IS THE MILK GOOD?

Buenos Ayres June 10, 1870. To the Editors of the STANDARD.

Gentlemen, On perusing your edition of to-day I find under the heading EDITOR'S TABLE some few remarks on the cattle disease, now so prevalent in this country.

Having lately arrived from Lancashire, in which county the disease, at the time of my departure, was creating great havoc, I may, through my little knowledge, be able to give you some information on the subject, as to whether the sick cows give milk, and, if so, whether that milk is dangerous to the health.

Not a hundred miles from Liverpool a gentleman and his wife, personal friends of mine, whilst in apparent good health, were suddenly attacked with most violent pains and swelling in their mouths and feet, inasmuch that they were entirely unable to eat, speak or walk; a physician was immediately called in; he prescribed, as he thought, for very severe cold, but each day the patients grew worse.

At last he thought of the disease amongst the cattle, and at once set on foot inquiries as to the health of the cows from whose owner the patients were in the habit of daily receiving their milk, and found out that, out of five cows, three were suffering from the disease. He at once consulted with a brother physician on the subject, and they both came to the conclusion that my friends had caught their sickness through drinking the milk of diseased cows, and prescribed for them accordingly; however, it was many days before they were at all able to sit up, and when I left home, three months or more after they had been attacked with the sickness, they were in a very weak state.

This is only one of many similar cases in Lancashire, and received more of my attention through both patients being personal friends.

ANOTHER MOLE GRIVANCE.

How long will the authorities suffer passengers and immigrants arriving here to be swindled by the fresh-water sharks of this harbor?

There is not a day passes over our heads that numbers of passengers are not swindled right and left.

So many cases have come under my notice lately, that I cannot help expressing myself very strongly through the medium of your journal. This system of swindling is too scandalous to be tolerated. Where is the Port Captain that he does not put a stop to this? The Port Adjutant takes upon himself the responsibility of regulating and deciding all claims and differences about boat hire. If anyone wishes to appeal, from the Port Captain's subordinates to higher authorities, such as to the Captain of the Port, they immediately call in the guard to lock him up, unless he pays what is demanded.

A case like this came under my notice yesterday. A young Englishman agreed with a boatman to take him ashore for twenty dollars, from a steamer in the Inner Roads. On his arrival on the Mole the boatman coolly

asks fifty dollars; the indignant passenger refuses to be swindled. He is called in to the Adjutant's office, and, although the tariff is fixed by law at twenty dollars, he has no alternative but to pay the amount asked by the boatman, viz., fifty dollars.

Another case occurred a few days ago; the passenger agreed with a boatman to take him on board a vessel in sight, for twenty dollars. On his arrival on board he pays the money agreed upon. He returns a few hours afterwards and encounters another boatman, whom he has never seen in his life before, that insists upon receiving eighty dollars for the trip in his boat. The passenger thinks the man crazy and goes up the Mole, where he encounters the same boatman again with a guard, and is taken to the Adjutant's office. The boatman states that he has made it a rule not to allow any of his boats to leave the Mole for less than one hundred dollars, and that the man who made the bargain had no right to do so, &c. The passenger is compelled to pay the balance or be locked up. This, I should say, is quite a source of revenue to these understrappers, as those differences occur several times a day.

ON 'CHANGE

The Bond market ruled a shade weaker to-day and there were several sellers on time and for cash. The first sales were done at 65, and closed at 64. For the end of the month 25,000 opening at 69, and closing at 69. In the liquidation prices fell off more, and several sales were made cash at 68, and for the end of the month at 68. There was a rumour in the early part of the day to the effect that Sr. Gorostiza had resigned, that the Portfolio of Finance would be given to Dr. Mariano Varela, and Foreign Affairs to Dr. Roque Perez, but after much enquiry we discovered that there was no foundation whatever for the report.

Exchange was done freely to-day at 49, and factors pretend +9. There was a good deal done in exchange to-day, and it is estimated about \$170,000 sterling passed. The bulk of the exchange business will be done on Monday.

The sale of the splendid estate known as Santa Catalina was announced to-day, for the round sum of \$1,450,000 mps. the Provincial Government being the purchaser, for the purposes of an Agricultural College. The place contains 750 squares, and about half a million of trees. It is one of the best known properties in the country, and the price paid is more than a quarter of a million over the highest offer last year.

Mr. Napp, who has just returned from the camp, brings rather favourable advices respecting the cattle disease, on the large estancia of M. Cnas, out of 10,000 cows only 12 have been attacked. The estancia says that there is nothing new in the disease, as the cattle get over it very winter, but they rarely die of it, only making them in poor condition for some months; this year owing to the wet state of the camps there may be more of it than in other years, but the disease is almost limited to the chacaras around the city.

In the produce markets very little doing; the arrivals at the station are chiefly wheat, hides and tallow; capones are also coming in. Mr. Henley with most of his colonists left yesterday in steamer for Rosario; ten of the colonists have remained on board the Onida; they leave on Monday for Rosario.

Collections through town to-day were tolerable and money on the Bolsa ruled easy. Although the business during the week in the produce market was active, there was very slight demand for money by the barqueiros.

The mails for the Onida close on Tuesday at the usual hour. Our Packet Edition for Europe will be published on Monday morning.

So much importance is attached to some statement relative to the wool clip of 1869-70, which appeared in our columns, that one of the principal barqueiros and wool exporters in this market has had the following table of our wool exports taken from the books of the Custom House:—

Table showing wool export statistics for 1869-70, including quantities and values.

The total of the wool export of 1869-70 amounted to 178,956 bales, but these returns were only up to Oct. 1869, leaving still in the market a very large stock of wool on hands.

The total export of wool for 1869-70 up to 31st May is 140,290 bales, with 8,000 bales still engaged, in all 148,290 bales; but of this all the shipments made in last Nov., and nearly all made in December, 1869, were of old stocks of wool remaining in deposits, as at early a period in the season there was very little wool in the market, and little baled, save a few samples of the new clip shipped by steamer. The return of the monthly shipments shows the real state of the trade:—

There are at present 80,000 bales engaged; and this exhausts all the wool in the market. With respect to the quantity of wool outside, it is already known to be very trifling. Parties who have been sent from town with orders to purchase, have returned unable to buy anything worth the trouble of sending in. For the last two months in the South Plaza all the far out south wools have been coming in, and the clip may now in every respect be regarded as finished both as regards the deposits in town and the camp outside. The clip of '69-'70 was known by all who watched the market to fall immensely short of the previous one, not only from the heavy killings in the grasslands as shown by the tallow exports, for 1869 being 40,000 pipes over the previous year, but also on account of the 'epidemia' on the sheepfarms during the year, in many parts whole flocks perished. The clip of 1869-70, as compared with that of 1868-69, shows the following result:—

Total deficit of River Plate. Wool clip for the year 1869-70. The foregoing figures may be relied on, as they have been taken from the books of the Custom House. Even supposing that from the camp districts and rivers we have to receive wool and that our shipments for the ensuing months of July, August, September, and October would be the same as last year (which is utterly out of the question), the stock on hand this time last year it deposit was 250,000 arrobas whilst to-day it still there would still be a deficit of 37,000 bales; but we believe, taking all things into consideration, there cannot be the least doubt that even on the most liberal estimate the deficit of the wool clip of 69-70 cannot be under 60,000 bales.

A very important proposal, from one of the first of London firms, was yesterday laid before the President for the negotiation of a ten million sterling loan to this Republic at 8%. The money to be employed in railways, and the railways to be pledged to the bond holders; the contractors of the loan to get 2 1/2 per cent. commission. The coupons of the bonds to be payable in sterling in London. The bonds to be amortized in part, and with a 2 1/2 per cent. amortization. The proposal is drawn up in the most formal manner, and it really speaks for the high credit of the country abroad. We suppose the matter will go before Congress.

Some very important sales of estancias and real estate have been concluded during the week, but as the papers are not yet signed, at the request of the parties we hold the particulars over for the present.

The house, Nos. 182 and 186 Calle Parque, was sold to-day for \$891,000. There is every probability of Mr. Jardell's cable telegraph scheme being carried out. The Argentine Government looks most favorably on the enterprise, whilst the Emperor of Brazil would give every assistance to a telegraph line to connect the Plate with Rio. We believe the new company will have an open share list in this market.

Messrs. C. Schmidt and Co., of Antwerp, in their circular for the past month give the following:—

Wools continue in demand, and during the month of April 6,240 bales changed hands at firm rates. Prices have still further hardened, and holders feel inclined to look for higher rates in view of the small quantities to be offered at the next public sale on the 10th May, which barely reach 16,000 or 18,000 bales. 4000 bales of our stock have been withdrawn from the market for the moment.

We are inclined to think that the position of the article is such that no fluctuation need be feared in the coming months, though a temporary rise is possible. It must not be lost sight of that, as compared with wools from other quarters, River Plate wools have obtained a value but little under that of German and English wools of like quality. Thus Sydney, Cape, or Hungarian washed wools are but a trifle per cent. dearer than Buenos Ayres wools; the difference is still less for combed wools, and it is possible that Montevideo sorts, which have reached very high prices, may soon reach them in value.

Good wools are quoted at present as follows:—

The imports from 1st January to 30th April reached—34,446 bales against 44,831 in 1869 and 61,678 in 1868.

Sold and on the way—29,230 bales against 26,268 in 1869, and 23,511 in 1868. Stock on 30th April—18,379 bales against 28,116 in 1869, and 32,587 in 1868.

30,000 bales are known to be at sea destined for this port, a large number of which may be expected to arrive very shortly, so that a supply of all sorts will be to hand immediately after the next sales.

Sheepskins have been in good demand at a slight advance. Sales, 609 bales. Stock, 453 bales.
