The plague of 1871, like that of 1665 in London, was too general and too widespread for repetition; it lasted in both places until it consumed the very elements which produced it. The people in London, after the epidemic, set about at once to carry out necessary sanitary works. The great fire in 1666 helped them for half the city was burnt down, and had to be built anew.

With all our sorrows, with all our bitter experience of the past, it would seem we learn nothing. Even whilst we write a wretched system of cleaning out water-closets by means of air-tight tubes is going on. We saw one at work the other day in Calle Florida. The latest accounts report the Indians defeated at Pieaza, but Fort Lavalle has been captured and its garrison butchered. The National Government has telegraphed to Entre Rios for troops, as a general rising of the Indians is apprehended.

The news of Mr. Lafone's death, received here by telegram, caused universal grief. During a long and useful career he had succeeded in making many friends, both native and foreign, but our regret that he should die so far from home is lessened by the thought that he was not unknown in Buenos Ayres.

None but those who have suffered from the laah can feel for the pains of the sufferers, and the conduct of our leading men to-day should save Argentines the trouble of going back eleven years in our history to find the cause of our present sympathy. A call was made for subscriptions and behold, the most munificent sums came rolling in.

The irrepressible Aparicio is still in the field, and said to be advancing on Paysandu at the head of five thousand men. Goyo Suarez is in hot pursuit. A decisive battle is shortly expected. The Government forces obtained a slight advantage over the enemy near Mercedes, after a stiff fight of four hours.

To-morrow there is to be a grand 'funcion' at the Recreo de los Amigos, a beautiful quinta near the Aguada; half the net proceeds to be dedicated to the Buenos Ayrense fund.

The Journal de Comercio contradicts the report so freely circulated here of the deaths from yellow fever on board the Italian steamer Pampa.

The Brazilian transport Isabel has brought down twelve Doctors from Rio, besides fifty thousand dollars and four thousand stretcher-beds, medicines, &c. Such spontaneous generosity speaks of a noble people.

News has been received from the army. The Minister of War, Colonel Ordoñez, has moved his camp to the English race-course. Colonel Vidal and the vanguard are at Piedras. The Blancos have appeared near Pando, five or six hundred strong. The bulk of the enemy's forces are at Maciel.

The Health Committee of Paysandu in its last session of 26th April consented to open the port to Concordia, which has long been isolated from B. Ayres. In this way we shall be able to communicate; at present there is no way except by Rosario, which necessitates a delay of three days.

From Paysandu we hear that the Army of the North is encamped at the Arroyo Negro. The commander is busy reorganizing, and promises when ready to take the field and 'lick them all to bits.' Who 'them' are, this dependent can't say. For the honor of the cause we must suppose the galling General to allude to the enemies of his country; but the neighboring estancieros insist that hitherto all the good military operations have been directed, and with signal success, against the 'silly sheep.' It is this new kind of tactics which is ruining the country.

Every day the foreigner becomes more disgusted, the native more demoralized. Where, when and how is all this to end?

The city is fuller than ever. Several of your townsmen just arrived from Europe prefer to remain here until the plague is over. Business is consequently brisker than it has been for some time past.

Showing an increase of 61,000 head over same period last year. The Union Tramway is beginning to pull up for lost time, and Mr. Croker, who during the siege would persist in running in spite of Blancos and Colorados, and often for their mutual convenience, is in great spirits.

Dry hides have fallen since last mail from Strates. 1000 done at 65 rs. gold. 4000 matadero hides at 54 1/2 rs. Jerked beef—23,000 quintals, from Santa Maria's saladero, in the Uruguay.

The mortality returns continue to show the most encouraging improvement. On Friday only 38 fell victims to the waning epidemic, and the new cases reported were barely a dozen, of a mild form, and half of them children. The weather is so propitious that it is not too much to expect the plague will have almost disappeared by to-morrow week, the day on which the 'feria' expires.

Mr. Charles Pecher, so well and favorably known in this city as Consul for Belgium, presented his credentials yesterday to Dr. Tejedor as Consul General of that kingdom to the Argentine Republic. It will be remembered that Mr. Pecher was promoted to this important post before his late voyage to Europe. We understand that the Belgian Government has charged Mr. Pecher with the negotiation of a treaty of commerce between Belgium and this country, a task which we feel certain will be ably fulfilled by the Consul General.

The Indians are at their old work. At Azul and Rojas they have committed heavy depredations, and great loss of life is announced. The frontiers were, as usual, found unprepared; in fact, the periodical accounts given by the native papers of these Indian incursions might have been left in type for the last ten years, and still be accurate at the present moment; and it is quite probable they will be serviceable for many years to come, for the present generation need expect no reform in the miserable way our military system and Indian relations are managed.

The frequency of the mishaps on the Northern Railway is exciting the ire of our native colleagues, and it would be well if the manager could make a vigorous effort to put an end to them. At the same time it must be remembered that this line has lost more employes from the plague than any of the others, and it is not easy to get ready-made railway officials who are like soldiers, requiring a long time to train. Accidents, or at least delays and trifling mishaps on the other lines occur, but are left unnoticed by the native press. On Friday both trains from Chiriquy were hours behind time at the Parque station.

The bulletin of European news published by the Tribuna yesterday announces the death of the newly born child of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales on the 7th of April. The royal infant only survived its birth 24 hours.

Several of our native contemporaries seem to take a special delight in making adverse comments on the service of the City of Buenos Ayres Tramway Company, ignoring completely the difficult times we have had to go through, and which have affected the efficiency of most undertakings; but taxed, perhaps, in a special manner this Company. They have lost by the epidemic their three inspectors, Messrs. Mendez, Fernandez and Pico, besides others of their employes, besides having had to bear a reduction of traffic so large as to reduce their daily receipts much below the expenses, notwithstanding the enormous reduction of the latter. Among the many unfounded complaints made is that of the suppression of the last train to Barracas, which was caused by the fact that before such suppression it often did not yield more than eight paper dollars, showing clearly that the public in time of epidemic do not care to travel at eleven o'clock at night, all to the suspension of all business on account of the 'feria' ought to have been in favor of the Tramway Companies as well as anybody else, and if they have continued working at great sacrifice they deserve praise and not blame.

We rejoice to announce that, on enquiry yesterday at the residence of Dr. Weiss, the eminent Professor of Chemistry at the National College, we were informed that the physicians in attendance on him consider his state much improved. We trust there may be a continuance of this change for the better in this popular gentleman's condition.

The Chambers of the Province have sent a minute to the Executive arguing that the elections in the city should be held at once; also in those country districts where they have not yet come off.

One of the best signs of the rapid decline of yellow fever is the announcement that only four trains per diem will henceforth run on the mortuary tramway line to the Chacarita. Last week the dead trains ran every hour. A new Italian paper La Italia en America, is announced to appear on the last day of the vacation, to-morrow week. Dr. Cittadini is one of the editors, which augurs well for the success of the coming journal.

It is said the efforts to bring about peace negotiations in the Banda Oriental between the Reds and Whites have finally failed. There now seems nothing for it but to let the belligerents fight it out till the 'Kilkenny Cat' stage is reached.

We see in the Liverpool papers mention of a project for building a railway bridge across the Mersey from Liverpool to Birkenhead.

Mme. Philippe, of French Theatre celebrity, has arrived in Montevideo with a powerful and complete troupe of artists and a very extensive repertoire, comprising French dramas, vaudevilles, and operettes. Owing to the epidemic, she is unable for the present to reach her destination, and will perhaps give a short series of representations in Montevideo, previously to settling down permanently at her old quarters, the French Theatre.

With reference to our prospects of having an opera here this winter, the chances seem to be remote, although, should the epidemic cease so soon, as there now seems every probability it will, we doubt not that our enterprising friend Pestelardo will be able to organize something with the elements to be met with here and in Montevideo, and it is probable they will give a series of performances at the Colon.

In the list of deaths published about a week ago we regretted seeing the name of our much esteemed friend Col. Orquera, who died of cancer at the age of 56. Col. Orquera had seen a good deal of service both here and in Banda Oriental, and has been a valuable man to his country. He died for some time in the post of 'Fiscal Militar,' which he resigned on being appointed Inspector of the Northern Frontier of Santa Fe. It was in the discharge of his duties as such that he contracted the disease which has proved fatal to him. He was one of the constant subscribers to, as well as one of the most strenuous supporters of the STANDARD, and in concluding this brief notice of him we sincerely offer our most heartfelt condolence to his bereaved family.

We are promissal a description of a journey in the camp from — to — by a lady. It contains a harrowing account of the sufferings from 'sea sickness' of half-a-dozen diligence passengers (not British be it said). A Cunard steamer in a winter gale in the North Atlantic could not have presented a more afflicting spectacle than the interior of the diligence running between — and — on the morning of the 13th of April last. An elderly gentleman reached such a critical state as to be just able to whisper something about 'prayers for the dying' to a pretty girl of 16 sitting next him. The fair traveller, though herself very squeamish, from the motion of the Pampa ship, took such an immoderate fit of laughing, that she and the old 'buffer' (as her urochi of a brother irreverently called him) were cured on the spot, the latter no doubt by the counter irritation of indignation.

The man who murdered young Caesars in the Plaza Parque escaped from prison a few days ago. He feigned to be attacked with yellow fever, and thus obtained the opportunity of carrying out his design.

Twenty-seven employes of the Custom House, of all grades, have died of the epidemic. If the losses in the other public offices are in the same proportion, a goodly number of fresh recruits for the civil service will be required.

Carlotta Patti is now performing in Lima with great success. A colleague hints at the possibility of a member of the Anchorena family devoting a million dollars to build an orphan asylum.

It is stated that the reports as to the cholera being epidemic in Corrientes at present are doubtful. Only a few isolated cases are said to have taken place. Those who have enjoyed the mild excitement and intense discomfort of being whisked through 'arroyos' in the camp during the epidemic will appreciate the news that the iron bridges ordered in England for the camp districts are being shipped in England. Two vessels are already on the way, the Oroydon and Fanny Belauer; the Oroydon brings twelve bridges for Giles, Areco, Cañadas de la Guardia, Saladillo, Las Hermanas, Tala, and other places. A colleague states that when the epidemic was at its height some of the city undertakers were making \$40,000 mpc a day. \$4500 mpc was considered a moderate price for an ordinarily decent funeral. At Belgrano and Flores concerts in aid of the funds of the Comision Popular will be given to-day. Communication with Montevideo by mail was re-opened yesterday. The mails will henceforth be dispatched as usual.

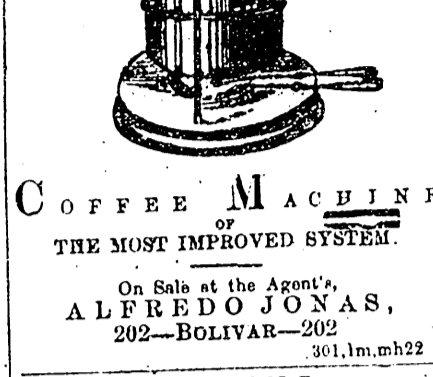
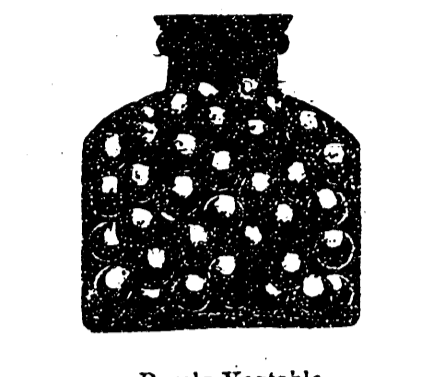

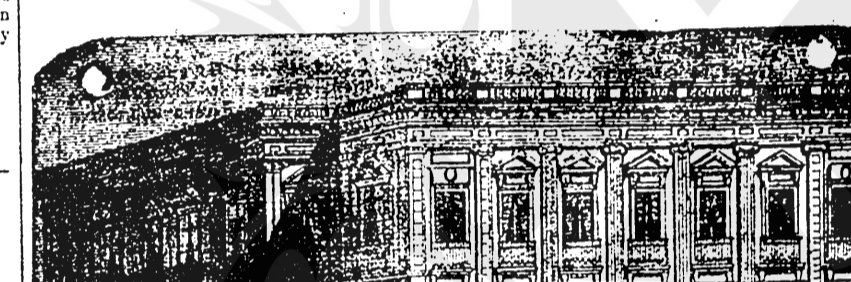
