









from Mont Valerien, some of which, according to the calculations of the German Staff, must have traversed a distance of nine thousand metres. The battle of Neambe is still the topic of conversation in all circles. No matter what was the rebellion winds up Naembe must henceforth occupy a prominent place amongst the victories of the national arms. Private letters confirm the decisive nature of Jordan's defeat. That leader is now without either a Staff or officers, all his chiefs being killed or taken prisoners; he is stated to have fled from the field of battle with such precipitancy that he threw away his 'recoar' and accoutrements to lighten the weight on his charger. We publish in this issue Col. Baubien's official report in full. The battle was of a most sanguinary description, considering the short time it lasted; and the list of trophies captured would do credit to any army.

Yesterday was an extremely dull day in town; no news, no 'bolas,' no business. The Provincial Government offices were shut, owing to its being the anniversary of the battle of Caceres and fall of Rosas, and many business men consequently made holiday and eschewed 'Change for the day, thus adding to the general dullness. Those who take an interest in that now numerous class known as "Sovereigns out of place" will read the following list of their names with pleasure or the reverse, as their political principles dictate; we take it from an English paper:—

Prince Gustavus Vasa of Sweden (1809), Comte de Chambord (1830), Duke Charles of Brunswick (1830), Comte de Paris (1848), Duke Robert of Parma (1859), Grand Duke Ferdinand of Tuscany (1860), Duke Francis of Modena (1860), Francis II., King of Naples (1861), the widow of King Otho of Greece (1862), Duke Adolphus of Nassau (1866), King George of Hannover (1866), Elector of Hesse (1866), Empress Charlotte of Mexico (1867), Isabella, Queen of Spain, (1869), Emperor Napoleon (1870).

Mr. Narciso Martinez de Itoz has been elected Provisional President of the Municipality. No better man could have been selected. A band of marauders was lately attacked and routed in Santa Fe province by a scouting party from General Conesa's army. Strange to say the leader of the bandits was a namesake of the present Commander-in-Chief in Entre Rios.

That force which it may be courtesy, but is certainly a mockery, to call the 'rural police,' has lately been distinguishing itself in the partido of Balcarce. For a long time past three desperadoes have been prowling about that district, and every policeman in it registered a vow to capture them if the feat did not involve much exertion or the abandoning of the daily 'siesta.' Three respectable men returning from Buenos Ayres, where they had sold some sheep, were lately pounced on by a posse of these policemen, who mistook them for the vagrants so long 'wanted.' One of the party was severely wounded in resisting the overzealous myrmidons of the law.

The Italian Minister at Montevideo is about, it is said, to address a vigorous remonstrance and reclamation to President Batlle's Government respecting several Italians residing at Las Piedras who were some time ago pressed into the National service. There is a strong feeling manifested by the Italians in the sister city on this subject. Mr. Gustavus Schmitz, whose death by yellow fever we published in our last issue died at Asuncion.

The change in the prospects of Mr. Fulton Mendez' Corkscrew steamer, which we announce this morning will be read with great interest here. This time there must certainly be something in it' or our Admiralty Board would not have condescended to shake off its chronic lethargy and send for the inventor. Woolwich may be building 6000 ton ironclads on the Mendez principle before the year is out. The Tribuna of Montevideo appeared in mourning on Wednesday, the anniversary of Quinteros.

The stean omnibuses on the Western Railway were tried on Thursday with great success. Governor Castro ran down to Flores in one of them about noon, and the 'bus' was decidedly a complete success. The carriages are beautifully got up and run so smoothly that they are sure to be patronized in preference to the ordinary trains. As the 'bus' moved up Calle Parque, all the people rushed to their ball doors and windows, believing that some carriages had broken loose and were running away of their own accord; the engine being placed between the compartments is scarcely visible. Great credit is due to Mr. John Allan, Locomotive superintendent who directed the putting together of the omnibus.

GERMANY AND LUXEMBURG.

It is only three years since the present Earl of Derby obtained the unanimous approbation of every unthinking man in the country by the negotiation of the Luxembourg Treaty. The jealousy with which France had been filled by the aggrandisement of Prussia at Sadowa had induced her to conclude a private bargain with the King of Holland, who is the Grank Duke of Luxemburg, for the purchase of that fortress. When the bargain was concluded Luxemburg was a German Duchy. The Grand Duke held it as a German Prince, and the fortress, which might be easily made the stronghold in Europe, was garrisoned by Prussian troops. The dissolution of the old Bund was merely the expulsion of Austria, and the new North German Confederation had no idea of releasing its hold in any of its provinces. A purchase of Luxemburg by France in such circumstances was a deliberate challenge flung by her to Prussia, and her adversary was ready to take it up. It was in the interests of peace, which we used to think paramount in the British mind—a peace threatened wantonly by international jealousies, that the other Powers stepped in and the Prussian troops were withdrawn. The formidable fortress was dismantled, and the Great European Powers gave each other a joint-guarantee of the neutrality of the territory in dispute. It was only a few weeks after the Treaty had been signed that Lord Stanley informed the world that he means nothing by the guarantee. If Prussia, France, Russia, Austria, Turkey, and Italy agreed at any moment to repel any attack on the neutrality of the Grand Duchy, Great Britain was ready to support them; otherwise, and in the failure of any one of these Powers to implement its obligation, we washed our hands of the matter, Europe stood astounded; Prussia exclaimed indignantly that she had been swindled. France congratulated herself that, if she had been prevented from attacking Germany, she had at least by her help extruded the German troops from a threatening military position, and the world concluded that British diplomatists were sharp enough for anything. Was the end not in itself admirable? We aimed at nothing else than to keep Europe at peace. Had we not succeeded? If we but adjourned the great arbitrament of war, what did it matter that our way of doing so had been scarcely honourable? Three brief years have shown us that so immoral a bargain is the fertile source of heartburning and mischief, like humiliation to-day because we were too clever yesterday. Had the nation adjourned the Luxemburg dispute, as she might have adjourned the Hohenzollern one, by laying her hand on her sword, and by threatening that the man who stirred in an unjust quarrel would make her his enemy, she would have gained the respect of Europe. A volunteer policeman who is strong enough to make himself respected, is a man of the greatest value to a community; a busy fool who makes every quarrel his own, is certain, indeed, to reap a bitter reward for his rashness; but a bystander who interferes, only when a great wrong is perpetrated before his eyes, and whose words may be followed by blows, can settle many a quarrel. We adjourned the dispute by pretending that we should be prepared to fight to maintain Luxemburg neutral against all comers, and we cannot wonder if the world was surprised to discover that we had meant nothing by the promise. As matters stand, we are entreated by many of our advisers to fight now. The Standard and Mr. Frederick Harrison implore us not to leave France without an ally, and to assert ourselves before it be too late. It is necessary to ask what business Luxemburg is of ours, and what conceivable advantage could be gained by keeping a little state, with a quarter of a million people in it, between two powerful and irreconcilable enemies in a condition in which each of them must be incessantly tempted to appropriate it.

Luxemburg belongs to Holland and to Germany. It is Dutch; as Hanover used to be English. Its people are German, though it is said that the sympathies of the wealthier classes are with the French. It is a member of the Zollverein, in virtue of its being a German province. It is as reasonable to attempt to maintain such a state isolated in the heart of Europe as it would be to declare Lippe Detmold a 'No Man's Land' in the heart of Germany.

There was one motive, and only one, which could ever have made our conduct reasonable. It might be worth while to neutralize Luxemburg, or to commit any other geographical and political absurdity, if such a step could prevent a European war; but the war has broken out in spite of us. France and Germany can no longer be held apart or torn apart by disinterested and pacific bystanders. The whole situation is essentially different from that which existed in 1867. The King of Holland will probably be found willing in 1870 to sell what he was willing to sell three years ago. His Queen has, indeed, expressed her bitter antipathy to everything that is German, but she may be tempted to recognise the fact that hard cash is very much the same whether it comes from friend or foe.—London Paper.
