LATEST FROM EUROPE.

THE TCHO BRAHE MAILS.

London, June 2nd.

The freedom of the City of London is to be presented to Prince Arthur at a special Court of Common Council, to be held on Thursday, July 13.

Several meetings of the Home Cattle Defence Association have lately been held, at which a point has been made of the alleged inconsistency of the Privy Council in absolutely prohibiting the import of cattle from

countries where the existence of rinderpest is only suspected, and yet permitting access to the metropolitan markets of beasts from Russia and other parts of the Continent, from which the cattle plague is never absent.

Lord Cairns, as arbitrator under the Albert Life Assurance Company's Bill, held a sitting yesterday morning at Waterloo-place. The question before his lordship was the liability of the Family Endowment Society on policies or other contracts issued or arising out of business transferred to the Albert Life Company, as far as such liability had not been determined by cases decided in the Court of Chancery.

The examination of the claimant to the Tichborne baronetcy again occupied the whole of yesterday, and had not been brought to a conclusion at the rising of the court.

A sitting for public examination under the failure of Messrs. Jeffery and Co., of Compton-house, Liverpool was held in the Court of Bankruptcy yesterday. It is believed that the liabilities will reach £300,000, and the assets are returned at £155,000. The creditors are nearly 1,000 in number, and the first dividend to the joint creditors will be about 3s. 6d. in the pound.

Paris is so rapidly reassuming its old aspect that one of the papers, the *Journal de Paris*, rebukes the people for their apparent gaiety, and indifference. In the district of Belleville, however, according to the account of another correspondent, whose letter we publish to-day, the feeling of hostility to the soldiers is so strong that a large military force is required in the streets to keep the people in subjection. The women are especially vindictive, and curse the troops with a fury that no display of force can quell.

In the cemetery of Pere La Chaise the unburied dead, present the most sickening sight. Prince Napoleon has addressed a letter to Jules Favre, denouncing the policy he has pursued as Minister, and maintaining that no Government can be established in France except by an appeal to the people.

Our Correspondent at Berlin says it has now been definitively settled that the triumphal entry of the troops into that city is to take place on the 16th of June, and that the festivities are to last three days.

The same correspondent says that public feeling in Berlin has been greatly excited by the occurrences which have taken place in Paris. The ferocious conduct of the soldiers arouses even more feeling than the incendiarism of the Communists.

Victor Hugo's expulsion from Belgium is condemned in very strong terms by the *Independence Belge*. "We deeply deplore," it says, "the resolution which the Ministry has just adopted. The letter of Victor Hugo was a political fault, which, we regret, which we have very distinctly characterised; but the expulsion of the author of that letter is equally a fault that we regret also, not only for the exile, but still more for the Government itself, and the country which, whatever may be said, did not need this pretended protection. The hospitality accorded to Victor Hugo did as much honor to the country which gave it as to the poet who received it. It is impossible for us to admit that by expressing an opinion contrary to ours, contrary to that of the Government and the population, Victor Hugo abused that hospitality, and the law of 1835 being admitted, we cannot approve the use made of it by the Ministry."

Counsels closed yesterday at 9 1/2 to ex. div., for money, and 9 1/2 to 92 ex. div., for the new account. Business in the Stock Exchange was inactive, but the tone of most of the markets was unfavorable.

The House of Commons reassembled after the Whitsuntide recess at 4 o'clock yesterday. In reply to questions, Lord Enfield said he had informed Dr. Wm. Stewart (who had intimated in vague terms that he had been appointed Minister for Paraguay) that British subjects could not be recognised as Ministers, only as consuls. The Marquis of Hartington said that last year £18,000 had been advanced to Irish farmers under the Land Act, and up to the present that sum had been increased to £25,800. Mr. Cardwell said it was intended that a certain number of officers who had served two years in the militia should receive commissions in the line. It was not intended to give them indiscriminately, but as a stimulus to efficiency.

It is said that Mr. Gladstone is better, and expects to be in his place in the house to-day. A later telegram says—Although Mr. Gladstone's health continues to improve, it is not probable he will take his place in the House of Commons before Monday. The health of the Pope is again indifferently reported upon.

Her Majesty the Queen, with their Royal Highnesses Prince Leopold and Princess Beatrice, is expected to leave Balmoral on or about the 19th inst., for Windsor Castle.

An alarming accident, causing damage to the extent of £50,000, took place at Swansea yesterday. The quay wall of the river gave way, owing to the cutting of a new canal which ran parallel to it.

FUNERAL OF THE REV. DR. SPRAET.—The remains of this highly-esteemed Roman Catholic clergyman were removed to Glasnevin Cemetery

on Tuesday, in the presence of a vast multitude of persons of every station in life and of every shade of religious opinion. The funeral cortege was probably the largest seen in the city or in Ireland since that of O'Connell. Among those present were—The Lord Mayor, the Lord Chan. Illor, Chief Baron Pigott, Richard J. Devereux, M.P., Sir James Power, Bart.; the Rev. William Carroll, Rector of St. Bride's; the Rev. James Tobias, the Rev. Dr. Whelan, Roman Catholic Bishop of Bombay, &c. Along the entire route immense crowds had gathered for several hours previously, almost stopping the thoroughfare. Most of the spectators, as well as the processionists, wore caps on their hat or arms. When the cortege reached the cemetery it could not have consisted of less than 30,000 or 40,000 persons, and, notwithstanding that some inconvenience arose from the crowded state of the thoroughfares, the conduct of the people was very creditable.—*Dublin Express*.

LATEST TELEGRAMS.

Washington, Tuesday.

President Grant has appointed Mr. George Bancroft United States Minister to the German Empire.

New York, Thursday.

According to the usual monthly report of the Secretary of the Treasury, the public debt of the United States has been reduced during the month of May by \$443,000.

Ottawa, Thursday.

The *Times* and *Citizen*, Government newspapers, announce that Sir John McDonald has signed the Washington Treaty, reluctantly reserving to himself and the Cabinet the fullest liberty of action respecting its acceptance by Canada.

Madrid, Wednesday.

The rumor of an approaching Carlist rising is officially contradicted. A banquet was given to-day to celebrate the opening of the Madrid tramways, which have been started by an English company. The Captain-General of Madrid proposed a toast to England, and amongst the other toasts was one to the prosperity of England and Spain. All the Madrid authorities were present. The tramways will be open for traffic to-morrow.

Lisbon, Wednesday.

Great preparations are being made for the reception of the Emperor of Brazil. The Chamber of Deputies is discussing the ways and means. The hostility shown to the Ministry has been considerably modified.

Brussels, Thursday.

The Tribunal has given in its decision in the affair of the bonds of the last Paris loan, a portion of which had been realised by the Commune. The Tribunal sentenced the seller to restore the amount at the price paid. The seller will appeal to a superior court.

Berne, Thursday.

The Federal Council has received an address from Geneva, praying that an asylum may be awarded the members of the Paris Commune. The address has been taken into consideration. It is not true that Felix Pyat and Pascal Grousset have been arrested in Geneva.

Calcutta, June 1.

Herat fell on the 6th of May. All was right on the previous day. Treachery is suspected.

Fateh Khan, the Governor, was killed, and his son wounded.

Verarmoz Kabin approaches cautiously with the Ameer's army.—*Times Telegram*.

Paris June 1st.

Crowds are going to see the bodies of the Archbishop of Paris and M. de la Motte, which are lying exposed in the Archbishop's Palace, Rue Grenelle, Faubourg St. Germain.

Papers of Felix Pyat have been discovered, and among them many letters urging the immediate execution of all the hostages.

Petroleum was thrown into a baker's house yesterday.

A gendarme on horseback was fired at from a window in the Rue Elysee, but not touched.

In the Belleville quarter soldiers refuse to go about alone from fear of assassination.

The sale of journals about the streets is forbidden.

The Paris journals declare the Legitimists and Orleanists have at last come to a clear understanding about the succession.

Preparations have been commenced for the restoration of the Vendôme Column.

Active measures are also being taken to prevent the threatened pestilence arising from the number of corpses lying half buried about Paris.

It is said the military executions are still going on, and that some women were shot this morning.

An ordinance of Marshal MacMahon directs that provisionally the theatres are only to give representation by special authorization.

Forty thousand men will remain here to garrison the interior of the city, while another 40,000 will occupy the forts and the suburban communes to the south and west.

THE STATE OF PARIS.

Paris, Wednesday.

The cafes have begun to open, and people have begun to sip their little drinks before them, and to saunter about as in the olden time, staring about at anything to be seen—here the shot marks in a window, there a broken lamp-post, and there again a hole in the street, into which a shell has buried itself, tearing up the asphalt pavement. It is wonderful what

a trifle will collect the Parisian idlers in crowds. The other day, when the men were firing from the heights of Montmartre on those of Chateaufort, a great crowd collected at the corners of the Rue La Fayette and the Rue Lepelletier. What did they see? At a distance of about 2,000 metres they saw the famous mill on the top of Montmartre, and they saw the occasional flash of a gun with a puff of white smoke from under it. For hours upon hours they stood open-mouthed gazing upon this as a wonder. And so now the people tramp about exclaiming like children over every shot mark and for every burning pile. A journalist much respected in Paris, M. Edouard Hervé, is shocked and indignant that any Parisian should show signs of anything but mourning. He sees people laughing—it cuts him to the quick. He sees people gaily dressed and going about with every appearance of satisfaction—he is ashamed of them. He sees the tricolor flag waving in the front of the houses—he regrets it, because all the flags give a holiday look to the streets. He sees people sitting before the cafes in rows, three deep, drinking their syrups. How in these bitter days can they find sweetness in any drink? Now this jeremiad comes from a journalist who may not be the ablest writer in the Parisian press, and whose journal may not be particularly influential, but who may be fairly described as being personally the best liked and most esteemed writer in Paris. The *Journal de Paris*, which he edits, is an unpretentious little paper, published at five centimes, and you are apt to despise it until you see how remarkable is his good sense amid all the fantasies of Parisian journalism, and how much he is trusted and respected by his colleagues who are serious. He is who protests against the appearance of gaiety among the signs of reviving life in Paris. No doubt he has reason on his side when he talks of the unhappiness of his country; and no doubt he does well to chide the fickleness and want of seriousness of his countrymen; but surely there is something pedantic and ultrapuritanic in the notion that signs of rejoicing and contentment should not break forth at the downfall of the Commune. Grant that France is in deep affliction, and has good cause to wear sackcloth and ashes. But is there such pedantry in we who those who are sore at heart must never break forth into laughter? Or does it not rather sometimes happen that men laugh in order not to weep.

We cannot ascertain—but pardon me, I ought only to speak for myself—I find the greatest difficulty in getting accurate information as to killed and wounded. I have seen quite enough to sicken any man, but I can only stare in speechless amazement at the accounts which reach me of what other people have seen. As far as the army is concerned, you may take the word of M. Thiers for it: that its losses are inconceivable. They went very cautiously and skillfully to work, taking the barricades in flank and rear, and very seldom in front. I have heard people, ignorant of what street fighting is, condemn this mode of attack as being more full of discretion than valour. On the contrary, it seems to me to be worthy of the highest praise as being most scientific and effectual. The chief stronghold of the rebels, viz., that of the Place Vendôme, was taken by a beautiful series of movements, culminating in the occupation of the Opera House; and these movements cost the army very little indeed—nothing to speak of. I have been asking everywhere, "Tell me, do you know of a barricade taken in front or taken at the point of the bayonet?" The only affirmative answer I have yet received is this:—Yes, the barricade in the Boulevard Malesherbes was taken at the point of the bayonet, and the colonel of the regiment that took it is in our ambulance just now," the speaker being Dr. John Rose Cornack, the head of the English ambulance. But if the losses on the side of the army are slight, those on the side of the National Guards and the Commune are abundant. But even here we must beware of exaggerations. I met a man last night—a man of business and of figures—who was agitated at the slaughter, and in cold blood reckoned the massacre of the National Guards at not less than 60,000. I met another man who told me that with his own eyes he had seen 600 prisoners shot in the Gare du Nord, beneath his windows; and he told me this with every kind of corroborative circumstance—such as that they turned their ears to the marksmen, not, as one would imagine, to escape from seeing the guns levelled at them, but, as my informant put it, that they might be sure of a speedy death.

It is difficult amidst all these statements to keep within the limits of probability. But in the first place, we may reckon the number of prisoners at 30,000, about one third of whom are women, old men, lame men, hump-backed men, and boys—mere boys. Suppose we put the number of able-bodied men at 20,000. Now, the whole fighting force of the Commune could not upon paper be reckoned at more than 85,000; they called a muster of their men on the 2nd May, and they managed to count in all 84,988 men and officers—that is, of course, not counting 77,665 besides who did not belong to the fighting battalions. The 77,000 were ready to keep guard within Paris; the 85,000 were ready to fight within or without, and a great number of the men among them were ready to do so only upon compulsion.

I do not believe that when the panic came on that Sunday night and Monday morning which saw the entry of the army into Paris there were more than 50,000 ready to stand to their arms and fight a losing campaign behind the barricades of the city. And these 50,000, even with the forced recruits compelled to fight at the barricades, must have dwindled away as the days wore on and victory after victory declared itself on the side of the army. Reduce this 50,000, first by the 20,000 who are prisoners, and next by the thousands who threw down their arms and have gone into bidding. I do not pretend to give you in a precise figure the number of killed and wounded on the side of the National Guards. I only give you the elements of a rough calculation; and I raise this query—Is it possible that the number of killed and wounded in battle on the side of the Commune, added to the number of summary executions, can amount to 10,000?—*Daily News*.

PARAGUAYAN CREDENTIALS TO ENGLAND.

DR. STEWART'S MISSION REJECTED.

Last night Lord Enfield returned the only answer which it was possible for him to give to the question which was addressed to him by Mr. M'Arthur. Dr. William Stewart, he said

In many districts of the city. In England the Tichborne case causes increased excitement; the claimant's case is closed, and looks very favourable. The article on 'The Plague of 1871,' which appeared in the STANDARD of April 30, created an immense sensation in England, and stimulated the subscriptions pouring in for the relief of Buenos Ayres. The Times copied the article 'verbatim' in its issue of the 31st May.

At the Convention on Tuesday night there was another brilliant display of eloquence and legal erudition. Dr. Dawson, the O'Connell of Buenos Ayres, spoke with his accustomed felicity; also General Mitre, Dr. Rufino Elizalde, and others. It would seem at last that some good will come out of this famous Convention.

The city was enveloped in a dense fog yesterday morning, and until noon there were numerous pedestrian collisions in the principal streets; as for the river, there was no seeing even the water until the fog cleared off.

In our report of the Fourth of July celebration at the United States Legation on Tuesday, we omitted to mention that Mr. Kirk received telegrams early that morning from the following gentlemen, expressing their great regret at not being able to attend: from Viscount Amelot de Chaillou, French Chargé d'Affaires, from Chilvoyley, Mr. Samuel Wheelwright, U. S. Consul, Rosario; and Mr. J. C. Hall, an American citizen in Cordoba. Great regret is expressed in all circles at the probable departure of Mr. Kirk. We understand that President Grant is most anxious that he should continue to hold the post which he fills with so much credit to himself and the great nation he represents.

We received files of late New York papers yesterday. They give long accounts of the ravages made by the epidemic in this city, and gave the deaths at fully 30,000 people, from information derived from trustworthy sources here; we will publish extracts to-morrow.

The Irish papers announce the death of the Rev. Dr. Spratt, of the order of Carmelites, who, during a long and useful life, devoted himself chiefly to impressing the virtue of Temperance on the working classes.

It appears that the rupture of peace negotiations in the Banda Oriental was chiefly owing to the pretensions of the Blanco leader, who refused anything in the way of formal submission to the Government, and laid down as a 'sine qua non' the following conditions:—A mixed Government, the Gales Politicos to be named half from the Blanco and half from the Colorado party, the money spent by the rebels to be paid up by the country; these modest demands blew up the negotiations. A battle is daily expected, and the odds are the Government troops, if they are worth their salt (doubtful), will win; as a newspaper correspondent who has lately been through the Blanco camp says they have only two field pieces and 400 infantry, the rest being military 'bobtail' of the worst description. In fact, the Blanco army is "all officers and no soldiers," comprising 15 Generals, 18 Colonels, 181 field officers, 431 majors, 425 captains, and any number of 'subs'; the proportion is about 1 effective soldier for every two officers. Some people say the Government army is organized on the same South American principle.

Our French colleague denies that His Majesty King Orelie, of Araucania, is in town; and recommends the public to take no notice of him in case he should 'turn up' here some day. Sleepy Spain is rousing up. We perceive by the exchanges to hand yesterday that a TRAMWAY is about to be established in Madrid. This is really very encouraging news; and the tramway and the new journal our friend Hector Varela is about to start, the capital of all the Spains will go ahead with the rapidity of a house on fire. The Asuncion papers state that the Paraguayan Government is about to name Du. Hector Varela its Consul-General in Spain; impossible to find a better man, if he would accept the post, which we doubt.

It is said that Dr. Benitez has resigned the post of Minister of Finance in Entre Rios, as he cannot get his colleagues to agree with him as to the best way of bringing about the financial regeneration of the province. This is a pity, as Dr. Benitez is an able man, and Entre Rios only wants proper handling for a year or two to make it one of the first provinces of the Confederation, so rich are its natural resources.

In our issue of yesterday we mentioned the reunion of our American friends at their Legation to celebrate the ninety-fifth anniversary of their independence; and we now hear that several North American gentlemen entertained their friends privately in the course of the day with banquets worthy of the occasion. We are happy to record among others that given by Mr. Oaduns, the well known and well-to-do barraguer of this plaza. Covers were set down for a numerous company, among whom we remarked Messrs. Hibbert, Nash, Downe, Lewis, Prescott and Brookhorst, besides several German gentlemen and many well known wool merchants. Everything went off splendidly; speeches were pronounced, wines were quaffed, and the flow of eloquence was only surpassed by that

of champagne, huge hampers of which had been expressly sent to Mr. Caduns by his friends in Bordeaux, as a token of their gratitude to him for the able manner in which he had supplied the wool markets in France notwithstanding the obstacles set in his way by the late war. The company separated at 10 p.m., and broke up under the charm and thrilling influence of a powerful oration delivered by our opposite neighbor.

Our Moorish friend Ben Zuli thus facetiously sums up, in the Republica the result of the elections on Sunday: "three arms broken, one skull cracked, one leg broken, one eye gouged out, and contusions, bruises, black eyes, and damaged noses innumerable;" nevertheless, the Chambers have approved the elections.

It is thought that the expediency of national intervention in the troubles of Santiago del Estero will be at once submitted to Congress by the Executive; it is not believed that armed intervention will be necessary.

Mr. Torredo de Barros is 'pro tem' in charge of the Brazilian Legation at the Hotel de la Paz.

The sale by auction is announced of Mr. Hector Varela's household furniture and splendid collection of pictures; the auction will take place on the 14th, 15th, and 16th of this month.

Part of the Aduana Vieja is in such a tottering state that the Government engineers proceeded to inspect it yesterday, lest a catastrophe should occur; it is said extensive repairs will be required.

Mr. Carlos Stegmann, C.E., is about to leave for Mendoza to plan some irrigation works for the Government of that province.

There was a fair attendance at the auction sale of Mr. Robl's paintings on Tuesday evening. The prices realized were in general much under the value of the pictures, but some of them fetched a fair amount.

The Commissioners of Immigration have published their report for 1870; in the first six months of that year 22,014 immigrants arrived here from Europe.

A monument in white marble has just arrived from Italy for the tomb of President Sarmiento's son, at the Recoleta Cemetery. The monument consists of a pedestal of black marble, surmounted by a white marble bust of the gallant young officer.

Quarantine on vessels from Buenos Ayres was to be abolished at Asuncion on the 1st July.

The ferocity of the women of Paris during the late excesses has naturally caused a number of anecdotes about their doings in former revolutions to be raked up. The following, in which the late gallant General Lamoriciere played the part of a true 'gentilhomme' of the old regime towards a virago 'de la halle,' may be new to many of our readers. The scene occurred during the outbreak of 1848.

An Indian Chief from the Upper Parana is now on a visit to the President of the Republic of Paraguay. This enlightened denizen of the wilds has approached the Paraguayan President not to beg for subsidies of gin, calia or cigarettes, but to ask that a priest and a school-master may be sent to his 'toids' to instruct his tribe, and also that some agricultural implements may be given to them; his people are said to cultivate cotton extensively, and still to cherish the principles of the Christian religion taught their forefathers by the Jesuits; they know little of pastoral industry, having few sheep, and neither cows or horses. The Chief is described as a fine looking man of 42 years of age; he is stopping in the President's house, and dresses in a semi-military uniform presented to him by H.E.

All the members of the Comision Popular are expected to attend the funeral service for the late Dr. Roque Perez, which takes place this morning at 11 o'clock in the church of Saint Ignatius.

The following are numerous cuttings from our English and North American exchanges:—A marble-cutter near Lockport recently received from a German an order for a tombstone with the following epitaph: "My wife Susan is dead; if she had life till next Friday she'd been dead about two weeks. As a tree falls so must she stand. All things is impossible mit God."

"The fact that the marriage of the Lord of Lorne and the Princess Louise took place during Lent, has created quite a flutter in High Church circles in England, Punch, of course, ridicules these scruples. Here is one of his notes:—

CLERICAL ERROR. "High" Parsons would have couples tarry, When they propose to wed in Lent— But why? The sooner people marry, The sooner, mostly they repent. "Excuse my left hand," said Wiggin, as he shook hands with a friend. "Certainly, I never take umbrage at nature" was the reply, referring to Ecclesiastes x. 2. The text is, 'A wise man's heart is at his right hand, but a fool's heart is at his left'; and the consequence is that they have not spoken since.

"There was a Dutch woman whose

husband, Dietrich Van Pronk, kicked the bucket, and left her inconsolable. Folks said grief would kill the widow. She had a figure of wood carved that looked very much like her late husband, in order to be constantly reminded of her dear departed. In about six months she became interested in a young shoemaker, who finally married her. He had visited the widow not more than a fortnight, when the servant told her they were out of kindling wood, and asked what was to be done. After a pause—'Maybe I ish vell enough now to split up old Van Pronk vat ish up stairs.'

It doubtless will interest our subscribers to know that yesterday the Argentine Finance Minister, unasked, sent to subscribe to the STANDARD. Nearly all the foreign Consuls abroad of their own free will are subscribing for the Packet Edition. This certainly shows an editorial triumph, which is grateful to us, and reminds us of the lines of our colleague Mr. W. C. Bryant—

Truth crushed to earth shall rise again; The Eternal years of God are here— But Error, wounded, writes with pain, And dies among his worshippers.

The Asuncion papers to-day mention the assassination of Don Pedro Martini Decoud at the Tebiquary.

The distinguished tragedian Rossi, now playing at Rio Janeiro, has been made a Chevalier of the Order of the Rose.

The Nacional states that the proposed loan in London negotiated by Senen Rodriguez with the house of Waring Bros. has burst up. We have as yet no advices in the matter.

Sau Jose de Flores is becoming an English colony, and the present season has set in with a round of soirees, tea-parties, and 'conversations.' Building is going on actively on both sides of the railway, land going up in value daily, and new families settling down with permanent residences in this charming suburb.

LATEST FROM BRAZIL.

The Minister of Agriculture has authorized the Director of the D. Pedro II railway to contract with the Coolie concessionaires, for the import of 500 as laborers on the railway.

The Amazonas Navigation and Commerce Company has received authorization to transfer all its rights, contracts and obligations to a foreign company. By one of the clauses of the decree the new company must colonize annually two square leagues of its 23 territories, under penalty of loss of the grant of land.

Messrs. Joao Antonio Rodrigues Martins & Co. have received a five years privilege for the introduction, into the port of Rio, of vessels destined for fishing and for transporting the fish alive to market.

The Brazilian fleet consists of 17 ironclads, 5 sailing vessels, 13 auxiliary screw vessels, 14 paddle steamers and 7 steam transports; total 56, armed with 240 cannon and manned by 340 officers and 5,000 men. It is intended to build or purchase, within three years, four casemated corvettes, of the speed of 14 miles an hour, 10 gunboats of 10 feet draft and 10 miles an hour, and six gunboats of 8 feet draft and 8 miles an hour; all armed with the heaviest cannon to be had.

Yellow fever has declined in Bahia, and few cases were occurring at last dates.

A Thompson's road steamer was tried at Barra, Bahia, with ploughs, and the trial was considered successful by the planters and others assembled to see it.

The Buenos Ayres Relief Committee closed its operations on the 9th. Up to then over 74,000 had been collected, but, owing to the treatment received by the Brazilian doctors who went to the River Plate, the current of subscriptions had almost entirely stopped.

In the parish of Rio Novo, in the province of S. Paulo, Manoel Joaquim de Oliveira died recently at the age of 116 years, leaving ten children, thirty-four grandchildren, and three great-grandchildren. He rode on horseback, worked on his farm, and possessed undiminished intellectual faculties to the last.

The Sociedade Auxiliadora da Industria Faccional has reported in favor of granting to W. S. Ellison and A. M. de Oliveira Bulhões, civil engineers, a 20 years patent for the form of a suspension rail, and for waggon, carriages and locomotives pertaining to the system, but has reported against granting a patent for the system of suspension rail itself, as it is already in use in Europe and the United States.

Exchange.—The banks maintained a nominal rate of 24 for the departure of the French packet up to the 17th, but the Government's refusal to draw forced them to lower the rate to 24 for the 19th, and the following day they refused to draw. On the 24th the English Bank reopened at 24 but, finding a large number of takers, declined to 24, and finally lowered the rate to 24, at which the market closes flat.

Coffee.—An active enquiry having prevailed during the fortnight, for the European markets, with limited arrivals from the interior, and the new crop being now known to be very small, the market has assumed great firmness, and we quote an advance of 100rs to 200rs on our last quotations.—Brazilian Times.

There was very little done in London to-day only one sale of 1200 at 70, which it was thought was for account of the Bion Hebra. At after hours 20,000 were sold for the end of the month at 70 1/2. For the end of the quarter there are a few buyers offering 71, but as yet no sellers.

Exchange was done to-day at 50 1/2; about ten thousands sterling passed. Takers 'look for 50, but there were no bills offering to-day at this rate. Exchange in Montevideo ruled to-day at 6 1/2, and by letters received from Rio per Tycho Brabe we learn that exchange ruled there at 24 1/2, and covers had gone up, closing 10 25 0.

Money is offering freely at 9 and 10 per cent. per annum, but there is not much enquiry for large amounts, and very little doing in the way of advances on Bonds.

The sale of a large estancia in the far south was announced to-day. It is known as the Estancia Segui, near the Laguna de los Padres. The cattle were sold at 90 'al corte,' and the land at reserved rates.

The liquidation of the Bionhebra is now progressing, and is a worthy remark that the total number maturing with 'plus of capital' reaches 600, of which only 32 had died. It is also worthy of note that very few have neglected to comply with the statutes in regard to sending in the 'fe de vida,' and this is due to the unending attention of the manager of the Company in notifying parties before hand. There is really no better managed company in this city than the Bionhebra, and none more prosperous; each day there are new subscribers enrolled from every quarter.

The Finance Company in liquidation has declared a second dividend of 7s, making with previous dividends, 12s. in the £.
The Foreign Tramway Company received a telegram from Madrid, June 1st, announcing the successful opening of the first tramway in that city.

A new Telegraph Company has been formed at Berlin, for a joint system of continental and ocean telegraph.

The British Tarque Amelia, from Richmond has arrived with a cargo of American flour.
The captain of the Swedish barque Verdundi, at Rio, spoke the British ship Dundonald in lat. 12 S. long. 27-13 W. from Swansea to Valparaiso all well.

The French barque Ville de Lille has cleared from Rio for Buenos Ayres with a full cargo of cut paving stones.
The Bonita of the Antwerp and London line is the next steamer due of that line, she is expected hourly.

The official Custom House returns of Rio report £1,500,400 p.m. in specie exported from Rio to the Plate, this specie came to the Maua Bank Montevideo.

Advices received from Fray Benitez report another attack on that truly unfortunate little place by the Blancos. Shops all closed and the townspeople in the greatest alarm. The Blancos succeeded in taking the town. Letters from Montevideo announce the starting of a mercantile casino in that city where importers and exporters are to meet daily. The idea is a novel one, inasmuch as Montevideo at present boasts of an Exchange building, the finest in the Plate, and in fact altogether too large for the trade of the place.

The Tycho Brabe has brought advices of a wholesale robbery of the French funds of 1869 by a band of Communists or robbers. As some of these securities have been sent to Rio, Buenos Ayres and Chile for negotiation, merchants and others must be on their guard.
Notwithstanding the general impression in Montevideo that gold must fall owing to the heavy imports of specie, the rates kept rising; this, of course, is purely due to speculation; gold has risen from 14 to 14 1/2 and the operations are getting more active. 25 shares of the Union Tramway have been sold at 6 per cent. discount. The cargo of pitch pine ex J. M. Wiswell, has been sold at reserved rates. A Pernambuco cargo of sugar at the following rates:—

The new 4 per cent import tax in Montevideo now in force is felt by all to be excessive, and has brought trade to almost a complete standstill.

During the last few days there have been large sales of produce both in the North and South plazas, and also in the deposits. 15,000 arrobes of wool were sold out of deposit the other day at 70, and some very fine lots were bought by an American barraguer at reserved rates; also 7000 ar. Entre Rios wool at 24 ris. 10,000 American dry hides sold on the Bolsa at 48 ris. 7000 do. in two lots, at same price. Prices for dry hides for the States are firm, and rates in the plaza have risen to 184 per arabe.

The auction at Mr. Iokh's on the 4th gave good results: everything sold well, and the auction of plants by Bullrich this day was equally successful. A meeting of the Directors of the Popular Argentina is called for Friday at 12 o'clock. A punctual attendance of the Directors is requested, as business of importance has to be conducted.

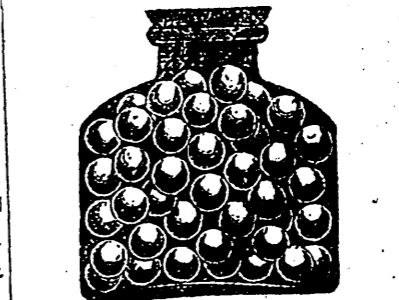
