before, what must be awarded to those who cause trees and 'montes' to stand on arid plains. By none could this desideratum be more easily promoted than by the Rural Society, in furnishing seeds on any terms to all who apply, and even pushing them into the outlying camps."

The branch railway to Lobos is now finished, and, we believe, will be opened to traffic on the national anniversary, 25th inst.

A literary conference came off last Sunday at Lujan, in aid of the Comisión Popular fund; it was very well attended, and some of the speeches were excellent.

There are numbers of new houses now in construction in all the suburbs; at Flores, especially. Dr. Ferrey is building a handsome terrace in English style, with front gardens facing the line of tramway. It is said that one of our leading bankers is about to build a fine country house in the neighborhood.

Some anxiety is expressed as to the condition of the Welsh colonists at Chupat, but we have little fear on that head. They have always been on the most friendly terms with the Patagonian Indians. The British war steamer Cracker, which has gone down to visit them, may soon be expected back with news.

On Sunday morning the mole presented an extraordinary spectacle. It was known to the authorities that several hundred Italian emigrants were about to land, and it was wisely determined to put into full force the decree forbidding such new arrivals to remain in the city while the plague lasts. As the whaleboats drew near, crowded from stem to stern with the Ligurian immigrants, three companies of infantry, with fixed bayonets, were marched down to the mole and took such a position as to prevent any of the new-comers from leaving the pier. They were all kept there till their luggage was landed, when, the carts leading the march for the Western Railway terminus commenced. Many of the immigrants became obstreperous, and refused to 'move on,' but being told that their goods and chattels were booked for Chivilcoy, and that it was problematical if they would see them again in case they (the owners) remained behind, all made up their minds to try Westward ho! and took the train accordingly.

On Friday night a man committed suicide in a house at the corner of Calles Tucuman and Reconquista. He was shaven, and, no doubt, in a fit of mental weakness, suddenly drew the razor across his windpipe and fell dead.

General Osorio is said to have left Montevideo for the purpose of proposing terms of peace to Aparicio. The Colorados will now only insist on the rebels laying down their arms and returning home. The terms are mild and simple enough, and the revolutionists can scarcely find an excuse for refusing them on the score of their being grinding or extravagant.

'Cocktailling' has now become so well established a custom in this country that the following amusing story cannot fail to divert many of our readers:

A story is told in Washington of a well-known senator who is notorious for taking two cocktails in succession before breakfast. One morning, while the senator was practising at the 'Metropolitan Bar,' a friend put to him the following pertinent question, 'Senator, why do you take two cocktails by a custom? Won't one tone you?' The senator drew himself up, 'I will tell you why I take two. When I take one it makes me feel like another man. Well, you see, I am bound by common courtesy to treat that man, so I take a second.'

At the banquet given by Prince Bismarck to the diplomatic body at Berlin on the 22nd March, the first toast to the Emperor was proposed by Lord A. Lottus, who expressed the wish that Germany may still preserve him for many years, that she may enjoy an era of peace, and consolidate herself in her new organization. Bismarck replied by a toast to the Government represented at the banquet.

We have been favoured with a copy of the "Athletic Almanack" for 1871 edited in London by Mr. H. F. Wilkinson, of the "Field." The book is most ably compiled, and is an exhaustive record and source of reference for those who take interest in athletic exercises at home and abroad. In reference to Buenos Ayres, the "Almanack" says: "By far the most important and flourishing club, however, in foreign climes is the Buenos Ayres Athletic Society, which was founded in 1867, chiefly through the exertions of Mr. W. C. Roberts, who took the lead in planning and carrying out the arrangements during the first year. Since their first institution many well known English athletes visiting or residing in that country have competed at the meetings, and the performances have generally borne favorable comparison with those of the old country."

Brazil continues her noble efforts to relieve the sufferings of the people of Buenos Ayres. Her Majesty the Empress has contributed 500 paecas from her privy purse. Rio Grande has sent 734 paecas, and the city of Santos has collected the munificent offering of ten contos of reis, or £1000. In all the chief towns of the empire subscription lists are being opened and filled up with the most off-handed generosity.

The announcement that the Argentinian six million loan had been launched in London by Messrs. Marrites at the high rate of 8% caused the greatest satisfaction in town yesterday. Bankers and brokers looked jubilant, merchants static, the Government House people deliriously content; in fact, all seemed to think the situation saved when the arrival of the £100,000 by the Douro was announced. It is too soon to balloon till we are out of the wood, but the launching of the loan, if it cannot wholly avert the great pressure the plague has brought on the commercial community, will, at least, help to prevent the crisis from assuming a disastrous form. Buenos Ayres has justly acquired a reputation for being 'fortunate'; no matter how bad the financial ease in which she may find herself, something is certain to 'turn up' in the nick of time to save the situation.

Yesterday morning, while taking a ticket for Moreno by the 7 o'clock train, at Parque station, one of our leading British merchants had his pocket picked of 18,500 dollars. Notwithstanding that he felt the hand withdrawing from his pocket, and that operation was performed within a foot of a policeman, the vigilance of the latter was such that before the thief could be secured he had time to pass the money to an accomplice, and on being taken before the commissioners nothing was found on him but the habitual 'puñal.' At the risk of being charged, as usual, with ingratitude, it is difficult to avoid remarking that the Argentine vigilante of the period is as blind as a tramway-mayoral and conductor combined, and as helpless as the Post Office authorities; otherwise a well known gang of thieves might have been secured on this occasion, since it appears that later on in the day the victimized B.M., revisiting the spot, had pointed out to him by an officious peón the party to whom the money had been so adroitly passed under the very nose of the wide awake vigilante, whereupon he requested the latter to arrest him. As this, however, would have been too practical a way of doing business, the vigilante declined without an order from the commissioners, and by the time this was obtained it was found that the party's crimes had left by rail for some unknown place, where, it is said, a party, whose name is never mentioned to eat polite, lost his capital invitation via poncho, introduced by — & Co. (out of delicacy we omit names), and which is quite equal to the real article.

#### THE HEALTH OF THE CITY.

The deaths from fever on Sunday amounted to 33, and yesterday up to noon only 12 yellow fever interments had occurred.

The number of families now returning to town is so large that it is said the Medical Board is about to publish a manifest, cautioning the public against the extreme danger of coming into town at present.

The news of the acquisition of the Varela loan at 8% spread sunshine in the market. The first remittance of £100,000 sterling has come in the very nick of time, and will in all probability save the situation. The launching of the loan seems, after all, to have been attended with much success: the rate telegraphed to us 8%, which is 1 per cent higher than the rate generally spoken of on the B.M.; but as our correspondent in Montevideo is usually the best informed on such matters, we believe that our quotation is the correct one.

In the forenoon there was a fair attendance on the B.M.. People went more to hear the news than for business purposes. Amongst retailers there is something doing; but in the higher branches of commerce business is at a complete stand-still, and will remain so until after the vacation. The advances from Europe as regards produce are good, and the market rates will be found in another column.

The Provincial Bank statement for the month of March is published, and gives important returns; suffice it to say that the Provincial Bank was never in better position, and the immensity of its transactions shows the splendid utility of this institution to the commerce of Buenos Ayres.

The bank holds in specie, including the Oficina de Cambios, close on 91 millions of paecas, perhaps a larger amount of specie than ever before held by the bank. Nevertheless, it is the settled conviction of all business men that the bank should, owing to the peculiarity of the situation, emit four millions of paecas in specie bills, as the scarcity of mony is at present much felt.

Respecting the measures adopted at the commercial meeting held on the B.M., it is said that the committee named have seen the bank managers, and that the bank finds it impossible to alter their arrangements already concluded. The Committee called another meeting for Wednesday to consider the question. There was nothing done in Exchange to-day for the Hipparchus bills, but notwithstanding the firm brokers think that Exchange will be passed for the English packet.

Many of the leading foreign importing houses are now doing business at the Custom-house. For some articles the market is very badly supplied, amongst others, may be mentioned, hats.

The amortization of National Bonds should have taken place to-day at the Government-house, but as the President of the National Credit Office did not attend, nothing could be done until to-morrow.

The salero returns for the River Plate and Rio Grande will be up to the end of April, show a falling off of 350,000 on the return for the same time last year
