Gualeguay is said to have declared itself in favor of Lopez Jordan.

General Galarza, perhaps the most influential General in Entre Rios, has joined General Emilio Mitre.

Simultaneously with this, General Hereño had also presented himself to General Conesa. The following is the letter addressed by him to General Mitre:

Nogoyá, April 23. To General E. Mitre. My esteemed countryman, I have perused with pleasure yours of the 20th inst, and the proclamation that was inclosed.

As an Entre Riano, as a man of heart, and as an old servant of my country, I cannot but sympathize with the step taken by the National Government in order to apprehend the authors of the crime committed on the person of the illustrious General Urquiza, Governor of this Province.

I acknowledge that the action of the Government is in accordance with the prescription of Art. 6. of the National Constitution, and necessary for the vindication of public morality and justice.

Y. E. can, therefore, rely that upon this ground you have not appealed in vain to my patriotism. I have devoted forty-two years to the service of my country and the assertion of justice and right.

Y. E., in your character as National Commissioner, will not doubt solicit the assistance that may lead to the apprehension of the assassins.

I shall to this end lend at all times to Y. E. my humble co-operation. I avail myself of this opportunity to sign myself, with due respect, Y. E.'s obedient servant, Domingo Hereño.

General Mitre has appointed General Galarza to the Command-in-Chief of the Entre Riano Cavalry, and the latter has already assumed his post.

IMPORTANT CORRESPONDENCE.

Gualeguaychu, April 26. My dear friend,

I have important news to communicate. General Galarza and Colonel Barragan have placed themselves under the orders of General Mitre, who at once assigned to them their respective posts in the army.

I think that the adhesion of General Galarza and Col. Barragan are tantamount to complete reaction in all Entre Rios against Lopez Jordan, since they enjoy high estimation throughout the province.

General Galarza is at present the only man capable of bringing forces round him. He has written to Col. Reinoso, of Concordia, who had separated from the assassins, desiring him to call together his division. I feel certain that Reinoso will not comply with this order.

I have spoken with Mr. Soneira and Mr. Guimaraens, Brazilian Vice-Consul, who left Uruguay to-day. They tell us that Lopez Jordan is encamped at San José, and has written to Gualeguaychu, stating that he will resign his governorship in order to avoid the effusion of blood. This is what we proposed to him at first and which he misunderstood as a sign of weakness. Nobody is now disposed to accept the disgraceful compromise, since we do not only look for Lopez Jordan's disappearance, but we want to moralize the country. We wish to effect a

complete reaction in Entre Rios, and if the National Government supports us as I believe, and is not satisfied with the departure of Lopez Jordan from the country, we shall demand the appointment of a new Legislature, because the present one is not only an accomplice of Lopez Jordan, but is composed of the most corrupted and reactionary elements that exist in this province.

I repeat that I consider the presence of General Galarza, at the head of the Entre-Riano forces, of so great an importance, that when all know of it, Lopez Jordan will be abandoned by the greater part of those that are now with him.

Tuesday.

The accounts received from England of the prices obtained for the horned cattle, sheep and horses exported by the Ariandé, are looked on as ringing the death knell of an enterprise from which, at one time, the best results were anticipated; and great sympathy is felt and expressed for the spirited promoter Mr. Baillie. It is argued that the cattle were in an indifferent state when shipped and by no means favourable conditions a better result would have been obtained; but the general impression, seeing that the price realized does not pay the freight, is that live cattle exporting will not pay and that the hopes of cattle breeders anxious to cater for the supply of meat to the home markets must revert to Professor Gangeo or any of the numerous 'preservers' that are trying to solve the knotty problem they have set themselves.

The Cordillera takes about 80 passengers from this port, en route to England; the punctuality and despatch of this line of steamers is gradually rendering it the favourite with passengers to the Old World.

The Copernicus, Captain Hairby, leaves for your port to night. This vessel did not call at Rio and her passengers have consequently escaped the annoyance and discomforts of quarantine. The most sinister rumours are afloat here as to the miseries endured on Flores island; it is said, however, that it may be looked on as an Elysian field as compared with Euseñada.

The General Assembly had a stormy sitting on Monday on the banking question. The demonstration on the part of the occupants of the galleries became so noisy and unruly that the President ordered the benches to be cleared and the rest of the discussion was carried on with closed doors.

The result, when the house divided on the motion that 'the Assembly should confirm the primary sanction given to the bill' was 19 for, and 21 against the motion. Sr. Herrera subsequently moved that the House do take into consideration the project of the Finance Commission, which was passed. The sitting did not close till eleven o'clock at night.

The bull-fight on Sunday was a most miserable and even laughable affair. The River Plate 'cows,' for they were unworthy of the name of bulls, would not fight, with one exception, and had to be taken from the arena to get their throats cut outside. One of the 'matadores' got a pretty fair prod in the ribs from the solitary 'toro' that showed a disposition to die game. It is said we will have no more of those wretched exhibitions till November; 'tant mieux pour nous,' and the 'cows' also.

H. H. Comte D'Eu, previous to his departure, made it a special request of the Government, that all political prisoners might be released, in commemoration of his visit. Altor due consideration Sr. Bustamante, was obliged to refuse the petition of H. H. L. grave state reasons preventing such a step.

There is a report that Sr. Kafu, the present Italian Minister here, is about to be replaced; his successor will, it is said, shortly arrive in a Spanish gunboat.

There is nothing fresh from the army in the field. Great efforts are being made to concentrate troops in the North. Arms and clothing are being sent thither in large quantities, and General Caraballo will soon be at the head of nearly 3,500 men. The bands of Blancos collected opposite Paysandú have disappeared; it is supposed they have gone higher up the river with the intention of crossing. The hopes of the Government party here have risen with the accounts from your city representing the strong current of public opinion that has set in against the assassin Lopez Jordan.

A very lamentable suicide occurred in this city yesterday. A young girl living in Calle del Yí, aged only fifteen years who had met with some fancied disappointment in love, put an end to her life by throwing herself into an 'algaibe.' This mode of suicide is becoming frequent with the weaker sex lately, both here and in your city.

Recent advices received from the West Coast state that the seaboard of Chile and Peru has been ravaged by a frightful tempest; no details have as yet been published but the losses of life and shipping are said to exceed any arising from a similar cause of late years. Particulars are looked for with great anxiety here.

There is very little doing here just

now. The favourable news from Europe respecting produce now brought by almost every steamer seems to have no effect whatever on general trade, and on the Bolsa inactivity and dullness continues the order of the day. It is idle to hope for any permanent improvement, till the banking question is patched up one way or another; at present such a devoutly to be desired consummation seems as far off as ever.

THE 'EMILIA' STEAMSHIP.

From our Italian colleague Commerecio di Genova of 22nd Feb. ult. we glean the following interesting details about the s.s. Emilia, launched on the 20th of said month from the naval yard of Sestri Ponente, and destined to run between Genoa and the River Plate. The Emilia has been built by Chev. Agostino Briasco, for account of Messrs. Ferrero and Co., and is to be commanded by Chev. Augier. She comes from the same building yard as the Clementina, Agness and Bianca Portica, which are already so favorably known in the River Plate. She is registered 3,000 tons burden; her dimensions are, length of keel 65, deck 70, greatest width 10.60, and height 7.20. She is built on the model of the latest and most improved English constructions, and her lines above water mark are both elegant and convey the idea of strength and swiftness. She has a spardeck in her whole length, which is calculated to add greatly to the comfort of the passengers, whilst it provides excellent hygienic conditions. Her cabins, both of the first, second and third class are both roomy and well ventilated, and she is furnished with large fresh water tanks which will secure an abundant supply of this necessary element during the voyage.

The engines are of 600 horse-power, and have been supplied by the firm of Ansaldo in San Pier d' Arena, and the well established reputation of this firm which has already furnished such powerful engines is a sufficient recommendation, to anticipate that those of the Emilia will be everything that can be desired.

In short all those who are connected with this splendid specimen of naval architecture, her constructor Chev. Briasco who has received most valuable co-operation from her future captain Chev. Augier, and her owners Messrs. Ferrero and Co., have reason to be proud for having added this fine ship to the Italian merchant navy.

EDITOR'S TABLE.

The Jordan war is the topic of the day. The most contradictory rumors were afloat yesterday morning as to engagements having already taken place with the rebel forces, and it was asserted that the artillery at Cala had not, as was supposed, fallen into Gen. Mitre's hands, but had been seized by the rebel chief. This affair is creating almost as much excitement as the Paraguayan war, and sober brokers and millionaire speculators seem fired with the desire of 'seeking the bubble,' reputation, even in the cannon's mouth. The unanimity of opinion as regards the successful issue, should there be a struggle, is very remarkable, and is of the best augury. But the intelligence to hand yesterday leads to almost the certainty of a fight being avoided. We give in another column the latest news from the disturbed province.

News is expected here by the Southampton packet of the 9th April as to the negotiation of the National loan. The opinion is gaining ground that it will be 'placed' on favorable terms, as the news of Lopez' death cannot fail to create the best impression in London as to the future prospects of this Republic.

We learn from Bahia Blanca that General Rivas had sent a strong detachment to occupy the new fort of Pillahuico, to afford protection to the station. It is proposed eventually to station 1,000 men at this place. The lands in the neighborhood are fertile and pre-eminently adapted for new settlers, but the great drawback is its distance from a port.

The earthworks of the Lobos railway are now finished, and the laying of the rails is now the order of the day; in a very few months the road will be open all the way to Lobos. This indeed will prove a splendid convenience for that rich pastoral district.

It is really surprising to hear the accounts of the robberies going on about town at present. The Pobre Diablo was cleaned out the other night; Mr. Blumberg, Mr. Grigg, and a whole host of other distinguished residents have also had their houses robbed. All ask, where are the police? But this is a mistake, rather should we ask where are the prisons?

Our friends in Barracas inform us that now Sir John is laying his water pipes along Calle Larga. What a change for that cherished, but neglected spot—tramways, water supply and gas. Could our departed friend Don José Herrera arise from his tomb, he would not recognize the scenes of his life's labors.

On Tuesday it was currently rumored that San Fernando had been invaded by a party of 50 men, who had landed from some island in the very dead of night. The quidnuncs said that Governor Castro, who happened to be out there at the time at his quinta, had telegraphed at once to Mr. Crabtree to send Mr. O'Gorman for a picquet to be sent down by special train. How the row ended, this depe-

ment knoweth not, but certain it is that the wind blew very stiff about there on Tuesday morning at daybreak.

Owing to the crush of matter in an editorial sense, we are obliged to pass over some capital specimens of rebellious literature which the Jordan war has brought forward. Jordan's first letter, and the notes from his special commissioners who came down to tr. with the National Government on his behalf, but who improved so much on acquaintance that they declined to return, are papers which should not be lost to history; but the races, the declaration of war, and the mails from Europe, have precluded the possibility of a merited critique.

Mr. Henley, who lately bought some of Mr. Steam Plough Melrose's land at Bellville, will be again in the River Plate about the middle of June. He brings out with him several young Englishmen who intend settling on his lands. His son who has come out as his agent, to conclude the contract with Mr. Melrose, is at present undergoing quarantine on board the Flamingo. He expects to land on the 29th and will at once proceed to Bellville to make all necessary arrangements for the reception of the band of colonists his father is bringing out.

The passengers in quarantine at Euseñada, are it is said undergoing unheard of privations. There is no proper shelter provided, and the food is scarce and bad. It is even stated by the Tribuna that they would have perished of hunger had not Captain Benetti of the guardship Vigilante come to their rescue when they were attempting to escape in small boats to the city. It is to be hoped that this state of things will at once be remedied. Yellow fever has now almost disappeared from Rio and the quarantine regulations may with safety be modified. It is clear that our authorities are quite at sea as to the proper way of managing a quarantine Lazaretto.

The steamer Copernicus arrived in Montevideo on Monday, bringing news of the very highest importance for the River Plate—sale of live stock shipped to England; rise in price of produce, Argentine stock, &c.; and yet it will be credited that, except in our columns there has not as yet appeared one line of European news.

When the Ceuta volunteers arrived at Rio from Paraguay, they were met at the wharf by about one hundred ladies, most of whom belonged to Ceara families, but now married or living with their parents. Col. Tiburcio a brave young fellow whose acquaintance we made in Pirayu, is a native of Ceara. Most of the ladies embraced him. The Rua Quitanda and Rua do Ovidor were arched over with flags, &c., Liburcio and his men marched through the streets amidst the most uproarious demonstrations, in fact, all Rio seemed to have gone mad the day the Ceara volunteers landed.

'On dit' the Protestant Episcopalian community in this city are on the look out for a new and more central site whereon to erect a new church; the present edifice will be sold. We understand that it has never been consecrated; it will doubtless fetch a splendid price.

The auction sale of the Cobo estancia which we published yesterday, is probably the very best proof of the improved prospects of sheepfarmers. Good mestiza flocks at \$28 mpc. by the cut, everything that walked out of the corral counting. We congratulate our country friends on this news. Wools to-day are selling at 75, which a fortnight ago could hardly fetch 68; some parties in the Plazas have made small fortunes this year by jobbing in wool, but the parties who have made most money are the exporters. One well known English merchant stands to make £50,000 chiefly on Montevideo wools. A French exporter well known to our barraqueros will probably make even more. A well known Scotch merchant who always remits in produce, will not at least £25,000 stg., whilst a renowned American house that bought up all the San Nicolas and Santa Fé wools, will make nearly as much by its shipments to Antwerp. Five year this for the wool exporters. Prices for coming clip 80 to 100, if duties are taken off. Hurrah for the sheep business.

We are authorized to say that none of the parties named Jordan in this and the sister city have relationship or connection with the Jordan of Entre Rios. Lopez Jordan is generally supposed to be a natural son of the late General Urquiza. How true this may be we cannot say, but there is not the slightest evidence to support the rumor that Lopez Jordan is an Irishman. His portrait has been placed in our Museum by a subscriber; phrenologists, to judge him by his head, would say that he has combativeness well developed.

Our readers may prepare themselves for a full and detailed account of the inauguration of the Central Argentine Railway, by our brother editor, who left in the Captain on Tuesday, in company with the Minister of the Interior, Dr. Sarsfield, to meet Mr. Wheelwright to-day in Cordoba. The inauguration will be a very grand affair although slightly impru. Three or four militia officers have quietly left town to call out some divisions of the National Guard. We believe the number of men to be raised here will be trifling, but the levy in Santa Fé and Corrientes will be necessarily severe. Nearly all the National

Guards of these Provinces will be mobilized.

The heroic and enterprising Gualeguayebuanos have just invested in a small steamer, hitherto known as the Duke Saxe, but now named Garibaldi. This steamer will ply direct between Gualeguayehu and Buenos Ayres. The Monáddita up at Rosario has, during the recent row, lent the most valuable aid to the National cause.

Several well known subscribers leave per next English mail for Europe. Mr. C. Jackson and family, Mr. and Mrs. Richard O'Shea, Argentine Consul-general for Spain, Master Richard Fernandez, Padre O'Gorman, Dr. Montes de Oca, Sr. Don Juan José Fulton Meudez, Rufino Varela, J. C. Vgrela, and several others.

Letters received by the last mail announce the speedy return of our much esteemed fellow-countryman Oan-nu Dillon.

A general meeting of the Foot-ball Club took place last night in the rooms of the British Library. The treasurer Mr. Heald, reported a satisfactory balance in favor of the Club for the past year. A revision of the rules of the association was proceeded with and some important amendments were put to the meeting and carried. Messrs. A. Dowdall, Lacey, T. Hogg, and N. H. Smith were appointed a Committee for the present year; and the meeting broke up after fixing the 26th May as the date of the opening match.

The present state of Ireland has supplied a Yankee penny-a-liner with imaginary material for the following humorous squib:—'On returning from the ball I passed by the residence of Mr. —, whose life has been threatened, and who was once shot at some time ago, when his poor unfeeling coachman, was killed, instead of himself. In consequence of this, his house is now garrisoned by a dozen constabulary, and is now barricaded from top to bottom. It happened to come across the old gentleman going out for a constitutional, and a pretty sight it was in a civilized land. First came a brace of policemen armed with carbines, and who kept a sharp look out round all the hedges and other places that might hide a murderer in them, at a distance of some 20 yards or so the old gentleman and his son, each with a double-barrelled gun over his shoulder, and flanked by other policemen, with two more in the rear. Nobody dared to stop at his house for the ball, lest they should be shot at in passing to and fro.'

The British Hospital Bazaar, is engrossing the attention of the English residents. As the preparations undertaken by the patronesses develop, the success of the Fair becomes more certain. A number of articles de Paris was received a few days ago by a fair member of the Committee which, we are told, she hopes to 'place' to advantage, and we have no doubt she will. An impression has gained ground amongst a portion of the male community that a visit to this 'haunt of the fairies' will entail pecuniary consequences of a nature that only auctioneers, lawyers, brokers, bankers, and merchant princes can venture to look upon with indifference; and that 'black-mail' has already been levied to a considerable and inconvenient extent. We can contradict these rumors on the best authority. Moderation in their demands is the golden rule the lady patronesses have resolved to follow; and some of them will not even condescend to ask at all, but graciously receive any offerings that may be sent in. Bachelors with limited incomes may take a stroll through the 'garden of girls' in full confidence as far as their pockets are concerned; we will not guarantee the safety of their hearts.

The debut of the new 'prima donna' La J. Rouzi, which was to have taken place to-night, has been unavoidably postponed, and she will make her first appearance on Saturday night at the Opera House, together with the new tenor, in Verdi's Macbeth. Every box in the house has already been taken. The 'debutante,' whose biography we published some time ago, has acquired the highest reputation both as a singer and actress on the lyric stages of Europe; for generations her family has produced great artists, and we anticipate a 'succes eclatant' for the new aspirant to the favor of our musical public. The lessees of the Opera House and the courteous and energetic manager, Sr. Agenti, deserve the sincerest praise for their efforts to raise the lyric stage of Buenos Ayres to a level with public taste and culture. The repertoire for the present 'temporada' will bear favorable comparison with that of any Opera House in Europe, excepting that of London, where all the brightest luminaries of the operatic stage have been collected in a cluster for the season of 1870.

Mr. Heine, the celebrated blind violinist, and his wife gave their third concert on Tuesday night at the Victoria Theatre. The fame of those artists has been gradually spreading and resulted on this occasion in a house crammed to the doors by a select and discriminating audience. We observed in the boxes most of the leading native and English members of our best society, and the other parts of the theatre was filled, as we have said, to their utmost capacity. Mr. Heine's first solo from Lucia Borgia was remarked by musicians for the masterly handling of the bow; the general audience was aroused to 'furor' point and the performer had frequently to pause.

to allow the enthusiasm to subside. A "morena" from Norma and the "Witches" Dance also evoked vociferous applause. Mrs. Heine's performance of a selection from Rigoleto and a Souvenir d'Amerique earned for her the most genuine and vociferous applause. The evening was brought to a close by Mr. Heine, who astonished his audience by extemporised selections from favorite operas, performed on the tin whistle.

It will be remembered that Dr. Caceres, who has lately been so seriously indisposed as to necessitate having an attendant to watch him, lost his way in the streets of Rosario a few days since, his servant being seized by a recruiting party while following his master through that town. The unfortunate gentleman made his way in some manner to this city, and was met in one of the plazas in a lamentable state, bitten by dogs, and his clothes in pieces. It has not been ascertained how Dr. Caceres made his way here.

General Gelly y Obes embarked yesterday for Corrientes, with his staff. On the latter is Major Fitzmaurice, an engineer officer.

We had the pleasure yesterday of examining a collection of rich metals and minerals from Australia, California and Chile, in the drug store of our esteemed friend and vocalist L. L. Jones. We can safely assert that there has never been seen here a collection either so rich or so varied as the one we are speaking of. Gold cropping out of stones the same as grass out of the earth; blocks of white silver from which one could sit down and cut "pesos fuertes" with a hammer and punch, rosicler of silver in pieces like gigantic rubies, copper in all colours and forms, petrifications &c. &c., comprise this extraordinary exhibition we believe that it would be wise if the Government would be generous and buy this assortment for the public museum, as it has been collected with great pains and taken many years to get together.

COST OF LIVING IN FOREIGN CITIES.

A series of reports recently made to the Foreign Office by her Majesty's representatives abroad, in answer to a circular despatch from the Secretary of State making inquiries relating to the organization of the diplomatic service and the effect of change made in the system in force in the establishments; supplies, among other matter, a comparison of the cost of living at the present time and twenty years ago.

Beginning with Paris, we find Mr. West, of the embassy to the court, reporting that neither a diplomatist nor any other member of society can live now on the income which sufficed in 1850. At that time the cost of living for a young man in the diplomatic service, not including such expenses as keeping a horse or carriage, but with economical habits for a person in his social position, may be taken at £330 a year, but now at £600. Mr. West observes that the general style of living among the society in which members of the diplomatic body are in the habit of mixing is undoubtedly very much more expensive now than it was in 1850.

From Berlin Lord A. Loftus reports that on joining Her Majesty's Legation there in 1837 he was able, with care and economy, to live in a suitable manner upon his income of £300 a year; but that income would be barely represented by £500 a year now. "The style of living among the society in which members of the diplomatic body are in the habit of mixing has become of late years much more costly. There is no court in Europe more magnificently kept up than at Berlin. Luxury has taken the place of simplicity, and this is more especially the case as regards ladies' dress." He sends two statements he has obtained. In one, M. de Magnus, Consul-General, says—"I can well recollect when a man worth 100,000 thalers (£15,000) was considered a wealthy man; he is now only just able to maintain himself." M. G. Bussen a member of the Prussian Parliament, writes—"The cost of living shows an increase of about 90 per cent. The year your lordship names, 1859, marks the period of a very sudden transition at Berlin from the simple drudgery and listless habits of a royal 'residence,' as they were before the excitement of 1818, to the stir of an ambitious manufacturing and commercial centre, such as Germany had not possessed before."

Lord Bloomfield reports an increase at Vienna of 70 or 80 per cent. in the last twenty years in the cost of living; and Sir A. Buchanan sends a similar report from St Petersburg.

Sir A. Paget writes from Florence that the general expense of living is almost treble what it was twenty years ago.

Mr. Burnley reports that at Dresden he could have lived at half his present rate ten or fifteen years ago; "the requirements of society are much greater than they used to be; rich bankers and traders who have made their fortunes in Chemnitz and other towns, come to Dresden to reside and spend their money freely, and this of

course, entails a certain amount of rivalry, as to who shall be said to have given the best entertainment; a good deal of the present dearth of living is also attributable to the number of Americans who are accustomed to the high paper prices of their own country, and are too apt to observe that everything is very cheap, which induces shopkeepers to raise their prices accordingly."

From Stuttgart Mr. Gordon writes that the requirements of society in every branch of luxury have increased, in the last ten years even, very considerably indeed, and most especially since the accession to the throne of the present King, and his Majesty's Russian consort Queen Elga, whose influence in this respect undoubtedly makes itself very strongly felt, and has introduced habits of expense and luxury among the native court society of this capital which were previously totally unknown.

It would be tedious to repeat the returns from all the European courts; Lord Bloomfield says that none of the junior members of his embassy can maintain their position in Vienna society without largely exceeding their official salary; Sir A. Buchanan also states that one of the steadyest young men employed at the embassy at St. Petersburg in late years found his expenditure £900 a year, and Mr. Odor Russell winds up with a suggestion that no one should enter the service without a private income of £1000 a year.

Crossing the Atlantic, we find Mr. Thornton reporting that at Washington the junior members of the mission are obliged to expend \$3,205 (about £667) if bachelors, and above £1,000 if with a wife and small family; these are the lowest rates, and do not include clothes or the hire of carriages, and, in fact, the gentlemen belonging to this mission spend a great deal more. He encloses a letter from Mr. Riggs, banker at Washington, who states that the general style of living among the society in which the members of the diplomatic body are in the habit of mixing is much more expensive than it was 15 or 20 years ago. Other returns show that the change is very marked in South America. Mr. Mathew states the cost of living at Rio de Janeiro to be more than double what it was 20 years ago. A junior member of the legation cannot spend less than £600 to £800 a year. An old resident at Buenos Ayres assures Mr. Stuart that 20 years ago £1,000 a year was a good income there, and would maintain a numerous family, but that now a newly-married couple with £1,000 a year would have to study the very strictest economy, and perhaps retire altogether from society; but, on the other hand, money is earned with greater facility now, and at this day there is an amount of wealth in Buenos Ayres which would then have appeared incredible.

The report from Caracas, Venezuela, mentions some curious items in the comparison with the cost of living 20 years ago. Bread, which may be termed an article of foreign production, as the flour is imported from the United States, is now more commonly eaten than it was then, and the price has considerably increased; carpets, an unknown embellishment 20 years ago, have become almost general among the higher classes; carriages, also unknown at the period referred to, are now in general use, though mostly hired.

Our representatives in China also have much to complain of. Ignorant of the language of their own servants, they say they find the price of everything doubled to them; and the market prices are of themselves high enough; bread 5c. or even 8c. per lb., mutton 25c. or even 40c. per lb., coals \$12 per ton. Much food is lost by getting tainted, especially as the Chinese have no scruple in selling the flesh of animals that have died of any disease. Mutton has a most objectionable amount of bone to its meat, and in some places it is only sold by the quarter. The saying is that a man must buy a sheep to get a mutton chop. Fowls are sold by weight, with sand shaken into the feathers. Consul Markham calls to mind that at home a beefsteak or leg of mutton would constitute a fair meal, and says that in China it is necessary to have three times the number of dishes required in order to have a fair chance of getting one eatable. It is a common saying that in China dollars go no further, than shillings do in England; and Consul Pedder writes from Amoy that even sovereigns must occasionally be spent for what could be done, at least as satisfactorily, for shillings in England.

Thus, from all quarters we are assured that those who go abroad must "put money in their purse;" and the returns do not suggest much opportunity for retrenchment, in the salaries at all events. Indeed, some quite exclude the idea, as when Mr. Odor Russell writes from Rome:—"Your lordship is pleased to ask me to explain my views as to the staff which I consider is absolutely requir-

ed at my mission. I can only say, in answer, that I have been my own staff for 11 years, and that I cannot possibly do with less in future."

Mr. Hentley with a colony of young Englishmen for Fraylo Muerto, who shortly be expected by sailing vessel; his son has arrived in the Flaunted to conclude the purchase of Mr. Stannough Melrose's property at that place.

Property in the neighbourhood of Calle Calles has risen greatly in value and has for the most part passed into the hands of Italian builders. To-day a 1-acre site, nearly a whole square in that street, was sold at a reserved price. The transactions have given a new value to property in that direction.

In the produce-market there is great animation; hides are found to be very scarce, but butchers expect that soon large consignments will arrive from Entre Rios. In the Plaza Cien about 3,000 arrobes wool sold to-day at 61 to 60, 500 dry hides, camp, 148 per pesada, 300 dozen sheepskins, "media lana," at 82, 100 arrobes horse hair, North, at 170; and some few hundred of tallow from a camp graneria at 45.

In the South Plaza some wools at the station at 60 to 68. Some low wools from the far south were sold at 48 to 65, and some lamb's wool as high as 56, but very clean.

Dry hides, about 400 sold at 146 per pesada, and some good sheepskins at 140 per dozen, but very good skins. A small lot horse hair at 178. Several lots of wheat at 118 to 130 per fanega. Flour at the mill at 28 per arrobe.

Dry hides in South Plaza this afternoon at 182 per pesada.
