his views, if adopted, are highly ruinous to the very best interests of this country.

The respect which our countrymen have ever shown for the Government is notorious—none can question it—whether in the building of an estancia or the launching of a loan.

We are with Dr. Tejedor in many of his arguments, supposing the Argentine Republic to be in the same position as Savoy or Switzerland; but we deplore the fact that if these arguments and principles are applied to the River Plate there is an end to all immigration.

It is all very well for Dr. Tejedor to quote chapter and verse, and tell the half ruined English estancieros of Entre Rios of the practice in Italy, the precedent in Russia, and the opinions of the very British Cabinet itself on the subject.

When treating on this subject previously, we gave our distinguished Argentine Minister a case in point, where a Frenchman's mill was burnt by the Peninsular, and the British Government at once paid the damage.

As regards British claims for damages suffered in France during the German war, there is not the slightest parallel of analogy in the case; the whole question of claims hinges on civil war.

In waiving our right to question Dr. Tejedor's reading of International Law, we do so, merely to come at the real question, which is—Does it suit the interest of this country, to publish a notice to European capitalists and men of property, to the effect that in case of a row in the Republic, the Government is not responsible for damage done by the rebels, and more still, foreigners resident in the locality of the row must be treated as rebels?

The future of this country hangs upon foreign capital and foreign labor. Take from Entre Rios the foreign capital that within the last 20 years has found its way into it, and what is left?

The Argentine Government has refused to recognize the claims of foreigners in Entre Rios for the damages suffered by them at the hands of the Entre Riano rebels, and will only recognize foreigners' claims for damages caused by the National troops to the same extent and in the same manner as it will the claims of natives for similar damages.

compulsory military service whatsoever, whether by sea or land; and from all FORCED LOANS OF MILITARY EQUIPMENTS OR REQUISITIONS.

The treaty says nothing whatever about Government forced loans or Government military equipments—but speaks of all forced loans and all military equipments.

When the Entre-Riano revolution broke out, the Argentine Government forgot to publish a proclamation to foreigners, telling them that they should leave that province, as the Government could not protect their properties; and furthermore, if they remained they would be regarded as rebels.

The claims of foreigners in Entre Rios are, after all, a mere trifling in the consideration of this question: it is the precedent that Dr. Tejedor seeks to establish that is so ruinous to the nation and so dangerous to its future.

None who have closely studied the history of human affairs can have failed to observe that notwithstanding the varied triumph of error in subaltern matters, political errors never go unpunished.

The avidity with which the native press, and even the very Government itself has caught at this new theory of repudiation of foreign claims shows that the error has gained ground, and is regarded by all as a happy principle discovered by Dr. Tejedor to rid the country of every responsibility for its own torts.

There are Argentines who see the injury this 'puny wis- and pound foolish' policy is calculated to do; we hope, and believe, they will raise their voice in Congress, and with lofty patriotism defend the principles upon which up to the present every Argentine Government has acted.

We extract from a New York paper the subjoined article under this heading, as derived from the United States Census Report. The estimates are very carefully prepared, and show that every immigrant over 15 years of age, male or female, is worth 1193 hard dollars, say 30,000¢ of our money.

When the Argentine Republic that is now a favorite field for immigration, and to the same cause we must ascribe the prodigious growth of our exports during the past ten years.

The article we subjoin may form an interesting study for the general reader.

"We have received from the chief of the Bureau of Statistics, a special report on immigration, which contains much valuable information. We gather from the report, that prior to the year 1820 no official records were kept of the influx of foreign population to this country, but it is estimated that between 1770 and 1820 an aggregate of 250,000 immigrants transferred their allegiance to the United States.

More than one half of these have come from the United Kingdom and its Colonies, the German element embracing two-thirds of the remainder. The latter, with Scandinavians, are now taking the lead of all others, and they are of special value, being at once an industrious and an intelligent people, a large proportion settling in rural districts and developing the agricultural resources of the West and South, while the remainder, consisting largely of artisans and skilled workmen, find profitable employment in the cities and manufacturing towns.

The cost of an American farmer or a skilled laborer for the first fifteen years of his life is estimated at about \$1500, and that of a female of the same age about \$750. Assuming, then, the immigrants to be half males and half females, the average personal value of each to the country is equal to \$1125, by saving on the cost of living for the first fifteen years, in the case of all above this age, which includes five-sixths of the whole number.

The cash capital brought with each immigrant for an average is about \$68, which, being added to the previous average, gives \$1193 per head as the value of each one to the country above fifteen years of age. It is estimated that the increment to our natural wealth from immigration exceeds \$6,243,880,800.
