GENERAL SUMMARY.
The Brazilian ambassador at Vienna has caused a high mass to be performed in the church of St. Peter, as a memorial of the victory obtained over Lopez by the Brazilian troops.

THE PLYMOUTH ROCK HENLY COLONY.
We have before us the particulars of an extraordinary scheme of emigration to the River Plate. The prospectus sets forth that arrangements have been entered into for the purchase of an estancia, Las Playas, containing about 27,000 acres of land.

Cardinal Cullen left Dublin on May 17 for Rome; but before leaving he took the very commendable course of denouncing Fenianism. There are now six Irish constituencies vacant, viz.—Dublin, Cashel, Mallow, Sligo, Longford, and Mayo.

Judgment has been reserved in the case of an application to give Sir Charles Mordaunt leave to sue for a divorce. The Vivian-Waterford divorce case has been ordered to stand over till May 27, to give the Queen's Proctor time to consider whether he ought to put the petitioner to the expense of an investigation.

The Newmarket Spring Meeting commenced on May 2, when Mr. Merrey's Macgregor achieved the double feat of carrying off the Two Thousand Guineas and becoming first favourite for the Derby. The One Thousand Guineas was won by Mr. J. Dawson's Hester.

The Fenians taken into custody at Birkenhead have been discharged, on the ground that nothing had been proved to justify their detention. The installation of the Earl de Grey and Ripon as the Grand Master of Freemasons, has been fixed for May 14.

Post Office Savings Banks continue to prosper. May came in very roughly; three thunder-storms, with snow and hail, traversed the North and East Ridings, and the temperature fell below freezing point. THE ATHENIAN MASSACRE.

Monday, April 11, 1870, 4.30 p.m. cold, mist, rain, 6 p.m. to 5.30 a.m. Wood of Raplini, captured by band of Arvanitakis.

Tuesday, 8 p.m. to 6 a.m. Left after dark along high road towards Cephissia. Halt in plain. Alarm of parties near. Brigands surrounded us, ready to shoot. Sleep on thorn bush. Resting place in pine-wood. Very wet and cold. Brigand warns Dormouse [Mr. Vyner] by lying down close to him. Roused at dawn, and go to other pine-wood, a short way off, for the day.

Thursday.—Brigand reads two hours' history—Keramide St. John. Rainy and cold. Hut 60 x 20, our end badly closed by pine branches. Fires, but hard to keep warm. Roast lamb again, and more presents of liver. Evening came Dionys and agents from Athens. Scene by night—negotiating at one end, feasting at ours. Warmer at night, with my oil-plath from Poly.

head with extravagant ideas; says you are the twelfth richest lord in England and first cousin of the Queen; but I think we have convinced him that it is untrue. As long as things take a favourable turn, write to my mother; if the worst should come, to De Grey. Your letter dated Good Friday reached us only to-night at 8.30. I am strongly in favour of a responsible man being sent, as things have gone too far to be done by halves; and these scoundrels should be told what they can and what they cannot have, and not be put off by shuffling.

Mr. Erskine to Lord Clarendon. 'No satisfactory evidence has yet been produced as to the immediate cause of the collision with the troops. Nor am I aware of the existence of any testimony by an eye-witness as to the circumstances under which the captives were murdered, with the exception of Colonel Théagenis' report sent herewith.'

Mr. Herbert and Mr. Lloyd were found lying dead, about 20 yards apart, near and on this side of Dillesi; that is to say, almost exactly on the line of boundary between Attica and Boeotia, five or six miles from Oropos. Both gentlemen had been stabbed repeatedly in the back, and Mr. Herbert had received cuts from a sabre or arm, besides three gun-shot wounds through the body. Mr. Lloyd, in addition to three wounds in the back, was shot behind the neck, and must have died instantaneously.

'Little or nothing is yet known as to the last moments of Mr. Vyner and Count de Boyl, beyond the fact that their bodies were discovered some way beyond Dillesi, on the way to Schimlia; that Mr. Vyner was shot through the heart, and must have died instantly.' 'Mr. Yates, the Scotch engineer of the A. P. Co., has given me an account of the conditions in which he discovered the bodies shortly after he came on shore.'

MONTEVIDEO.

Thursday. General Battle is at Florida preparing his plan of campaign, and has summoned General Castro and the minor chiefs to a council of war. All kinds of versions are still current about the Battle of the Spurs, otherwise called Espueñitas, near the town of Minas, in which it appears the Blancos hauled Carabajal rather roughly. It is, at all events, apparent that the Government army has been inactive ever since, while Aparicio moves about at will. Major Ariva has been appointed to succeed to the command hitherto held by Maximo Perez, who has been struck off the army roll for desertion.

Friday. The Chilean mail steamers keep up their reputation; the Patagonia has made a splendid run this time, and brought 151 passengers, including 53 for this port and 49 for Buenos Ayres, among the latter Mr. Anchorena and family, and Colonel Ascasubi.

The Isabel and Galgo arrived to-day from Humaitá with Brazilian troops on board, 'on route' for Rio Janeiro. The Bonifacio arrived last night with 250 Paraguayans from Brazil, and the rest of the prisoners of war are expected.

The appearance of the cattle disease at the Cerro and Pantanoso has caused general alarm, as there are great fears of its spreading. Meantime the Legislature, instead of taking up so important a matter, amuses itself with petitions to widows, problematical railways, &c.

Three vessels are aground at the mouth of the river. The Graf Bismark is high and dry at Point Garzon, and the Rosa is gone to sea, although Captain Buckley, of H.M.S. Pylades, tried in vain to do so. The Ancotha last night brought word of two other vessels ashore at Point Piedras.

The Italo-Platense, pioneer ship of the new steam line from Italy, was to leave Genoa on June 4th, with a full complement of passengers; these vessels are of 3,000 tons, and 600 horsepower.

Telegrams to-day from Buenos Ayres announce that General Gelly has occupied Concordia, and that Medina, instead of invading this Republic, has taken to the forest of Montiel. The well known estancero Don Pedro Ibarra has been murdered near Paysandu.

The Brothers Ramirez, who were banished, have been allowed to return.

EDITOR'S TABLE. Yesterday morning, in respect to supplying the public of this city with the latest European intelligence, it was a case of the STANDARD first and the rest nowhere! Our colleagues' columns contained not a word of Portuguese 'coup d'etat', or any later news than those of the 11th ult., whilst we gave dates to the 20th. We could almost hope they might have the opportunity, as it would be a valuable lesson to the authorities, and a warning to assassins. Still, it is better for all purposes that the murderer be legally condemned and executed; and every right minded man in the country so desires. The Juez de Paz has sent a despatch to Governor Castro, requesting the Criminal Judge to be at once sent up, as the people of Baradero are determined in the matter.

We publish to-day some further interesting particulars respecting Mr. Plymouth Rock Henley and his volunteers. It appears they wear a rifle uniform, and are all supplied with a full 'kit' similar to that of the volunteers at home. The Plymouth Rock Volunteers are, therefore, likely to create a sensation. We understand General Henley will hold a grand review of his troops on their arrival at Bellville.

Respecting the cattle disease we have nothing new, beyond the fact that Mr. Chapeaurouge, a well known estancero of Areco, states that the 'capataz' from his estancia writes him that out there the cattle are all sound, and no disease whatever exists. We notice in the papers to hand by the packet that the foot-and-mouth disease in cattle is quite prevalent in England, where it was first known about the year 1840, and never since has been wholly extirpated. In a Scotch paper we see there are no less than 111 farms where the disease still exists. The following English regulations have been published by order of Parliament:—'All animals on land are to be marked with the broad arrow, and detained for at least twelve hours for inspection. Diseased sheep or swine found among a cargo are to be separated from the healthy animals and slaughtered under the superintendence of the inspector, who will make a 'post mortem' examination of each carcase. The healthy animals may be slaughtered immediately. All places where diseased animals have been lauded are to be disinfected as soon as possible. When cattle plague or pleuro-pneumonia has been detected, the whole of the cargo is to be slaughtered. If foot-and-mouth disease is discovered, the whole of the animals of the same class as those diseased are to be killed, and the animals not affected are also to be slaughtered. In case of sheep-pox or sheepscab being discovered, the whole of the animals are to be slaughtered.'

Our country readers will learn with pleasure that the advice from the European wool markets by the Oneida and Patagonia are most favorable. A well known English wool broker gives the following summary:—'A further advance has taken place, benefitting all descriptions, but most conspicuously the superior supply coming wools, of which the supply turns out much smaller than the trade—previous warings notwithstanding—seems to have been expected. Fine clothing kinds, too, are in great request, and realize very high rates, as, in fact, do all wools having claim to a superior degree of breed and character. As for the medium or good descriptions, they sell at an advance ranging from 1d to 2d on February prices. Lambs command extreme rates, realizing often 4d, 6d, and even 8d more than fleece value. The competition for cross-bred is brisk, but the prices are not what they were a year ago, when this class of wool was in exceptional demand.'
