BRAZILIAN RELIEF.

There was anything wanting to prove the genuine friendship of Brazil for this Republic, the splendid subscription raised in three days in Rio Janeiro for the relief of Buenos Ayres most certainly supplies it. Viewed even as a kindred nation, bound to us by the most friendly ties, none anticipated such a spontaneous ebullition of charity, and we confess that the personal of Gen. Paunero's letter, which we published on Tuesday, suggested the thought that unfortunate Buenos Ayres owes to the famous triple alliance far more in the securing to us such a tried friend as Brazil, than even in the overthrow of Lopez.

OUR PARIS LETTER.

No more sentimental wars for France, no more wars for an idea. The enemies of Prussia, are henceforth the fondled friends of France. There is the anti-Prussian League to never allow a German to work in France. In Paris, as in the Provinces, the Teuton who returns, is tracked, denounced and hunted. Prussia menaces reprisals, but the balance is against her. Her tourists threaten not to visit France—they are prudent, and avoid the trouble of being turned back. The French have launched their excommunication. Of foreign questions, hardly any meet with attention. The London Conference is viewed as the undoing of the 1856 treaty, the natural consequence of the defeat of France. England has secured the platonic salute, that henceforth a power having once signed a protocol cannot disown it till the occasion arrives for doing so. France has forgotten Pio Nono, and the only cognizance she has of the new King of Spain is, that he has contributed 200 frs. to the fund for her wounded.

Among the many persons and things arriving in Paris, are the rogues expelled at the commencement of the siege. They have a fair field just now, as the police-force is extinct. There are many beggars, but nearly all children—and swarm round you like a hive of bees. A few sows prove most efficacious 'not out'. The most curious feature of Paris life, is the newspapers. The streets might be carpeted with those that appear for the first and last time. Where the printers, paper, and money come from is a mystery that Sue could not clear up. The public censor, like Homer, must be nodding of late, as the market is flooded with filthy photographs and prints, and the purchasers are generally old men 'debauchees'. The 'filles de joie' are frowned down with a Spartan severity—they were the greatest among the great sins of the defunct empire—and hence patriotically reprobated. Gambling had assumed such proportions on the boulevards, that it was requisite to suppress the tables, or rather 'carpets' by a proclamation. It was another vice bequeathed to us by the Saviour of Society. Some of the newspapers of standing announce their intention to remain in mourning till the last lightning conductor helmet disappars from

the country. The theatres are struggling to keep open but only that of the Palais 'National' pays its expenses. The new pieces will not be brought out till the town 'fills'—and then we will see the Prussians, pointing a moral and adorning a tale. Paris has had no Carnival this year, and the fete of 'mi carême' was prohibited, as the wearing of masks, or the holding of the usual public balls, might lead to a breach of the peace. Besides, what need of other masquerades than that of Montmartre?

The journals are commencing to pick up a few advertisements, but one seeks in vain for such from business houses. Money-lenders come out strong, and promise 'every facility for payment.' There are the usual crowd of announcements from professors of English; which tell their own tale. None has yet appeared offering lessons in German. Then there are to be met with, in by-places and on the rain-apots, those familiar notices in manuscripts, where real poverty makes known its wants. The museums are gradually re-opening, and the galleries of the Louvre have no longer guardians in imperial livery of gold and green; but are dressed in neat suits of black. I think the gunsmiths' shops are more attractive than any museum, they display collections of Prussian missiles of every fashion and size. A shell of two-hundred weight that was picked up at Auteuil is the lion of Paris just now. It would be an insult to ask, how are we off for food. There is no stint of anything—to be hypercritical, all that I can observe to be wanting is fine table-salt. Only coarse pickling material can be had for love or money. The supply of water is still taken from the Seine, not unpalatable when filtered, pending that the aqueduct at Ourcq be freed from the Prussian dead. Horses are yet scarce—a cab is an affair to be arranged after the manner of a solemn treaty, but six francs an hour generally concludes the bargain, and ensures a happy state of mind in Cabby.

The environs of the city continue to be the object of a visit by thousands. First the battle fields are visited, and laurels, crowns and bouquets deposited on French graves, or to state the exact truth, 'pits.' I visited St. Cloud on Sunday last, being the first holiday, the citizens were free to go there without a pass. There were not less than 50,000 persons, moping in sadness and in silence among the blackened ruins. The destruction of this village will be the acme of German shame for ever. The French desire not to rebuild the town, but leave it for young Franco to ponder over, and remind them what they have to do.

The ruins of the palace promise to be carried away in the form of souvenirs. Marshal MacMahon has arrived with his family. He is truly a changed man, and looks as if his military life has closed. He hobbles on a stick, like a crutch, the twitches of pain being too evident on his emaciated features. Trochu is not coming to Paris, and he is right—but he is preparing a book, 'the history of the siege.' He was recently reported to have gone mad; to perpetuate his break down, will confirm the rumor. At Lyons resided two sisters, for safety. After the peace one of them set out for Switzerland to bring back her brother, a prisoner of war, and an invalid. On the day fixed for the arrival the other sister had prepared something like a family banquet. The sister duly arrived, and when asked where was her brother, replied, 'below, in his coffin.' 'We have lost a great many men in this war,' observed a Frenchman to a friend. 'Alas! yes, but all my creditors had volunteered for the front, and—' 'Well!' 'They have all come back.'

OUR SANITARY CONDITION. To the Editors of the STANDARD. Gentlemen, The saying that 'truth is stranger than fiction we realize in every day life; but could the scenes which have occurred in this city since the year began be properly chronicled by some able hand, I have no doubt they would surprise all, even those whose duties have led them as unwilling spectators into the arena. Terrible has been the ordeal. The pen of the future historian will weed from the recorded observations the truth concerning this unprecedented incident in our history, whilst it will duly and impartially lay with withering grasp the blame on the heads of those who rightfully ought to bear it.

Buenos Ayres is fast making history. Posterity, calm and unbiased in its opinion, will severely judge the policy of the action which delvered us unprotected into the hands of the awful pestilence. My present object has nothing to do with this. I can only criticize the past and present, in order to anticipate the future, and, if possible, call attention to circumstances apparently trifling amidst the vortex of questions constantly occurring, and which, if properly reviewed and acted upon, may assist in preventing a repetition of the scenes now fast passing into oblivion.

To fully appreciate the subject, many matters have to be considered. Amongst the most prominent are, the condition of Buenos Ayres, past and present; its ancient freedom from, and modern liability to epidemic diseases. To enter into minute details would be impossible for me, and tedious to your readers, as well as foreign to the object I have in view. It will, therefore, be permitted me to simply glance over the various topics above alluded to.

Buenos Ayres has long and justly held a reputation for being one of the healthiest cities in the world. A small and growing nucleus of a great city in a new and virgin country, it enjoyed excellent health, for the reasons here stated, viz: comparative freedom from contamination, a scant population, low built edifices, with ever-recurring fresh winds sweeping its long and narrow streets. But modern Buenos Ayres presents no similarity to the old city, while, unfortunately, the code of municipal regulations which was considered sufficient to serve the wants of the city in its infancy is still deemed enough for the grown metropolis.

As a sequence to this state of matters, we have in the hour of emergency a thorough break down, and a general admission that this state of things cannot last longer, whilst the remedies necessary for the amelioration of our condition are equally generally admitted as requiring a lengthened time, perhaps years, before they admit of execution. In such circumstances the question which rises to the front is, what are we to do in the interval? seeing that our exposed condition is admitted on all hands, and four years experience of epidemic disease has decimated the city of its people? Are we to again trust in Providence against a return of disease? Are we to again see panic succeed to panic? Or are there other rational methods which properly organized and practised may reduce our risks to a minimum? Self-preservation forces the question upon us. None are content to live with the pestilence, like the sword of 'Damocles,' constantly suspended over their heads. To answer the question proposed in a conclusive manner is quite impossible; opinions may be, and are various. I shall merely, then, limit myself to state my opinion to be that, a minimum of risk to epidemic influences may be obtained by strict supervision over city cleanliness, lodging, and immigration. By strict and efficient execution of quarantine laws we will prevent importation of disease, or if imported, may at once isolate it; whilst a new and efficient organization of health officers to report on the state of the parishes, in connection with the proper and efficient nomination of a medical staff to each parish, in all time coming, will afford the means to meet any emergency, and stay any panic which such emergencies might evoke; and I would also propose that the Municipality have this organization in their own hands, with a permanent medical committee composed of their own members, whose duty it would be to confer with the parochial health, and medical inspectors, and report to the Municipality in session, the Municipality reserving to itself the execution. In this manner we should secure early and reliable information. We should have an organization capable of expansion to any limit, whilst we should have the facility of being able at once to find where responsibility rested, and to punish or remove the party or parties in fault.

The cleanliness of the city is difficult as it at present exists, but until the coveted reforms enable engineers to assist us in an effective form by drain-ago, it is surely not impossible that by making some extraordinary effort and outlay, the Municipality could tide us over a year or two in increased cleanliness. Money is powerful, and the city would prefer tribute rather than death. We must reduce filth to the minimum—Buenos Ayres is a standing disgrace and scandal. The Indian in the camp removes his 'toldo' to a new site, or his refuse to a distance—but the merchant princes of this city raise their palaces over the abominations of their own and past generations, a fecund source of disease and death. Lodging must be strictly supervised and subjected to sanitary discipline. This city in becoming the entrepot of the immigration to the Republic, ought to have had great attention paid to building and ventilation, and lodging accommodation should have occupied a large share of municipal attention, when it has had none; as a consequence, B. Ayres finds itself worse off than many of the old and miserably built European towns—nor, unobserved under our eyes, has grown up that 'Upas plant' of disease and death, viz., the agglomeration of large masses of poor people in a state of poverty and filth. Witness our 'convencillos,' better known in Europe under the name of 'Pover Dens.' This is an active cause of disease and death known and admitted by all. This is the principal enemy to be met and dealt with by Health Inspectors and medical officers. They must be regulated at once, with power and decision, not for to-day, during a crisis in our history, but as a received and permanent habit of disease. This entails an 'Edile court,' another municipal committee to watch over buildings existing and projected, with power to withhold licence to build, and also to demolish and appropriate, or counsel the same, for public reasons.

Immigration is a fertile source of danger to us, and must be better supervised; we can no longer receive into our midst without guarantees the helplessly aged, the maimed, the lame and blind, to serve as beggars from door to door, and from their unfixed habits and uncertain mode of living, becoming a source of danger to all around them. All new countries defend themselves against such intrusion; why should this not do so likewise? The vigilant effort to direct and protect emigrants exercised of late ought steadily to be persevered in, not only for the sake of the people themselves, but for the powerful reason that all people living an unfixed and precarious life, as most new countries do,

are a veritable source of danger to even the most healthy community. The absence of decisive and strict quarantine execution has been the exciting origin of all our evils. The bulk of reflecting and learned opinion tends to trace the several epidemics lately ad at present reigning in Buenos Ayres to imported disease. In this opinion I quite concur, and in presence of the immunity of Montevideo, Rosario, &c. in the present epidemic, and the history of similar epidemics elsewhere, I am of opinion that, if proper quarantine regulations had been obtained we would have saved about sixteen thousand lives to the city of Buenos Ayres. These may impede commerce, granted; we are not all merchants! As a sanitarian I would insist on rigid quarantine from all suspected ports until at least our own sanitary estate enabled us to look at the matter with more indifference. Until, in my opinion, these various indications are fulfilled and constantly attended to, we have no right to rest and confide in safety. The drainage of the city is now a stupendous and immediate necessity, but, as observed, time is required; while we are in danger only well organized action can tide us over this. A strange want of organization has existed amongst us, but the spirited spirit made by the Commission Popular shows that it is to be found, and that Buenos Ayresan civilization does not, like the Chinese after reaching a certain point seem incapable of further development. On the contrary, this want of organization can only arise from lethargy and the want of a sufficient stimulus, which it is to be hoped the disease has furnished us. I would, in conclusion, suggest that since the establishment of tramways in Buenos Ayres affords new and increased facilities for all, some organized effort should be made to promote the formation of suburban residences of cheap, but commodious construction for the working classes—residences which could nominally be considered town—in order to relieve the overcrowding of the city, which may bring to us a danger well known, but much lost sight of during crises like the present: I refer to endemic disease.

I have seen four summers in Buenos Ayres, and during these it has been my experience to meet with a severe four days' fever, which I have forced myself to classify as febricula of a severe and mysterious type. In conversation with various friends, these likewise were aware of the existence of this four days' fever, and were puzzled to classify it. By the light of recent experience, I can set it down as nothing else than slight sporadic cases of yellow fever, proceeding to resolution on the fourth day.

If I am right in my idea of this febricula, then we in Buenos Ayres must accept the fact that sporadic cases of cholera and slight cases of yellow fever, also of a sporadic type, now and then crop up in our midst; in which case I more emphatically call attention to the matter above alluded to, and beg that each individual in the community do his utmost to force forward the movement for an amelioration in our hygienic condition.

The indications above advanced are not new; they have all a place in our legislation; but they are left unacted upon; they are known in theory—they are forgotten in practice. It will seem almost incredible that, while everyone is seeking about for some new cause as productive of all our present distress, it may be briefly and truly characterized as caused by filth and overcrowding, want of organization, and inattention to the execution of laws existing in our present system.

Where is Stand-by O'Gorman? The persistence with which this question has been put to us since the re-appearance of the STANDARD recalls forcibly the celebrity attained about a year ago by the query 'Have you seen Knags?' Stand-by O'Gorman is a much more important personage than the mythical, blue-eyed Knags, and we can understand and appreciate the intense anxiety of our readers to learn something of this celebrated member of our staff, whose telegraphic triumphs during the Franco-Prussian war will not soon pass from the public recollection. To assuage the fears of Mr. Stand-by O'Gorman's numerous admirers, we have to state that he has just returned to Montevideo from Martiu Garcia, where he spent the recess in the attractive pursuit of botany; the popular cadet of the family, also in our employment, is, we are informed, still engaged in marking lambs and shooting wild duck in the neighbourhood of L—s in this province.

The plague is better, God be thanked. On Tuesday the deaths fell to 70, and we heard very cheering accounts yesterday from doctors, clergy men, nurses, etc. There has been much more liveliness observable in the streets within the past few days. Each morning a few additional houses of business are observed to be opening, and the cafes are much more frequented at breakfast and dinner time. Nearly all the latter establishments at the STANDARD side of the city are still closed, except the Paris, Wat-son's, and the Anols Dorada; at the latter establishment there is now an excellent 'chef,' who filled the same post for three years at the Cafe Anglaise in Paris, a report dear to all the

foreign 'viveurs' with long purses, who visit that faircity of the earth. Every thing points to the prompt disappearance of the plague, and before the first of June 'things' will certainly be in fair swing again, though there is a 'quart d' heure' of the very worst description looming before the commercial body; yet the elasticity of all branches of business in this country is so remarkable, and the integrity of Buenos Ayres merchants and traders so well established that, we are inclined to hazard a prediction, that the 'squeeze' on the resumption of business will be much less severe than the pessimists and professional croakers are anxious to make believe. There is hope for Buenos Ayres yet, if the authorities are determined to profit by the awful lesson the summer of 1871 has taught them. We hope, indeed believe, they have so resolved.

The last American mail will be memorable for the news it has brought. Let our young readers persevere, study and inwardly digest the following: young people should not be allowed to play with fire; so, and with a view that the lesson may do good, we give the following harrowing fact.—'It is a very solemn thing to be married,' said a serious mother to her child. 'It is much more solemn not to be,' responded the judicious infant. The latter view of the solemnity of marriage appears to be growing alarmingly popular in the United States. A few days ago a Western paper announced that a young gentleman and a young lady who were only slightly acquainted were out buggy riding, and the young man defied his companion to stop at the Justice's and get married. She pluckily accepted the gage of combat—'not imagining he would stand his ground'—and he—who had made the proposition, through simple silliness—could not see his way clear to a graceful retreat. So the two spirited idiots stood up and were made one, and drove home somewhat thoughtfully, with a marriage certificate in their hands that more than filled them. They pacted at the lady's door with constrained courtesy, and the young wife, as the facetious annalist expresses it, 'has just been measured for a divorce.' A Pittsburgh journal records another case which is just twice as silly. Two young men called upon two sisters, and, in the course of the conversation, the ice of decorum having melted away before the shafts of that 'non humorous humor' of underbred youth which Howells has so perfectly characterized, the young people began to dare each other to do all sorts of unadvisable things. A defiance to immediate matrimony was of course, promptly made an accepted; for the staple jest of that class of persons is of rings and bridecakes. One of the zanyes went out for a parson, and the two couples were married with much giggling. Of course, after a spree like that there was no savor in further conversation, and the husbands went home and the wives to bed. In the morning the clerical hierophant sent in the legal attestation of his last night's performance, and the humorous quartette found themselves reduced to a duo. But that no element of idiotic absurdity should be wanting to the event, each man was married to the other's sweetheart, a detail which had been overlooked as altogether unimportant in the mad hilarity of the ceremony.

The Brazilian medical men sent to us by Rio Janeiro to assist the yellow fever patients are still 'tossing about in the roads. There is some kind of a hitch in the business here. The Republic says the doctors are going back to Rio in the next packet, as their services are now unnecessary. We are told that the 25,000 patacons collected in the Brazilian capital were intended to defray the expenses of establishing a hospital. If this cannot be done, we suppose the amount will go into the general relief fund.

We hear of a new line of steamers, to be established between Glasgow and the River Plate by Messrs. Burns & Co., one of the largest shipbuilding firms in Scotland.

Last week the anomalous spectacle of household chattels being despatched to country residences from various houses, while next door refugees with their Lares and Penates were returning from their prison-houses in the camp, was presented in many of the streets of Buenos Ayres. The movement is now like the tower of Pisa—all to one side: the exodus from the city has stopped, and the inhabitants are filtering in, but not in sufficient numbers to cause alarm.

The number of honorary correspondents to the STANDARD has, within the last few days, swelled to such a figure that we return our very best thanks to our friends outside. On our table lies a pile of country correspondence which would fill all the papers in town. A word, however, to our contributing friends: write us something cheerful, something to amuse, and on no account touch on the fever. We have too much of that stuff, and aim to keep it out of our columns.

Mr. Wesley, formerly manager of the 'Sala de Residentes Estrangeros' is at present studying at a college in New Jersey, and in a few years hopes to return to the Plate as a Methodist clergyman.
